**ANNUAL TOWN MEETING****March 9, 1948**

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ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for a term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable, two Road Agents, and three Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

After the close of the polls, the following results of the balloting for officers were announced: Town Clerk, Walter N. Heald; Selectman, Henry F. Whitcomb; Treasurer, Lawrence M. Colby; Tax Collector, David H. Simons; Overseer of the Poor, William A. Astle; Library Trustees, Amanda S. Edson, Mildred P. Silsby, Ruth D. White; Town Constable, Homer C. Johnson; Road Agents, Morris A. Moore, Frank B. Kinne; Delegates to Constitutional Convention, Robert E. Bowker; Fred Kelley; Frederick E. Green.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the Health Department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for protection of the premises on the Ammonoosuc River from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister, for payment of

the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the Skating Rink, and for all other town charges.

VOTED, That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$118,681.88 for the following purposes: Town Officers' Salaries, \$4500.00; Town Officers' Expenses, \$2500.00; Elections, \$600.00; Municipal Court, \$800.00; Town Building, \$3500.00; Police Department, \$8500.00; Forest Fires, \$600.00; Blister Rust Control, \$400.00; Health Department, \$400.00; Littleton Hospital, \$6000.-00; Vital Statistics, \$500.00; District Nurse, \$1650.00; Summer Highway Maintenance, \$15,000.00; Winter Highway Maintenance, \$3000.00; Street Lighting, \$7600.00; General Highway Expense, \$1500.00; Village Highways, \$12,000.00; Asphalt Treatment, \$6000.00; Library, \$5600.00; Town Poor, \$3000.00; Old Age Assistance, \$10,000.00; Memorial Day, \$200.00; Town Dump, \$800.00; Parks and Playgrounds, \$6700.00; Community Center, \$5200.00; Cemeteries, \$875.00; Advertising, \$250.00; Interest on Bonds, \$1060.20; Interest on Notes, \$280.02; Payments on Debt, \$9666.66.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State Aid for construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State Aid and for expenditures of other public monies in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its Town highways.

VOTED, that the town apply for State Aid for highway construction, and raise and appropriate for the Town's share the sum of \$1,029.09.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

VOTED, that the Selectmen be authorized to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1948, and to be paid therefrom.

VOTED, that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow monies, from time to time, on the credit of the town, for current indebtedness of the town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1948, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

VOTED, that the town adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

Following is the list of the New Budget Committee as appointed by Richard P. Whiting, Moderator, April 1, 1948: George Longchamps, Chairman—3 years; Clifford Santy, Secretary—3 years; Larkin R. Brush—3 years; Hubert Merrill—2 years; Earl B. Elkins—2 years; Vonley M. Ruggles—2 years; Norman H. Kinne—1 year; Harry B. Soper—1 year; Stanley B. Parker—1 year; Clarence W. Allard, chosen by the Selectmen—1 year; Elmer H. Southard, chosen by the School Board—1 year.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to the White Mountains Region Association 1/100th of one percent of the Town valuation for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages



of the Town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

VOTED, that the town raise and appropriate to the White Mountains Region Association the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the town, in cooperation with the 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to purchase and install, on Main Street, in said Littleton, Parking Meters for the regulation of parking on said Street, payment for the same to be made from the monies collected therefrom, and provide for the disposition of the earnings resulting from their operation and use.

VOTED, that the town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to purchase and install, on Main Street, in said Littleton, parking meters for the regulation of parking on said Street, and the revenue resulting from the operation and use of said meters to be used to finance the purchase, maintenance and policing of said meters, or to maintain and improve streets and highways in the town, or to acquire, construct, improve, maintain and manage public parking areas.

ARTICLE 9. To see what sum of money will be raised and appropriated for the re-surfacing of Main Street, and for the construction of a new bridge on Cottage Street, across the Ammonoosuc River.

VOTED, that the sum of \$24,750.00 be appropriated for the resurfacing of Main Street, and that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow said sum, the same to be expended in conjunction with State and/or Federal agencies pertaining to the same.

VOTED, that the sum of \$25,455.18 be appropriated for the construction of a new bridge on Cottage Street, across the Ammonoosuc River, and that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow said sum, the same to be expended in conjunction with State and/or Federal agencies pertaining to the same.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will authorize the purchase of, and raise and appropriate for the same, the sum of twenty-five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars, the race-track lot, so-called, off the Lisbon-Littleton highway, from the Glenwood Cemetery Corporation, and to deed the same to the State of New Hampshire as a site for a State or National Guard Armory to be there located, so long as the same is used for military purposes by the State or Federal Government, otherwise said property to revert upon its non-use for military purposes to said Glenwood Cemetery Corporation, upon the repayment by said Glenwood Cemetery Corporation to the Town of Littleton of the sum of two thousand five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars.

VOTED, that the sum of twenty-five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars be raised and appropriated to purchase the race-track lot so-called, off the Littleton-Lisbon highway and the Selectmen be authorized to take a deed of same from the Glenwood Cemetery Corporation and to deed the same to the State of New Hampshire as a site for a State or National Guard armory to be there located, so long as the same is used for military purposes by the State or Federal Government, otherwise said property to revert upon its non-use for military purposes to said Glenwood Cemetery Corporation, upon the repayment by said Glenwood Cemetery Corporation to the Town of Littleton of the sum of two thousand five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase or acquire by eminent domain

proceedings such tract or tracts of land, other than the race-track property but adjacent thereto, as may be necessary to complete the project of obtaining such suitable site for a State or National Guard Armory, in Littleton, as may be approved by the Adjutant General of New Hampshire and the State of New Hampshire and to raise and appropriate monies to pay for the same, and deed said property, when acquired, to the State of New Hampshire for military purposes, only.

VOTED, that the Town authorize the Selectmen to purchase or acquire by eminent domain proceedings such tract or tracts of land, other than the race-track property but adjacent thereto, as may be necessary to complete the project of obtaining such suitable site for a State or National Guard Armory, in Littleton, as may be approved by the Adjutant General and the State of New Hampshire and to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1500.00) dollars, or such part thereof as may be necessary, to pay for the same, and deed such property, when acquired, to the State of New Hampshire for military purposes only.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 55 of the Revised Public Laws of New Hampshire as amended by Chapters 20 and 236 in 1947, being an Act authorizing Towns to establish the office of Town Manager, and to raise and appropriate monies for the expense of the same.

VOTED, that the Town adopt the Town Manager Plan as provided in Chapter 55 of Revised Laws.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appoint an Aviation Committee, authorized to act for the Town in all matters pertaining to the establishment, construction and operation of aircraft landing areas, to do so jointly with similarly appointed officials of other towns, and to confer with State and Federal officials

in all matters pertaining thereto, and to raise and appropriate for that purpose the sum of \$1,300.00 to be expended under the direction of the Aviation Committee for the establishment, construction and operation of aircraft landing areas, under the provisions of Sec. 13, Chap. 306, R. L. and Sec. 72, Chap. 51, R. L. of New Hampshire.

VOTED, that an Aviation Committee be appointed by the Selectmen consisting of five residents of Littleton, to investigate and act for the town in all matters pertaining to the establishment, construction and operation of aircraft landing areas, and to do so in conjunction with similarly appointed or designated officials of other towns in the area, and to confer with State and Federal officials in all matters pertaining thereto and to submit a report on aviation facilities to the Town Meeting in 1949.

Following is a list of names appointed to the Aviation Committee for Littleton, N. H. for the year 1948 by Moderator, Richard P. Whiting: James C. MacLeod, Chairman; James J. Viette; Harold A. Edson; Stephen L. Eaton; J. Beattie Richardson.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to vest in the Town Manager, if the Town Manager Plan is adopted, the duties and rights of Tax Collector.

VOTED, to transfer the powers and duties of the office of Tax Collector to the office of Town Manager.

ARTICLE 15. To see what action the Town will take with reference to the following proposals:

1. That the Town of Littleton purchase from Carroll Lewis, of said Littleton, the so-called Lewis Airport, located in said Littleton, consisting of a runway approximately 3,550 feet long and approximately 500 feet in width, said Runway used as a landing strip for aircraft

for the purchase price of \$30,000.00 of which the said Town of Littleton will pay \$7,500.00, and the State of New Hampshire will match with \$7,500.00, and also the Federal Government of the United States will pay \$15,000.00, making the total purchase price of \$30,000.00 for said Runway. And also the land and buildings consisting of an Administration Building, maintenance and hangar building, and a hangar for the additional cost of \$20,000.00 to the Town of Littleton, making the grand total \$50,000.00, of which the Town of Littleton will pay \$27,500.00.

2. That the Town of Littleton upon purchase of the land and buildings as proposed in paragraph one be authorized through its selectmen to lease said buildings and the land on which said buildings stand to Carroll G. Lewis for the term of ten (10) years at the rental of \$1,000.00 per year; said rental of \$1,000.00 per year to be applied to the credit of the Town in payment of the \$20,000.00 for the purchase of the land and buildings mentioned, and thereby also giving the said Town of Littleton the only indebtedness of \$10,000.00 to be paid to the said Carroll G. Lewis for the sale of the said land and buildings mentioned; the Town of Littleton thereby purchasing the Runway together with the said land and buildings at an outlay of only \$17,500.00 with the State and Federal Government contributing their proportional shares as provided in such cases according to the laws of each respectively.

VOTED, to pass over.

ARTICLE 16. To see what action the Town will take with reference to the following proposals:

1. That the Town of Littleton purchase the Runway consisting of land on the so-called Lewis Airport located in Littleton, said Runway being approximately 3,550

feet long and approximately 500 feet in width, and being used as a landing strip for aircraft.

2. That the Town of Littleton purchase the Runway as described in paragraph one from Carroll G. Lewis of Littleton, for the sum of thirty thousand (\$30,000.00) dollars of which the Town of Littleton shall pay only \$7,500.00 to be matched with an equal amount from the State of New Hampshire, and the further amount of \$15,000.00 from the Federal Government of the United States as provided for by state and federal laws.

VOTED, to pass over.

ARTICLE 17. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

VOTED, that the annual reports of the various Town Officers for 1947, as printed in the Annual Report, be approved, accepted and placed on file.

ARTICLE 18. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

VOTED, to pass over.

ARTICLE 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

VOTED, that in the event a Town Manager system is adopted at this Town Meeting, the Town raise and appropriate a sum not in excess of \$10,000.00 for salary and expenses of such Town Manager, the amount of said salary to be fixed by the Board of Selectmen with the advice of the Budget Committee.

VOTED, to place monies received from meters in 1947 in the general reserve fund for retirement of Bridge and Street expense.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Littleton covering the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

**Scope of Audit**

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Municipal Court, Overseer of the Poor, Road Agent, Library Treasurer and Park Commission. The accounts of the Water and Electric Light Department and the Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

**Financial Statements**

**Comparative Balance Sheets:—Dec. 31, 1947—  
December 31, 1948: (Exhibit A)**

Comparative Balance Sheets, as of December 31, 1947 and December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the financial condition of the town

changed from a Surplus of \$2,723.62 at the beginning of the year, to a Net Debt of \$41,334.97, a net change of \$44,058.59.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:  
(Exhibit B)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

**Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures, Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C and D)**

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue deficit of \$30,617.66, less a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$12,902.25, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$17,714.41.

**Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Table 1)**

A statement of long term indebtedness, showing annual maturities of principal and interest, is contained in Table 1.

**Summary of Receipts and Expenditures:  
(Exhibit E)**

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of December 31, 1948, is indicated in Exhibit F.



### **Audit Procedure**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the collector's records.

### **General Comments**

#### **Net Revenue Deficit :**

The net revenue deficit of \$30,617.66, as indicated in Exhibit D, was due chiefly to the fact that the amount of estimated revenue from the Water and Light Department as set up in the budget was \$50,000.00, while the town actually received only \$15,000.00 from this source.

#### **Collector's Tax Warrant :**

Tax collections made on account of the 1948 warrant were not posted in the warrant book, all such collections being entered on individual card records. While an individual card system of this sort serves as a subsidiary record it does not replace the warrant book.

It is therefore recommended that all collections of taxes and interest and also abatements allowed be henceforth properly entered in the warrant books. It is very important that the warrant book be kept as a permanent record.

**Payrolls:**

It was noted that while town employees were paid in cash during 1948, the payrolls did not contain signatures as evidence of such payments. This situation is being corrected in 1949 through the introduction of a system whereby all employees will be paid by check.

**Conclusion:**

The accounts of all town officers which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure, with exceptions as herein noted, conformed to the standard prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Littleton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

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**FINANCIAL REPORT  
Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1948**

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The purpose of this report is to provide general information of the operations of the Town and to disclose its financial condition at the close of the fiscal period covered.

The financial report is divided by the use of two funds, the General Fund, through which all current operations of the Town are financed, and the Bond Fund, through which is recorded and exhibited all long term loan activities and outstanding indebtedness.

The above Balance Sheet presents a comparison of the financial condition of the Town at the close of the fiscal years 1947 and 1948. Assets represent money on hand and other values from which money is expected to be realized. Liabilities represent money owed by the Town, unexpended balances of appropriations and reserves set aside for special purposes. The difference between total Assets and total Liabilities is reflected in the surplus account.

There is no justification for maintaining an unduly large surplus. However, due to the fact that the Town

has to operate from January 1 until Town Meeting in March with practically no revenue and no authority to borrow, there has to be some reserve to draw on.

There are two weaknesses in Municipal Financing in New Hampshire. 1—Town officers are expected to carry on the Town business and provide all the services demanded by the citizens from January 1 until Town Meeting with no appropriations or specific authorization by the voters. 2—Taxes, which make up approximately 80% of the revenue of the Town do not begin to come in until July and most of them are not received until November. This necessitates large temporary loans to finance the various operations and activities until that time. During 1948, a total of \$50,000.00 was borrowed for this purpose. This amount is a little larger than has been required the past few years for two reasons: 1. Town, County and School Appropriations were larger this year requiring more money; 2. Bills were paid more promptly this year where previously, some of them were allowed to accumulate until near the end of the year until taxes came in.

Each item in the above Balance Sheet is keyed by letter to supporting detailed statements which follow in alphabetical order.

This statement shows that the Town had a cash balance on hand at the close of the fiscal year of \$45,170.68. Of this amount, \$45,100.68 was on deposit in the checking account in the Littleton National Bank, \$50.00 as change in hands of Tax Collector and \$20.00 as change in hands of the Recreation Director. The following statement (B) shows that the amount of \$35,000.00 is owed the Town by the Water & Light Department. Had this money been received during the year 1948 as expected, the cash position of the Town at the close of the fiscal year would have been increased by that amount, or a total cash on hand of \$80,170.68.

## Statement B.

Due From Water & Light Department	\$35,000.00
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The 1948 tax rate was based upon an agreement between the Selectmen and the Water & Light Commissioners providing that the amount of \$50,000.00 would

be transferred from 1948 Water & Light revenue surplus to the Town General Fund. This same agreement provided that the Selectmen would borrow \$50,000.00 for the Water & Light Department for the purpose of financing certain improvements to be made at the Lafayette Avenue Sub-Station. This loan was not negotiated during 1948. The necessary improvements were made, but had to be financed from the Department's current revenue. Consequently, they were able to pay to the Town only \$15,000.00. This left a balance of \$35,000.00 due the Town, which the Department has agreed to pay. Transfers from Water & Light revenue surplus for the past five years have been as follows: 1947—\$50,000.00; 1946—\$55,000.00; 1945—\$55,000.00; 1944—\$50,000.00; 1943—\$50,000.00.

During 1948 the Town Clerk paid out \$343.00 in bounty fees as follows: 8 bears, \$160.00 and 366 hedgehogs or porcupines, \$183.00. This full amount has been reimbursed by the State Treasurer. A Poll Tax of \$2.00 is assessed on every inhabitant from 21 to 70 years of age, except those exempt by special provisions of law. Poll Taxes are assessed as of April 1 of each year and are payable to the Collector on demand without previous notice. The above statement displays Poll Tax transactions during the year. Abate-ments were allowed by the Selectmen for many old un-collectible accounts which had been carried on the books but were of no actual value.

The original assessment list for 1948 included 1830 names taxed at \$3,660.00, subsequently, 283 names were added for \$566.00 and \$158.00 abated, being veter-ans, persons over 70 years of age or having moved away, etc.

Property Taxes are assessed as of April 1 of each year at "full and true value" of the property at that time. Property Taxes are due and payable 14 days after being billed by the Collector and become delinquent after December 1. An interest penalty at the rate of 8% is charged by Law upon all taxes not paid on or before December 1 after their assessment. The above statement shows that abatements were allowed by the Selectmen on a few old accounts which appeared to them to be uncollectible. The amount of uncollected current Property Taxes appears a little greater this year than at the close of 1947. This is a general condition and reflects the change in economic conditions.

Of the \$4,483.63 Property Tax abatements allowed on 1948 taxes, \$3,417.51 was for over-assessment, \$117.26 veterans' exemptions not allowed in original assessment and \$948.86 for errors in assessment. A total of \$1,272.83 was added to the Property Tax list during 1948 being inadvertently omitted from the original assessment.

In June, 1947, 175 Model E. Universal Automatic Park-O-Meters were purchased from the Magee-Hale Park-O-Meter Company at a net cost of \$11,495.00. Approximately, 150 of these meters were installed on Main Street at that time. The total of \$6,269.26 was taken in as meter revenue during the remainder of 1947. Of this amount \$3,127.33 was paid on the meter contract and \$148.83 expended as operating costs, leaving a balance on December 31, 1947 of \$2,993.10. The 1948 Town Meeting voted to set aside this balance to be used in the construction of the new bridge, or the Main Street re-surfacing project. This was applied to the Main Street project which made it possible to complete the job without calling a special Town Meeting, even though the

actual cost of construction had increased somewhat over the original estimate.

Parking meter receipts for 1948 amounted to \$8,156.-35. Of this amount \$3,402.93 was paid on the contract; \$1,500.00 transferred to the Police Department Budget by instruction of the Selectmen, and \$2,115.78 used for policing meters, repairs and maintenance, traffic signs, street marking and general traffic control purposes, leaving a net balance at the close of the year of \$1,137.64.

This statement presents in detail the financial transactions made during the year which affect the current surplus. This is an important account. It corresponds somewhat to a Profit & Loss statement of a private business enterprise, surplus increases representing profit and decreases representing losses. Appropriations from Surplus of course are not losses but rather making use of accumulated profit. Increases to the account amounted to \$8,828.25 and decreases \$1,074.20, or a net increase of \$7,754.05.

### SURPLUS INCREASES

1. **Revenue Surplus.** The Revenue Statement on page 36 shows that actual revenue exceeded estimated revenue by \$4,277.83.

2. **Appropriation Balances.** The Appropriation State-

ment on page 37 shows a net unexpended balance of current appropriations of \$3,615.45.

**3. Abatement Reserve Surplus.** The 1948 Property Tax assessment included the amount of \$6,116.35 added by the Selectmen as an overlay for the purpose of making abatements. During the year, abatements were allowed by the Selectmen as follows: Poll Taxes \$402.00; Property Taxes \$4,709.38; Tax Sale Liens \$196.37. In addition to this \$47.80 was refunded as abatement after payment, \$8.01 was collected after abatement and credited to the reserve account and \$85.86 credited to tax accounts as abated in 1947 and charged to surplus. (See Statement 10 below.) A balance of \$768.81 remained in this account after all abatements were allowed.

**4. Revenue of Prior Years.** Poll Taxes omitted from previous years' warrants, but added and collected during the present fiscal year amounted to \$88.00 as follows: 1947—\$82.00; 1945—\$2.00; 1943—\$4.00.

**5. Adjustment of School Account.** This is an adjustment of a difference of \$78.16 in the amount due the schools existing over the past several years between the accounts of the School District Treasurer and the Town records. It was found that the School record was the correct one, consequently, the Town record was adjusted to the School figure.

### SURPLUS DECREASES

**6. Main Street Paving Project.** The amount of \$24,750.00 was appropriated at the 1948 Town Meeting as the Town's share of resurfacing Main Street. To this was added the 1947 Parking Meter Revenue balance of \$2,993.10 producing a total available for the Town's share of \$27,743.10. Because of the increase in construction costs between the time the estimate was made



and the time the job was started, also the extra work done on the sidewalks and the faulty drainage condition in the low area at the foot of School Street, the entire job cost the Town \$28,379.98 resulting in an overdraft of \$636.88.

7. **State Aid Construction.** One mile of road over Mt. Eustis was reconstructed under the State Aid construction program. This work was performed by the regular Town Highway Department. The Town's share for this job was \$1,029.09. The State contributed on a 4 to 1 basis, allowing the Town \$4,138.16 making a total available of \$5,167.25. The job was completed at a cost of \$5,350.01, leaving an overdraft of \$182.76.

8. **Adjustment—Bounties.** The last Town Report showed a balance due from the State of New Hampshire as a reimbursement for bounties paid by the Town of \$153.00. As a result of audit, this amount was found to be incorrect. Consequently, not being due the Town, it was cancelled. (See Statement C, Page 21.)

9. **Abatements of Prior Years.** Three Property Tax abatements allowed by the Selectmen during 1947 amounting to \$85.86 were found not to have been credited to the tax accounts during that year. Therefore, they are deducted from current surplus of 1948.

10. **Adjustment—Special Poll Tax.** Statement D. on page 22 shows Poll Taxes were overpaid to the State of New Hampshire in the amount of \$222.70. Upon checking with the State Treasurer's office, it was found that \$15.70 of this amount was for interest collected upon those taxes. Consequently, the amount of reimbursement due from the State is reduced by that amount which is charged to the Surplus account.

## REPORT OF LITTLETON AVIATION COMMITTEE

Submitted to the

Town Meeting of March 8, 1949

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At the Annual Town Meeting held on March 9, 1948, under an article in the warrant it was voted, "That an Aviation Committee be appointed by the Selectmen consisting of five residents of Littleton to investigate and act for the Town in all matters pertaining to the establishment, construction and operation of aircraft landing areas, and to do so in conjunction with similarly appointed or designated officials of other towns in the area and to confer with State and Federal officials in all matters pertaining thereto, and to submit a report on aviation facilities to the Town Meeting in 1949."

On August 30, the committee was appointed by the Moderator as follows: James C. MacLeod, Chairman; James Viette; Harold Edson; Stephen Eaton and Beattie Richardson.

On September 21, the committee held an organization meeting to survey the airport situation and adopt a definite plan of committee procedure in approaching the problem. The possibilities for the acquisition of Lewis Field were considered and it was decided to investigate the availability of State and Federal funds, and also, to approach officials of the neighboring towns in regard to their cooperation and financial support from their communities.

On December 3, the committee met with Mr. Russell Hilliard and Mr. Mills from the State Aeronautics Commission Office in Concord. At this meeting, a report from a sub-committee on the proposal of pur-

chasing the facilities at Lewis Field was considered. Mr. Hilliard advised the committee as to the extent of possible financial participation on the part of the State Aeronautics Commission and the Federal Civil Aeronautics Authority.

Appended to this report is a schedule showing the cost to the Town of acquisition and development of the airport facilities, also, the extent and proportion of participation which could be expected under present regulations from State and Federal funds.

On December 13, the committee met with Selectman Clarence W. Allard, Town Manager Frissell, Harry Bassett and James F. Bolles of the New England Aero Associates, and J. W. Guider and George Noyes from Bethlehem. At this meeting, the advisability of the purchase of Lewis Field was reviewed. Probable cost of development and methods of financing were explored.

A sub-committee reported on their investigation of revenue and operating costs of ten municipal airports throughout the State.

It was decided to contact Mr. Frank Carboine, District Civil Aeronautics Authority Airport Engineer of Augusta, Maine and to arrange for him to meet with the committee.

On January 11 a meeting was held with Mr. Carboine, Mr. Hilliard from Concord and members of their engineering staffs, and a large delegation of enthusiasts from the neighboring towns of Whitefield, Lancaster, Groveton, Bethlehem and Easton. At this meeting, Mr. Carboine disclosed the fact that Lewis Field definitely could not qualify under the Federal Aeronautic Regulations for scheduled air transport service. However, Mr. Carboine and Mr. Hilliard both urged the continuation of activities at Lewis Field for light aircraft for which some State and Fed-

eral aid would be available in the event that the Town decided to purchase and develop the facilities.

Because of the limitations of Lewis Field and the price quoted for its purchase, consideration was given to other locations both from the point of view of adequacy and cost of development. Prior to making application for State or Federal aid for such a project, the Town would have to decide what price it would be willing to pay for the present Lewis facilities, as well as the total amount the taxpayers would be willing to invest in the development of an air field.

The committee is aware of a demand for air travel and the desirability of providing convenient and safe landing facilities to serve this area. We recognize the possibilities of such service through the stimulation of recreational and business activity.

Due to present shifting conditions in Federal and State regulations and anticipated changes in aircraft structural design, there seems to be no certainty as to the ultimate requirements for adequate airport landing facilities during the next few years.

Whereas, we cannot urge any immediate action toward acquiring airport facilities by the Town, we do recommend that an Aviation Committee be continued to represent the Town in all matters pertaining to aviation, to participate in long range airport development plans for Littleton, to cooperate with any similar efforts which might be made by neighboring towns or the White Mountains Region Association, and that the members thereof be appointed by the Moderator.

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library, the Annual Report of the Librarian is herewith submitted:

1948 was a satisfactory year of progress for the library. As a distributing agency it was busy. The general public used library services fully; school use for reference work and by English classes was heavy.

In addition to the fair appropriation for the purchase of books we were fortunate in receiving an especially large number of gift books, 215 of which were added, including 5 books in memory of C. F. Meacham and 1 in memory of J. R. Lyster. Several subscriptions to special periodicals were given by townspeople. \$50.00 for books from the estate of Miss Julia Bell and \$35.00, another gift for the same purpose, came as unexpected donations. Even with the extra books afforded by this money readers still clamored for more new books. Prices remain high and a generous book budget remains the best insurance of satisfied patrons.

In accordance with the plan begun last year to improve the reference collection, a "World Book" encyclopedia was bought and has been found excellent for up to date information. It is hoped that the project may be continued by adding other needed reference material next year. With more questions coming in by telephone as well as over the desk it is most essential that the library own the books that will answer them.

The library building was insulated during the summer and a saving in coal is expected to result. Two trial fluorescent lights have been installed in the stackroom. If they prove satisfactory it is intended to replace the old lights in the stack with this type. A new sign case has been set up at the foot of the front walk, a great convenience to patrons not familiar with library hours.

Most obvious is the need for a paint job on walls and ceilings of the main floor of the library. Attempted cleaning has had no effect and the appearance of the rooms is now definitely dingy. It is hoped this work can be provided for in the 1949 budget.

I would like to express my thanks to the trustees and the public for their interest during the past year, and the hope that in 1949 the library will continue to be of service to the people of Littleton.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Littleton Village District for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, which was made by this Division. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of this report.

The Net Debt of the District decreased by \$12,256.42 during the year. The factors which caused the change in financial condition are indicated in Exhibit C.

A comparative statement of appropriations and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, is presented in Exhibit B. As indicated therein unexpended balances of appropriations of \$917.74, less overdrafts of \$564.62, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$353.12. It will be noted that certain receipts and expenditures of the Village District during the months of May, June and July, 1948, which went through the town treasurer's account, are indicated separately in this statement.

## Report of Board of Education

---

To the Citizens of Littleton:

We herewith submit the annual school report. The report includes budgets and estimated receipts for this year and next year; report of the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission for the fiscal year July 1, 1947 to June 30, 1948; and written reports of the superintendent of schools and the headmaster of the high school.

An increase in the budget is necessary for the next school year due to continued demands for increases in teacher salaries and an increase in costs of operation of the school plant. The school board recommends an appropriation of \$88,725.00 if the legislature agrees to continue the present plan of state-aid for education. Should the legislature fail to provide for state-aid for education, it will be necessary to increase the above appropriation by an amount equal to that lost to the district by such action.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report relative to your schools.

This past year has again brought several changes in faculty membership. We were fortunate in retaining the valuable services of seventeen experienced members of the staff. Eight new members were engaged to replace those who did not return.

Mr. Louis L. Ramsay, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with graduate work at Columbia Teachers College, University of New Hampshire, and Boston University, receiving Master of Education degree from the latter and with seventeen years' teaching experience, seven of them as headmaster of Enfield High School, was elected as headmaster of Littleton High School.

Mr. Elmer R. Knowles, a graduate of the University of Maine with three years' teaching and coaching experience in Jay High School, Jay, Maine was elected to teach mathematics and coach boys' basketball.

Mr. George W. Pasichuke, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire was elected to teach social studies and biology in the high school.

Miss Thelma L. Partridge, a graduate of Keene Teachers College with two years' experience in Towle High School of Newport, was elected to teach English and Latin in the high school.

Mrs. Esther C. Kapala, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College and the University of New Hampshire, with graduate training at McGill University, Ecole du Montcel and Boston University and with

eighteen years' teaching experience, was elected to teach English in the high school.

Miss Natalie Clough, a graduate of Keene Teachers College with five years' experience was elected fifth grade teacher at the Kilburn School.

Mrs. Kathleen C. Duranty, a graduate of Keene Teachers College with four years' experience was elected to teach the fourth and fifth grades at the Apthorp School.

Mrs. Deveda L. Cushing, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with advanced study at the American Institute of Normal Methods and with seventeen years' experience was elected music supervisor in the district.

The usual seasonal minor repairs to keep the buildings and equipment in good condition were made during the summer months. Major repairs included repair of the high school building roof, pointing up brickwork on the high school building, painting entire basement and toilets in Kilburn building, resurfacing lower portion of Kilburn School yard, installation of toilet facilities in the teachers' room in the Kilburn School and repair of the northwest corner of the foundation of the Apthorp building.

Blackout shades were purchased for the assembly room at the Apthorp building and for one room in the Kilburn building in order to improve the facilities for the use of visual aids.

The report of the school nurse shows that 596 pupils were examined and the following defects found and reported to parents: Defective vision 77, defective hearing 14, heart condition 4, orthopedic cases 13, posture 2, defective teeth 192, diseased tonsils 51. Corrections or improvements on the above were reported as follows: Vision 74, orthopedic 8, teeth 131 and tonsils 9.

The Tuberculin Patch Test was administered to 310

pupils with 21 positive reactors. All were X-rayed with no active cases being reported by Dr. Kerr.

The following clinics were held: Dental, vision, tuberculin, orthopedic, tonsil and adenoid. The Maico audiometer was used for a check on 127 cases previously examined in 1947.

The penny milk program is being continued as in the past. A hot lunch consisting of one hot dish is served at cost during the winter months to supplement the lunch brought from home in the lunch box.

In September a one-half day conference on the use of visual aids was held with several experts brought in to assist in the program. In November a workshop for teachers was held at which time the elementary teachers studied the new social studies program under the direction of Miss Gertrude M. Lewis, Supervisor of Elementary Education, State Department of Education. At the same time the secondary teachers worked on the problem of meeting the needs of our youth.

Elementary teachers are working diligently on the problem of revising the report card that is to be used in reporting pupil progress to parents.

A number of the teachers have enrolled in an extension course on the use of visual aids that is offered by the University of New Hampshire under the direction of Professor Austin L. Olney, and which meets in the high school building each week for fifteen weeks.

Prices on school supplies and equipment still remain high. Scarce items are beginning to be more plentiful, however, our schools are being provided with adequate materials.

The teacher situation has been relieved slightly in the social studies and language fields. Elementary teachers and practical arts teachers are still scarce. The number to be graduated from our teacher training institutions is much less than the number of vacancies

that will occur in the state this June. Teacher salaries are still rising in all the states and in all sections of this state. The ability to hold good teachers is still determined to some degree by the ability to pay for services rendered. The average salary, however, of all teachers in Littleton is exactly the same as the average for the entire state.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the citizens of Littleton, the school board, teaching staff and other district employees for their splendid cooperation during the past year.

## HEADMASTER'S REPORT

---

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following is my first report as headmaster of Littleton High School.

### REGISTRATION

The total number of pupils registered in the high school for the first semester is 286. This compares favorably with last year's enrollment and indicates a leveling off in our high school population which will probably exist until the war babies reach high school age.

Of the total indicated seven have left school since September, two of those seven having probably terminated their education, while the other five have moved away and entered other schools.

### CURRICULUM

The Courses of Study offered in our high school compare very favorably with those of any high school its size in the state. The Driver Education course has been an important addition to the curriculum and will have far reaching effects. This course is being offered to

about fifty boys and girls in the Junior and Senior classes.

If I were to make any recommendations for another year it would be for an expansion of our Physical Education facilities. It is regrettable that our gymnasium must be idle many hours of the weeks only because of the lack of a full time Physical Education director. As it is we are forced to make our Physical Education an incidental, where it should be a definite part of our instructional program.

### TEACHING PERSONNEL

Four new teachers were added to the Littleton staff this year. It is to your credit that the professional and instructional quality of our staff is unusually good. All teachers have shown a whole-hearted cooperation with their headmaster, while the older teachers have been very helpful as a source of friendly guidance in the many things a new headmaster must learn.

### EXTRA-CURRICULA:

The school is maintaining an ambitious program of extra-curricula activities this year. The hiring of a boys' coach for basketball has enabled Mr. Root to spend time with Junior Varsity basketball; because of this there have been three simultaneous schedules.

A club program has been set up this year with the teachers giving their time and efforts to make it a definite part of the educational program of the school. There are twelve different activity groups (excluding sports) in which students may participate outside their regular classes. This should present something of interest to every student in the school.

To further the club program Mrs. John Seidler is graciously contributing her time two afternoons a week to aid in a program for Freshmen and Sophomore dramatics.

The student body has elected a Student Council which, under the guidance of Mr. Pasichuke, is about ready to present its constitution to the high school group. I feel that such an organization can do much toward improving school morale and at the same time teach an important lesson in democratic living.

#### GRADUATES:

Our 1948 graduates have entered into many walks of life. Of these forty-three, five are attending our State University, one at Keene Teachers College, and one at Vermont Academy. Of the rest the majority are in positions demanding trust and responsibilities commensurate with their educational and economic interests.

#### INSTRUCTION:

An expanded visual-aid program has been encouraged and is proving very popular with the teachers.

Many local professional and business men have appeared before our high school classes to speak upon certain aspects of their profession or business.

Field trips to various business establishments are being planned by the teachers.

I have already mentioned the quality of instruction. I know the staff is anxious to serve the students of Littleton High School to their full capacity; it is the responsibility of the students to take the greatest possible advantage of the opportunities they have as members of the student body.

What should develop into a very important part of the instructional program has been introduced this year. The staff has held "Open House" at the school from 7:00 to 9:00 P. M. once each ranking period and has encouraged all parents to come and discuss any problems pertaining to their child. I hope that all parents will eventually seize upon this as an opportunity

to do their bit in improving the Parent-Teacher-Pupil relations in the school, and at the same time improve scholarship among the pupils.

### CONCLUSION:

Littleton has a good school. The Board of Education and you as its Superintendent are to be commended for not only making it a good school, but for continuously striving to make it a better school. We, of the staff, are happy in the fact that we are all working harmoniously toward the same end—the developing of a rich, full, educational experience for the students of Littleton High School.
