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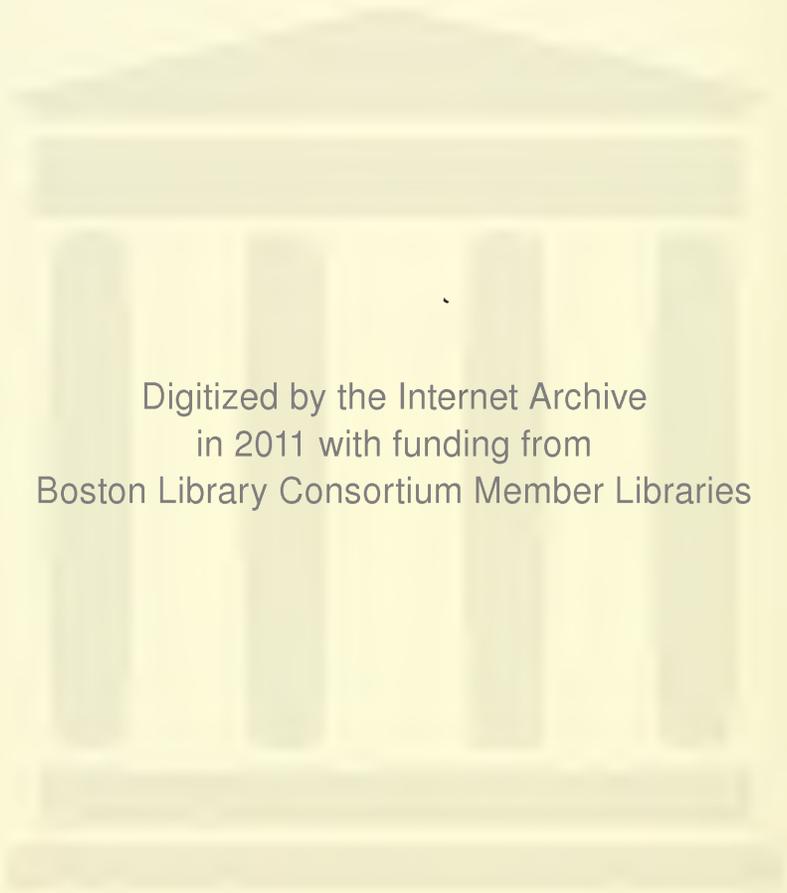

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill:

In making the Selectmen's report for 1971 we take this opportunity to bring to your attention several facts and events of lasting significance to the town. These are not necessarily listed in order of their importance because only time can accurately measure the impact of these decisions and efforts.

To be of aid in maintaining the health and welfare of low income residents of our town and in compliance with State and Federal regulations, a Surplus Foods Program has been established. It is our feeling that this has been of real assistance to many people. This program requires much donated time as well as Town funding. Mrs. Sue Bruckner is to be commended for her efforts in getting this program working.

Early in the year negotiations were initiated to install gasoline pumps belonging to this Town so that fuel for road work could be purchased on State contract. This project has been accomplished and is proving successful both in dollars saved and convenience to the Highway Dept.

Through the year we watched with interest the growth of the Newbury-Haverhill bridge and on Nov. 2nd the Selectmen of Haverhill, with Mr. Mann, Chairman, as spokesman, took part in the Dedication Ceremonies. The flow of traffic which crosses the bridge daily points up its potential usefulness now and in years to come.

In keeping with change in the business world we will, for the coming year, be contract-hiring a Police cruiser instead of buying one. Because of increased population in our Town, and because of increased flow of traffic thru the area the Police Dept. has more and more demands made upon it for your protection. We feel that Chief Cummins is doing an outstanding job in this department.

This year, due to increased gas tax, the Town of Haverhill received a "block grant" of \$11,827.88 from the State of N.H. for maintenance and construction of roads. This helped to hold down the tax rate in the area of road maintenance.

Your Road Agent has had no choice but to repair or rebuild many bridges and culverts this year. Among these was the Blake bridge which crosses the Oliverian. Another was a bridge in the No. 6 area. Mr. McKean has shown much interest, effort and ingenuity in keeping costs down while keeping quality

of workmanship high. We feel that he and his crew deserve your appreciation and approval.

It was with regret that we accepted the resignation of Mr. William Miller when he felt it necessary to present it to us. This necessitated many and drastic changes in the work load of this office. It also charged the remaining Selectmen with the responsibility of filling that office until the next Town Meeting. Mr. Richard Kinder of East Haverhill was approached and consented to assume this responsibility.

Your Selectmen are concerned about the ever-increasing tax rate. During the year 1971 the taxes raised for Town and Road expenses was 21% of your total tax bill, the rest of your tax money going for precincts, School and County taxes. We would hope that with care and cooperation your Town's % of the tax would maintain about the same level this year.

The interest, support and cooperation of the people of the Town of Haverhill is greatly appreciated by the Board of Selectmen.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Lest We Forget—It Can Happen Here

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds, but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellarholes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947. Nothing could stop the wind-driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand—a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them **dead out** when leaving.
4. **Most Important**—Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year—1971—was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES

"The silent influence of books is a mighty power in the world; and there is a joy in reading them known only to those who read them with desire and enthusiasm. Silent, passive, and noiseless though they be, they yet set in action countless multitudes and change the order of nations"—Henry Giles

Each year, we think it is impossible to top last year's circulation. Each year, more books go out. In circulation for 1971, we very nearly hit the 29,000 figure, and we're up 600 books from last year. In other words, the Woodsville Free Public Library continues to surge onward, and we, the trustees, and librarians couldn't be more pleased.

Patrons also enjoyed new, up-to-date reading tables, chairs, book display tables, and a magazine rack. No longer is there need for anyone to read standing up, miss seeing the latest best seller selections, or do deep kneebends to choose a magazine.

The school crowd work well together at the new study tables, and noise and confusion is much less than one might think. Library work has been streamlined to fit school assignments. Encyclopedias and reference works are handy, and teachers inform the librarians well in advance of future projects. Demands for reading materials are often in excess of supply, so for school work, the librarians sometimes insist that wanted books be used at the library, not taken out. They have also had to limit some new fiction, one to a person at a time. When counting our blessings, the Bookmobile is high on the list. It still operates, after months of State Library memos that it might be a budget casualty. In 1971, we topped all other libraries in this region again by borrowing 6771 books from the Bookmobile. In addition, we ordered about 537 books from Concord to fill individual orders.

Right now, instead of receiving, we are giving. We have donated some good fiction to Haverhill Jr. High library, all duplicates, that we felt would be good to share. Also, Mrs. Leonard has given outside time to a most worthwhile project, helping to create a library at the Grafton County Home for the residents there. Our library has shared books, especially those in large print, and it is the feeling that it is good to have the Woodsville Library represented and involved in such a project.

Programs and services for children have been most successful. The librarians have attended schools, visited classes, and invited pupils to participate in poster contests. Posters done during Childrens' Book Week and National Library Week have made fine displays. Prizes were books, titles chosen by the winners.

Forty to fifty youngsters signed up for the Summer Reading Club. The theme this year was "My Vacation Bookshelf" with each entrant making a bookshelf poster out of miniature books cut from colored paper, briefly reviewed, with author and name of book carefully recorded.

Cooperation with the school libraries and teachers gets more involved and challenging. Assignments are as changeable and complex as world events. Librarians must cope with requests for books on Cryogenics, Lyophilization, LSD, the Laser Beam, and transplants. Recently, a Junior High class came in for material to write a paragraph on ten subjects ranging from poverty and welfare to Vietnam and inflation. Confusing, but routine, all in a day's work at the Woodsville Library!

The all-purpose room downstairs is in constant use, for study and research, meetings by various organizations including the Golden Circle of Senior Citizens, TOPS, and an interdenominational Bible class for youngsters from area churches.

One last item—at a recent State Library meeting held in Littleton, librarians were urged to cultivate what is known as "OUTREACH", a new term meaning to get more people into the library by reaching out to them in various ways. Wouldn't you say that YOUR library is a member of good standing in this program?

THE 1971 COMMUNITY RECREATION REPORT

The 1971 Woodsville Community Recreation Program commenced in January with a pee-wee basketball league composed of players ages 9-11. Coaches were Victor Roy, Arnold Heath, Bob Fraser, and Bradley Ashley. The league was highly successful in that it catered to the needs of the younger players. Clinics were held for instructional purposes both for the 9-11 and 12-13 year age group.

Saturday afternoon recreation mainly basketball was conducted for the older (high school age) groups. Little League baseball was continued in May with a double-round robin being scheduled. Coaches were Floyd Gibson, Arnold Heath, Bill Crawford, Jack Graham, and Victor Roy. Playoffs were won by Jack Graham's H. O. Taylor team in a close game over Floyd Gibson and Arnold Heath's Larty's nine.

Babe Ruth baseball for ages 13-15 was continued with Woodsville being again entered in the Triangle Babe Ruth League. The Woodsville entry won the League and had several players selected for the Babe Ruth All-Star team which competed in the Vermont Babe Ruth Tournament.

The Recreation Summer Basketball League continued with an independent schedule that included: Concord, N.H., Lebanon, Berlin, White River, Vt., Groveton, Littleton, Pembroke, Bishop Brady and Burlington, Vt. The league was particularly successful in that it offered competition against larger schools and towns with the prospect of improvement in the caliber of play.

A women's softball league was organized and assisted by Pierre Baker. This league operated on Monday nights at the Woodsville Elementary School. The 1971 summer youth recreation program began in July and had a particularly fine summer. No days were lost to swimming and a high measure of success was achieved in the swimming program. Hall's Lake again was used in the conduct of the swimming program and Herbert Chamberlain's bus was employed for transportation to and from Hall's Lake. Two picnic hikes were conducted, as well as the annual pet show, bicycle rodeo, crafts exhibit and doll fashion show. 29 students from Wells River participated in the program and a total of 189 were enrolled and registered in the overall program. The Y-R program culminated with the annual swimming meet and field meet in which many trophies, ribbons, certificates and swimming cards were given out.

It has been agreed upon by the Recreation Commission that all students outside the Precinct of Woodsville be assessed a fee to participate in the Community Recreation Program. It was further agreed that this fee be \$30.00 for the entire program. This would include eligibility into the Summer Y-R Program, Little League basketball, Little League baseball, Babe Ruth baseball, and summer basketball.

Anyone participating in the Little League basketball program will only be assessed \$5.00. The same fee will apply for Little League baseball. This is for anyone residing outside the precinct of Woodsville. This will be effective the 1st of May 1972.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF HAVERHILL, in the County of Grafton and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in North Haverhill in said Town on Tuesday, March 7, 1972, at Eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters. Articles 1-3 inclusive will be decided by written ballot. The polling booths at the Town Hall in North Haverhill will be open from 8 A.M. to 6 P.M. for voting on these articles. At 6 P.M. the meeting will be adjourned to reconvene at 8 P.M. at the James R. Morrill Elementary School Auditorium in North Haverhill, in said Town of Haverhill, for consideration of the remaining articles in the warrant.

ARTICLE 1. To choose by non-partisan ballot one Selectman for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Clerk for a term of one year, a Town Treasurer for a term of one year, a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, a Highway Agent for a term of one year, and a Tax Collector for a term of one year.

ARTICLE 2. To elect by ballot, delegates at large, alternate delegates at large, delegates and alternates to the national conventions of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for president and vice-president of the United States; and to vote on the ballot of the party of your choice, your preference for one person to be the candidate of your political party for President of the United States and one person to be the candidate of your political party for Vice-President of the United States.

ARTICLE 3. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendments of the New Hampshire Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.

ARTICLE 4. To announce the results of the balloting.

ARTICLE 5. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners and any other Town Officers and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To choose one or more Auditors, one Library Trustee for the term of three (3) years, one Cemetery Commissioner for the term of five (5) years, and all other necessary Town Officers.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V Highways, as provided in Chapter 241 RSA, as amended.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways for the repair of the Bath-Woodsville covered bridge, to appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 to cover the Town's share of the costs thereof, of which sum \$8,000.00 is to be raised by taxes for the current year, and the balance by borrowing. The Selectmen are hereby authorized to borrow said balance by giving notes therefor to be repaid within one year.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to make alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for support of the Town as recommended by the budget committee in its report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for said purposes, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing notes or orders in anticipation of taxes, to provide for expenses of the current year.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks by mail, or at the same time they examine the taxable property.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, or to sell real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed, by public auction sale or by advertising for sealed bids.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a Budget Committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next annual Town Meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will accept and lay-out as public highways the roads in the Mountain View Acres development in North Haverhill, New Hampshire, and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town, a deed therefor, at no cost to the Town.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract with the New Hampshire State Tax Commission for re-appraisal of all properties in the Town of Haverhill.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the voters will authorize and direct the Moderator to appoint a Committee of five citizens to undertake a study of the feasibility of instituting a Town Manager form of government for the Town, which committee is to conduct a study into any benefits the Town could derive from such a form of government and report their findings at the next annual Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make available town owned land to be used for industrial purposes.

ARTICLE 18. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD**1971**

The Planning Board received 21 applications for sub-division approval during 1971. These applications involved the creation of hundreds of individual lots. Subdivision regulations do not restrict the location of the subdivision within the town or in anyway control the use of the land once the approved plan is recorded. They do provide certain basic standards with which the subdivider must comply.

Review of applications involves a study of the plans, consideration of soils information, topography, and drainage. Often an examination of the land in question is necessary for the Board to be assured that minimum standards are met.

The Planning Board members serve without pay or compensation for expenses. For technical assistance we have relied on the USDA Soil Conservation Service and other agencies who have provided information at no cost to the Town.

The Planning Board was directed by the 1970 Town Meeting to formulate and prepare a comprehensive ordinance controlling and regulating the use of land (zoning). It is hoped that this ordinance and the basis for an overall Town Plan can be developed from the work of five voluntary subcommittees representing Woodsville, North Haverhill, Haverhill Corner, Center Haverhill-Briar Hill and East Haverhill-Pike.

A lot of work has been done by some of these committees but due to a shortage of working time, apathy from the majority of residents and a lack of assertive leadership the proposed ordinance is not yet ready for presentation to the voters.

A closer rapport between the various boards and committees working in the interests of the Town of Haverhill is anticipated and will be a considerable step in providing unity in the goals and objectives in the future development of Haverhill.

Our school district has been one of the hardest hit in the state in cutback of funds to local school districts. In order to illustrate the impact of these cutbacks the following is presented for your information:

At this date the school budget to be presented for the school year 1972-73 is at approximately the same figure as the current budget. In order to "hold the line" several teaching assignments will be terminated and other areas of the budget have been trimmed. It should be pointed out that we are attempting to maintain the status quo from a budgetary point of view but maintaining services that have been part of our cooperative district since its inception. We feel the opportunity for a good education is available if a child wishes to take advantage of it.

Your central office has recently completed a study of past school enrollments and projections for the future. These figures may change according to in and out migration and school drop-outs. In addition this chart should give the voters some picture of budgetary commitments vis-a-vis school enrollments:

**REPORT OF ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS
1971-1972**

I herewith submit my second annual report to the voters of the Haverhill Cooperative School District.

Once again we began our school year with a two day workshop attended by the entire staff of Supervisory Union #23. The workshop was held at the Lin-Wood High School and featured Dr. John Petroski from the Department of Education of the University of New Hampshire who spoke on the subject of "Building a More Relevant Curriculum." The workshop dealt with a wide range of subjects including the identification of children with behavioral problems, the computer in education, sensitivity training, early childhood education, environment and ecology, and the education of children with learning disabilities. The reaction to the workshop on the part of teachers and consultants was very favorable.

The teachers at the elementary level have formed two committees, one to investigate ways in which to improve our elementary school library services and another to consider the feasibility of a continuous progress reading program in grades K through 6.

We have extended our program for children with learning disabilities into grades seven and eight. This activity is being directed by Mrs. Jane Reed who meets with small groups of children giving them individual help in the learning areas where they are experiencing difficulty.

I am happy to report that participation in our school lunch program has increased over the past year and that the programs continue to operate on a self-sustaining basis. Many thanks to our lunch operators and their assistants who do such a fine job both from the standpoint of efficiency and economy.

May I take this opportunity to thank everyone for their fine cooperation during the past year.

The term "education" denotes many things and is subject to many interpretations; however, regardless of definition the

ultimate aim of any educational system is to provide the students with the necessary experiences in the academic and extra-curricular areas. It is essential that they obtain sufficient knowledge, adequate skills and proper attitudes so that when they emerge from our schools these persons will be equipped with the essential tools necessary to adjust and to contribute profitably to the life process.

With this basic philosophy in mind, Woodsville High School is attempting to meet the needs of its students through its curriculum and extra-curricular programs. The program of studies has been strengthened by the inclusion of a consumer education course, independent study programs in science, and greater emphasis on vocational training in the business and home economics areas.

Much benefit to our school has been gained through an extensive self-evaluation process by our faculty in preparation for the visitation in the spring of 1972. This evaluation committee, representing the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, is an invaluable source to help us insure that our students are receiving an education which is consistent and comparable with other schools of similar circumstances throughout the New England Area.

The fall of 1971 saw a number of changes in the faculty personnel at Woodsville High School. In the *English Department* Mrs. Barbara Clough was replaced by Miss Katherine Reny; also Mrs. Virginia Kendall was replaced by Mrs. Glenda Evans. Mrs. Linda Stoddard and Mr. Daniel Nason were replaced by Miss Judith Saunders and Mr. Neil Crowell, respectively, in the *Science Department*. Other changes included Mr. John Dryden who succeeded Mr. Leigh Asplund as the Industrial Arts instructor; Miss Harriet Polner assumed the duties of guidance counselor from Mr. William King, and Mrs. Patricia Roy replaced Mr. Barry Liveston in the *Mathematics Department*.

As in past years we continue to stress and encourage student participation in the school's extra-curricular program as we feel that many educational and social benefits are gained through such involvement. Junior Prom, Winter Carnival, concerts, plays, etc. are actively supported by a large percentage of the student body.

During the 1970-71 school year we were extremely pleased and proud of our students in the play production, "The Wizard of Oz", and in the performances of all of our athletic teams with special recognition to those members of the basketball and baseball squads who achieved state championships. Much credit for these accomplishments must be given to the coaches, advisors and directors for their time, effort and leadership in promoting the student activity program.

In conclusion I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, the W.H.S. faculty and the people in the Town of Haverhill and the surrounding communities for their continued support and cooperation.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I hereby submit my annual report for the school year ending June, 1971.

School opened in September, 1970 with an added enrollment from the previous year (168), principally because of the inclusion of the 7th and 8th grade pupils from the Warren school district. They have been a good addition to our school and seem to have acclimated well.

We had only a few changes in the teaching staff which is included elsewhere in the school district report.

Our curriculum was basically the same as the previous year with the addition of some so-called "Mini courses". These courses such as gun and gun safety, chemistry, dramatics, winter carnival, knitting, cake decorating, shop for girls, etc. were given for a short time (6-8 weeks) to give the pupils an opportunity to add to their knowledge in some field that would not have been possible in the regular curriculum. These courses proved quite popular and were changed from time to time throughout the year.

The usual testing program was carried on—8th grade in the fall; 7th grade in the late winter.

Open House was observed in October with a large attendance of parents and interested townspeople. It is always gratifying to have parents and friends visit us whether it is Open House or anytime during the school year.

Last year for the first time, the Junior High had a winter carnival which was well done not only by pupils but by the faculty members in charge—Mr. Steeves and Mr. Riach.

The pupils visited a number of places on field trips—Apollo 11 at Montpelier, Planetarium at Plymouth, Barre Granite Quarries and the Science Center at Squam Lake.

A Christmas music program was presented at Alumni Hall by the 8th graders and the 7th graders presented a spring program under the direction of Miss Emery.

We had our usual sports program—Soccer, basketball for girls and boys, baseball and softball.

Our assembly program for the year was of the highest level. We had assemblies on such subjects as drugs, alcohol abuse, and IFYE delegates who had been to various countries, as well as Robert Hammond, a crew member of the U.S.S. I submit herein my annual report of the Woodsville Elementary School for the year ending December 31, 1971.

The school enrollment as of the writing of this report is 214 pupils. The enrollment by grades is as follows: Kindergarten—21, Grade 1—27, Grade 2—26, Grade 3—41, Grade 4—32, Grade 5—36 and Grade 6—31. Grade 3 is split into two sections because of the large number of pupils and Grades 1, 2, 4, 5 and 6 have a helping teacher who works part time in each grade.

Two changes in the teaching staff took place this year. Mrs. Geneva Jones is now teaching grade 2 replacing Mrs. Dorothy Schuyler who has retired. Miss Janet Armstrong, a graduate of Lynchburg College in Virginia, was hired as an additional third grade teacher.

The school lunch program is proving very popular with the youngsters. Approximately 155 pupils are being fed each day. The program is under the direction of Mrs. Marjorie Paronto.

Educational television from channel 15 in Hanover is being widely used in the school. Programs being used by the teachers are in the categories of Health, Literature, Music, Science and Social Studies.

Achievement and intelligence tests were given in October to grades 4 and 6 under the State Testing Program. Tests given were the Stanford Achievement Test Battery and the Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests. Under the State Program these tests are machine scored by the Bureau of Educational Research and Testing Services at the University of New Hampshire. Stanford Achievement Tests are given in grades 1, 2, 3 and 5, Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Tests in grade 3 and Metropolitan Readiness Tests in kindergarten under local sponsorship.

A program of Speech Therapy under the sponsorship of North Country Education Services is available in the school. Miss Jeanne Yeane, the speech therapist, is working with 9 youngsters at Woodsville Elementary School.

White Mountain Community Services Center at Littleton:

Several pupils were referred for testing during the year. We are fortunate to have this center serving our area.

October 13-14, 1970 the Speech Therapists from the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center were in the area to re-evaluate pupils with possible speech and hearing defects. Ninety pupils were screened by the therapists. Following the findings of these tests seventeen pupils received Speech Therapy at school.

May 12, 1971 four pupils went to Littleton for a complete hearing test with the Audiologist from the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center. Children with defects were referred to their own family physicians for follow-up treatment.

On October 15, 1970 there was a special program regarding drugs at the Junior High School. The program was presented by Mr. Heron and was very interesting and helpful to the staff and pupils.

The Haverhill Dental Clinic was held during March and April with a total of seven mornings. Sixty one pupils were examined with forty three needing treatment. A total of 124 fillings and 24 extractions were done. Three of the extractions were permanent teeth, (children in 2nd grade) and this stresses the need for early dental examination and care. Again the Ladies Auxiliary to the Haverhill Memorial V.F.W. Post sponsored transportation for the clinic. The following people donated their cars and time: Mr. and Mrs. James Morgan, Mrs. Norman Demers, Mrs. Eric Davis, Mrs. Norman Davis, Mrs. John Farnham and Mrs. Harlan Hutchins. I want to thank each one that helped make this clinic possible.

In February the Dental Hygienist from the N.H. Division of Dental Public Health Services presented a special Dental Health Program to grades K-6 at the Woodsville Elementary and the Morrill Elementary Schools.

On January 15, 1971 Dr. Jamback came to the Woodsville Elementary School and examined 186 pupils for dental defects. We are grateful to Dr. Jamback for donating his time for these examinations. Later in the Spring we had 5 mornings for Dental Clinic. Thirty two pupils were treated for a total of 91 fillings and seven (7) extractions. I want to thank the Salvation Army and the Lionesses for the money they donated to make this clinic possible.

March 16, 1971 the Special Cancer Film was shown to Senior girls and their mothers. Dr. Berry was present to answer questions following the film.

We are fortunate to have Mrs. Carol Smith, Public Health Nurse, working in our area. Mrs. Smith held a series of three Well Child Conferences at the Woodsville Parish House. The clinic was sponsored by the N.H. Division of Health and the local 4-H Club. Dr. Eastman did the physical examinations and administered immunizations. Mrs. Maccini, R.N., Mrs. Jamback, Mrs. Conrad and their committee worked at each clinic. Each clinic was very well attended and many children received necessary immunizations.

I want to thank the Cohase Lions Club for their continued support with the Sight Conservation Program.

I also want to thank all that gave clothing to be used where needed.

On May 6th and 7th, 1971 pupils were registered to enter kindergarten and 1st grade in September, 1971.

During the year I attended two School Nurses' meetings and several conferences with the Staff from the White Mt. Community Services Center in Littleton. I also had an opportunity to visit the Lisbon Development Center for exceptional children.

This year for the first time I have had a part time aide to assist me with a variety of tasks. Mrs. Paul Mayette has been invaluable by assisting with records, clinics, correspondence, etc.

I want to express my appreciation to Mr. Mullen, Dr. Eastman, Mr. Donald Evans, Mr. Howard Evans, Mr. McKelvey, the Teachers, Parents and Pupils for the cooperation given me this past year.

SUPERVISORY UNION #23

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses are prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union #23, during 1971-1972, will receive a salary of \$18,000.00, which is made up as follows: \$2,500.00 to be paid by the State Department of Education and \$15,500.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,500.00 for travel within the Union is also prorated as stated above.
