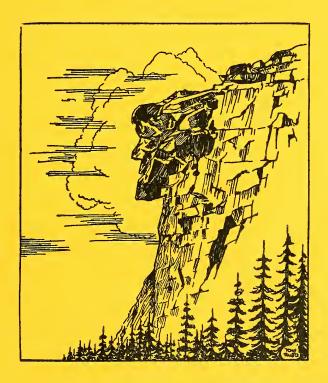

Town Meeting Warrant

(As known February 18, 1956)

- Article 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- Article 3 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Pine Blister Rust reserve fund.
- Article 4 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used for Rag Weed control.
- Article 5 To see what action the town will vote to take to provide for the disposal of rubbish and garbage and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- Article 6 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Vital Statistics, the Littleton Hospital and expenses of the Health Department.
- Article 7 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purchase of a new truck for the Highway Department.
- Article 8 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of highways and bridges, snow removal, oiling of its roads, and for Town Road Aid.
- Article 9 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for the lighting of streets for the ensuing year.
- Article 10 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the highway department.

Article 11 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for sidewalk up-keep and repair.

Article 12 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Abbie Greenleaf Library the sum of \$500.00 for librarian's salary and \$100.00 for the purchase of new books.

Article 13 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

Article 14 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used for proper observance of Memorial Day.

Article 15 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of its cemeteries.

Article 16 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for a band concert.

Article 17 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$174.34 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 10c per \$1000 of the assessed valuation (1/100th of 1%) for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter and advertising and otherwise publicizing the advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the region.

Article 18 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for maintenance of the Information Booth at the Town Building.

Article 19 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for legal expenses.

Article 20 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to defray the town's share of Employees' Social Security.

Article 21 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following: \$2,500 to pay the amount maturing on the Town Building and Water Works bonds; \$1,000 on outstanding Fire Equipment and Garage notes; \$528.86 on outstanding Gale Reservoir Construction notes; \$1,200 on outstanding Mittersill Road Construction notes; also the sum of \$982.87 to pay the interest on said indebtedness and on temporary loans.

Article 22 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,700.00 for payment of the Grafton County Tax.

Article 23 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate necessary funds for Old Home Day Celebration.

Article 24 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,000.00 to develop Mc-Gowan Spring. The amount raised to include the construction of a reservoir and filter-bed at McGowan Spring; to pipe said reservoir to Howe reservoir and to build a road from McGowan Hill Road to Howe reservoir along the Town's Right-of-Way to maintain said system. Such sum of money as raised by the Town to be borrowed on Long Term Notes. Recommended by Commissioners of Franconia Water Department, John Welch, Merton Shores, Richard Sullivan.

Article 25 To see if the town will vote to contribute the sum of \$25.00 to the N. H. Marine Memorial Commission.

Article 26 To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for Fire Department for new hose and other equipment needed.

Article 27 To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for Civil Defense.

Article 28 To see if the town will vote to purchase the so-called D'Urso lot for public use and raise necessary funds for same.

Article 29 To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to allow a discount for early payment of taxes.

Article 30 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 31 To see if the Town will vote to purchase the land owned at present by the Trustees of Dow Academy, located between the river and Academy Street for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00).

Article 32 To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE 1954-1955

The school health program was carried on as usual. Complete physical examinations were done on sixtynine pupils by Dr. Ralph Parker, school physician.

Eye testing was done on all pupils and hearing tests

were done in the first four grades.

Eight children attended the toxoid clinic for immunization and vaccination.

Polio vaccinations were done on nine first and

second graders.

Dental clinic was started in January and held once each month. Pupils of the second and sixth grades were examined by Dr. G. A. Clark and seven pupils were treated. The members of Greenleaf Civics Club were very faithful in transporting the children.

Registration day was held in June for the incom-

ing first grade and was very successful.

One child attended the Child Guidance clinic and one the Orthopedic clinic held in Littleton.

Two children have received assistance from the

Crippled Children's Service.

I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Farris and teachers for their cooperation and assistance and also to the members of the Greenleaf Civics club for their assistance at the clinics.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Franconia School District:

I herewith submit my thirteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The total enrollment of your school last year was 127, with 40 pupils in Grades IX through XII and 87 in Grades I through VIII. The average membership was 109.9 and the percent of attendance was 94.8. There were 41 tuition pupils, 20 of whom were in the elementary grades and 21 in the high school.

This year the total enrollment is 132, with 37 in Grades IX through XII and 95 in Kindergarten through Grade VIII. There are 39 tuition pupils enrolled at the present time; 15 elementary pupils and 8 high school pupils are from Lisbon Town No. 3; 2 kindergarten, 5 elementary and 3 high school pupils are from Easton; 5 high school pupils are from Sugar Hill and one kindergarten pupil from Bethlehem.

Mr. Oliver Cole replaced Paul Farris as Principal of Dow Academy. This is Mr. Cole's first year in administration. He is doing well. School runs smoothly and efficiently under his direction.

The major building repairs at Dow Academy are now complete. We expect only normal maintenance items for the next few years.

Kindergarten was established as a half day program, morning sessions in the fall and afternoon sessions during the winter months. In addition to her Franconia duties, the teacher, Mrs. Ruby Harris, teaches at Lincoln on a half day basis also. She is very successful in her work.

Franconia is fortunate to maintain its Shop program this year. Because of the teacher shortage several of our neighboring communities have discontinued their programs. We were lucky to find a man leaving industry to return to teaching.

It is difficult to forecast happenings in education for the next few years. Country-wide the United States loses many more teachers than it gains. About 50,000 new college graduates enter the program while 90,000 teachers leave, a net loss of 40,000 qualified teachers. This has gone on for several years now.

How can we hold our best teachers? How can we attract teachers to Franconia? How can we encourage Franconia children to become teachers?

If your son is to become a teacher he will want the respect of the community, good working conditions and a salary that permits him to support a family well. Let's all put our shoulders to the wheel, supply these conditions and insure a good education for Franconia children.

I wish to thank the teachers, the School Board and the many interested townspeople who help the children with their education activities.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

I herewith submit my first annual report as Principal of Dow Academy.

ADMINISTRATION

Dow Academy, a public school, is divided into two divisions, elementary and secondary. The elementary school consists of Kindergarten and the first six grades; the upper six grades constitute a Junior-Senior High School.

The school year, which began September 9, 1955, will terminate June 15, 1956. School vacations were scheduled as follows: December 20 to January 3, Christmas vacation; February 27 to March 4, Midwinter vacation; and April 20 to April 30, Spring vacation.

Dow Academy's school day, which permits a thirty minute period at noon for lunch, begins at 8:15 A. M. and closes at 2:15 P. M. The Elementary school's time schedule differs slightly in that they are dismissed at 11:30 A. M. for their noon period and school closes at 2:30 P. M. The school busses arrive at approximately 8:00 A. M. and leave at 3:00 P. M. This gives our students time after school for meetings with their teachers or the opportunity to get additional materials for their home study.

Attendance is a prime and fundamental factor in the operation of a good school. The regularity and promptness of Dow's students in attending school has rated consistently over 95% in both the elementary and secondary schools.

The faculty of Dow Academy is basically the same as last year. New teachers to Franconia are Mr. Richard Dunbar and Herbert Gebelein. Mr. Dunbar is from Newport and is teaching science and shop classes. Mr. Gebelein taught part of last year at Lisbon and lives in Rockport, Massachusetts. He is a graduate of Indiana University, and has done his graduate work at Purdue. Mr. Gebelein is teaching Social Studies and coaching boys' athletics.

Mrs. Janice Darling resigned her position as Commercial teacher and moved to Plymouth at Christmas time. Mrs. Agnes Andross, a Commercial teacher with six years experience, replaced her.

Miss Janet Stewart teaches English and French and coaches girls' athletics.

The Elementary Grade School teachers are the same as last year. Mrs. Alice Leavitt teaches Grades 1 & 2, Mrs. Helen Wood, Grades 3 & 4, and Miss Nancy Klingensmith, Grades 5 & 6.

Dr. Ralph Parker and School Nurse, Phyllis Rogers, who has replaced Nurse Irma Simeneau, continue to render their fine services in keeping the school children in good health. Complete physical examinations, including a blood count and urinalysis, were given to all students whose parents so desired. Mrs. Rogers has also conducted eye and ear examinations. The Dental Clinic was again held with the cooperation of the Greenleaf Civics Club. This year Polio vaccinations were made available for all those between the ages of one and fifteen years.

The School Lunch program, under the guidance of Mrs. Emma Dexter and Mrs. Maude Cotnoir, who was replaced by Mrs. Edith Stevens in November, has proved more than satisfactory in its new cafeteria. This is the first time that a full year's program has been held. I wish to thank the Greenleaf Civics Club and all others who have been so cooperative in making this possible. It is of extreme value to the good health and development of our pupils.

Music is continuing to improve through the efforts of George McLure and Mrs. Marion Callender. Mr. McLure is the band director. The combined Dow-Bethlehem School Band is showing much progress. Several members are working very diligently to earn a trip to Washington, D. C. with McLure's Student Band. Mrs. Callender instructs 7th and 8th Grade Home Economics, Singing, Music Appreciation and Dancing.

Mr. Merton Shores is School Custodian, and continues to be of great value in the operation of our school.

CURRICULUM

The elementary school is functioning under the State Program of Studies. Similar courses are taught in the majority of elementary schools in the state. A new marking system has been established on the following basis: A—Excellent progress; B—Good progress; C—Average progress; D—Below average progress; and F—Failure to meet minimum requirements. This system was adopted to make the marking system as consistent as possible throughout the entire school. Personal letters written three times a year are used in the kindergarten and first grade.

The high school has three curricula from which to choose: The General; the Academic, or College Preparatory; and the Commercial. In each curricula, sixteen units are required for graduation, four of which are in English, and one in U. S. Constitutional History, taken during the Junior or Senior year. A unit is made up of one course for one school year in which a grade of 70% is attained. College grade work is 85% or above.

Franconia's kindergarten has been in operation for the first time this year. Its daily schedule is from 9 to 11:30 A. M. September to Christmas vacation, and 1 to 3 P. M. for the rest of the school year. Mrs. Ruby Harris is the teacher. It meets each school day in the Franconia Town Hall.

ATHLETICS

The Dow Academy Athletic Association, a student organization, has been in charge of the athletic program. It has sponsored the following athletic activities: Golf, Boys' and Girls' Basketball, Baseball, Softball, and Skiing. Student participation in these activities is very good. Athletics are an integral part of our school program, from which students derive many benefits.

ACTIVITIES

The following activities are presently carried on in our school: Dramatics Club, Glee Club, Cheerleading, Ski Lessons, Student Council, Yearbook, Class organizations, and Prize Speaking.

Some of the accomplishments of these organizations have been: A three-act Play, Magazine Drive, Ski Meets, Dances, Food Sales, Assembly Programs, and an annual Prize Speaking Contest.

The students have worked hard and have been very cooperative in making these activities successful.

CONCLUSION

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the students and staff members of Dow Academy and the people of the community for their fine cooperation and support in making this a successful school year. It has been a pleasure working with Mr. Ronald Perham and the Franconia School Board, both of whom are continually trying to give us a better school in which to educate our children.

Your Town Report and Your People's Information

Your Region Association has had in 1955 one of the most active years. Naturally, the highlight was the Presidential visit in June, and we were honored by taking a direct part in various phases of the planning which went on for months previous. Seldom has the limelight been so directly centered on the White Mountains in a national scale.

Through all the complications and confusion surrounding that planning we somehow found time to carry on our normal schedule of work benefiting our towns. Much outside travel has carried the "message of the mountains" personally to Boston, Hartford, Springfield, New York, and Philadelphia. Events such as a Guides' Show and a Women's Golf Tournament were promoted and brought gratifying publicity. Stories and pictures were placed in many publications, and thousands of publicity folders distributed, as well as direct mall answering of several thousand letters and cards with information.

Our annual 4-H contest continues to have heartening results in encouraging young people's efforts through this fine organization. Another standby, the real-estate bulletin, has put property prospects in touch with property owners and realtors all over the region.

Is it all doing you, the tax-payer, any good? "Yes!" to that. We tracked down some of our mail inquirers in a random sample again this year. We found that out of just this small sample (500 letters and cards) we had 100 parties that spent just over \$17,000 in the Region! That represents over 2½ times the amount appropriated by all our towns last year. We're sure you would all be glad to invest \$1.00 to get back \$2.50, any day.

Naturally this income isn't the only total we brought in, as there are many, many more we have no way of tracing. But it does show this is big business. It means that these people are paying big sums of tax money that doesn't come out of your pockets. With your continued help we can ease the burden of the tax load in all towns, bringing outside money to help pay for state and local services that otherwise you'd have to finance.
