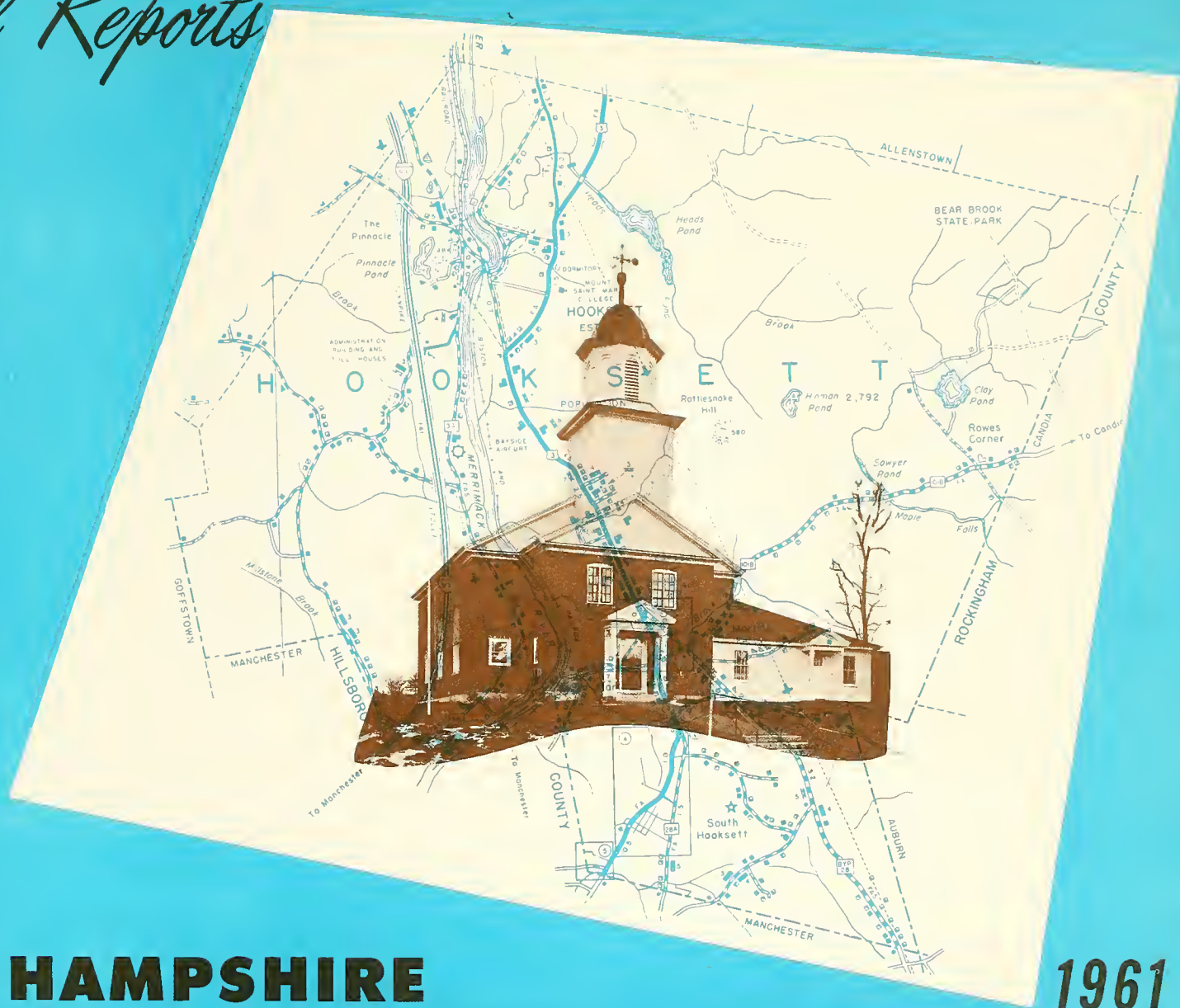

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## TO ALL RESIDENTS OF THE TOWN OF HOOKSETT

Your Board of Selectmen respectfully submit herewith a report on the state of affairs of this town for the year of 1961.

Two years ago, our state and national leaders predicted that the decade 1960-69 would be one of decision and progress from a national plateau down to the local municipal level. In every respect, to date, this has been a true prediction. The truth of this prophecy is certainly very much in evidence in our own Town of Hooksett.

The population and taxable property growth has increased steadily in 1961. Again we are happy to report that commercial and residential properties have increased in an even proportion. We know of nothing that indicates a healthy economic condition more precisely than does the manner in which our commercial increases have kept pace with our population and residential increases. The above mentioned increases are not only healthy from an economic standpoint, they also afford the town officials and various boards an opportunity to plan the future development of the town in a more accurate manner.

Article six of the 1960 warrant, was voted upon in the affirmative. This article authorized and appropriated funds for the reconstruction and renovation of the old Town Hall, thus making a modern municipal building, housing all town offices, police department and municipal court. Early in the summer of 1961 the implementation of this article was begun, under the construction supervision of Mr. Roland Levesque. The project was finally completed in October of the past year. The Board of Selectmen are happy to report that this project was brought to the present stage of completion for the sum of seventeen thousand nine hundred twenty-four dollars and sixty cents, thus leaving a balance of seventy-five dollars and forty cents in the appropriation of eighteen thousand dollars voted at the annual meeting of last March.

It is the firm conviction of this Board of Selectmen that no finer facilities exist anywhere in the State of New Hampshire for the conduction of town affairs, than those now enjoyed by the Town of Hooksett and its officers. Surely this project has been a milestone on the road to progress.

It seems fitting at this point to express our appreciation for the fine spirit of cooperation that was accorded the selectmen by all people involved in bringing to completion this worthwhile project of public enterprise.

An affirmative vote on Article eight of the 1960 warrant, created an Industrial Advisory Council and provided funds for their use. This Council was duly formed and have been functioning with dispatch for the greater part of the last year. They are presently engaged in smoothing out the last details of a definite plan for promoting the industrial and commercial potentialities of the Town of Hooksett. The Selectmen sincerely hope that the town will see fit to continue the functions and activities of this council in the future.

The Board of Selectmen, with the support and encouragement of the Advisory Council have tried hard to convince the State Department of Education and affiliated committees, that Hooksett would be an ideal location for the proposed New Hampshire Technical Institute. To date, this site has not been chosen and there is a distinct possibility that Hooksett may yet be given consideration for the location of this desirable institution.

During the past year, the Board of Selectmen along with various local organizations and individuals have been engaged in an attempt to secure from the United States Post Office Department a central Post Office for the Town of Hooksett. If we are successful in bringing about the installation of such an office, the multiple mailing addresses now prevalent in Hooksett would be done away with, and mail service would improve for everyone. It can readily be seen that the establishment of a central Post Office in the town would constitute a very significant benefit to the economic development of Hooksett. We therefore urge everyone to do whatever he possibly can as an individual to further this project.

The Police and Fire Department of this town have as usual, provided during the past year, the excellent protection of persons and property that they have provided in past years. It is only through a true devotion to duty, and a consuming interest in the affairs of our community by the men of these departments that the superlative service enjoyed by all, can be maintained at such a low percentage of our tax dollar.

As we close this report, may your selectmen take this opportunity to thank all elected and appointed officials of this town as well as many other public spirited citizens who have been instrumental in making 1961, a year of progress, in the record book of the Town of Hooksett.

# Town Warrant

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hooksett in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs. You are hereby notified to meet at the Fairlane Ballroom, Route 3A in said Hooksett on Tuesday the thirteenth (13th) day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to cast your ballots for Town Officers. . Polls close at 6:30 P.M., action on remainder of warrant starts at 7 P.M.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount of two (2%) per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before the fifteenth (15th) day of July, and to grant the Selectmen authority to extend this date if unable to get tax rate from State Tax Commission as of July 1st.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of the 1962 taxes, to be repaid therefrom.

4. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Agents, Auditors and Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred twenty-six dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$526.59) the State to furnish three thousand five hundred ten dollars and sixty-one cents (\$3,510.61) the same to be expended under the State Highway Department for Class V Town Road Assistance, or take any action thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of each Selectman by one hundred (\$100.00) dollars. Inserted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum, not to exceed ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars, for the purchase of a new town scavenger truck. This sum to be borrowed on the credit of the Town and amortized over a period of five years, and the yearly payments to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund of the Town. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand nine hundred and seventy-five (\$1,975.00) dollars for the purpose of installing a new engine and a new fire pump on Engine #3 of the South Hooksett Fire Department; and also to pay the remaining balance of the heating system. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty (\$250.00) dollars to build a public boat launching ramp on the Merrimack River. Said ramp to be constructed on the northerly end of the town lot formerly used as a refuse site. Inserted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application, in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended, and to enter into such negotiations and do whatever else is required for an advance, in an amount not to exceed thirteen thousand (\$13,000.00) dollars, to be made by the United States to the Town of Hooksett to aid in defraying the cost of surveys, reports and plan preparation for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of Hooksett. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

11. To see if the Town of Hooksett will vote to sell the building known as the Fire House of Hooksett Fire Department #1, to the Hooksett Village Water Precinct for the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars. Inserted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

12. To see if the Town of Hooksett will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand (\$15,000.00) dollars for the construction of a new Town garage on an area belonging to the Town, known as the Lefebvre lot, formerly used as a rubbish disposal area by the Town. The apportionment of the fifteen thousand dollar appropriation would be as follows:

- a. \$5,000.00 derived from sale of Fire House.
- b. \$4,000.00 paid into Town Treasury by School District.
- c. \$6,000.00 appropriated by Town.

Inserted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

13. To see if the Town will convert the present Town garage to a Fire Station, to be utilized as such by the Hooksett Fire Department #1. Inserted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

14. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Cemetery Commission, consisting of three members appointed by the Board of Selectmen, to be responsible for the general administration of the Town's Cemeteries, including their operation and maintenance, the sale of lots and maintenance of such records as shall be required by the Board of Selectmen and by RSA 289:4. Inserted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

15. To see if the Town will vote to give the dishes, silverware and other cooking utensils, formerly used at the Town Hall, to the Hooksett School District, or take any other action in relation thereto. Inserted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

16. To see if the Town will vote to amend the New Streets and Extensions of Existing Streets Ordinance by deleting Section 1, Paragraph B, and inserting in its place the following:

Section 1, Paragraph B:

All new streets, or extensions of existing streets shall have a roadway twenty (20) feet in width, properly graded and graveled to a depth of twelve (12) inches. In addition shoulders must be graveled to a depth of not less than eight (8) inches.

If curbing is installed, roadway shall be graded from curb to curb to depth of not less than twelve (12) inches.

Slopes shall be graded and guardrail installed, where necessary, in accordance with State of New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highway Specifications. Inserted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

17. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Streets and Extension of Streets Ordinance by adding the following to Section 1, Paragraph D. "This includes any and all utilities other than public utilities, such as electric, gas and telephone". Inserted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee or take any other action in relation thereto.

ABSTRACT OF ACTION ON ARTICLES IN WARRANT  
MARCH 14, 1961 TOWN MEETING

Meeting called to order by the Moderator George A. Cook at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Voted to keep the polls open for the duration of the business part of the meeting.

ARTICLE 1. Officers chosen in open meeting; Weighers of Commodities: Homer Enderson, Rutger Broek, Leslie M. Pike, John Bates, Roland Casey, James Gilbert and Edward O'Connor. FENCE VIEWERS: George A. Cook, Walter B. Scott, George Blakeslee and Edward DuDevoir.

SURVEYORS OF WOOD AND LUMBER: Walter B. Scott and Alfred Rousseau.

HOG REEVES: Armand Roberge and Raymond Greene.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to give a discount of two per cent on all taxes except poll and head taxes, paid on or before the 15th day of July, and to grant the Selectmen authority to extend this date if unable to get rates from the State Tax Commission as of July 1st.

ARTICLE 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of the 1961 taxes, to be repaid therefrom.

ARTICLE 4. Voted to accept the report of Town Officers, Agents and as printed in the Town Report.

ARTICLE 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$523.37, the State to furnish \$3,489.11 the same to be expended under the State Highway department for Class V Town Road Assistance.

ARTICLE 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000.00 to be amortized over a period of six years, to convert the existing Town Hall into a Municipal building, housing the Executive, Judicial and Administrative offices, as outlined in the Building Committee's Report. A ballot vote was requested, using the checklist, with the following result: Total number of votes cast 177, necessary to pass 118. YES - 121, NO - 55. Moderator declared article thereby adopted.

ARTICLE 7. Moved and supported to pass over this article having to do with establishing rental rates for the Town Hall.

ARTICLE 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to use for publicizing and promoting the Town's industrial potential to industry interested in locating in Hooksett.

ARTICLE 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 for the installation of a new hot water heating system for the South Hooksett fire station.

ARTICLE 10. Moved and seconded that this article be adopted, discussion. A voter asked for clarification of RSA 153 and on being informed that it was a lengthy article, withdrew his request. The voters were assured that Article 10 was practically identical with the State Statutes, with the penalty added. When put to a vote Moderator declared article adopted setting up an oil burner ordinance.

ARTICLE 11. Motion made and seconded that this article be adopted. Questions were asked as to what kind of trailer was meant. Voter offered an amendment to strike out "any trailer" and "any other purpose" following which it was voted to adopt the amendment and the original motion.

ARTICLE 12. Motion made and supported that a fee of \$5.00 be charged by the Selectmen for processing Mobile Home permits.

ARTICLE 13. Reading of this article by the Moderator, calling for deletion of the words "Farm and" from Article 4, Section A-5 of the Zoning Ordinance resulted in protracted discussion following which, Oscar Morin, Sr. moved the article be adopted. Seconded. Put to a vote, Moderator declared same to be in the negative.

ARTICLE 14. Voted to rescind Art. 15, Section C of the Zoning Ordinance and insert in its place the following: Tourist home means any place consisting of a room or group of rooms located on one premise where transient accommodations for sleeping or living purposes are provided for a price.

ARTICLE 15. Motion made and seconded that the Budget be accepted and it was so voted.

There being no further articles to come before said meeting, Moderator declared same adjourned at 8:45 P.M. and by similar action, polls were closed for voting for officers.

## REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

This year the Budget Committee held all of it's meetings in the conference room of the new Town Municipal Building. Despite the long hours spent it has been a real pleasure to have been able to work in these comfortable and truly adequate quarters. This building is certainly an asset to the Town of Hooksett and it is the unanimous feeling of this Committee, not as a committee, but as taxpayers, that the appropriation made last year for the conversion of the existing town hall into a town municipal building was well spent. In the opening of our first meeting a rising vote of recognition was extended to the Board of Selectmen and to local contractor, Roland Levesque for a job well done with the amount of funds appropriated for this project.

### TOWN BUDGET

The first meeting of the Budget Committee was held on January 23rd at which time itemized reports of expenditures for the preceding year were reviewed for each of the various town departments along with the proposed budget requirements for the new year. Some increases were noted and after careful examination of these items they seemed justified considering the continuous growth of the Town in the last few years. The increases which were approved by the Committee resulted in a total increase of the town budget of approximately \$10,000.00.

Article #6 Selectmen's Salaries. This article submitted by petition from the Hooksett Women's Club called for an increase of \$100.00 to each of the Selectmen's salaries. This article was approved by the Committee as submitted. However, it is felt that this increase is inadequate and it is our wish to recommend a larger increase. These men devote more of their time and energy to this job than is generally realized and it is believed that they should receive more adequate compensation for their services. In the case of the present Board, we might add that each of these men have served for several years and that the background knowledge which they have acquired is an invaluable asset to the Town.

Article #7 Garbage Disposal Unit. This article pertains to the purchase of a new garbage disposal truck also known as a packer. The one presently in use, having been purchased as a used unit for \$1,200.00 has serviced the Town for the past five years and is now considered unrepairable. After some discussion, it was realized



Article #11, 12, 13, Town Garage. These articles involve the Village Water Precinct, the School District and the Town. It is proposed that the building presently housing the village fire department be sold to the Village Water Precinct at a cost of \$5,000.00 and that the town garage be used to house the Village Fire Department. It is further proposed to construct a new town garage large that the only solution to this problem was the purchase of a new unit at an estimated cost of \$10,000.00. This larger unit having approximately five yards more capacity will result in labor and time saving when in use. It is proposed that this item be paid for from the Capital Reserve Fund at a rate of \$2,000.00 per year.

Article #8. This article concerns the installation of a new motor and a new fire pump on one of our fire apparatus. A report from South Hooksett Fire Chief Maurice Boisvert revealed that both of these items requested were beyond repair and that if this piece of equipment was to stay in service these replacements were necessary. It was questioned as to whether or not it was wise to spend this amount of money on this apparatus. It is our understanding that otherwise this fire truck is in good condition and should remain in service for quite some time. Therefore the Committee has given approval to the article.

Article #9 Boat Ramp. This article submitted by petition calls for the appropriation of \$250.00 for the construction of a boat launching ramp on the Merrimack River north of the dam in the village section of the Town. The Committee has approved this article since it is believed that this facility creates pleasure boating access to the river. In addition to the service for the townspeople, it was noted that if this ramp was used by the general public it almost certainly will bring additional business to the area in the form of trade in the markets, restaurants, service stations etc.

Article #10 Federal Loan. This article allows for the borrowing of \$13,000.00 from the federal government for the purpose of initiating a survey towards the construction of a sewage disposal system for the Town. The Committee is definitely in favor of this article due to the manner in which this loan is made available. It is our understanding that once this survey is completed and if it is the desire of the Town not to pursue this problem any further, the amount of the loan need not be repaid. However, if it is decided to go ahead with the construction of such a system the amount of the loan automatically becomes part of the overall construction cost. Taking into consideration that the cleaning up of our waterways will be a must in the not too distant future the Committee believes that this is a wise undertaking.

enough to house all of the town equipment as well as the school buses, this new garage to be built at a cost of \$15,000.00. It is a well known fact that the present village fire station is definitely inadequate for the fire department, furthermore the town has outgrown its present garage so that some equipment is now being kept outside at the mercy of the elements. Considering the \$5,000.00 to be appropriated by the Village Water Precinct and the \$4,000.00 to be appropriated by the School Department, this would leave a balance of \$6,000.00 to be appropriated for the town budget. This article was approved by the Budget Committee.

Article #14 Cemetery Commission. This article is submitted by recommendation of the Budget Committee. This Commission is to be composed of three members who would have complete charge of our cemeteries. It is well known that our cemeteries are in very poor condition and are badly in need of overall grading and landscaping. The Board of Selectmen and the Trustees of the Trust Funds continuously receive complaints concerning the condition of the lots. It is felt that something must be done about this situation and an extra \$1,000.00 has been added to the cemetery appropriation. This extra amount is to be used on one cemetery to see if this condition can be remedied. This will be a start towards the correction of a really deplorable condition which now exists.

Capital Reserve Fund. The appropriation for the Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the replacement of town equipment was increased by \$2,000.00. It is the unanimous opinion of this Committee that this procedure of replacing town equipment is by far the most economical method. This fund while in the process of being augmented is also earning dividends in excess of 4%, furthermore items of equipment purchased from this fund eliminate the necessity of a bond issue and also the payment of interest at a rate of approximately another 4%. This method creates a savings of approximately 8% overall in tax dollars. It is therefore our belief that this practice should be continued and increased in the future.

## WATER PRECINCTS

A review of the expenditures and also the proposed budgets of the Village and Central Water Precincts indicated that no appreciable increases were required again this year. However, a detailed analysis of the statements of income and expenses left some doubt as to whether the proper procedures were being applied in accounting for the funds of the Precincts. It was also noted that an appropriation of \$1,000.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund of the Village Precinct was not deposited to the account but was used as part of the current expenses for the year just ended. A reading of

the article setting up the Capital Reserve Fund disclosed that no provisions had been made for withdrawal of funds from the account.

It is therefore recommended that an article be introduced in the warrant to correct this discrepancy. It is further recommended through a motion duly made and approved that the services of the State of New Hampshire, Division of Municipal Accounting be requested yearly to perform the annual audit of both Water Precincts.

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Committee again held three meetings pertaining to the school budget. The first meeting held on February 7th at which time Mr. Sanborn, Mr. Langer and Mr. Moore presented the proposed budget for 1962-63. The open meeting was held at the Underhill School on February 15th. It is again our wish to mention that the meeting was poorly attended and thereby making it difficult for the Committee to attain a general feeling of the people. However, the few comments heard have had our close consideration. The final meeting was held on the evening of the 16th with the Committee carefully examining and discussing each item of the budget with a final result of an overall decrease of \$16,989.40. An itemized report of each item decreased appears below.

Article #3. See paragraph for article #11, 12, 13 of report for the town warrant. (This is a three way article for appropriation between the Town, the School District and the Village Water Precinct.)

Article #4 School Buses. This article in regards to the purchase of two new school buses for the School Department was approved unanimously by the Committee. A review of item #16 of the budget revealed that the renewal of the existing bus contract was to include a substantial increase in the amount of \$2,113.00. Upon examination of a proposal presented by the School Board for the purchase of two new buses by the district indicated that an additional savings could be gained by solving our transportation problem in this manner to the amount of \$1,727.00, thereby creating a total savings of \$3,840.00 from transportation.

Salaries of District Officers (School Board). It was noted by the Committee that no increase was asked for on this item. Again it is the feeling of the Committee that these salaries should be given definite consideration towards an increase in the near future.

Salaries (Teaching Personnel). The overall appropriation for salaries was decreased in the amount of \$10,300.00. A detailed study of the requirements indicated that there would be a decrease of 22

pupils for the year 1962-63 over the previous year. An individual count of the number of teachers required made it possible to eliminate an appropriation for the salary of two teachers which were not needed. This amounted to \$8,000.00. The considerable increase in the starting salaries for teachers was noted, although this seemed to be an excessive amount for a starting salary considering all of the fringe benefits included, the Committee did not wish to jeopardize the chances of the District to hire efficient teaching personnel by lowering the starting salaries.

The proposed appropriation for the music specialist was decreased by \$150.00 leaving an appropriation of \$1,800.00 for this purpose and which is an increase of \$465.00 over the preceeding year.

The \$200.00 increase in salaries for each of the principals were decreased by \$100.00 each. Taking into consideration that an increase of \$300.00 was received the previous year, it is the feeling of the Committee that an average increase of \$200.00 per annum was considered to be in keeping with comparable positions elsewhere.

The extra allowance for a handwriting specialist was stricken out completely from the budget. It is our belief that this could and should be handled in the course of regular classes.

Tuition. A proposed budget recommendation for an overlay of 5% amounting to \$4,668.00 to take care of new families moving into Hooksett was eliminated from the budget. The elimination of this item is deemed advisable since a check of previous years indicated that the tuition re-imbursements from drop-outs more than offset the needs of new arrivals who require tuition allowances.

Retirements. This item was decreased in proportion to the decrease in salaries and amounted to \$720.00.

Allowance for Budget Deficiency. This item in the amount of \$1,461.40 was eliminated with the recommendation that every effort should be made to keep within the approved budget and that in the case of a dire emergency application for additional funds can be made through this Committee.

A final analysis of the overall budget appropriations indicates that a total increase from all budgets will amount to approximately \$35,600.00, \$10,000.00 from Town appropriations and \$25,600.00 from Schools. Although an increase was inevitable, it has been our aim to limit increases only in areas in which these were definitely necessary and justified.

It is hoped by every member of the Committee that all the proposals brought before us have been dealt with in a fair and just manner and also for the benefit of our community. In closing, may we express our appreciation to all who have helped us in determining the course of action to be taken, and also a special thanks to the Board of Selectmen, Mr. Arthur Sanborn from the School Board and Mr. Richard Hemeon for their services and help to us.

At 11:00 A. M. a short business meeting was held. A report of the minutes of the last meeting. All of the same officers were re-elected. Pres. Harvey Chandler explained that the N. H. Planning and Zoning Ass'n. has many films which are available for any Committee to use.

At 11:30 A. M. we had a talk on Tax Map Preparation and how they are made and then pictures from the Aero Service Corporation by Allen Davis of Philadelphia, Pa. Having worked with the Selectmen and State Tax Appraisers on property taxes, and realizing the many questions which come up regarding size and shapes of land I found it most interesting. These pictures were taken from the air and then made up into tax maps and records which would not only help the Selectmen, but other Committees and taxpayers as well. The town of Salem had this aero map made up and in two years they had picked up enough taxable property which was not recorded to pay for having these records made. I felt that this would be a great help to Hooksett, when and if the Town can ever afford it. Also I felt that Mr. Allen was a business man from Pennsylvania and here was a chance to pass out one of the zoning maps I had taken along, so he has one of our small zoning maps and I had a little chat with him about what Hooksett is trying to do. I also spoke with Pres. Harvey Chandler and gave him one of the small maps.

Dinner was served at 1:00 P.M. Tomato juice, tossed salad and roll, lobster newberg, lyonnaise potatoes, mixed vegetables, coffee and lemon chiffon pie. The dinner and after dinner speaker pleased me, not only for the food but that here at a meeting for business God was not left out. Grace was asked before the meal and the speaker brought out the fact that even though great plans were made for the day and good weather expected, the Great Planner or God was the planner above all. How true this is, in whatever faith we may believe, regarding our Town or in our daily lives.

Land, Conservation and Capabilities was presented by Kenneth E. Grant, State Conservationist. This was very interesting, as he explained it in a way that it not only affected the farmer, but agriculture, consumer and user of water. He stated that good soil is a heritage which we can not afford to waste. There is a soil map put out by the Soil Conservation Service for our State which may be had by the Towns if they so desire.

At 3:15 P.M. Mr. Sulo J. Tani, Director of Research and Planning from Maine spoke. I could not seem to get as much from his talk except for the fact that he felt it would be nice to have green strips of grass on either side of our Highway and how the signs spoil our scenic beauty. Also he felt that in growing Towns it was necessary for the Town to purchase all the land it could for future use such as cemeteries, parks and playgrounds. Also he spoke of the fact that it might be necessary for the Town sometime to purchase easements on land for proper sewerage systems and drainage.

I have on hand leaflets on "Billboard Blight", "Existing and Proposed Land Use Studies", "Planning Enabling Legislation", "N. H. Housing and Redevelopment Legislation", "Town Management" and "Community Planning In N. H.". All of these will be kept in the Planning Board File and you may have them to read at any time.

Thank you for the opportunity of representing Hooksett. What a challenge it is. I enjoy the business world so much and Hooksett means much to me.

## AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook - yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness - our carelessness. This, we - you - and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations - hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you -

1. Follow the warden's directions.
2. Secure the required burning permit.
3. Keep your fires under control.
4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

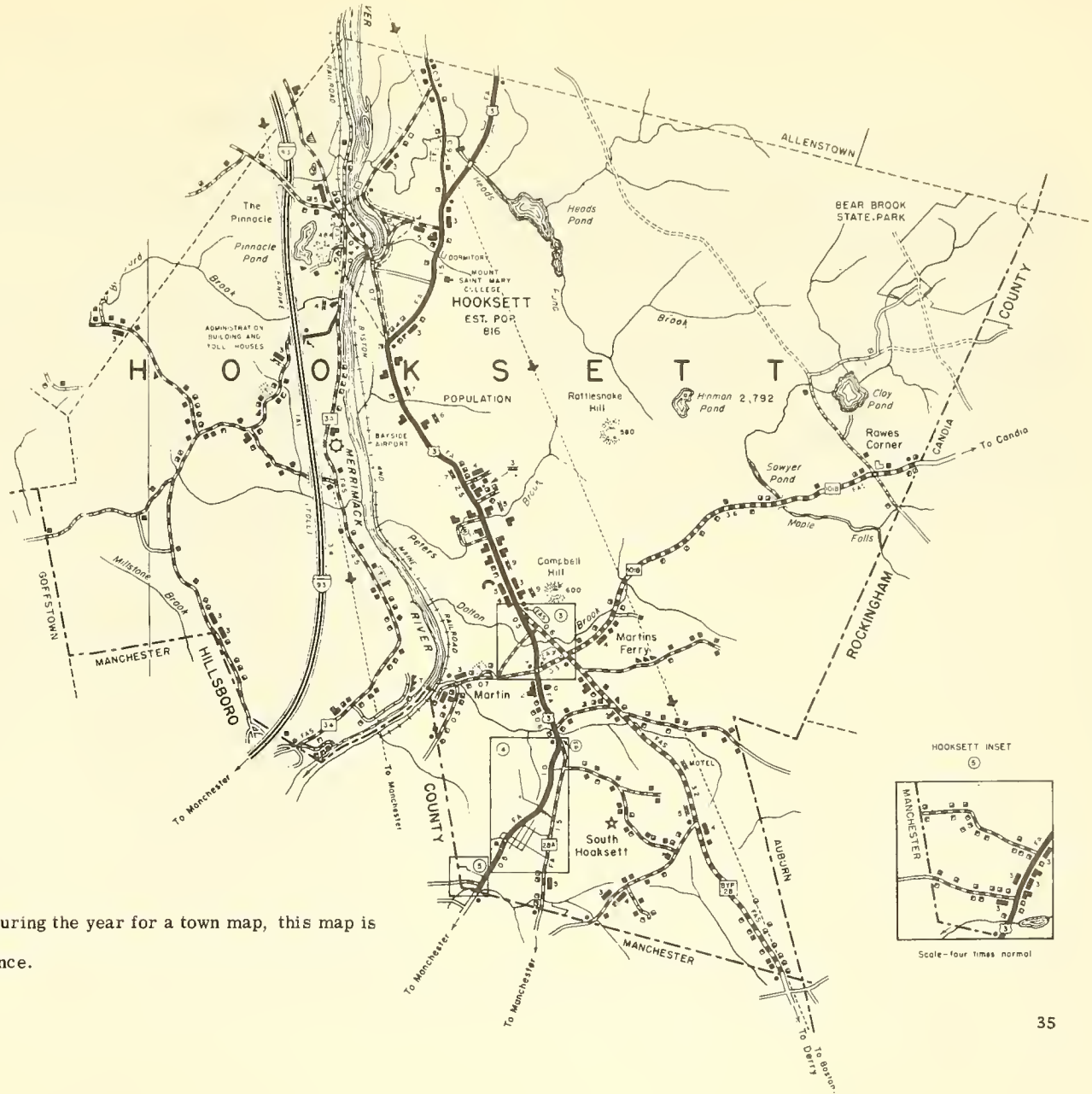

LIBRARY REPORT  
1961

The year 1961 has shown a substantial increase in many ways. A total of 3776 books were circulated - an increase of 751 over the previous year. One hundred and sixty-six (166) books were added to the collection, of which seventy-two (72) were gifts from generous people. One thousand and seventy-four (1,074) books were received on loan from the State Bookmobile and several requests were filled through the New Hampshire State Library. If you have a special request we are pleased to fill it if we possibly can.

The interior of the Library has been painted, new shades installed, and we have recently acquired a new reading and reference-work table.

The Town Library is situated next to the Town Municipal Building, and is open on Saturday afternoons from 12 to 4 p.m. We invite your patronage at this time.

INDUSTRIAL ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Industrial Advisory Council, which was appointed in March 1961, has held eleven meetings. Members of the Industrial Advisory Council are as follows: Co-Chairmen Rutger Broek and Russell Carter, Lindsay Rice, James Follansbee, Leslie Pike, Frank Cate, Larry Boucher, George Blakeslee, Leo LaPlante and Arthur Donati. The Planning Board and Board of Selectmen have been invited to attend all meetings and assist in any way possible.

These meetings have been held in regards to the Industrial potential in Hooksett, both new Industry and the growth of present Industry.

A survey has been made as to the employment of Commercial and Industrial establishments. Also a survey on land which might be available for new Industry. It would be appreciated if anyone who would like to sell Industrial or Commercial land would contact some member of the Board. Maps have been made for advertisement showing the Zoning areas of Hooksett.

Governor Powell and Winfred Foss of the State Planning & Development Commission have been contacted regarding a new building in the Industrial Park.

Publicity for the Town of Hooksett has been stressed at these meetings. Double Cards have been designed advertising the advantages of an Industrial firm locating in Hooksett. These are to be sent out to Industrial & Commercial potential. Brochures are being compacted as a follow up of these cards.

Land which could be available for the new Technical Institute and the desirability of having it locate in Hooksett has been of the utmost interest to this Council.

# Civil Defense

It is with great pleasure as Director of Civil Defense, Town of Hooksett, that I submit for your approval my fifth annual report on Civil Defense.

During the past year we had six Civil Defense alerts as listed: two severe storm warnings; two tornado alerts; one hurricane alert, "Hurricane Esther" and one National alert, this being a national exercise and the participation of all cities and towns is required.

During the past year we have continued to purchase from the State Distributing Agency at Concord, N. H., government surplus supplies for the fire department, the police department and Civil Defense, whenever suitable items were available..

During the past year I attended 17 evening meetings devoted to Civil Defense, sponsored by various organizations within the Town of Hooksett, during which over two thousand pieces of Civil Defense literature, was distributed. I have attended meetings at the State Civil Defense Office and also a meeting called by Governor Wesley M. Powell.

At this time I would like to invite each and everyone to visit our new Civil Defense Office at the new Hooksett Municipal Building. We have an ample supply of the latest Civil Defense literature available for your convenience. Our office hours are every Thursday evening from 6:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M.; on Wednesday and Friday evenings by appointment.

Civil Defense staff meetings will be held on the second Monday of the month with business meetings on a weekly basis. During the next six months we will be working with the State and Federal Civil Defense Agencies to complete the community shelter survey program which is now underway in the State of New Hampshire. The last of February or the first of March we will start receiving shelter supplies and equipment for which provisions have to be provided and inventory kept. During this same period we have to re-staff our Civil Defense unit to a minimum of 60 members. Our Civil Defense plans have been completely revised and soon training of Civil Defense personnel will be conducted on a weekly basis to be effected and efficient regardless of what type of emergency we are faced with.

We realize that we are faced with a huge task but at the same time if we continue to receive the cooperation from the citizens of the town of Hooksett, as in the past, we will achieve our goal with success.

Once again I wish to extend my sincere thanks to all of the Civil Defense personnel, the Board of Selectmen, the Police Department, the South Hooksett and Hooksett Village Fire Departments and the Hooksett Board of Health for volunteering their time and services for this most worthy cause.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hooksett for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library, Municipal Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1960 - December 31, 1961: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1960 and December 31, 1961, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$10,302.98 in 1961.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

### Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$1,054.46, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$446.40, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,500.86.

### Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1961, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from

statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

#### GENERAL COMMENTS

##### Current Surplus:

It is noted that the current financial condition of the Town changed from a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of \$1,325.07, to a current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of \$371.95, in 1961, as shown herewith:

##### Surety Bond of Town Clerk:

The surety bond of the Town Clerk should be increased from \$2,500.00 to \$6,000.00 in order that the amount of the bond may be more proportional to the amount of funds received by the Clerk.

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Hooksett School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1960 and June 30, 1961, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$389,570.34 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D) a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$297.75, plus a revenue surplus of \$1,739.84, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,037.59.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of June 30, 1961, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Statements of School Lunch Accounts: (Exhibits F-1 & F-2)

Statements of the Village School and Underhill School Lunch accounts for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, are presented in Exhibits F-1 and F-2.

Statement of Building Fund Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement showing the activity in the Building Fund account, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, is included in Exhibit G.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1961, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$3,995.57 to \$2,125.23 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1961, as shown herewith:

Capital Reserve Fund:

It is noted that the appropriation of \$1,000.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund which was made in 1960, had not been turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds as of June 30, 1961. It is therefore shown as an appropriation liability account in the Balance Sheet of that date (Exhibit A). This should be remitted to the Trustees in accordance with the provisions of the law relating to Capital Reserve Funds (R.S.A. Chapter 35 - Section 13).

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Hooksett School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Hooksett qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the FRED C. UNDERHILL SCHOOL in said District on the 10th day of March, 1962, at two (2) o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary District Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to establish a committee of three to study the needs for remedial reading instruction and for a special class for those who cannot grasp the Academic subjects, but whose talents could be brought out by a specialized teacher. This study to be undertaken with consideration for more than one Town cooperating and utilizing the same teacher or class with us. Recommendations to be brought forward in 1963. INSERTED BY PETITION.

3. To see if the Hooksett School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000), said sum to be used as the District's share in the construction of a Garage to be used jointly by the Town of Hooksett and the School District. It is understood that if affirmative action is taken upon this article that implementation of the article will depend upon the type of action taken upon related articles to be voted upon at the 1962 annual meetings of the Hooksett Village Precinct and the Town of Hooksett. INSERTED BY PETITION. Approved by budget committee.

4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to purchase two (2) school buses, of a size and type best suited to the District's needs, for a sum not to exceed \$10,500.00 for each bus and to authorize the School Board to expend from the District's capital reserve fund such sum of money, not to exceed \$10,500.00 which is necessary to purchase one (1) bus and to borrow a sum not to exceed \$10,500.00 for the purchase of the second bus. Approved by budget committee.

5. If Article 4 is not adopted, to see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to negotiate a five (5) year transportation contract with Mr. Edmund Allen.

6. To see if the School District will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, or take any other action in relation thereto.

7. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to accept on behalf of the District, all Federal or State Funds for the aid of Education or School construction, should any such funds become available.

8. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

# SCHOOL BOARD REPORT 1961-62

The number of Children registered in Hooksett Schools reached a new high in 1961. The following figures show the increase each year since 1958:

In preparation for the expected continuance of this growth construction of a new school began October first. Progress since then has been rapid with all work below ground completed before the frost set in. The outside masonry walls, with the exception of the kitchen which is currently in progress, have been completed to roof level as have the inside classroom walls. Work on the corridor walls will begin shortly and all necessary steel joist's for support of the roof are at the site ready for installation with the advent of milder weather. As soon as the roof is finished the remaining construction will go forward with increased vigor and be completed in time to accommodate the seventh and eighth grades in September.

The new school is built upon a knoll and so oriented that it overlooks the water in a pool fashioned by nature centuries ago. Here it will stand in mute testimony to our belief in the future of the community in which we live. With the surrounding air so fresh and clear that it makes one glad and thankful to be alive, its portals will welcome all who seek the accumulated knowledge of the ages and the wisdom to use it.

In such a setting we feel the acquisition of knowledge will be a pleasure for our Children.

We believe it will add strength to our School and will lead to strength in our Children. Mental and Intellectual strength, Physical and Emotional strength, Moral and Spiritual strength.

We believe a full measure of this strength can be realized through Teachers whose interest, background and experience have made of them specialists in their chosen field, and it is our intent to add such teachers to our staff as quickly as possible.

As an example permit us to use the field of Science: A Teacher who cannot explain the action of rockets, the principles of skin diving, or the splitting of the atom cannot properly teach Science to Children who watch Cape Canaveral on Television and want to know why rockets have to be so big, and what makes them go. A Teacher who specializes in Science knows the answer when such questions are posed. She is better prepared for her classes, and can offer more to the Children than one who is trying to be an expert in all subjects. The atmosphere of her class will be more stimulating, her displays more specialized, and it is easier for her to maintain good discipline because her class is a challenge to the Children who must work harder just to keep up. In a class where all these things are present it is much more difficult for the Children to coast. While the need for specialists can be demonstrated most dramatically in the field of Science the need is just as great in every other subject.

The specialist offers at least one solution for those who feel that Children are being pampered in School today.

Parents often ask us why reading is such a problem to some children and not to others and what can be done in our schools to help those children who find it difficult to learn to read correctly. Unfortunately there is no pat answer, no ready solution for few events in our complicated lives have a single cause. It has been suggested that barring mental or physical defects there is actually very little difference between the so-called gifted person and the average person. If this is true then individual accomplishment is not necessarily the result of exceptional ability, but just plain ambition - in terms of cooperativeness, enthusiasm and pride in

doing any job well. This is probably over simplification but we intend to do whatever we can to better the reading habits of the children in the Hooksett Schools.

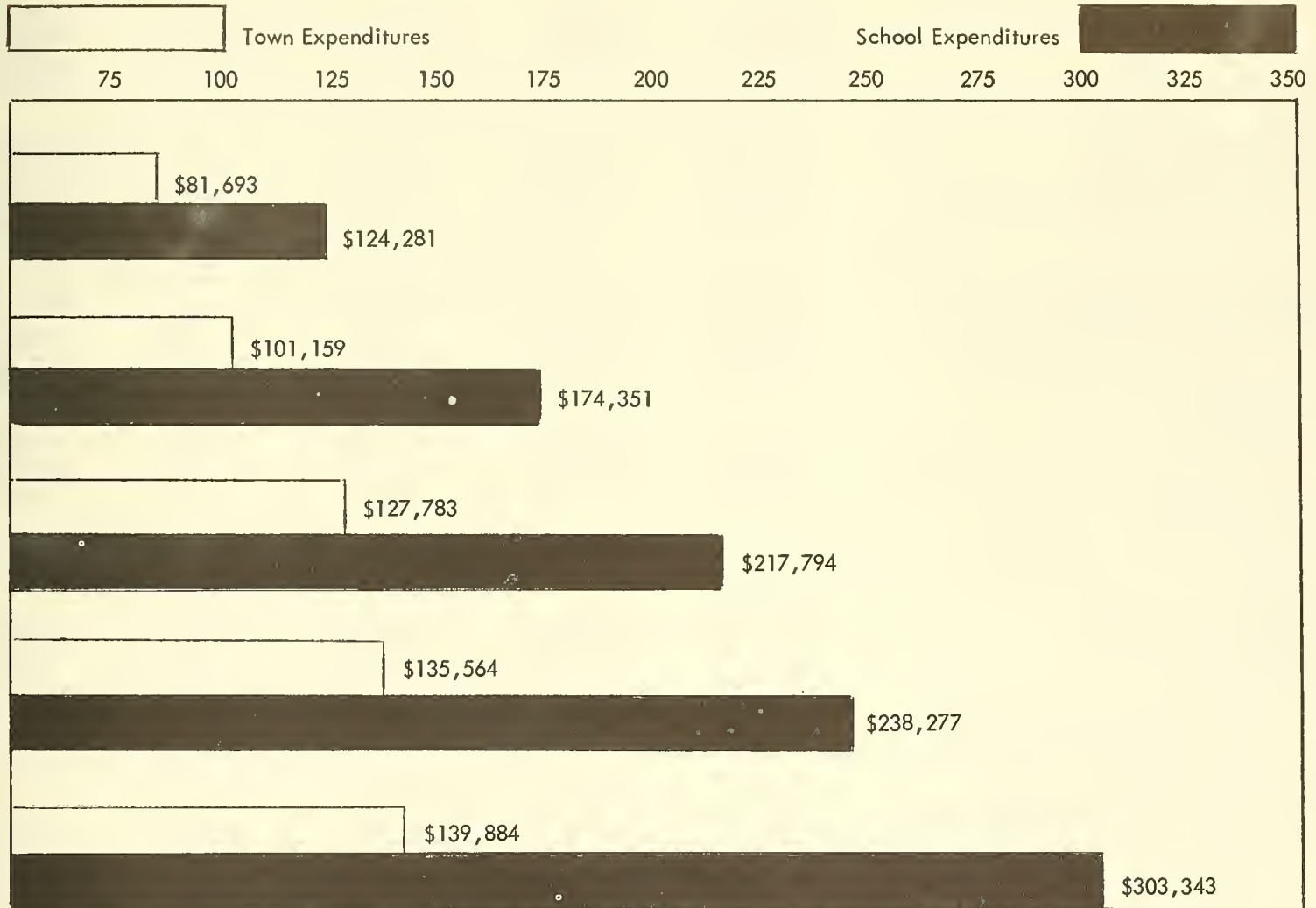

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

### HOOKSETT

#### Superintendent's Report

It is with pleasure, but also with some hesitation, that I submit my first, and brief report as your superintendent of schools. Half a year "on the job training" is hardly enough to properly evaluate Union #53, its present status, its future, and its ever increasing school population.

Hooksett will find itself in the enviable position of having space to spare as the result of far sighted action taken last spring at a most reasonable per unit cost. It would not, however, be wise to predict how long this spare space maybe available but it is probably safe to say that it is a shorter time than we think.

Space is not the only key to good education. There can never be any substitute for outstanding personnel in the classroom. The teacher, aside from the pupil himself, is the most important cog in the educational machine. Anything which will secure, keep, and improve good teachers is, in the long run, money well spent. Good salaries do not guarantee good teachers since often only experience and time can give proof, but teachers are, for a few months in the year, a commodity in the open market. A superintendent no longer hires a teacher but rather sells a job; the teacher picks the job most attractive to her. One of the ingredients in this battle is money. I would like to see Hooksett in a better competitive position when hiring teachers. Recent reports on salaries show that the gap between the average town and city elementary teacher is not as great as it was once. What gap there is, in part, is due to city salary schedules with relatively high maximums. Specifically, I would hope to be able to meet beginning salaries when spring hiring begins.

With the present and future plant facilities and a competitive hiring salary the future of Hooksett schools could look bright.

It is probably not wise to close this report without looking ahead a few more years when expanding population will again cause us to consider so-called junior high schools either co-operatively or singly, six year high schools, or some similar organizational arrangement. It would seem that such would be educationally sound and economically desirable.

In closing I would say that good education costs more money than poor, and that quality education costs the most. It is my job to give you the best for the money spent. We can, however, always show improvement day by day, and this is the basic philosophy we like to think is part of our educational belief.

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TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE HOOKSETT VILLAGE WATER PRECINCT IN THE TOWN OF HOOKSETT AND COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN SAID PRECINCT AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Fire Station #1 in said Hooksett on Friday the 16th day of March next, at seven-thirty o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Water Commissioner for the ensuing five years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray precinct charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see if the Precinct will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to purchase from the Town of Hooksett the building presently used as a fire house by Fire Department #1 for the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars.
8. To see if the Precinct will authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to borrow, on behalf of the Precinct, the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, by the issuance of Serial notes of the Precinct, for the purpose specified in Article 7, said notes to be payable at the rate of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars per year for five years. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

9. To see if the Precinct will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to audit the books and accounts of the precinct as of December 31st of each year, beginning with the year 1962 and continuing until changed by a vote of the Precinct; and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds to defray the expenses of said audit for the ensuing year. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee and necessary funds therefor are contained in the budget.)

10. To see if the Precinct will vote to establish a Special Fund to be used to finance major repairs to, or replacements of, the Precinct's property and equipment, said fund to be deposited in some savings book in the name of the Precinct; and to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to withdraw and expend money from said fund for such repairs and replacements whenever they shall be necessary to provide adequate water to the Precinct's customers for fire protection and domestic purposes; and to further authorize the Water Commissioners to transfer the balance of the funds in the Precinct's Capital Reserve Fund to this fund.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Putting in our two cents worth, or expressing our individual opinions, can be vitally important to the future of our country.

Americans have a God-implanted love of free speech, but I have observed during my service in Congress that too few of our citizens take advantage of this privilege of speaking up on government matters.

A reason may be that many people believe their Congressman does not welcome a letter or a telephone call from a citizen who has an opinion on some past, pending or future matter. May I correct this mistaken idea as simply and as clearly as possible? Every Congressman welcomes the opinion and counsel of our citizens because his primary job is to do just that: represent our people in the government of our country. To do this well, the Congressman must know what his people are thinking, and the more opinions he gets the better will be his decisions. Public opinion is a very important factor in a democracy.

The very basis of our government is built around people. What we call politics, elections, legislation--all are attuned to one great determinant, the voice of the people or public opinion.

The people created America, and the people - you and I - must continue to watch over and improve the country our forefathers built and our contemporaries are building. This is our duty and our greater obligation.

As a country, we decided long ago to place this responsibility upon our citizens. Freedom for all was the fruit of this decision, but freedom carries with it the cost of widespread citizen interest and participation in the affairs of government.

One of the best ways to fulfill your duties of active citizenship, of course, is to help elect the man or woman of your choice to public office. But do not stop there. Let me encourage you to take the next step. Keep the persons who represent you in government informed of your views throughout the year. This is an equally important responsibility in our democratic form of government.

Sometimes I think it might be well if we erected a large sign over Congress which contained this thought: Here the opinions of all Americans are heard--and should be heard--with equality. As a result, the sense of their proposals becomes the law of the land.

Or perhaps we should put it in more typical American language: Here your two cents worth does make a difference!

### REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

During the year 1961 the precinct area was extended to include the property on both sides of the Daniel Webster Highway from the existing southerly boundary, at the China Dragon and Farm Kitchen property, to the northerly line of Indian Cliff Cabins and the southerly line of the school property. This extension was primarily for the purpose of furnishing water for the new school presently under construction and the existing 6" main in this highway was extended a distance of 2500 feet to the school site.

The policy of replacement of old undersized mains was continued with the replacement of the 2" main running from Cochrane's property to the Guilbeau property, a distance of 450 feet, with 6" cement asbestos pipe.

Fifteen new services were installed during the year, nine in the Linda Lane Project where new mains were installed in 1960 and six in previously installed mains.

The new water supply installed in 1960 was used for the first time this year with excellent results. The 16" main from Brickyard Brook was in use from 5:30 P.M. on April 12th to 4:40 P.M. on April 18th and during this time, according to the engineer's estimates 17 million gallons were added to the Pinnacle Pond reservoir and the water level was raised 28".

In addition to normal maintenance during the year, a major repair job was done on the main crossing the Merrimack River Bridge, additional supports were installed and the main straightened and painted.

## THE CENTRAL HOOKSETT WATER PRECINCT

### ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1961

The water system functioned satisfactorily throughout the year even though the frost penetrated deeper than any of the past 20 years.

Four services froze when 5' frost depths were recorded, but all main lines were kept open by "bleeding" the dead ends until all danger was past.

The major project and expenditure was the painting of the steel storage tank situated on Oak Hill Road. The tank being in service since 1956, was very rusty as all the paint was scraped off by the ice action along the water level line. This project took 21 days during which time the pump ran continually, pumping 4 1/2 million gallons. With the cooperation of all the residents everyone had ample water while the tank was out of service. Arrangements with the N.H. Industrial Park Commission were made for an emergency connection with their system in case of fire in the precinct.

Six new services were installed during the year.

The water consumption has been steadily increasing each year since the system was constructed. The average daily use for the year 1961 was 71,000 gal. per day representing a 24% increase over the previous year.

The Precinct boundary line between the Central Hooksett and Hooksett Village Water System has been established as the South line of the new school property on the West side of the D.W. Highway and the North line of the Indian Cliff property on the East side of the D. W. Highway.

The above boundary was agreed upon by both Water Commissions at a meeting held during the past year.

Plans to connect both water systems at this point are being considered for common protection during times of emergency.
