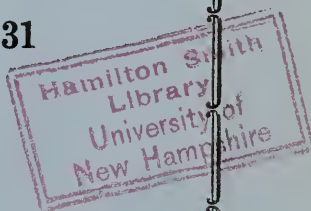

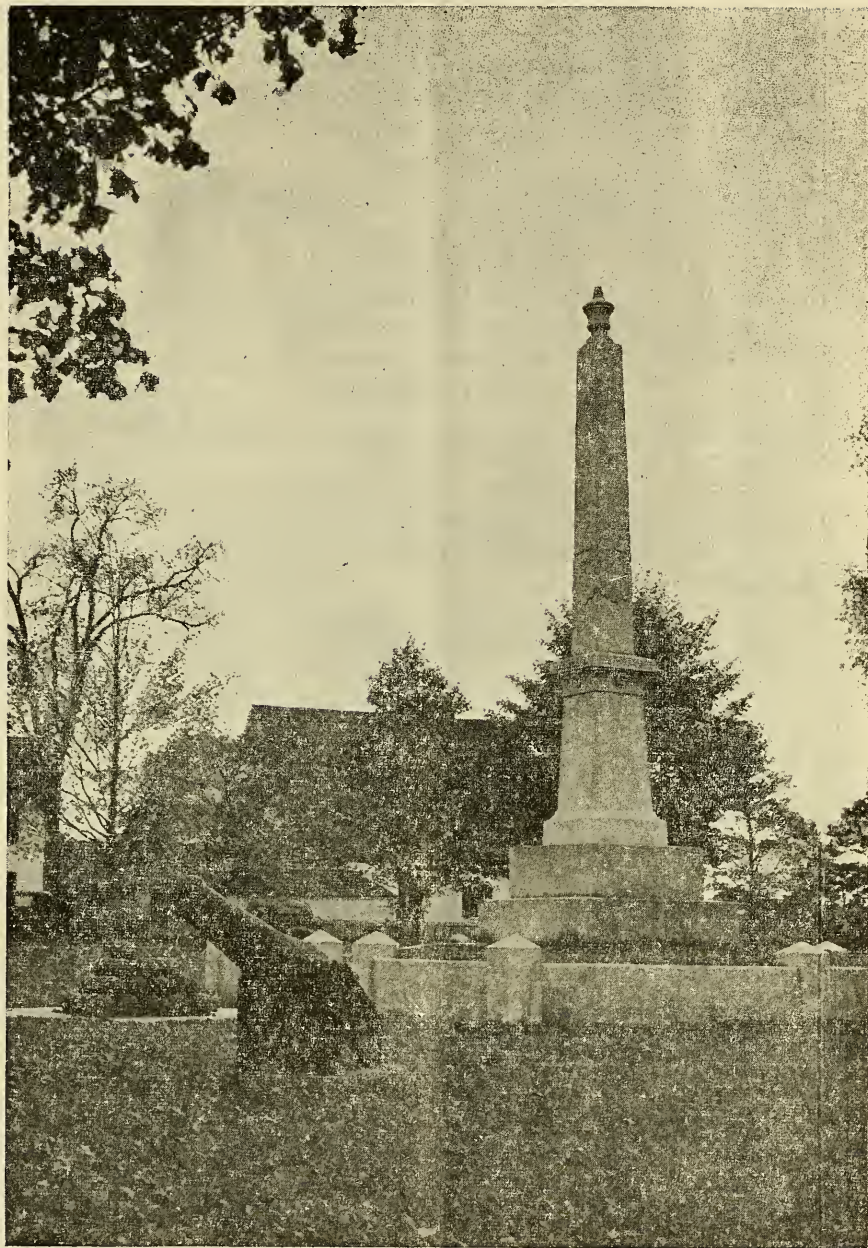

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$206.81, the State contributing the sum of \$827.25 to be spent on the Cork Hill Road, under class 5 aid.
4. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the purchasing of fire equipment and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
5. To see if the Town will vote to purchase or hire suitable land for a ball field and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
6. To see what action the Town will take on caring for the Town dump and to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum for the same.
7. To see if the Town will vote to install a circulating heater in the upper hall and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

8. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter to call attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town and to assist in planning and development for the benefit of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association the sum of \$69.00.

9. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum to provide watchmen and additional police protection due to the war emergency.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum for the use of the town health officer and board of health due to the war emergency.

13. To see if the people of the Town will vote to sell the North School House.—By Request.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officers and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to borrow a sum of money not to exceed \$3,600 for the purchase of a school bus, the sum so borrowed to be paid back in five equal installments during the next five school years, the first installment to be payable during the school year, 1942-1943.

10. To consider any other matters that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton Falls:

I herewith submit to you my twelfth report as Superintendent of your schools. The financial and statistical report is that of the school year 1940-1941—the last completed school year.

The upper grade room experienced a particularly trying year from September 1940 to June 1941, since three different teachers were in charge during this time. It is a credit to the pupils and teachers that all of our sixth grade of last year entered Hampton Junior High are reported to be doing good work. We are proud of them as we are of all our pupils.

The current school year began Wednesday, September 3, 1941, with an enrollment of forty-eight and the grades rather evenly divided with the first grade largest, numbering ten, the others with seven, eight or nine. This compares with last year's September enrollment of forty-six.

The statistical report shows that the people of Hampton Falls, both parents and children have faith in their schools, for percentage of attendance is 95—well above the state average. The first requirement for a good school—that the pupils attend regularly—is fully met.

I believe Hampton Falls is to be congratulated that its teacher of the first grades is again in charge. Miss Nichols is a skillful teacher. She likes and understands children. Miss Gardner, in the upper grades, is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College and is well qualified for the task of preparing our children for the work of Junior High grade.

Music and Art become more important in time of stress and world turmoil. The work of Mrs. Naves and of Mr. Hawkins is more necessary at this time than in previous years. Participation in musical concerts and in exhibits is good but it is the daily contact of pupils with teachers and their interests that really produce the results from which our children benefit most.

Hampton Falls is now transporting forty-nine pupils to

the Hampton schools. To these must be added the twenty-five transported to the local school. As a trial attempt to cut down the expense of this item, the hours of the local school were changed slightly and the two bus routes joined into one. This will result in a saving of \$410.00 transportation costs during the current year. Many school districts, some in New Hampshire, are finding it is good business to own their school busses. I am recommending that Hampton Falls consider seriously the purchase of a bus. The original purchase money can be spread over a term of years, on a school meeting vote, thereby entailing no extra expense during the purchase years. The district itself would then be responsible for the bus, its upkeep and equipment.

As in most New Hampshire towns, Hampton Falls is sending an increasing number of pupils to High School. Our pupils are forming an integral part of the schools to which they go and are taking their full responsibility for the reputation of the school whether it is in scholarship, athletics or the varied school activities. These committees are glad to have our pupils with them.

Teachers, as a group, are devoting much extra time to war work and will continue to do so. Some are air raid wardens, some are taking their turn at observation posts. Some are in Red Cross Work and large number are attending first aid classes. As citizens and teachers they are under a double obligation since by the very fact of war, children are placed in added dangers. Children who must hear of a confused and war-torn world wherever they turn are by that fact less easily taught. This necessitates added skill and added preparation on the part of the teacher. This fact will be recognized I am sure.

I wish to thank you as a board for valuable help received by me in the duties of my office.
