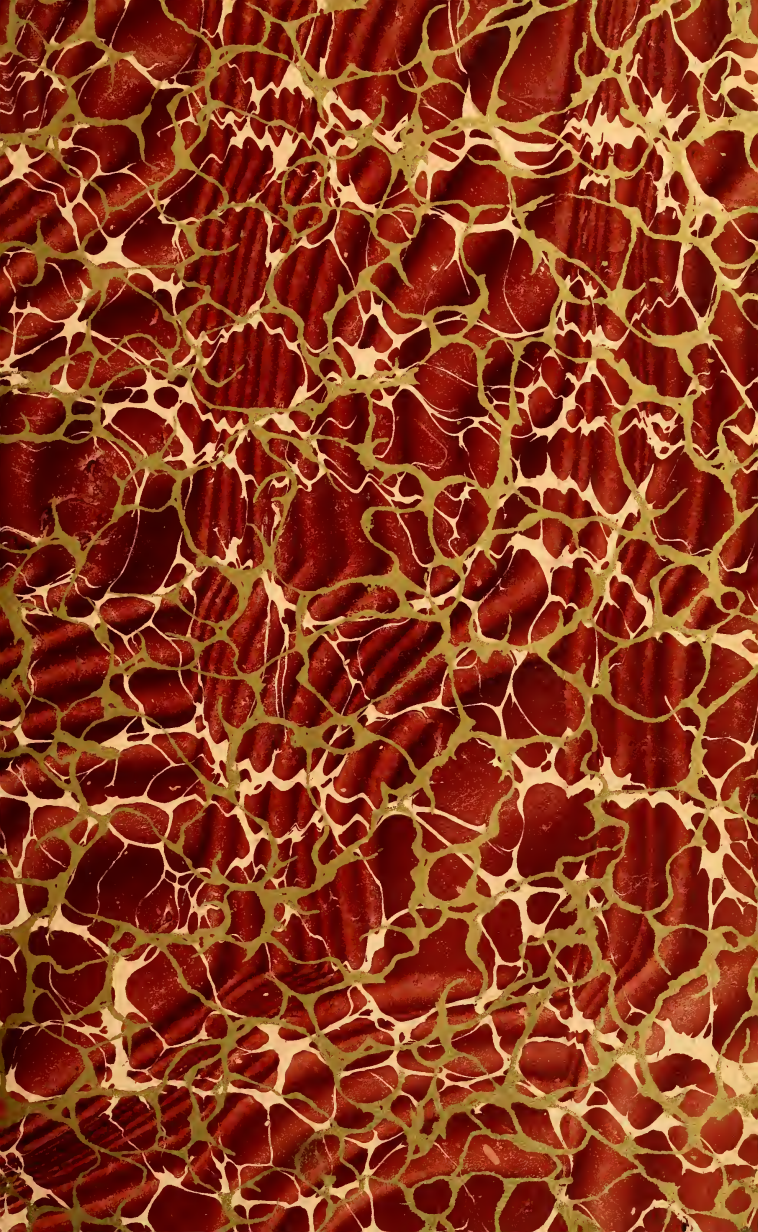

ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT.

Keene, Tuesday, January 3, 1911.

The members of the city government for the municipal year of 1911, having met for organization, agreeably to the provisions of the city charter, the convention was called to order by His Honor Mayor Benton, at ten o'clock in the forenoon. The oath of office by law prescribed was administered to the mayor-elect, Charles G. Shedd, by Hon. Frederic A. Faulkner, who then introduced him to the aldermen and councilmen present. After roll-call by the clerk, His Honor Mayor Shedd administered the oath of office to the following named members of the boards of aldermen and councilmen, to wit:

Prayer was then offered by the Rev. H. Sumner Mitchell, after which the mayor delivered his inaugural address.

After the prayer and inaugural address, Frank H. Whitcomb was elected clerk, and Albert W. Green, city messenger, and the councils then adjourned until 7.30 o'clock.

At 7.30 o'clock p. m., the common council organized by the choice of George W. Sargent, as president, and Herbert O. Wardwell, clerk.

THE MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

Gentlemen of the City Councils:

Agreeable to precedent and custom, it becomes incumbent upon me at the opening of this new year of our city government to call your attention to some of the more important facts for your guidance this coming year. I shall not make any extended review of all the departments, but simply mention some of the points which I consider worthy of your notice, and I shall detain you but a short time.

In the first place, allow me to state that you of the aldermen and common council, by accepting your nominations and elections, have virtually entered into a contract with the city of Keene whereby you are bound to give your time and best judgment to city affairs during your term of office. You are naturally expected to be punctual and constant in your attendance at all the meetings and to devote all the time required to the committee work to which you may be assigned. It is not my desire to have you consider this a mayor's administration, but rather one in which your two boards shall do the active work in hearty cooperation, with the mayor as an administrative officer.

I urge upon you the necessity of making yourselves familiar with every question which may properly belong to your several committees and to sign no report unless you are thoroughly acquainted with the substance and intention of the same, and consider that which you are recommending for the best interests of all our people.

We should first gain an accurate knowledge of the finances of the city in order to determine what we may safely accomplish.

You will find a thorough summary of this financial condition in the City Report for 1910 given you this morning, also the recommendation of the retiring finance committee for your annual appropriations. Many things will be demanded by our citizens and many must be accomplished. It is for you to decide what will work the most good for the greatest number. If you can leave the city's balance of its assets over its liabilities as large as you find it, and without raising the rate of taxation or increasing the bonded indebtedness, still carry out every improvement desired by every citizen, I have no doubt that your course will meet the approval of many but even then not of all.

I am in favor of and suggest to you a conservative year's work, with as few extraordinary expenditures as possible, but still keeping the several departments up to their present efficiency. A number of important changes have been made the past year in the city ordinances, and while you may make as many more or intend to unmake some already existing, it seems advisable to me that you should follow the changed conditions closely and note how they work out for a while, rather than attempt immediate changes as has been suggested.

By far the largest expenditures for 1911 will be upon our highway system. We have a large volume of business from the surrounding towns of the county and it seems desirable this year to pay much attention to our outside roads. Besides the necessary repairs required around the central part of the city I recommend the earliest possible attention of your committee on streets to the policy to be pursued in improving the

main lines of travel leading to all the outlying towns. We must also arrive at a decision as to what action we shall take upon the continuation of the west side trunk line from the Concord road to the Gilsum line. If we are to apply for state aid toward constructing the same it will be advisable to do so early in the season. I am of the opinion we should complete our share of the state highway this year if possible, and recommend the same.

The superintendent of highways calls your attention to the matter of lack of room for storing the apparatus used by his department and this, as a sound business proposition, should receive your investigation.

The amount recommended for concrete walks this year is \$2000. I trust that your committee may be able to devise some way of improving the concrete walks on our Main street, as they are in deplorable condition a greater part of the year. If you cannot see your way to carry out the entire raising and regrading proposition, possibly some temporary relief may be devised and even such improvement in the walk may arouse sufficient pride in the heart of each abutter to cause him to keep the same cleaned through the winter and spring months.

I recommend that the work of exterminating the brown-tail moth which was begun last year, be continued this season, and in the same manner, and that you appropriate a sufficient sum for the same. We cannot afford to suffer from the ravages of these pests after seeing their destructiveness in other localities.

For the past two years there has been considerable agitation over the office of city physician. Only one of the changes suggested seems desirable to me and if any change is to be made I recommend that the office and salary be abolished and

each department be allowed to call a physician when necessary, the cost of the same to be charged to that department.

The fire department is one upon which we all rely for safety of life and property and we are able at a moderate expense to maintain a competent and efficient force of firemen and I endorse the suggestions of the chief engineer, especially the keeping of a second pair of horses on duty during the winter months in order to make responses to alarms as immediate as possible.

The water works beginning Jan. 1st, 1911, is to be conducted as an entire separate department and none of the net income is to be turned into the city treasury, as formerly. All water bonds and interest charges, as well as maintenance, are to be paid from the water receipts, with the end in view some time of a reduction in water rates. By the building of the new dam just completed we shall be assured of an adequate and healthful supply of water sufficient for all purposes for a long time.

For the past fifteen years the city has been negligent of its opportunities in securing more land for the protection of its watershed. Your board of health have always been opposed to any proposition looking to the working of any of the quarries situated directly in the midst of our supply. It is a fact, I think, established beyond a doubt, that one case of typhoid among workmen employed in these quarries would be able to communicate we know not how many to our citizens. It is a question for you to consider well whether you can afford to have these quarries worked, even with the increased business which is promised in connection with it, or whether you prefer to safeguard your greatest natural blessing by every means in your power. It appears to me that some of the proceeds

derived from the sale of water should be applied to acquiring city ownership of each and every parcel of land from which could arise any contamination of our excellent supply.

Among our most valuable assets not scheduled in the annual report are the hundreds of children in our public schools. I am a firm believer, made so by practical experience in your board of health work, in the advisability of medical inspection of all the schools, at least twice each term. Many cases are to be found entirely unsuspected by parents where poor or backward scholarship, headaches, nervousness and kindred troubles are traced to defective vision and are easily remedied. Throat and nasal troubles, adenoids, enlarged tonsils, defective teeth due to lack of care, are all easily discovered and generally gladly attended to when reported to the parents. A few practical lessons in hygiene in our schools will surely benefit the pupils as much in fitting them for life as a knowledge of many subjects which are taught them and never afterward used.

The matter of improvement and enlargement of the public library still appears to be in a nebulous condition. The book room is said to be badly crowded and there is a demand for more room and better facilities for the preservation of documents from loss by fire. Inasmuch as the Symonds fund is available for such purpose I see no reason why the city councils and library trustees should not arrive at an understanding at an early date and complete this work. It should not however be undertaken in so elaborate a manner as to exceed the funds set apart for such purpose.

The Perry house and Coolidge park will soon pass into the possession of Union school district and the amount to be paid and method of payment will be decided by the court at the

April term. Although this is exchanging money from one pocket to the other, in view of the litigation this property has already caused, the city should be well represented at that time by counsel so that our interests may not be neglected. By a decree of the court, made last April, the amount of cash, now held in the city treasury remaining of the Coolidge fund, \$4,056.67 must be legally invested in a separate fund and the proceeds used for library purposes.

Carried in the list of city liabilities appears an item of \$4,000 arrears in salary of Ainsworth M. Nims, former tax collector. This matter should be settled during the coming year and I trust you will be able to do so amicably and equitably.

The new system of street lighting which has been partially installed the past year under the new contract with the Keene Gas and Electric Co., has given much satisfaction to our citizens and it is to be hoped that the committee on lights will be able to complete the same at an early date.

The subject of practical forestry is now a well established business proposition and I recommend that a thorough investigation be made of all woodlands owned by the city and not included in the park system, with a view to developing them systematically and eventually securing an annual revenue from the same.

This is perhaps not a proper place to mention party politics but the city councils having recently placed the matter before the voters and they having adopted the caucus act as provided in the laws of 1905, which action I understand is to be ratified at the coming session of the legislature, it will become necessary for the various committees of the several parties to take due notice of the same and observe all the provisions in the

nomination of the several officers to be elected in December next, and I consider it desirable to give such notice as early as the present time.

This city having again voted strongly in favor of no license, the enforcement of the prohibitory law is placed in the hands of the county officials with the assistance of our police force, but the mayor takes this opportunity to state that he will be ready and willing at any time to cooperate with them in such enforcement or will be ready at any time to investigate any complaints made to him of any violations of the liquor laws.

These, gentlemen, are a few of the matters which present themselves to me at this time. I have no doubt there will be many others before your term of office expires, but as I intended to have the shortest inaugural address on record, I shall now allow you to take up the regular business for 1911, only expressing the hope that we may at all times work in harmony in our several positions to the end that our achievements may be of lasting benefit to the health, happiness and prosperity of this beautiful city of Keene, so dear to us all.

The supply from Sylvan lake is shut off; all water consumed in the city being taken from the Roaring brook system.

In order to obtain the full benefit of the Roaring brook supply, it will be necessary to enlarge the pipe from the end of the twelve-inch pipe at the schoolhouse on lower Marlboro street to Main street.

I therefore recommend, that a feed pipe of suitable size be laid; leaving the present pipe for use as a domestic supply.

The water in the several lakes is the highest it has been for over twenty years.

There is eight feet six and a half inches at Echo lake; and sixteen feet and six inches at Sylvan lake.

December 1, 1910, there was one foot and five inches at Echo lake and seven feet at Sylvan lake.

The analyses taken at different times the past year, the latest November 27th, show that the water is entirely free from contamination of any kind.

Owing to the change of the grade of the railroad crossing, it was necessary to resurface Main street from Church street to Emerald street. The spaces between the railroad tracks were paved with granite block laid on sand and the granite block pavements in the gutters and from gutters to curb line north of the tracks were also raised. Railroad and Wells streets have been resurfaced their entire length with stone crushed at Merchant bank. Water street has also been covered from Russell's shop to Willow street with Marlboro crushed stone and Winchester street has been covered with Marlboro crushed stone from end of state road east to and across the new iron bridge.

Aside from the repairs mentioned above, a considerable amount of work has been done on these and other streets that more properly comes under the head of cleaning streets, picking stones, etc.

Federal and Lamson streets have been partially graded and cement concrete sidewalks authorized by the board of mayor and aldermen, in preparation for which about 900 feet of granite curbing has been set, the lateness of the season making it impossible to complete the streets.

MARLBORO ROAD.

The Marlboro road near the Marlboro line has been in very bad condition since the building of the electric railroad in 1900, which was not kept to the same grade as the highway, in some places it being as much as twenty inches higher than the center of the road. The road was very narrow and the soil was nearly all clay and full of springs, being very hard to drain.

2,430 feet of this road was improved this year, it being widened 6 to 8 feet its entire length, partly through ledge. The old sluices were all relaid and four new ones were put in; also on the west side a 3-ft. ditch was dug about half the length of the road. In this ditch 614 feet of 6-inch tile was laid; the remainder of the way the ditch was filled wholly with stones. This ditch empties at intervals into sluices.

About 4 inches of small field stone was spread on the road for bottom course and rolled, this being covered with 10 inches of 2-inch crushed granite thoroughly rolled and bound together; the top coat was 3 inches of 2-in. trap rock with Bermudez road*asphalt as binder. The finished road is 19 feet wide.

STREET SPRINKLING AND DUST LAYERS.

The last few years there has been considerable complaint in certain sections of the sprinkling district that water did not lay the dust satisfactorily and for this reason, His Honor the Mayor, and the joint standing committee on streets, with myself, have investigated several of the so-called dust layers and road binders and have tried a few that were extensively used in other places. The cost of each and the cost of applying per square yard follows: The cost of cleaning the streets is not included in these figures, as that expense is the same without regard to the kind of dust layer to be used. The cost of watering is the expense for men and teams on the water carts only.

Watering streets, per square yard,	\$0.011
Tasseoil, one application, per square yard,	.017
Calcium Chloride, per square yard,	.017

One tank car of Standard Asphalt Road Oil was used and one tank car of Trinidad Liquid Asphalt. Both of them act as road binders as well as dust layers and evidently will last for a season with one application.

Two carloads of Tasseoil and two carloads of Calcium Chloride were used, each of which need two or more applications for a season, the second application costing about one-half the first.

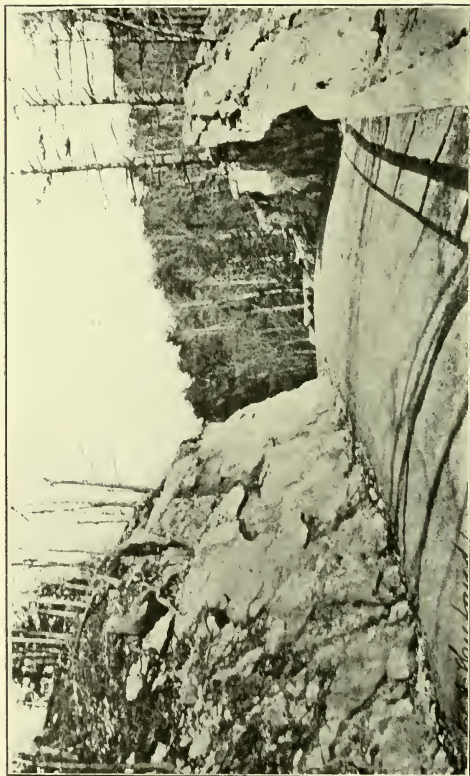
From these figures it would seem that the average cost of the dust layers used would be about double the cost of water, if nothing was allowed for the cost of the water itself.

One advantage of the dust layers is, they lay the dust for all day, while with water a street is sometimes wet enough to make it muddy after it is first watered and then the street will be very dusty before the team can get back to water it again. Another item is the amount of water used on our streets for a season; it requires four water carts, each holding 750 gallons and in very dry weather each cart is often filled forty times daily.

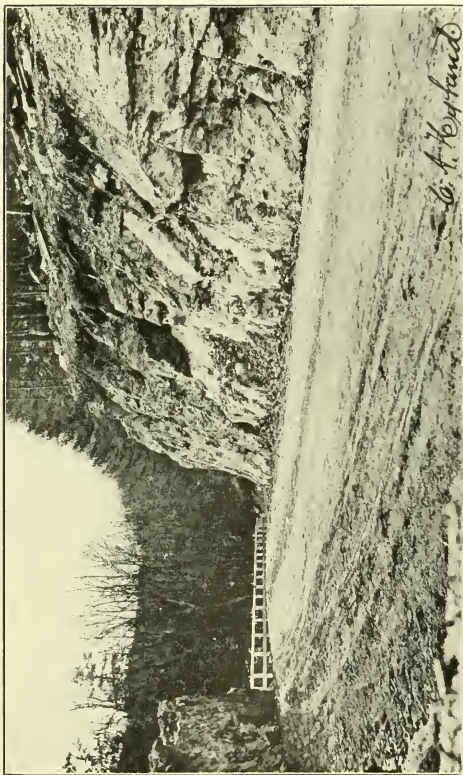
I would recommend that some action be taken in regard to procuring some place to house the wagons and tools of the highway department, as at present many of them are kept out of doors a great deal, causing by far more damage than the wear of actual use.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STREETS.

WEST SIDE ROAD.

To the City Councils:

The West side trunk line from upper Washington street in Keene to the Gilsum line, a distance of about four miles, on which work was commenced June first, has been nearly completed leaving about one-half mile to be built next year. Ordinarily our roads are constructed by the superintendent of streets and charged to the regular appropriation or by a contractor under the supervision of the city and state, as was the case last year. This last method has given considerable dissatisfaction in this section of the state owing to the fact that but one construction company seemed willing or able to land the contract and their work under the state specifications and supervision not being entirely satisfactory. The city not being able to secure state aid if the road were built in the regular way and the contractor being out of the question, the only alternative seemed to be for the committee to assume the contractor's place and build the road with an outside foreman, under the supervision of the state highway department. This plan being adopted by the city councils, the committee, with Mr. F. A. Bowen the foreman selected by the state, commenced purchasing the tools, machinery and materials needed for the work and attempted to hire help.

One of the arguments in favor of building the road ourselves was to give employment to local help, but real work such as was handed out by our efficient foreman did not appeal to

the local sons of toil and, after scouring Keene and vicinity, there was not a baker's dozen with whom to begin work. We hired about thirty Italians which necessitated finding suitable quarters. The old soap factory on Washington street was hired, fitted up with bunks, mattresses, etc., at a very small cost, and served its purpose admirably. We nearly lost the Italians the first night as the moonbeams straying between the shingles and rafters attracted their immediate attention, and they exclaimed: "We go back Boston morning." It was explained to them that the building was to be shingled at once but the possible combination of rain water and soap factory gave them a bad start.

It was believed that the big cut through the ledge at Beaver Brook falls would prove one of the principal and most costly difficulties of the job, but it melted away under Foreman Davis' steam drills for less than the estimated expense, this being a pleasant surprise to the committee and the only one of its kind occurring in the estimates furnished by the state. The worst turn, steepest grade and by far the most dangerous place, on the whole road was where it wound around the ledge opposite the Beaver Brook Falls and the pool below. It is without doubt one of the most picturesque spots on this or any of the Keene drives. An engineer would have dropped the ledge over into the falls or such portion of it as he did not blow into the scenery, but to preserve the spot uninjured from a scenic point required careful treatment.

A road was cut farther back on the ledge and about 1,500 yards of rock was removed, most of which was used in the construction work. The grade was reduced nearly one-half, the curve entirely removed, and the view of the falls considerably improved, at a cost of about \$2,500. The first mile or so proved to be very expensive construction, the old road practically constituting all the dirt in sight. To widen or grade, immediately involved more blasting, one portable steam drill with several hand drill gangs working continuously on this section of the road, the left side proving to be one continuous

ledge. On the other side of the road forty-five out of forty-eight post holes, for the fence, had to be blasted.

The first section of the road to the falls was surfaced with gravel from the Merchants bank sifted through a power screen. It was not expected that we should have to use gravel from the Merchants bank, but the engineers were not able to find any other suitable gravel this side of the falls. It was the committee's original intention to use screened gravel for the entire road and a special screen was secured for the purpose. The screen was discarded after completing the road to the falls as the state did not consider it necessary and objected to the extra expense. On this account and also owing to a considerable difference in the standard of the sub-grade it can not be expected the road above the falls will stand up quite as well as the portion on this side.

All state roads are built under specifications prepared by the state highway department and like a truthful story-can be stretched, or shaded, but not changed, the results being the principal difference. State roads under present conditions are an expensive luxury, nevertheless we believe this road as a whole will give excellent service and prove entirely satisfactory to the public.

Of this amount there is due the city from the state of New Hampshire, about \$4,000, which will be enough to complete the city's half of the remaining unfinished portion.

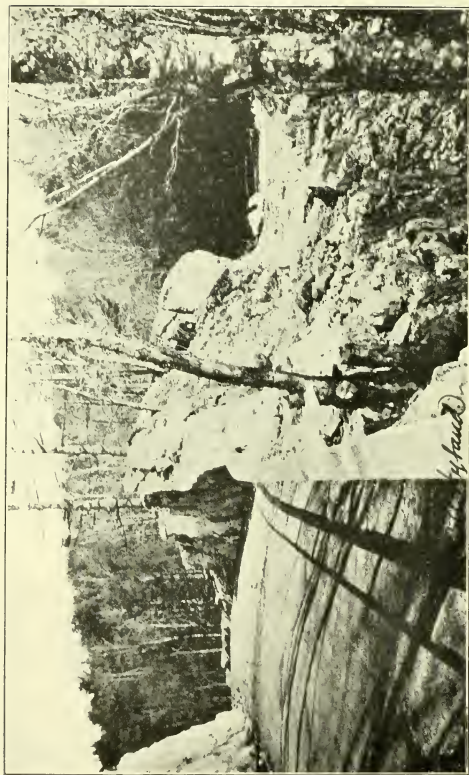

REPORT OF PARK COMMISSIONER.

To His Honor the Mayor, and the City Councils:

The money available for park purposes the present year, as indicated by financial reports, has been expended largely for the care of Wheelock park, which has become the popular resort for church, society, and family gatherings.

Preparatory to these gatherings, most of the dead limbs on the trees in the immediate vicinity of the pavilion were removed as a matter of safety, and the ground put in good condition.

During the dry season, it is necessary to keep constant watch to prevent and check fires. Many of the foreign trees and shrubs, planted and set out by the late Mr. Wheelock eighteen years ago, have attained considerable growth, and add greatly to the attractions of the spot. Generally, the citizens have been very careful about mutilating anything connected with the parks.

The roads in Robin Hood forest have been improved, and are now passable in most directions.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT.

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

I herewith submit for your consideration the following report of the fire department for the fiscal year ending November 30, which finds the department fully up to the standard as regards apparatus and equipment and with a full quota of men in each company.

You will note from the following table of fires and losses that the department has responded to one hundred and five calls, divided as follows: Twenty bell alarms, seventy-two still alarms, and thirteen brush fire calls. Five of these were calls for help from out of town. This is much the largest number of calls we have had in the history of the department. The loss at these fires was \$23,203.38. The insurance paid was \$9,861.16. The estimated valuation of the buildings that the fires were in was \$107,800. Much of this loss was due to the fire on Emerald street July 6, to the property owned by the Impervious Package Co., there being no insurance on this stock.

Improvements and new apparatus added to the department: There have been purchased 1000 feet of 2½ inch rubber-lined hose, one Eastman Deluge set, rubber coats and boots, and all necessary repairs have been made in fire station. The buildings are now in good condition with the exception of the tin roof on the fire station. There have been three new fire alarm boxes installed, number 41 located on Middle street near high school building, number 31 on Washington street opposite Pine street, and number 73 at corner of Arch street and Park avenue.

Apparatus and force: The apparatus and force of the department, under a chief and three assistant engineers, located at central fire station, Vernon street, is as follows: Steamer Company (25 men) with Amoskeag Steamer No. 1, Button Steamer No. 2, one combination chemical and hose wagon, one Relief hose wagon, Washington Hook and Ladder Company (20 men) has one service truck and one Relief truck. Deluge Home Company (20 men) has one combination chemical and hose wagon.

There are 8,500 feet of fire hose, 300 feet of chemical hose, 1,500 feet of linen hose at South Keene, six 6-gallon and four 3-gallon extinguishers, one cellar pipe, uniforms, rubber boots and hats for the department, four sets of swing harnesses, two extra Barry collars, three sleds, one three-way Eastman Deluge set, and three sets of Hobb's runners.

I make the following recommendations: That the city purchase a triple combination automobile fire truck. This piece of apparatus was thoroughly demonstrated at the recent National Convention of Fire Chiefs and unanimously acknowledged by the fire chiefs as being the most complete, practical and satisfactory piece of fire apparatus ever exhibited; that the city purchase 1000 feet of fire hose; that the department be allowed two pairs of horses to be kept at fire station, and available at all times. As I recommended last year, that our fire alarm telegraph system be changed from a gravity to a storage battery. This change will necessitate the expenditure of several hundred dollars, but can be operated at much less expense and give better satisfaction than the system now in use.

Report of the National Convention of Fire Chiefs held at Milwaukee on Sept. 19, 1911, which I was delegated by the city to attend:

The convention lasted four days and was attended by about seven hundred fire chiefs representing all sections of the United States and Canada.

The greatest interest was manifested throughout all the meetings and much valuable information was obtained. The discussions in regard to the prevention and extinguishing of fires; the exhibition of all kinds of modern fire apparatus, and everything manufactured for the use of fire departments, the automobile manufacturers' exhibit of pumping engines were most instructive and valuable to all in attendance.

It was the unanimous opinion of the delegates that more attention should be given to the prevention of fires, and that the fire districts should be most rigidly guarded, and that automobile fire trucks were the only kind of fire apparatus to be purchased at the present time. I made special effort to investigate the different kinds of these machines, there being several kinds manufactured, as without doubt the city will be called upon in the near future to purchase an additional fire truck.

We received a most cordial welcome from the mayor and firemen of Milwaukee, who did all in their power to make our visit to their city an agreeable and pleasant one.

The convention will be held next year in Denver, Colorado, and I trust that every city in our state will be represented by its fire chief.

It is gratifying to note that through the efforts of the mayor, the committee on fire department, and local firemen, the State Firemen's Relief Association held its annual convention in this city in September, which event proved a pleasant feature of the year's work.

I take pleasure in further reporting that harmony prevails between officers and men of the several companies, that they appreciate their quarters and the liberal spirit manifested by the city councils in promptly providing for the needs of the department. It also gives me pleasure to speak of the valuable aid afforded by the chairmen and members of the joint standing committee on fire department, the lands and buildings committee and the superintendent of the streets. A most

cordial relation exists among the members associated with me on the board of engineers, who with the officers, members of the department, and public have assisted me during the past year and to them and the city councils I extend my thanks and hearty appreciation.

The following signals were adopted by the board of engineers, January, 1907, and are as follows:

1. The superintendent has the right to strike one blow upon the bells at any time, to test the circuit; also to ring in one round from any box, preceded by a single blow exactly five minutes after the noon stroke, on Saturdays, for the purpose of testing the boxes.

2. The signal 22 repeated on the bells is to call the firemen to their houses for further orders.

3. Two blows struck upon the bells signifies a still alarm.

4. In case of a serious fire the engineers may cause a second alarm to be sounded from the nearest box. A second alarm is given by striking ten blows, followed by the box number.

5. As box 9, which is located on city hall, is still likely to be used for a general alarm, and to be pulled for a fire which is not in or near the square, the engineers will ring in a second alarm or four full rounds from this box, if there is fire of any magnitude near the square.

6. The old alarm on city hall will only be rung between 9 p. m. and 6 a. m., except in case of serious fire.

7. Arrangements have been made with the Beaver Mills Co., and alarms of fire will be given on their whistle same as by the bells.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF FIRE ALARM TELEGRAPH.

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

The caretaker may as well admit any and all of his failings. Each day brings new experiences and the report of new "troubles," many of which are offered in the way of criticism, and some of which, although followed to the cause, do not furnish added ability to guard against a recurrence in the future. However, he is ready at all times, so far as he can do so, to maintain the circuits and boxes in proper condition, and desires the aid of the citizens in reporting any matters of importance connected with his department.

Three new alarm boxes have been purchased and installed this year: No. 73 at the junction of Park avenue and Arch street, in West Keene; No. 31 on Washington street, opposite Pine street; and No. 13 at the Beaver Mills, the old box to be built over with new appliances and to be numbered 1-4-2, and to be installed on Willow street. Attention is particularly called to this new ring. Commencing as usual, with the ward number, it is followed by 4-2.

TRUSTEES OF KEENE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Councils.

The trustees of the Public Library submit the following report:

The year 1911 has been an important one in the history and progression of the Keene Public Library. At present that history must remain largely unwritten and the results await the completion and development of the improvements which have been undertaken. The trustees desire to express to the city councils their appreciation of the steps which the city has seen fit to take looking to the improvement of the library building and an important increase of its facilities. It is gratifying to note that former recommendations of the board have met with the approval of the city government.

The retirement of our former president, Hon. William P. Chamberlain, who has served on this board for over thirty years and ever since the library was taken over by the city, may well be noted here. The trustees have expressed to Mr. Chamberlain their appreciation of his long and faithful services in behalf of the library.

In the month of February the resignation of Miss Maud E. Bloomingdale, now Mrs. Fred P. Beedle, our efficient librarian since 1903, was received and accepted. The trustees, after due consideration of numerous applications to fill the vacancy thus created, engaged Miss Mary Lucina Saxton of the Holyoke Massachusetts library staff, and a lady of much experience in library work, to fill the position. Miss Saxton has since rendered excellent service in her new position. Owing to the contemplated changes in the library building, which would pre-

vent the librarian from occupying rooms therein, it became necessary to readjust her salary, and the board, after due consultation with your honorable board, fixed her salary at \$800.00 a year.

The alteration decided upon for the library building also deprived the janitor of his living apartments therein and his salary had to be readjusted to meet new conditions, and is now fixed at \$500.00 a year.

In submitting the following report of the librarian the board desires to fully endorse her recommendations in regard to the reference room and a children's room, and notes with much pleasure the large increase of reference work, especially by the children and students, which the library is called upon to provide for.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN.

To the Board of Trustees of the Public Library :

The statistics for the year show a slight decrease in the total circulation of books, but a decided increase in the circulation of non-fiction. The number of borrowers has also increased very largely, six hundred seventy-two readers' cards having been issued.

The long-felt need for a larger book-room has during the last year, been recognized alike by trustees and city councils and an adequate and pleasant stack is now in process of construction. It is a matter of regret that the equally important need of a children's room and a larger reference room than is at present in contemplation have not been included in the new plans.

For several years, the circulation of juvenile books has been on the increase, also the use of the reference and reading rooms by students and others seeking information, and it is the purpose of the present librarian to continue to build up these departments as much as possible and thus to make the library an influence for good and usefulness in the life of the city.

For some time, a new charging system had been advocated by the former librarian and by consent of a committee of the trustees in July, it was made possible during the past few months to put into operation the so-called "Modified Newark system." This change, together with a re-registration of borrowers, has caused some confusion and delay in the charging of books which has been borne by the public with great patience and good-will. Much gratifying commendation of certain features of the new system has been expressed. By the introduction of this up-to-date method, greater efficiency and accuracy will be gained.

Owing to the delay in the completion of the new book-room and the increasing difficulty of caring for and properly disposing of the books, fewer new books have been purchased this year than has been customary, and many of these have been chosen to supply the practical demands made by the library users. A new set of reference histories, the latest edition of the Webster's New International dictionary, a new atlas, also almanacs and year-books have been added to the reference department. An attempt has been made to serve the interests of the fiction readers better, by placing upon the shelves several copies of each work of recent fiction purchased.

The withdrawal from office of a well-known and much-liked librarian who has done as much for the building up of the library, as your former librarian has done, is a real calamity to a community, and the present librarian greatly appreciates the cordiality with which she has been received by the library users.

REPORT OF THE CITY SOLICITOR.

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

At the April term of the superior court, the city was awarded in the petition of the Union School District for the assessment of damages for the taking of the Coolidge lot, the sum of \$19,500. The Union School District paid this award in a fifty year note of the district bearing interest at the rate of 4 per cent.

At the present time the only matter pending before the superior court, in which the city is a party, is a petition of the city for instructions as to the manner in which it may use the income from the note received in payment of the Coolidge lot. This will come on for a hearing at the next term of the Superior court.

During the past year the city purchased all the stock of the Cheshire Granite Company, a corporation which owned quarry rights on the slopes of Roaring Brook in Roxbury. These rights are on land which the city bought this year from the Story heirs. A meeting of the stockholders of this company has been held and the quarry rights deeded to the city. In this way what might at any time prove a serious menace to our water supply has been removed and title to the quarry rights is now in the city.

There have been the usual criminal matters to attend to before the police court.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the City Councils of Keene:

During the past year there have been reported to the secretary of the board of health contagious diseases as follows: Measles, 71 cases; scarlet fever, 9 cases; diphtheria, 3 cases; typhoid fever, 17 cases.

Out of that number one person sick with the measles died, and one from typhoid fever, unless we reckon one who developed the last named disease while away from home and died while away.

At the present time there are ten cases of typhoid fever in the city, all of whom as far as we know are on the road to recovery.

The cause of the typhoid fever cases, no one seems to know and probably never will. They have appeared in households where the most modern sanitary conditions prevail and seemingly the most scrupulous care is taken, and perhaps are just as liable to be found there as anywhere. The cases are not confined to any particular part of the city. After all it is best always to guard against these diseases as much as it is possible, ever keeping in mind that no human foresight is a sure preventative, though to a great extent it will mitigate the provocation.

There has been an extension of the public sewer system for the past year on Washington and Marlboro streets, where there are perhaps from fifty to seventy-five houses adjacent thereto. We have notified the owners of the different houses on said street twice each to connect their premises with the sewers, in conformity with the law provided in such cases, and

some of the owners have made such connections, others will do so this season and still others will not be able to till another season. All show a willingness to do the best they can, but for the want of ready money to meet the expense in some cases, it is extremely difficult to do as they desire.

Acting under the law passed at the last session of the legislature requiring certain persons, firms and corporations to provide medical and surgical appliances in factories, I have sent notices to the different places of business in this city, to which the law applies, some seventy-five different places, recommending such an outfit as to us seemed best and so far as I am aware, such appliances have been supplied and the recommendations heeded. In this matter we have no duty except to make recommendations, as to what would be satisfactory to the Board of Health, there our duty ends. If the law is not complied with, then, for the breach of it, an offender would be liable, the same as for the breach of any other law, and subject to the jurisdiction of the police forces.

Our report in the law, called the pure food law, has been made already to your honorable board, as of October 1st last, and there will be no further reference to it till April 1st, next, the reports being semi-annual.

In addition to the above, we have, of course, been favored with a great many complaints, of the usual kind, where nuisances have been said to exist, which we have attended to in the ordinary and usual way. A great deal of necessary work has been done which it would be difficult to specify and which would not be of any interest to the community. No money has come into our hands during the past year, belonging to the city.

REPORT OF SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

I herewith present the first report of the sealer of weights and measures for the city of Keene:

List of property belonging to the city of Keene: Twenty 50-lb. test weights, one 25-lb. nickel plated steel test weight, one 10-lb. nickel plated steel test weight, one set brass test weights, 4-lb. to 1-16 oz. in case; one set aluminum weights, 20 grains to 1 grain in case; one set even balance scales in case, one set liquid measures, two 1-gallon, one $\frac{1}{2}$ -gallon, 1 quart, 1 pint, 1 gill, one glass graduate, 5 measures in one; one pint berry measure, one set dry measures, $\frac{1}{2}$ -bushel, 1 peck, $\frac{1}{2}$ -peck, $\frac{1}{4}$ peck, 1 quart; one 2-foot rule and gauge, one 6-foot steel tape, one hand seal, 100 lead seals, one S wrench, one small monkey wrench, one hammer, two screw drivers, one 1-lb. hook weight, one wire-cutter, one pair pipe pliers, one set steel dies, alphabet; one set steel dies, figures, 0 to 9; one 15-inch level, about five pound shot and sheet lead, one 10-gallon can, $\frac{3}{4}$ bushel grain, tags, seals and record blanks.

I have given careful attention to the testing the following list of scales and measures:

Railroad track scales, 1; wagon scales, 9; platform floor scales, 85; platform counter scales, 28; beam scales, 32; computing scales, 34; confectioner's scales, 24; spring balance scales, 45; even balance scales, 31; steelyards, 11; track scales, 5; hopper scales, 1; oil and molasses pumps, 22; dry measures, 70; liquid measures, 196.

It has been several times suggested that the city should install a first-class set of wagon scales. The suggestion is a good one.

In my opinion the law in relation to sealers should be changed, and instead of state, county and town sealers, have a state and county sealer. The county sealer to test all weights and measures used for commercial purposes in the county, at a fair salary, as the smaller towns cannot afford to invest \$250 in a set of test weights and measures to test the small number of scales and measures used by them. A wagon scale cannot be tested properly with less than 1,000 lbs. besides a load of from one to three tons.

The law in relation to milk cans and bottles should be made to conform more with the Massachusetts law. The merchants have been very willing to have their scales tested, and I have found more scales that were giving overweight than underweight. The dealers are buying a better class of scales as they find a cheap scale is a poor investment.

The net quantity of the contents of all packages should be plainly stated in terms of weight or measure on the outside of all packages. There is a vast quantity of goods put up in packages for the retail trade that are more or less short weight or measure, butter for instance, in packages sold for a pound, will weigh from 14 to 16 ounces.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH, FOOD INSPECTION.

To the City Councils of Keene:

In accordance with a city ordinance passed by the city and to take effect October 1, 1910, entitled, "An Ordinance Regulating the Production, Care and Sale of Milk, Food and Food Substances," the Board of Health makes its second semi-annual report as follows:

In our last report to the city April 1, 1911, we stated that the city inspector gave the number of cows that he had inspected as being 958 from which milk was sold in this city, and the number of owners of such cows as being, 184. Since then, or for the past six months, there have been inspected the additional number of 73, and kept by 12 different persons. So that the number of cows inspected for the past year has been 1,031 and the number of persons who owned the same is 196.

The report to this office in each case is that the cows were found to be in a good healthy condition and their surroundings sanitary. Acting on the above findings we have issued 196 licenses for the several owners to keep said cows and sell milk in the city. There have been no reports, but as above stated.

Outside of the above services, there has been a good deal of work done by the inspector in the examination of markets, restaurants and other places where food and food substances are kept for sale, and we are satisfied that a great deal of good has resulted from such inspection.

In such examinations, no reports except verbal has been made to this board, as there are no provisions for such, except

in such cases where a complaint should be made for further action. In all cases where there has been need of better sanitary conditions, the owners or proprietors have been willing to do whatever the inspector has suggested, and by that means all premises, as far as it has come to our knowledge, a more wholesome condition has been the result.

But in those cases, as well as all others, eternal vigilance on the part of the proper officers is the only price of the continuance of a wholesome and sanitary condition in all places where this law applies.

The law passed at the last legislature to promote the sanitary production and distribution of food, is a most wholesome law, and should receive the sanction of all citizens. By a little care and small expense, certain foods are kept free from dirt and flies and rendered wholesome to the consumer as they should be. The inspector, under the advice and sanction of the Board of Health, has seen that the provisions were carried out and the proper protection given. We are satisfied that there can be nothing but good coming therefrom.

We have received for the past six months, the sum of \$3.00 for tags sold, the property of the city, which amount has been paid to the city treasurer.

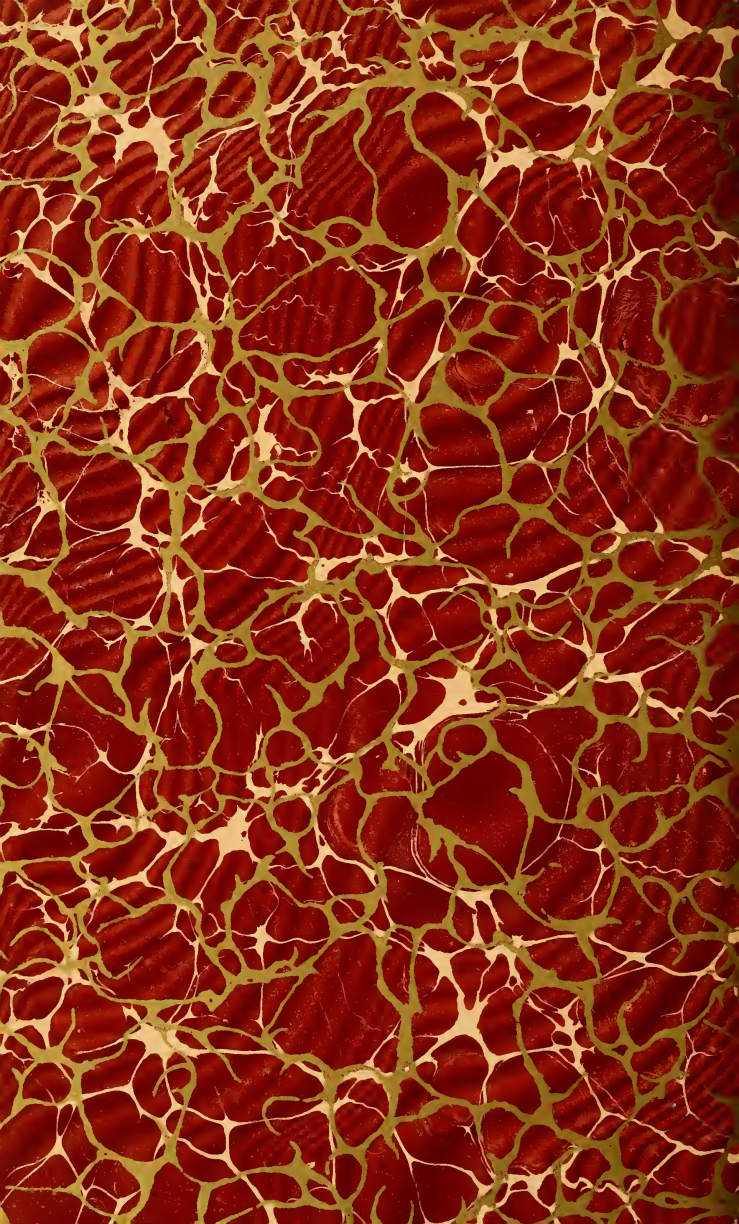

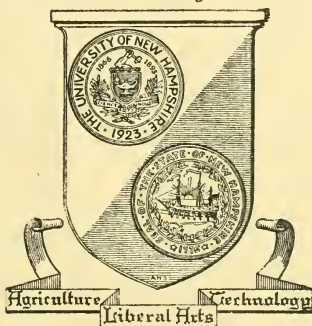
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
