TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston in the (L.S.) County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Kingston Town Hall in said Kingston, N. H. on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town and School Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow sums of money in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and to issue in the name of the Town negotiable notes, the aforesaid notes to be paid during the current year for taxes collected during the year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$441.55 and the State will contribute \$2,943.66 for the Class V Highways, under the provisions of the T. R. A.

Article 5. By petition, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500.00 to continue the permanent improvement of Hooke Avenue.

Article 6. By petition, to see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Country Pond Road in South Kingston, N. H. to light up a down hill corner plus a blind driveway.

Article 7. By petition of Dulcena E. Higgins and 9 others, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to black top Babscott Lane.

Article 8. By petition of Kenneth J. Wright and 13 others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to surface and tar Wright Road.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 for improvement of Great Pond Road.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 for improvement of North Danville Road.

Article 11. To see if Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax dedeed property at public auction.

Article 12. By petition, to see if the town will install or erect a street light on existing pole No. 164 on Ronnie Lane.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 to widen the approach to the bridge on New Boston Road.

Article 14. By petition of the Fire Wards and the Firemen's Association, to see if the Town will vote to purchase and equip a vehicle to replace the present rescue wagon, using the unexpended 1961 balance and currently raising \$800.00 by taxation, the purchasing committee to consist of three elected Fire Wards, Fire Chief Moore, Donald Clark, Head of Rescue Squad, and one Selectman.

Article 15. To see it the Town will vote to allow the Fire Wards to place unexpended funds from each year's appropriation into a capital reserve fund for the purpose of replacing the 1939 "Diamond T" fire

truck. A financial report to be included in the Fire Wards' yearly statement.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote that the funds of the Thomas Elkins Fund in the amount of \$1,260.00, and the funds of the Ward Clark Parsonage Fund, in the amount of \$5,200.00, be paid and transferred to the Trustees of The Trust Funds for investment and distribution within their discretion, subject to existing terms of funds established.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to remove the office of Sexton of Cemeteries from the ballot and place this responsibility for appointment with the Trustees of Trust Funds.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Auditor's Report and the Town Report as printed.

Article 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Article 2. Meeting called to order by the Moderator, Leonard Sanborn. Prayer was given by Rev. Robert Robb. Moderator read the results of balloting under Art. 1. Mistakes in Town Report were corrected and a motion was made and passed to take up the budget, item by item. As a result of this it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$211,710.10 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. Voted that the Selectmen and Treasurer borrow sums of money (deleting "not to exceed") in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current year and to issue in the name of the Town negotiable notes, the aforesaid notes to be paid during the current year from taxes collected during the year.

Article 4. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$443.91 and the State will contribute \$2,959.39 for class V Highways, under the provisions of the T.R.A.

Article 5. This article, to raise \$3,400 for improvements on Rock Rimmon Road was not passed by a vote of Yes 50, No 54.

Article 6. Voted that the Town raise and appro-

priate a sum not to exceed \$500.00 to improve Hook Ave., West Shore Pk., Country Pond, providing the land owners on this road agree to provide property for widening road to legal width.

Article 7. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate a sum of \$500.00 to surface and tar the new road constructed at Cooper's Grove.

Article 8. Voted by ballot.

Article 9. Voted by ballot.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for improvement of Great Pond Road.

Article 11. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax deeded Property at Public Auction.

Article 12. This article to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for improvement of the Hunt road, was not carried.

Article 13. Voted to close the old part of Great Pond Road that was discontinued when the road was straightened, that is, the old road that goes down over the wooden bridge located just beyond Lester Nason's house.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to resurface and tarvia a portion of Ronnie Lane, so called, beginning at the Cemetery Lane midway between Main St., and the Plains Cemetery and continuing to the end of the newly constructed road, a distance of 300 feet, in accordance with established regulations.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to regrade and tar Little River Road Extension left unfinished two years ago.

Article 16. Motion made and carried that this article be laid on the table.

Article 17. Voted to accept the Auditors Report and Town Report as printed except that the Selectmen and School Board shall meet with the Tax Commission to correct certain figures in Town Report that are in error, not later than June 1, 1961.

Article 18. A gift of \$175.00 to the Nichols Memorial Library from Pine Tree Grange was acknowledged by the Trustees of the Library.

Selectmen announced that the new Street signs had arrived.

Voted to adjourn.

Seven cemetery plots sold during the year; six in Greenwood Cemetery and one in West Kingston Cemetery, totaling \$175.00. Three new Trust Funds totaling \$400.00 were set up, one in Greenwood Cemetery and two in West Kingston Cemetery.

A new Well and Water Pump was installed in W. Kingston Cemetery and a New Pump was installed in the old well in W. Kingston Cemetery.

All of the five cemeteries were mowed three times, just before Memorial Day, about July 4th, and in September. The mowing of the entire cemeteries three times keep them looking quite well and with five to seven extra mowings of the Perpetual Care plots will make our cemeteries look very good.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

As a result of purchasing a set of the Americana Encyclopedias in 1960 and a set of World Book Encyclopedias in 1961 we were eligible to apply for State aid this year. We received a grant of \$200.00 which is being used for the purpose of helping up-date our Science collection, especially in the Senior High School level.

Many of the classes have been replaced and new titles added during the year from approved lists for Supplementary School Reading. This program will be expanded during the coming year. We are providing reading and reference material for students in several neighboring towns.

A total of 1677 books were borrowed from the Bookmobile, a substantial increase over previous years because of the fact that Bookmobile service has been discontinued at the Bakie School and Sanborn Seminary. It was felt that this service should be handled through the local libraries. Ninety-two special books were borrowed from the State Library.

National Library Week was observed by an exhibit of Civil War relics and a special collection of books of that era, which created considerable interest to the town's people. Mrs. Gladys Larson brought her pupils of the Holiday Kindergarten for a story hour and instruction in the use of the library.

A group of pupils from the Bakie School, accompanied by Miss Reid, visited the library during National Book Week for a story hour.

Regional and State meetings were attended by your librarian and trustees.

At the annual meeting of the N. H. Library Trustees Association last October Mrs. Andrew Christie was voted a Director of that organization, representing Southeastern N. H.

The trustees have greatly improved the appearance and safety of the driveway by having the broken cement removed and hot-topping and widening the surface, thereby increasing the space for parking cars.

A new addition to the children's section has been made by a long table with several small chairs which are being greatly enjoyed. New book cases for the 7th and 8th grade levels have been added and two new desks for study purposes.

We are deeply grateful to the members of Pine Tree Grange who bequeathed in 1960 a sum of \$175.00, the interest to be used for the purchase of books.

Again we wish to express appreciation to the Kingston Garden Club for replenishing the flower urns and for the wreath which was presented for the Christmas holiday season.

A subscription of the Christian Science Monitor was given to the library again this year.

Several gifts of books have been presented and we are grateful to the following donors.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

42 automobile accidents in 1961, handled by members of this department, an increase of 18 over 1960.

12 personal injuries resulting from these accidents, assisted N. H. State Police on one fatal.

5 hit and run type accidents, three of which were apprehended and found guilty in court, 1 appealed.

31 appearances in court on warrants and summons plus 4 juvenile sessions at Plaistow and Epping, N. H. Municipal courts, twenty more than in 1960.

2 stolen automobiles, one recovered in Haverhill, Mass., and one in Worcester, Mass.

5 vagrants removed to Brentwood, three more than in 1960.

4 arrests for driving to endanger, all were found guilty.

5 arrests for driving while intoxicated, four found guilty, two more than in 1960.

1 arrest for operating without license.

1 train-auto collision on the New Boston road crossing, no injuries reported.

2 complaints of bad checks, restitution made.

Lost or missing persons, six separate cases not including those at the State Park, all located.

Four trips to Concord State Hospital.

Two trips to Concord NHSP Hdqtrs., for blood tests on DWI's.

Nine reports of prowlers answered.

Three separate boundary disputes investigated.

Several serious Halloween Pranks resulting in costly damage, all of which the offenders have made restitution or are now in the process of making it or working it off.

Four road checks were conducted during 1961, one at the request of the Haverhill, Mass. P.D., and two

in conjunction with the Rockingham County Mutual Police Assoc. Eight officers are used at these checks and when possible more in order to expedite the movement of traffic. The main purpose of these are strictly in the interest of Safety of the Public. We attempt to weed-out the drunken drivers, speeders and tag those found to be operating defective equipped vehicles.

11 dog complaints handled by the Police Dept. in 1961.

Four arrests for drunkenness and disorderly conduct in 1961, three more than in 1960.

This department called on twelve occasions during the year to assist in apprehending escaped prisoners. Two from Hillsborough County and ten from Rockingham County. Whenever we receive these calls we first notify each and every establishment that may be open for business, also any social gatherings to be on the alert and to lock and secure their automobiles so they may not be stolen.

Ten officers were assigned to duty at the State Park in 1961, one man each Saturday and two men on Sundays and holidays as condition warranted. These men were hired and paid by the State of New Hampshire for this service.

During the off seasons for campers and summer residents we have continued to inspect their property and also maintain a regular routine of patrolling roads that are not generally used mainly in areas where summer cottages and camps are located. These assignments being during the night time in radio equipped cars. As a result of these there has been an encouraging decrease in camp breaks and vandalism.

The auxiliary Police and CD units have been very cooperative in helping with traffic on carnival week and holidays, also on camp checks and lost persons.

For the fourth consecutive year, this department has been presented a certificate from the Motor Vehicle Department in recognition of the exemplary cooperation and support given to the New Hampshire Motor Vehicle Department by the Kingston Police Depart-

ment, for contributing in great measure to the safety accomplishments in the State of New Hampshire.

At this time I wish to thank the members of the Police Department, Auxiliary and CD units and Fire Department for their effective work at accidents, fires, camp checks, handling traffic and investigations.

**REPORT OF THE SCHOOL CLERK FOR
THE KINGSTON SCHOOL DISTRICT**

At a meeting of the Inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Kingston, qualified to vote in district affairs held in said Kingston in the Daniel J. Bakie School on March 11, 1961, starting at 8 p.m., the following business was transacted:

Articles 1-2-3-4 and 7 were voted on by Australian Ballot on March 14, 1961, at the Kingston Town Hall at the time of the regular election of town officials.

Article 5. A motion was made and not passed to take up articles 5, 9, 10, 15 and 16 in this order and to postpone action on other articles until a later date.

A motion was made and passed that the Salaries of the School Board and other Officers of the District be set up as \$510.00. (This was broken down for explanation as \$125.00 for School Board Chairman; \$125.00 for School Board Secretary; \$100.00 for School Board Member; \$100.00 for School District Treasurer; \$20.00 for School District Moderator; \$10.00 for School District Clerk; and \$15.00 each for two School District Auditors.)

Article 6. This article relative to hearing the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen was passed over by vote of the people.

Article 8. A motion was made and not passed that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$183,922.23 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income, the School Board

to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

An amendment was made and passed that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$162,065.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 9. A motion was made and not passed that the School District of Kingston vote with other Districts of Supervisory Union No. 14 to provide for the services of a Helping Teacher as provided in R.S.A. 186:11, XXII, XXIII, XXIV; as amended 1957 R.S.A. 252:2.

An amendment was made and passed to table the above motion.

Article 10. This article was void because Article 9 was not passed.

Article 11. A motion was made and passed to lay on the table the proposal for the School District of Kingston to remodel the Kingston Town Hall for school purposes, providing the voters at the Town Meeting will vote to release the Town Hall to the School District.

Article 12. A motion was made and passed to table this article which proposed that the School District of Kingston raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$36,500.00 for the purpose of remodeling the Town Hall and purchasing the necessary equipment, etc.

Article 13. A motion was made and passed to table this article which proposed that the School District of

Kingston vote to build and equip a new elementary school.

Article 13a. A motion was made and passed that the Moderator and the School Board appoint a permanent committee not to exceed four members to work with the School Board for the purpose of conducting a survey as to the immediate and long term building needs of the School District of Kingston, both from an educational and financial status and assist in carrying out these recommendations; and further moved, that this committee be instructed to work closely with the trustees of Sanborn Seminary in their future planning, and further that this committee not be relieved until action on their recommendations is completed.

Article 14. A motion was made and passed to table this article which proposed that the School District of Kingston raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$128,900.00 for the purpose of the construction and equipping of a new elementary school, etc.

Article 15. A motion was made and not passed, on petition of Somerby C. Follansbee, Jr. and thirteen others, that the Kingston School District vote to instruct the School Board of Kingston to have the financial records returned to the Kingston School Board and authorize the School Board to hire a part time clerk and appropriate funds for same.

Article 16. A motion was made and not passed, on petition of Somerby C. Follansbee, Jr. and thirteen others, that the Kingston School District vote to instruct the School Board of Kingston that all purchases made for the operation and maintenance of the Kingston school district will be made by the School Board.

A motion was made and passed that the meeting be adjourned until 10 a.m. on Tuesday, March 14, 1961, for Australian Balloting at the Kingston Town Hall. This meeting adjourned at 9:40 p.m.

On Tuesday, March 14, 1961, there were a total of 483 votes cast by Australian Ballot beginning at 10:00 a.m. in the Kingston Town Hall and closing at 7 p.m. These ballots were counted on Tuesday evening and the following results were obtained:

Article 1. Leonard F. Sanborn was chosen as Moderator for the coming year. (181 write-in votes)

Article 2. Bettie C. Ouellette was chosen as Clerk for the ensuing year. (174 write-in votes)

Article 3. Somerby C. Follansbee, Jr. was chosen as a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. (267 votes; Maude E. Dolliver received 198 votes)

Article 4. Gertrude W. Semple was chosen as Treasurer for the ensuing year. (361 votes)

Article 7. Irving Johnson (83 write-in votes) and Harry Snow (78 write-in votes) were chosen as auditors for the School District for the coming year.

The results of the balloting were read by the Moderator. A motion was made and passed that the meeting be adjourned at 9:09 p.m.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Kingston qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Bakie School in said district on the third day of March 1962, at eight o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

Articles 5, 6, 8, 9, and 10.

Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, and 7 to be acted upon March 13, 1962 at Kingston Town Hall, ten o'clock in the morning.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Educational Needs Committee.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. with the construction and equipping of this addition to the Bakie School.

And in order to provide such funds to authorize the school board to issue and sell notes or bonds for all or any part of the sum so appropriated in the name of and on the credit of the district under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and any amendments relating thereto; and to delegate the school board the authority to fix the time and place of payment of the principal amount of each note or bond, and to sell the notes or bonds, and to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable.

9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To Citizens of Kingston:

Bakie School can no longer be thought of as a small elementary school as we now have eleven teachers, 311 students and a Supervising Principal. From the most conservative estimates one would expect that this school will become even larger. Kingston, as we all know, is located in one of the fastest growing areas of New England. The various communities to the south of us have been experiencing this rapid growth, that is now taking place here, and they know only too well the problems this growth presents. It might be well to note here that the most recent study of projected enrollment was completed only a few months ago and already we exceed these estimates by nearly two years.

The Bakie School Board and Building Committee have given serious thought and a great deal of time studying student enrollments, classroom needs, financing, etc. The various types of construction, location of the needed addition, etc. have also been given the same consideration.

The proposed building program is then the result of a careful study by interested citizens.

Bakie School had a rather unusual experience this past year. A new Superintendent of Schools and a new Supervising Principal, both in September. However, little of this change was noted by the student body primarily because the School Board fully understood the policies, financial condition, and staffing needs of your school.

Mr. John Hodsdon, Supervising Principal is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College and is continuing a graduate program at the University of New Hampshire. The faculty for 1961-62 and their respective grades are as follows:

The majority of these teachers are experienced which is generally accepted as very valuable. Teacher replacement does not lend itself to continuity of program, self-confidence in students, and understanding of the community, its people, etc. Kingston deserves credit in maintaining this condition — an experienced staff. The physical plant is also deserving of comment in that it continues to be maintained in a manner indicating pride on the part of the community. It is attractive, very clean and well equipped. Mr. Rock, custodian, and Mrs. Towne, cafeteria manager, both carry on their respective departments efficiently.

In closing may we note that the various School Boards, Principals and teachers in Supervisory Union #14 are working actively in many of the new concepts of education, guidance, curriculum development, exceptional children, etc. Informational meetings have been and are being scheduled so that all of us can know of, understand and evaluate this ever growing field of education.

DANIEL J. BAKIE SCHOOL
REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

Education is everybody's business. It is a responsibility placed upon every teacher and parent in Kingston and in the United States. Because of this responsibility then, we should work together being in constant contact with educational practices.

The distinguished committee members of the White House Conference on Education wrote: "The schools have become the chief instrument for keeping this nation the fabled land of opportunity it started out to be"

These men were right when they wrote the above statement. Daniel J. Bakie School offers that opportunity to every student who enrolls here. In September 1961, 311 students enrolled in Bakie School. As we progressed through the months, the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools, the Principal, and the Teachers, worked together striving to make available to these students an ever increasing number of facilities and quality in education.

Grades 1 - 5 in Bakie School are self-contained classrooms. It is in these first five grades that the students receive the basic fundamentals in reading, writing, arithmetic, language, science, and social studies. In grades 6 - 8, which is departmentalized, the students have the opportunity to receive a more specialized program in reading, writing, mathematics, social studies, English, and science. French and physical education are also introduced to these students. Due to the ever increasing values of the subjects involved, our faculty is doing their utmost to continue their own education in order to stay abreast of the changes in educational prac-

tices. This makes it possible to continue to give the best education possible to the children of Kingston.

At Daniel J. Bakie School there are certain values, certain skills, and a vast amount of knowledge being emphasized and taught constantly; however, education must change. The educational program of today should be different, to a point, than that of yesterday. The staff here is a very flexible one, and willing to accept new ideas, new methods, and new programs, which were essential in the changing educational world.

Where the schools are headed is more important than where they have been.

To the Superintendent of Schools :

This past year has been an exceptionally gratifying one in the field of the children's health. The children seem to be taking a more active interest in their own personal health and hygiene. Health education is stressed with the use of movies, pamphlets and discussion groups. Any parent is invited to attend these programs in order to see how the entire well-being of the child, both physical and mental is of prime importance.

All the children received routine checks on height, weight, hearing and vision. The Vollmer patch test for tuberculosis was given and anyone with a positive reaction was taken to Manchester for a chest x-ray.

The Dental Health Program was carried out again by the P. T. A. with the children being taken to Dr. Storey in Exeter by the parents.

Home calls were made to discuss problems with parents and it is through this direct contact that a greater understanding can be reached.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the organizations and individuals who have helped with their services and financial aid.
