

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING **DEERING, N. H., MARCH 14, 1944**

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of Deering, N. H., was called to order by the Moderator, Carlton M. Sherwood, at 9:55 o'clock in the forenoon. After the warrant was read a motion was made by Howard Whitney to take up the articles following article one at eleven o'clock. It was so voted.

Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth, it was

voted to close the polls at 5:15 o'clock.

Article 1. Votes were cast for all officers on the Australian ballot as follows:

Selectman for three years: Jav F. Kincaid had 26 votes: Arthur O. Ellsworth had 60 votes and took oath of office.

Town Clerk: Gladys A. Ellsworth had 41 votes; Marguerite L. Dutton had 46 votes and took oath of office.

Town Treasurer: Gladys A. Ellsworth had 40 votes; Marguerite L. Dutton had 47 votes and took oath of office.

Highway Agent: Hobart D. Kiblin had 27 votes: Howard E. Whitney had 65 votes and took oath of office.

Overseer of Poor: Chairman of selectmen had 35 votes; Arthur O. Ellsworth had 47 votes and took oath of office.

Tax Collector: Arnold K. Ellsworth had 26 votes; Chester P. McNally had 62 votes and took oath of office.

Auditors: Eunice E. Willgeroth had 80 votes and took oath of office; Marjorie A. Holden had 81 votes and took oath of office.

Library Trustee: Edith L. Parker had 28 votes; Charlotte K. Holmes had 46 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds for three years: Ida D. Kincaid had 43 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds for one year: Wendell D. Putnam had 19 votes; Gladys A. Ellsworth had 54 votes and took oath of office.

Constables: Carroll E. Greene had 28 votes; Everett H. Abbott had 29 votes; William Dumais had 54 votes and took oath of office; Harold G. Wells had 56 votes and took oath of office.

Surveyor of Wood and Lumber: Everett H. Abbott had 70 votes and took oath of office.

Article 2. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$2,000.

Article 3. Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to raise \$2,500.

Article 4. Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to raise \$500.

Article 5. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to authorize selectmen to deliver inventory blanks.

Article 6. Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to authorize selectmen to borrow money.

Article 7. It was voted to authorize selectmen to use present funds to pay P. W. A. bond.

Article 8. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$800.

Article 9. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted not to raise \$300.

Article 10. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$700.

Article 11. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$40.

Article 12. It was voted to pay sixty cents an hour for labor, seventy-five cents for road agent, and one dollar and fifty cents for trucks. After discussion on

motion that road agent be authorized to pay an extra sum for work done at night, and in other emergencies, it was not a vote.

Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted that all officers except those on an annual salary basis receive same pay as road labor.

Article 13. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to authorize selectmen to buy caterpillar tractor when and if one is available, and to borrow money for same.

Article 14. Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to pay the moderator ten dollars.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deering, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House, in said Deering, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for highways and bridges; \$2,000 for winter roads and \$1,000 for summer roads.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$300.00 for interest and insurance.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 to cover long term P. W. A. bonds.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for street lights.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$300.00 for Blister Rust Control, or pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise a sum of \$40.00 for the Monadnock Region Association.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$700.00 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor.
- 10. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing.
- 12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to establishing prices in regard to labor.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to pay \$5,700 out of money on hand if a new tractor is available.
- 14. To see if the Town will accept the Memorial Tablet from Wolf Hill Grange No. 41 for World War II Veterans.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise \$600.00 for the T. R. A.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

GENERAL REPORT

During this period of severe strain when many rural schools in the state have been forced to close their doors because of teacher shortages and other difficulties, it is gratifying to realize that our Deering schools have been able to continue on in a fairly regular manner.

The anticipated crowding at the East Deering School did not develop. Of the present enrollment of twenty-seven, five will graduate this year. It is anticipated that five more will enter this school next year so the total enrollment will probably be the same for 1945-46. Two of the eight pupils at West Deering will graduate in June. At this time it seems that there will be no pupils entering the first grade at West Deering next year. Thus the enrollment for 1945-46 will be only six pupils. The State Board of Education will not give State Aid for schools with such small enrollments.

The attendance at West Deering has been excellent. Pupils are there every day, and on time, unless they are forced to remain at home because of severe illness. Several times they have had 100% attendance for the whole month. Due to many and varied causes the attendance at East Deering is very poor. This school has the poorest record for attendance and tardiness of any school in this area. However its record is improving and is better than last year. The pupils are handicapped often times because of poor traveling conditions. Several days the school buses have not been able to make their trips. Yet there are many cases in which the children have been unnecessarily detained at home. There is almost never any reason

for tardiness. I would like to make a strong appeal to all parents to help in this matter so that in the future the East Deering school may have a much better

record in attendance.

The transportation is much the same as it was last year. Mr. Locke operates two routes, starting at the Center and carrying the Manselville pupils to Hillsboro. Then he returns through South Deering and carries the pupils to East Deering. Mr. Johnson makes two trips carrying the North Deering pupils to East Deer-There is no transportation at West Deering.

The pupils continue to do their part in winning the war. Each week many of them bring their savings to school and purchase War Stamps. They have also assisted in the picking of milk weed pods and the collection of waste paper. Allen Kiblin was selected as one of ten in the state for his work in the Scrap Drive. to be considered for a prize of a free trip to Boston. Unfortunately he lost out in the final drawing of names.

The School Board hoped to make extensive and necessary repairs on the school houses last year but found that labor was very difficult to hire and very expensive. Some painting and temporary repairs were made at East Deering. Much more would have been done if labor and material were readily available.

In conclusion I want to thank the School Board. Teachers, Attendance Officer and Citizens who have assisted in our attempt to maintain good schools in

Deering.
