TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Art. 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes:

1. Town Officers Salaries	\$2,550 00
2. Town Officers Expenses	1,300 00
3. Election & Registration Expense	1,000 00
4. Forest Fire Expense	500 00
5. Expense of Town Hall & Other Bldgs.	1,000 00

8. Expense of Civil Defense	100 00
9. Support of Board of Health	400 00
10. Support of Town Library	550 00
11. Purchase of Insurance	1,100 00

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the control of tent catipillars. (Not recommended by Budget Committee.)

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 as the Town's proportionate share for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital .(\$250.00 approved by Budget Committee).

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$12,500.00 for Town Road Maintenance.

Art. 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,500.00 for snow removal.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for street lighting.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$910.96 thereby receiving an additional \$6,073.09 from the State for Town Road Aid.

Art. 12 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,800.00 for the repair and upkeep of Equipment.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the support of the Poor.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 for Old Age Assistance.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for aid to soldiers and their families.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for support of the Town Beach.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for support of Town Cemeteries.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for Damage and Legal Expense.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$205.00 as Towns share in Monadnock Region Association.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to defray the Town's share of Old Age & Survivors insurance.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$280.00 for interest on Temporary Loans.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for Long Term Notes.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to continue the Road Improvement Plan as submitted by the Town Road Committee and adopted at Town Meeting March 10, 1953. (Included in Budget).

Art. 25 To see if the Town will vote to lay out a highway from David Ryan's house, on the northerly side of the old Keene-Brattleboro highway, northerly to the Albert Slade Poultry House and to see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the construction of the same. (By petition). (Not recommended by Budget Committee).

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the River Road near Governor's Brook that has been replaced by the new cut-off.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to reconsider Zoning Ordinance as printed in 1953 Town Report or act thereon.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the will of Etta Hubbard Hildreth, Item 3, the sum of \$200.00 addition to Cemetery Fund. Income to be used exclusively for care of lots, monuments, and markers on the lot of Amos R. Hubbard and Levi Ware in Chesterfield West Cemetery. Also to accept \$500.00 addition to Etta Hubbard Library fund from same will.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Helen B. and Joseph James, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the

Bescher-James burial lot in Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Bescher-James Fund.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Laura S. Atherton, the income thereof to be used for perpetual care and improvement of the William and Alanson Chamberlain lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery. Said fund to be known as the William and Alanson Chamberlain Trust Fund.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Ada E. Fowke, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Frank B. Fowke burial lot. Said fund to be known as the Frank B. Fowke Trust Fund.

Art. 32. To hear reports of Standing Committees and act thereon.

Art. 33. To Transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING, 1954

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 9, 1954.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and the Warrant through article one was read. The Moderator declared that balloting under this article was in order, for the election of all necessary Town Officers.

George Barrett as assistant Moderator and Mildred Gauthier as assistant Town Clerk took the oaths of office before the Town Clerk.

At ten o'clock the Moderator again called the meeting to order and the rest of the warrant was read by the Town Clerk. The articles were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Oscar Ericson and supported by Agnes Chickering to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as in 1953. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Harry Winn to authorize the Selectment to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Arvid Pearson, reporting for the Budget Committee stated that they had held three meetings, one of which was public. The attendance and interest was good but more should attend the public meeting. The budget was higher than last year because of the school and the West Chesterfield bridge. With what the Budget Committee had approved the tax rate might be five dollars or more. Voted by voice vote

on motion made by H. Claude Mowry which was supported that this report as given be approved. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Harry E. Winn to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes:

1. Town officer's expenses	\$2,245 50
2. Town officer's expenses	1,200 00
3. Election and registration expenses	1,200 00
4. Forest fire expenses	500 00
5. Expenses Town Hall and other town bldgs.	1,000 00
6. Expenses of police department	800 00

9. Expenses for civil defense	100 00
10. Support of board of health	400 00
11. Support of town library	550 00

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Harry Winn to raise the sum of \$12,500.00 for Town Road Maintenance, this sum to include tarring and completing new construction from Town Beach to Camp Notre Dame. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$4,500.00 for snow removal, about \$200.00 of this amount to be used for the purchase of new snow fence. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford Chickering and supported by Walter Post to amend the article to read "To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for street lighting," to take care of increased rates. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. A vote on the article as amended was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Newton Darling and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$905.80 thereby receiving an additional \$6,038.67 from the state for Town Road Aid. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by Harry Winn to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for support of the poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Robert Woodman to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 for Old Age Assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Agnes Chickering to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Agnes Chickering to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for aid to soldiers and their families. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$500.00 for support of Town Cemeteries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Harry Winn to raise the sum of \$300.00 for support of the Town Beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ronald Guyette and supported by Bertha Willette to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise the sum of \$500.00 as the Town's proportionate share for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Harry Winn to raise the sum of \$125.00 for Damage and Legal Expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$194.00 as the Town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region Association. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Oscar Ericson and supported by Clifford Chickering to allow Town Officers four and one-half percent ($4\frac{1}{2}\%$) of state head taxes assessed, for administration of the State Head Tax Law. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Clifford Chickering to raise the sum of \$300.00 to defray Town's share of Old Age and Survivor's Insurance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise

the sum of \$250.00 for interest on Temporary Loans. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$200.00 for interest on Long Term notes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Robert Woodman to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to continue the Road Improvement Plan as submitted by the Town Road Committee and adopted at Town Meeting, March 10, 1953. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Stratton Morse and supported by Agnes Chickering to tar the road from Route 9A at Tower Light Inn, past Tower Light Inn and golf course, to the tarred road at Brookside House, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Walter Post to amend the article and raise the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of rebuilding the bridge leading from north end of West Chesterfield village to the Marshall Farr Road so that it will have a load carrying capacity in conformity with the legal load limit for Town Roads, and securing State Aid. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative as amended.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Stratton Morse to amend the article and transfer the light on the road between the Cobleigh and Dodge Residences in West Chesterfield and install it on the northeast corner of the junction of Route 9 and the road past Walter Deselle's residence. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Harry Winn to pass over

the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 30. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Harold Putnam to amend the article and raise \$1,100.00 to purchase insurance benefits for workmen's compensation, equipment and public liability and fire insurance on public buildings. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. The vote was challenged and the Moderator called for a show of hands. This resulted in 44 votes for yes and 32 votes for no. The Moderator declared the vote as carried in the affirmative, also the article as amended carried in the affirmative.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Stratton Morse and supported by Paul Penning to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to put the gate house and gate at the outlet of Spofford Lake in good shape, the same to include painting gate house and putting new grates in front of the gate. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 32. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Agnes Chickering to accept the sum of \$52.16 from Jessie M. B. Joslin, to be added to the Geo. H. Joslin \$100.00 trust fund, the income from same to be used for the upkeep and perpetual care of the George H. Joslin burial lot in Spofford cemetery.

Article 33. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Grace Kearney to accept the sum of \$52.16 from Jessie M. B. Joslin to be added to the Ellen M. Ball \$100.00 trust fund, the income from same to be used for the upkeep and perpetual care of the Ellen M. Ball burial lot in Spofford Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 34. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Grace Welcome and supported by Oscar Ericson to accept the sum of \$150.00 from Mrs. Dora Hopkins, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Etta L. and

Albert E. Smith burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Etta L. Smith trust fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 35. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Grace Kearney and supported by Agnes Chickering to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Rollin H. Brown, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Clegg-Streeter burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be know as the Zilla Streeter Brown Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 36. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by Clifford Chickering to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mary Virginia Chickering the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Richard G. Chickering burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Richard G. Chickering Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 37. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by Fred C. Humphrey, Jr. to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 38. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by William Mitchell to Adopt the Zoning ordinance as drawn up by the Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative. This vote was challenged and the Moderator called for a paper ballot. This resulted as follows: Number of ballots cast 133. Necessary for choice 67. "No" had 83 and "Yes" had 50.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Thomas O'Sullivan, Jr. and supported by Walter Post that the meeting take up the zoning ordinance article by article and any general discussion be postponed until the last article. This vote also was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Malcolm Sullivan and supported by Russell Johnson to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 39. Robert Woodman reported that the Selectmen had contacted the Telephone Company about the rates on calls to Keene, Brattleboro and West Chesterfield and learned that we might expect the dial system with free calls to Brattleboro and Keene in 1956.

Article 40. John Prout reported that Chesterfield is one of three towns in the State not organized for Civil Defense and that he would take over as Chairman or Director if he could get enough support from the townspeople. He urged everyone to sign up for some phase of the work.

Joseph Sorrentino urged that the road leading from the "Green Pastures" Stand so-called, on Route No. 9 toward the Town Dump be improved.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Thomas O'Sullivan which was supported that the Selectmen should look into the legal aspect of giving money to both Keene and Brattleboro Hospitals. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Alice Spaulding, who is retiring as Treasurer, for her nine years of service.

No other business appearing, the meeting was recessed except for balloting by Australian Ballot.

At six o'clock the Moderator declared the ballot box closed and a count of ballots cast resulted as follows:

For Tax Collector. James C. Fisher had 247 votes and was declared elected.

For Road Agent. Newton E. Darling had 158 votes, Roger C. Spaulding had 95 votes, Ronald T. Guyette had 1 vote. Newton E. Darling was declared elected.

For Fireward. Clifford B. Amidon had 222 votes, Bernard Chickering had 2 votes, James Humphrey had 1 vote, Fred Stoddard had 1 vote, Hadley Winn had 1 vote, Arvid Pearson had 1 vote. Clifford B. Amidon was declared elected.

For Auditors. Thomas C. O'Sullivan Jr. had 200 votes, James A. Dodge had 19 votes, Carl A. Johnson had 16 votes, Homer Ellis had 4 votes, William Mitchell had 4 votes, Warren Allen had 3 votes, Paul Welcome had 2 votes, Oscar Ericson had 2 votes, Dorothy Spaulding had 2 votes, Virginia Parker had 2 votes, Merle Chickering had 2 votes, Clifford Tuttle had 1 vote, Margaret Nurse had 1 vote, Paul Penning had 1 vote, Grace Welcome had 1 vote, Roger Spaulding had 1 vote, Winston Cray had 1 vote, Frank Hubner had 1 vote, Henry Chickering, Jr. had 1 vote, James Fisher had 1 vote, William R. For Center Constable. Henry C. Chickering had 156 votes, William M. Gilson had 82 votes, Ralph Dick had 1 vote. Henry C. Chickering was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Constable. Bernard A. Chickering had 232 votes, Harry Winn had 1 vote, Newton Darling had 1 vote, Clarence Shippec had 1 vote, Paul Welcome had 1 vote. Bernard A. Chickering was declared elected.

SPOFFORD LIBRARY

The Spofford branch of the Chesterfield Library had a busy 1954.

A total of 43 persons made use of the library facilities as follows:

- 19 Spofford Residents
- 17 Summer residents
- 7 Out of town residents.

Of this total, there were 11 Juvenile readers.

273 books were circulated from the State Bookmobile and 7 special orders of books were obtained from the State library for 3 persons.

There was a gift of 9 books from an anonymous donor.

50 books from the Chesterfield library were obtained for the summer months and every alternate month throughout the year there has been an exchange of as many books as the librarian wanted, and this cooperation has been greatly appreciated. Although Mr. Tuttle, trustee in Spofford, has been willing to make this exchange, the librarian has, with his consent, taken it upon herself to select the books most often called for by those using the library.

During the summer months, Mrs. George Joslin, Jr., 4-H leader instigated a Children's Reading Hour at the Spofford Library. Childrens' records were borrowed from the Keene Record Library and an adult was present to read to the younger children. This was not continued, however, due to the fact that the attendance did not warrant it. Apparently the out-of-doors was more attractive.

It truly is a joy and a privilege to be able to serve those interested in books, both those of Spofford and those who

vacation here in the summer. The summer visitors are very appreciative of the opportunity to make use of the library, too, and they have nothing but praise for the variety and types of books we have.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Chesterfield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the eighth day of March 1955 at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip a two-classroom addition to the Chesterfield School.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the purpose of constructing and equipping a two classroom addition to the Chesterfield School and to authorize the school board to borrow on the credit of the district therefor; by issuance of serial notes or bonds and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which such notes or bonds shall be issued, including their sale, and the time and place of payment of the principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, New Hampshire revised laws chapter 72 as amended by chapter 55 laws of 1949, and chapter 5 laws of 1951 as amended by chapter 9, laws of 1953, or any other amendments relating there-to.

11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) for the employment of an extra classroom teacher and funds for necessary equipment, light and heat necessary to make a corridor space available for a classroom. (Pass over if addition is voted)

12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand seven hundred dollars (\$3,700) for one additional teacher and for additional cost of light, heat, insurance, etc. because of the two room addition.

13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for complete plans, specifications, fixed bids, etc. for a two-room addition. (Pass over if addition under articles 9, 10 are voted)

14. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand seven hundred dollars (\$2,700) for additional capital outlay on debt and interest charges necessary to retire bonds and interest on a two classroom addition.

15. To see if the district will approve the use of \$1,000 of the estimated balance of this year's funds, for the completion of the insulation work at the school estimated cost \$400-\$500; and the extension of the sewer disposal system in conformance with requests of the state health department, bid costs \$500.

16. To see if the district would like to hold the annual school district meeting in the evening at the school.

17. To see if the district will vote to adopt the provisions of chapter 34, sections 112-120 of the revised laws of New Hampshire; namely the non-partisan ballot system, for the election of all officers of the school district which have been customarily elected by ballot at previous meetings, the article if adopted to become effective at the annual meeting of March 1956.

18. To take up any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The Chesterfield School educational program is operating smoothly under the able direction and supervision of our principal, Mr. Gordon Decato and through the efforts of a capable staff. Mrs. Vanetta Emery, after a refresher course at Plymouth Teachers College, took charge of grade one and has done a capable and conscientious job with the little beginners. Mrs. Marion Nurse and her assistant, Mrs. Barbara Aldrich have continued their excellent lunch program work and feed a larger percent of pupils than other programs in the union. Mr. George Purrington, serving his first year as school custodian, has not only kept the building clean and comfortable but has also kept busy improving the building with painting and repair work.

A word should be said in favor and recognition of the fine work of the Chesterfield P.T.A. and its program for aiding and supporting school activities.

The major problem of the school is that of meeting the demands of a steadily increasing enrollment. The enrollment chart printed elsewhere in this report shows what we must expect from future enrollments of resident pupils only. This chart does not attempt to estimate the number of pupils who may move into the community during the next six years.

By 1958, we may anticipate an enrollment of 209 pupils at Chesterfield and the problem of, 'what to do' must be faced and solved now. To this end the school board has appointed a committee of six members, in accordance with district instructions, to study Chesterfield school problems. The board and committee have compiled a study report and recommendations to the citizens of Chesterfield. It is hoped that all will examine this report carefully and face these problems realistically. My own recommendation coincides with that of the board and committee.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield :

I herein submit my second annual report as principal of the Chesterfield School.

Children are God's gift to man. They are children for such a small period of time and during that time, the school and the parents have the responsibility of giving them the most complete and thorough training within our means. It is also our responsibility to help them to develop into capable citizens, not only of the United States, but of the world.

Tolerance, understanding, and faith in God are virtues that start in the home and are encouraged during school life. Would our world be in the condition that it is if we lived by the afore mentioned concepts?

The past school year has been most successful in many ways. Our family has grown considerably and from studying the school census, it will continue to grow by leaps and bounds. An additional classroom and teacher are needed for the coming

school year, to insure your children a continuance of the high grade of education they have been receiving. This is not a temporary condition, but one that will become more acute during the next three years.

Mrs. Vanetta Emery has joined our school staff and is doing a very capable job in teaching the first grade. The other members of the staff, Miss Esther Grout Grade Two, Mrs. Alice Spaulding Grade Three, Mrs. Laura Atema Grades Four and Five, and Mrs. Alice Bothwell Grade Six, have once again proven themselves to be excellent teachers and citizens of our community. Our entire staff has met the test of a good teacher. They have endeavored to keep up with ever changing ideas and methods by taking extension courses. We are indeed fortunate to have teachers of their calibre to work with the minds of our youngsters.

In order to teach saving, thrift, and the value of money, your children are encouraged to purchase United States Savings Stamps, through the school program. This is a relatively new program in our school, but functioning very effectively.

Our new custodian, Mr. George Purrington, assumed his duties shortly before school opened and has been doing commendable work. In his **spare** time, I don't know how he finds any, he has completed nearly half of the insulation work. We are noticing the effects of this insulation already.

Mrs. Marion Nurse, Lunch Program Supervisor, and her assistant, Mrs. Barbara Aldrich, have continued to serve the appetizing and nourishing meals that we all appreciate. A partial summary of the program follows:

During each month of the school year, the cafeteria staff serves an average of 2,380 meals or a total of approximately 21,000 meals a year. The Federal government contributed some \$1,000.00 cash aid to the program and some \$1,800.00 worth of foods. Among the surplus foods supplied to the program were; —dry beans, shortening, frozen beef, canned beef, potatoes, butter, cheese, grapefruit, dry milk, orange juice, peaches, tomatoes and salad oil.

With the Federal Program help, plus the charge of 25 cents per meal to the pupils; the program paid all its own expenses and closed the year with a balance of \$108.80.

The school nurse, Mrs. Marion Warner, continues to care for the physical well being of our children. This year she is urging our children to care for their teeth. Will you help us?

The Chesterfield School District Meeting was called to order by Moderator Harry Winn at 2:10 p.m.

The warrant was read by the Clerk.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

George Joslin moved that the Clerk cast one ballot for Harry Winn for Moderator for the coming year. Seconded by Mrs. Jessie Joslin. Motion carried in the affirmative.

The Clerk cast one ballot for Harry Winn for Moderator for the coming year, and declared him elected Moderator. He took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Henry Highton moved that the Moderator cast one ballot for H. Claude Mowry for Clerk for the ensuing year. Seconded by Robert E. Woodman. Motion carried in the affirmative.

The Moderator cast one ballot for H. Claude Mowry for Clerk for the ensuing year, and declared him elected. He took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Harold Putnam moved that the Moderator cast one ballot for Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering for a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. Seconded by Robert E. Woodman. Motion carried in the affirmative.

The Moderator cast one ballot for Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering for a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years, and declared her elected. She took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Mrs. Anna Hubner moved that the Moderator cast one ballot for Mrs. Evelyn Winn to serve as Treasurer for the ensuing year. Seconded by Mrs. Clara B. Wellington. Motion carried in the affirmative.

The Moderator cast one ballot for Mrs. Evelyn Winn to serve as Treasurer for the ensuing year, and declared her elected. She took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering moved that the article be passed over. Seconded by Mrs. Clara B. Wellington. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

There being no committees there was no action on this article.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering moved that the Town Auditors audit the school accounts this year. Seconded by Harold Putnam. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of the school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income: the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue, and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Mrs. Grace Welcome moved that Article 13 be voted on before considering Article 8, Seconded by Thomas O' Sullivan. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Thomas O'Sullivan moved that Article 13 be passed over. Seconded by Henry Highton. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Harold Putnam moved that the school district raise and appropriate \$57,323.60 and authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes. Seconded by Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate an additional sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be made available prior to June 30, 1954, to meet increased costs of transportation.

Harold Putnam moved that the article be passed as read. Seconded by Harry Ericson. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. To see if the district will vote the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for installation of doors on classroom supply closets. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee)

George Joslin moved that the article be passed over. Seconded by Harold Putnam. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for necessary work on the school roof.

Paul Welcome moved that the article be passed as read with this addition: in the event that we do not need the money to repair the roof, that the money be used for insulating the building. Seconded by Robert E. Woodman. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to continue the construction of the ball field. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee)

Henry Highton moved that the article be passed as read. Seconded by James O'Neil. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. To see if the school district will vote to discontinue the teaching of the seventh and eighth grades of the Chesterfield School, and transport same to Keene and Brattleboro schools, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,250.00 for transportation and tuition. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee)

See action taken under Article 8.

Article 14. To take up any other business which may legally come before this meeting. (This Article was omitted from the warrant. By direction of the Moderator it was inserted)

The Moderator asked for a show of hands as to how many favored sending the seventh and eighth grade students of the Chesterfield School to Keene and Brattleboro Schools, and a show of hands of those who favored keeping the seventh and eighth grades in the Chesterfield School. The show of hands was seventy-five percent (75%) for keeping the seventh and eighth grades in the Chesterfield School, and twenty-five per cent (25%) for sending them to Keene and Brattleboro Schools.

Thomas O' Sullivan moved that the School Board be instructed to appoint a committee to investigate the possibility of a progressive expansion program. The committee to determine the probable cost and that the committee submit it's recommendations to the School Board for action by the town next year. Seconded by Harold Putnam. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Arvid Pearson moved that the meeting be adjourned. Seconded by Thomas O'Sullivan. Motion carried.

CHESTERFIELD AND THE PROBLEM OF INCREASED SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

Report of the School Board and Study Committee
January, 1955

THE PROBLEM

The Chesterfield School was opened in September 1951. An estimated enrollment of 125 pupils was expected.

The actual enrollment by years follows:

Sept. 1951	139 pupils enrolled
Sept. 1952	160 pupils enrolled
Sept. 1953	172 pupils enrolled
Sept. 1954	186 pupils enrolled
Sept. 1958	209 pupils are expected to enroll

A six classroom school has, under state recommendations, room for 168 pupils. We are at the present time, over-crowded, but by dividing up classes, are able to care for the present extra load.

The Problem is:

What will we do to care for the children now living in Chesterfield, who will in Sept. 1958 enter the school and total 209 pupils?

The Facts:

This report is an attempt on the part of the school board and a study committee, to present all the facts on this problem and to suggest possible solutions.

SUGGESTED SOLUTIONS TO THE PROBLEM

SOLUTION 1

SEND GRADE 8 OUT-OF-TOWN AS TUITION PUPILS

- A. This idea rejected by votes at March 1954 meeting.
- B. Keene School Board refused in 1954 to take grade 8.
- C. Brattleboro cannot accept grade 8 because of overcrowding.
- D. Hinsdale and Walpole are crowded.

Therefore: Trying to solve the problem of overcrowding in Chesterfield by sending pupils out of town, does not appear to be the answer.

SOLUTION 2

EMPLOY AN EXTRA TEACHER IN THE CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL.

- A. An extra teacher would permit all grades to have a teacher except grades 4 and 6 which would be combined under one teacher.
- B. This would give us 7 teachers but only 6 classrooms.
- C. The activities room-lunch room would have to serve as the extra classroom;

But: The lunch program would have to be curtailed and the room would not be available for music or any other activities.

And: For two hours each day when the lunch room is being set up, used, and cleaned up after lunch; the extra class would have to hold its classes in the school corridor.

FURTHER-MORE: Such a plan would only put off the problem until 1958 when 8 teachers and 8 rooms will be needed in Chesterfield.

SOLUTION 3:

CONSTRUCTION OF A TWO-ROOM ADDITION TO THE SCHOOL.

A. The enrollment of 209 pupils in 1958 will be such that eight rooms and eight teachers will be necessary.

B. The figure of 209 pupils does **NOT** include any pupils from new families moving into Chesterfield; this figure therefore, may be too low, but is based upon children **NOW** living in the community.

C. Eight classrooms would enable Chesterfield to educate all elementary pupils at home and would care for an enrollment of up to 265 pupils in the future.

D. Educating all elementary pupils at home is considerably less expensive than paying tuition and transportation to any out of town school which might become available.

E. An eight teacher school would increase the educational opportunities of the Chesterfield School.

1. From the standpoint of adequate room for our present child population in Chesterfield, **eight** classrooms will be necessary by 1958.

2. From the standpoint of cost, the addition of two rooms is the least expensive solution to the problem. Construction and operation being estimated at \$6,400 per year while transportation and tuition is estimated at \$12,000 for the first few years.

3. From the standpoint of providing adequate educational opportunities for our school children, the additional rooms would be a great advantage. Then each grade would have its own teacher; the classes would be near the desirable maximum set by the state; there would be more opportunity for individual instruction and an enrichment of the whole school program.

4. Using the present auditorium for a classroom would tend to restrict or eliminate space for class plays, dances, PTA meetings, graduation exercises, the music program, etc.

5. Use of the hallway for over-flow class space would be dangerous in case of fire; would necessitate the installation of additional light and heat in the corridor and would not meet with approval from the State Department of Health and Education.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The School Board and the Study Committee unanimously recommend that the school district of Chesterfield approve the construction of a two-room addition to the present school, furnished and financed at a cost not to exceed \$25,000.00, to be ready for use in September, 1955.
