To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Loudon on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400 to exterminate the white pine blister rust.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day.
 - 5. To see if the town will accept state aid for highways.
- 6. To see if the town will build one permanent bridge each year.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise money to add to the library trust funds, for to purchase books and magazines as needed.

- 8. To see if the town will vote a discount of two per cent. on all taxes paid on or before June 15, 1922.
 - 9. To elect one selectman for three years.
- 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to paint the Maxfield Library.

Loudon would receive \$804.85 state aid instead of \$382.02 if the money appropriated by the last legislature had been enough to go around. Because of lack of funds, Loudon loses \$422.83 which is the cause of the deficit.

We recommend, then, that three hundred dollars be raised towards meeting the expenses of the schools for the remainder of the current year, that is, until June 30, 1922.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 8, 1922.

To the School Board and Citizens:

Under the old system of supervision the districts of the union apportioned the superintendent's time among them. Under the law of 1919 they can make no such apportionment as the whole purpose of the law is to equalize school privileges.

I have been interested however, to study how my time has been spent among the several districts. While the superintendent does other work besides visiting schools, that part of his work is easiest to record and may form a fairly satisfactory basis for estimating how his entire time has been apportioned. The following table is for the two and one-half years of the existence of the supervisory union:

To equalize the results of the superintendent's work we may say that roughly the average visits per teacher should be about the same for the various districts. By this standard the table would indicate that Loudon has suffered somewhat, Canterbury slightly, and that Boscawen and Penacook have received somewhat more than their share of the superintendent's attention.

If the time spent in a town while visiting schools should be considered, the comparative compactness of the several districts enters into the problem. By such standard, Penacook would seem to be the neglected district and Loudon would not be below the average. The table also roughly indicates the increasing time available for school room visiting now that the pioneer work in organization has been accomplished and the secretary is held responsible for a great amount of the office work.

The schools opened last September with only four of our eight teachers of the previous year. This is double the number of changes made in September, 1920. By closing the Clough Hill school, the number of new teachers to be found was reduced from four to three. Whenever teachers living in town are lost and must be replaced by teachers from a distance, it will usually be necessary to increase the salary paid, especially if trained teachers are employed.

During the year since the last report was written, several buildings have been improved. In the White school a partition has been placed across the alcove in front of the room with a blackboard upon it. The ceiling has been whitened and the woodwork painted. Similar improvements have been made in the Brown school and a second toilet has been built there. The ceilings have been whitened at the Moore and the Pearl schools and all the woodwork at the Moore painted one coat. Both ceilings at the Village school have been painted and some new curtains furnished at the primary room. The ventilation of the Moore and Pearl schoolhouses has not been improved.

As to the curriculum—we are continuing to teach and to drill on reading, writing, arithmetic and spelling. In history we have added the study of Ancient History and English History in a simple form for intermediate grades. In Physiology less anatomy is taught and more pains are being taken to instill habits which tend towards a healthful life. Physical examination is discovering defects, and has been success-

ful just so far as parents have been willing to co-operate with the doctor. We have children whose parents are not ready to send them to high school who are doing a little advanced work in Algebra, History and Science.

In Grammar and Arithmetic a variety of texts have been in use and should continue to be in use. A single textbook has been adopted however, which is chosen whenever new books need to be purchased. There is a great shortage of good maps in the district and we had planned to purchase several this year but a recent bequest for that purpose has induced us to wait until they can be purchased from that fund.

Our expenditures for high school tuitions is increasing. The parents and neighbors of the twenty-two young people listed elsewhere in this report, will doubtlessly consider this a good investment. Three of our last year's graduates are attending high school at Pittsfield and three at Concord.

The loss of a portfolio containing the account books of the district and several school registers will explain omissions in this report. The attendance table in its incomplete form contains some very commendable records, notably the per cent of attendance at the Village Primary school; but the cases of tardiness there and at the Moore school, indicate a lack of realization on the part of parents of the value to children of the habit of punctuality, and the harm done the school by such careless attendance.

It is a disappointment to all of us that the state funds were not sufficient to give Loudon the amount of state aid on which we had counted. It is for this reason that a deficit will be incurred for the current year.


