On motion of Mr. Leavitt of Effingham, it was

Voted: To instruct the County Commisisoners to appropriate the sum of \$250 to assist in completing the index of the records of Strafford County, provid the Belknap County Convention vote to raise or appropriate an equal or greater amount for such purpose.

It was the sentiment of the Convention that the salary of the sheriff of Carroll County be raised to \$300 per year.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS:

I beg leave to submit the following report of the activities of your law enforcement officers. At the May term there were found seven indictments, two for fornication, sentence 30 days in the House of Correction; one adultery, sentence suspended; two for larceny, sentence six months in the House of Correction; one breaking and entering in day time, sentence continued; one for non-support and this was continued by agreement of the respondent to pay \$3 per week to his wife.

At the October term there were found six indictments, one for fraud, sentence one year in Jail suspended; three breaking and entering in the night time, sentence all continued; two breaking and entering in day time, sentence suspended during good behavior in one case and the other continued for sentence.

The officers have been very dilligent in liquor prosecutions and we feel that there is no great amount of violations of the liquor law in the County. Sheriff Leavitt and his corps of efficient deputies are to be commended for their enthusiastic interest in law enforcement. The County is well guarded by these officers.
