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### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Danville on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at four of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects: (Business Meeting at 7:30 P. M.)

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in improving the cemeteries.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

11. To see how much of the Parsonage Funds the town will vote to spend for preaching for the ensuing year.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for an Athletic Field.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to be used in repairing the Red Schoolhouse in Middle District.

15. To see if the town will vote to prohibit Sunday hunting.

16. To see what action the town wishes to take regarding a Town Forest.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Blister Rust.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### FOREST FIRE PREVENTION PAYS DIVIDENDS

---

Most forest fires are preventable because someone is responsible for them. State records for 1950 show 94% of 632 fires resulted from human perversness and carelessness. Refusal to secure the required warden permit before burning; failure to use good judgment, lack of equipment and assistance while burning; carelessness in smoking and poorly conditioned woods equipment (trucks, tractors, etc.) resulted in a total of 6090.6 burned acres with a loss of \$63,949.10 in valuable property.

Fortunately, these human factors can be dealt with because people can be reached. This the local forest fire warden tries to do by informing his fellow citizens that **EVERYONE MUST:**

1. Secure a written permit to burn in or near woodlands when the ground is not covered with snow.
2. Use good judgment in burning and have enough equipment and assistance to keep fire under control at all times.



3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands and refrain from throwing lighted material from automobiles.
4. Make certain that all equipment used in the woods is in good condition.

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Danville qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district, on the ninth day of March, 1951 at eight o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

## REPORT OF MUSIC TEACHER

---

To the Superintendent and School Board, Citizens of Danville:

Children learn a great deal about music through songs, rhythms, folk dances and games. These activities will add greatly to their enjoyment and understanding of music.

A Christmas Operetta was presented in the Town Hall in December and through the cooperation of the teachers parents, and pupils proved successful.

## HEALTH SUPERVISION

---

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Board:

Your School Nurse welcomes this opportunity to inform you in regard to what has been accomplished from the standpoint of health education during the past year.

The children received the usual yearly physical check-up consisting of an examination of teeth, tonsils, posture, vision, and hearing as well as weighing and measuring. Little Health Talks on timely subjects were given in the classrooms. Home visits have been made, and follow-up work carried out.

Probably no subject is of greater concern to parents and teachers than the health of the children in their care. The parents have shown an increased interest in establishing a closer relationship between school and home in the mutual striving for better health objectives.

The Maico Individual Audiometer, a recent acquisition of our Union, has been most useful not only as a hearing test, but as a check on the possible impairment of hearing caused by measles, ear infections, scarlet-fever, etc. The T. B. Patch test was given to all pupils in the seventh and eighth grades.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks for the full cooperation of the parents, teaching staff, friends, and public organizations that have given time and enthusiasms toward the betterment of our health program.

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

I take pleasure in submitting my first annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

Many things have taken place the past year to effect the educational picture. The unsettled national situation is very apt to effect the number of young people graduating from our teacher training institutions: the spiraling cost of living is effecting everyone, and the increased costs of supplies, necessary equipment, and maintenance is bound to effect every school budget..

As part of this report there will be a page devoted to Return of District Revenue, which shows the actual budget that the school district is operating under for the current year. (50 - 51) In comparing this with the projected budget of 1951 - 52 I would ask you to review the items mentioned above.

### REPAIRS

It is hoped that during this coming year needed repairs on the roof can be accomplished. There is also the items of lights for Mrs. Winslow's room. A new duplicating machine would be a definite addition to the instructional and social functions of the school. It is hoped you will see fit to provide your teachers with this desirable piece of equipment.

## TEACHERS

Danville has indeed been fortunate in providing a fine corp of teachers for its young people. Good instruction demands continuity and the School Board and citizens are to be commended for their recognition of this fact. Excellence of instruction in the classroom and of performance in school social functions has become a worthy tradition.

## LOOKING FORWARD

It would be a fine project if local organizations could pool their resources and devise some way for providing hot lunches for children of the Eaton school. The rooms in the rear of the building would be very adequate for a Class A program if the problem of heating could be solved. This is a project worthy of community cooperation.

Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to the school board, citizens, teachers and pupils of Danville for the spirit of cooperation and friendliness with which they have received their new Superintendent.
