# Town Warrant

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kensington in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Kensington on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To Choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The Selectmen's estimated expenditures for the year 1955 amount to \$14,922.90.
- 3. To see if the Town wishes to allow discount on Taxes paid within 30 or 60 days after presentation of Tax bills and determine the amount thereof.
- 4. To vote on the basis of payment and the amount thereof to be paid the Tax Collector for collection of Taxes
- 5. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to dispose of property held by the Town on Tax Sale at Public Auction.
- 6. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 7. To see if the Town will authorize Selectmen to use \$6,000.00 of \$6,399.88 surplus, and raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 to make a total of \$8,000.00 for the following road improvements:
  - a. Resurface and tar Brewer road \$1,300.00
  - b. Resurface and tar Greenwood road from Rt. 107 to Echo Park 1,200.00
  - c. Resurface and tar Thorndyke hill, from Hilliard road to top of first hill (so-called Moulton Ridge road 500.00

d. Replace culvert between Carl Casper and Frank
Day's 1,000.00

e. Install culverts and repair Kimball road 1,500.00

f. Widen and lower grade in front of Fred Eastman's
on Drinkwater road 2,500.00

\$8,000.00

This program to improve our roads for economy and safety.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act Old-Age and Survivors' Insurance), as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.
- 9. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 10. To see if the town wishes to change the business meeting from afternoon to evening and determine time of same.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to have a Budget Committee of four or more members to act with Selectmen and School Board on all appropriations for town and school expenses. Committee to be nominated and voted on at each Town Meeting.
- 12. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Kensington, N. H., qualified to vote in school affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 12th day of March, 1955, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing two years to fill a vacancy caused by a resignation effective as of the day of this meeting.
  - 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 7. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make applications for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants, and aids or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the Federal Security Agency, or any other United States government or State agencies.
- 11. To see what organizations the District will allow to use the school building outside of school hours under rules and regulations established by the school board.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of Kensington, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year 1954-1955 opened with the following personnel:

Mrs. Esther Prescott, principal and teacher of Grades 4-6

Mrs. Mildred Crowell, teacher of Grades 1-3

Mrs. Eleanor Henry, teacher of Music

Miss Mary Shea, school nurse

Mr. John Ahern, teacher of handwriting

This is the same staff which the district had a year ago with the exception of the handwriting teacher, and it is well qualified to give good training to the boys and girls.

This year the problem of unequal distribution of numbers in the two classrooms is not present and we are able to have the usual three grades in a room again.

The extension and improvement of the playground facilities should be undertaken as soon as possible now that money is available for this work.

The response to the All-Risk Student Accident Insurance program was very strong again this year which would indicate that this type of insurance coverage should be continued.

The school work of the students seems to be progressing very satisfactorily under the guidance of the teachers. One of the best indications of this is the results of the achievement tests which are given each year. The great majority of Kensington students receive scores on these tests well above the national average.

The Parent-Teacher Association continues to work for the welfare of the school program.

I would like to mention a few of the many bills dealing with education which are being presented to this session of the state legislature for action.

One bill would reimburse each school district for about fifty per cent of the cost of school transportation for all students up to sixteen years of age.

Another bill deals with school building construction aid and would refund to any district which finds it necessary to build about twenty-five percent of the cost of the construction. This would be retroactive to 1946 so that any district like Kensington which had already built a school would be included. This is similar to laws which Vermont and Maine now have.

Other bills would provide increased amounts of equalization State Aid as well as a flat grant aid which would pay to each district so much for each pupil enrolled in school.

The above bills are all plans to reduce the burden on the property taxpayer.

Mr. Percy Dunn as janitor takes pride in his work of keeping the school in good condition.

I believe that all who contributed in any way toward the purchase of the new piano at the school should be commended. This fine piano should greatly assist the music program.

I call to your attention the reports of the school nurse and the music teacher and the tables which follow.

I again wish to thank the citizens, the members of the School Board, and the teachers, for their continued support and co-operation.

In May the school pupils took part in the annual Memorial Day program.

At the beginning of the fall term, we were pleased to have the instruments for a rhythm band purchased for the school. The rhythm band is an essential part of a music program, and the children are enjoying participation in this new activity.

We are very proud to have a baby grand piano, which was purchased for the school by the Parent-Teachers' Association. We are all very grateful for this new acquisition.

In November, a group of Mrs. Blake's piano pupils and the school students gave a concert at the Town Hall to raise funds to help pay for the piano.

We all appreciate Mrs. Blake's efforts and hard work to bring about the purchase of the piano.

The regular music program has consisted of ear-training, rhythms work with rhythm band, work with tonettes, singing in unison and in parts, dancing, learning the fundamentals of music and note-reading.

## School Health Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Does it sound out of place for me to say, "Three cheers for Kensington"? I feel I must, for you have established the first complete physical examination health program among the smaller communities in our School District Union.

During the past year, a dental program has been completed, and the thorough physical examination program has been set up with the parents urged to attend. The latter program is under the direction of Dr. Tuthill, a pediatrician. To date, although the program is not completed, minor conditions have been found that would have gone unrecognized without this complete check. For the future, you are looking ahead to a sight conservation program.

All of this has come about through the initiative of the P. T. A. with the co-operation of the School Board, the teachers, and the community at large.

Almost all of the children had had Patch Test and have been found to be free from T. B. Urinanalyses were also done on those having physicals.

More children have been seen by the eye specialist and received help with their vision difficulties.

In spite of the usual number of communicable diseaxes, it has been a good year from the health standpoint. We are looking forward to an even healthier one.
