## **TOWN WARRANT**

#### To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Jackson on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the , ear ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Summer Highways.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Snow Removal.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Highways and vote to raise and appropriate money for the same.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Poor Relief.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for support of Library.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred Seventy-five Dollars (\$275.00) for repairs to Parsonage.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for finishing Abbott Hill on Iron Mt. Road.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to reconstruct Wilson Cottage or Proctor Road.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to reconstruct roadway to Cemetery.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvement of Black Mountain Road leading to residence of Charles Hamblin.

14: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvement of Dundee Road between residences of Bertha Dame and Jerome Fernald.

15. To see what action the Town will take to provide for Selectmen's Office and for care of Town Books and Records and appropriate money for the same.

16. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

17. To see what action the Town will take for celebration of the anniversary of Ratification of Federal Constitution by the State, June 21st, 1938.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to resurface black sidewalk on mile circuit and continue cement sidewalk to Wentworth Hall Annex.

19. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Mrs. Charles M. Baker upon her death and death of her son, Ezra, land known as Prospect Farm (estimated as 500 acres) with buildings thereon to be held forever as a recreation ground in memory of Charles M. Baker.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Seventy Dollars (\$70.00) for its share for support of White Mountain Region.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) for promoting recreational business in the Eastern Slope Region.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to set up two large signs designating hotel boarding facilities, golf courses, etc., at Bartlett-Jackson line and a suitable location on the Glen Road.

23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain slopes, trails and parking areas which are open to the skiing public without restriction other than may be placed upon them by the Town itself.

24. To see if the Town will vote to set aside a sum of money to build a public Swimming Pool, to be used as a Skating Rink in winter.

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, not exceeding Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) in anticipation of taxes.

26. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

**Report of Superintendent** 

#### To the School Board and Citizens of Jackson:

Mr. Gordon who had been our efficient principal for five years, resigned last summer to accept another position. The other two teachers of our staff also resigned and it was necessary to engage teachers for three vacancies. Lawrence Forbush, a graduate of the Junior high school course at Gorham, and also a graduate of Boston University, became principal; Miss Annie Campbell, an experienced graduate of Plymouth Normal School became the teacher in the primary room, and Miss Kathleen Lord, also a graduate of Plymouth, who had one year of experience, went to the school at Dundee.

The program for installing a heating system and making other needed improvements at the village school was postponed for further consideration at the hands of the coming March meeting. It was the opinion of the school board that the cost of the proposed program would be considerably more than the \$2500 raised last year. Our experience this year, however, has demonstrated the urgent need of an adequate heating plant and of better sanitary facilities.

The percentage of attendance of all pupils last year was 91 and there were 130 tardy marks. This is not a good record and there seems to be no improvement so

far this year. The tardiness record of one of our schools is serious.

The following pupils are attending high schools in New Hampshire: Elliott Gray, Patricia Hodge, Virginia Kelley, Pauline Roberts, Richard Witham, Elizabeth Lamper, Olive Hayes, Mildred Johnson, Robert Wentworth, Warren Hazelton, William Proctor. This is an excellent percentage and indicates an increasing interest in education by our young people.

The superintendent has recommended strongly to the school board that the so-called ninth grade be discontinued. Beyond doubt in years past this arrangement was desirable but with advancing standards the situation is entirely changed. New Hampshire high schools will no longer accept the work of the ninth grade as a substitute for the first year of high school, and no one will believe for a minute that we can provide the time. equipment and teaching staff to make the work of the ninth grade standard. The strongest objection to the present arrangement is that the time spent by the teachers on the ninth grade is sorely needed to do properly the work of the regular eight grades.

The superintendent has entire confidence in the future of the schools. Teachers, parents, and citizens share in all the responsibility of the school. William G. Sumner, perhaps the greatest teacher ever produced in America, writes these two sentences in his life of Andrew Jackson.

"There is nothing on earth which it costs more labor to produce than a high bred man. It is also indisputable that home discipline and training ingrain into the character of men the most solid and valuable elements, and that without such training, more civilization means better food and clothes rather than better men."
