WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1934

To the inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, A. D., 1934, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.
- ART 3. To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
 - Art. 7. To choose all necessary town officers.
- ART. 8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds. (As suggested by State Tax Commission.)
- ART. 9. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold legally.

- ART. 10. To see if the Town will raise \$200.00 for the interior improvement of the Town Hall.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 12. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- Art. 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS IN MADBURY, N. H.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

I have the honor to submit my fifth annual report. We considered ourselves fortunate to retain at lower salaries the services of the same well-trained teachers. They are carrying on with the same zeal and accomplishing good results.

During the summer your School Board renovated the interiors of each school, they now present a clean comfortable appearance. I recommend that next summer the toilets receive attention, as these were overlooked in the renovations of last summer.

The superintendent has five rural schools within his jurisdiction and teachers are obliged to keep temperature records. Three of these schools are heated with coal and the two in your town with wood. The temperature charts show a much more even heat in those schools heated with coal. During the recent cold snaps the only children who suffered with cold were in the Madbury Schools. This was because it was impossible to bring a temperature of ten degrees below zero up to sixty-nine degrees before nine o'clock with a wood fire built in the morning. In those schools heated with coal, fires are run all night and no such low temperatures as ten degrees below zero are ever reported by the teachers. We find it no more expensive to use coal and I strongly recommend that at least one of the Madbury schools be supplied with coal next year.

The Madbury Center schoolroom door opens directly out of doors and very much cold comes in around the frame. This condition could be remedied by the expenditure of a few dollars to build a closed-in portico. A tight fitting double door would help.

The local cost of running your schools this year has been reduced because of State Aid. Next year your State Aid will be less because of a lowered budget this year. It is a mistake to lower your budget below the State average because by doing so you reduce your amount of State Aid. At least as much money will be needed next year to keep your schools at their present efficient level which only meets the minimum requirements.

Federal funds, received through the office of the State Department of Education, have enabled free milk to be supplied to those children, who were selected by the School Nurse, as being in need of milk. Twelve halfpints are being furnished to each school daily. Your attention is called to the report of the School Nurse.

WILLIAM S. LORD

William S. Lord, whose death occurred at his home in Madbury, April 29, 1933, was born in Great Falls, now Somersworth, April 7, 1857, the son of James K. and Phelena Smith Lord.

He received his education in the public schools in that town. As a young man he went to Sanford, Maine, where he learned the trade of harness making, which he followed through life. He was engaged in business in Sanford for a number of years and also conducted a business in Dover, N. H. Later he did business in Durham, N. H., retiring a few years ago to his home in Madbury.

Mr. Lord was a skilled workman and his services were sought near and far. He was kind-hearted, a good neighbor and was loved and respected by all who knew him. Mr. Lord was married to Miss Fannie M. Gowell of Sanford, Maine, to whom one son was born, Mr. Fred E. Lord, now a resident of Somersworth, N. H. Mrs. Lord died March 7, 1887 and later Mr. Lord married Miss Sarah J. Gillis of Dover, N. H., who survives him.

Funeral services were held at the Ricker Memorial Chapel in Dover, services being conducted by the Rev. Buell Maxfield, pastor of the Dover Baptist Church. Interment took place in the family lot in Evergreen cemetery at Berwick, Maine.

MRS. JOSIAH W. CHASE

Mrs. Josiah W. Chase passed away after a brief illness at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John S. Elliot, early Wednesday morning, January third, at the age of seventy-seven years.

During the years of 1932 and 1933 there came to live in our midst, Mrs. Chase, this lady of unusual qualities of mind and heart. As the mother of Mrs. Elliott she was happy and content in spending what proved to be the last days of her life in her daughter's home in Madbury. She grew to love, and feel a part of the quiet scenes about her, and to enjoy the country-side as if it were her own.

Mrs. Chase was a woman of high ideals, an ardent reader and a lover of nature. She learned more to the side of life that was ethical and religious, finding there the more optomistic turn than in the sterner qualities, and took her chief pleasure in the joy of others. To the few who were with her during this time, she was the embodiment of the ideal mother and friend—mellowed and sweetened with the years.

"Life's a clearing in the wood Where pauses mid-flight the soul—a thrush Bathes in the beam and finds it good Peoples with song the solitude Then soaring dares the dark—the hush."

MAJOR JOHN DEMERRITT

Our town has suffered a great loss in the death of Major John DeMerritt. From early life he was interested and took part in all town affairs, and although his interests and ambition sometimes took him far afield to other states and climes, his love for his native town never grew dim or obscured.

He was born in Madbury, August 8, 1856, the son of Ezra Edrie and Louisa M. (DeMerritt) DeMerritt. Thus on both the paternal and maternal lines he was a direct descendant of Elie deMerit, the emigrant, who took his first grant of land in Madbury, then old Dover, on April 11, 1694.

On the paternal side, coming down from the first son of the emigrant, Eli DeMerritt, who was born March 1, 1696, and on the maternal side from the second son, John DeMerritt, who was born June 19, 1698. From this latter line he had the distinction of being the sixth John DeMerritt in direct descent, and the third in direct descent to bear the military title of Major John. The first major was appointed by the Fourth Provincial Congress convened at Exeter, N. H., who voted November 9, 1775, that "Captain John DeMerritt be First Major in the Second Regiment". This was in honor of his services in assisting in taking the ammunition from William and Mary in December, 1774, secreting it at his home in Madbury from whence it was taken to Charlestown and used in the battle of Bunker Hill. (N. H. Provincial Papers Vol. 7, page 655.)

The second Major John, son of the above "Powder Major" as he was familiarly called, received his commission as First Major of the twenty-fifth Regiment from Gov. John Langdon in 1808 (N. H. State Papers).

After leaving the public schools he was sent to Coe's Academy in Northwood, N. H.; thence to Philip's Acad-

emy, Andover, Mass., 1875-77, and to Colby Academy, New London, N. H., 1878.

In 1870 he entered the service of the Boston and Maine Railroad as station agent at Madbury. During this time he built up the station from a common target station to a new building equipped with freight department, ticket-office and express, and a business center of some importance as the years went on. Besides holding minor town offices he was elected to the State Legislature in 1887 as Representative, and proved a valuable member, not only for the town, but for the Boston and Maine interests in the memorable Railroad contest which took place during that session. His activities gained statewide attention and many friends throughout the state.

In the following sessions of 1889-1896 he was retained in the Legislative interests of the Boston and Maine. He was Sergeant-at-Arms of the State Senate in 1897 and 1901. In 1892 Major DeMerritt had gained the position of City Passenger and Ticket Agent at Boston, Mass., which he held until 1897, when he resigned.

In May 1898 Major DeMerritt was appointed and commissioned Paymaster of U. S. Volunteers, Spanish American War by President McKinley, with the rank of Major. He was assigned to the Department of the Pacific, and was on duty at Camp Merritt, San Francisco, during the organization of that Department, and from August, 1898 to February, 1899 at Manila, Philippine Islands. On account of illness he returned to the States in May, 1899.

Again we find Major DeMerritt in the home duties of his native town, when health had been partially regained, interested and taking part in all town observances, and local military affairs, and at the time of his death, just completing his fifteenth year as School Treasurer and twentieth year as Town Clerk. It is worthy of notice that this last office gained for him a place in the line of

his forbears as the Town Clerkship, with the exception of two short terms, was held consecutively in the DeMerritt family from 1755, in which year Madbury was set off from Dover as a Parish, until 1867 when Major DeMerritt's father, Ezra Edric DeMerritt, completed his twentieth year.

EULOGY OF MAJOR JOHN DEMERRITT

As pastor to Major John DeMerritt, and minister of this church which he attended as his physical health would permit; and as minister to this community in which he lived; I want to express so far as words of mine may do so, the deep love, which you, who are assembled here, felt for our brother. Of all men in this community, he has been the most greatly loved; he was indeed, our chief citizen.

I think I know the reason why he has through the years, held so deep a place in the affections of this community. We love him for more than the fact of the splendid community service which he has rendered to the town. The cause for our affection is rather in the way in which he has rendered service: in the quality of the man himself.

The outstanding characteristic of Major DeMerritt was his Christ-like gentleness. It was John Ruskin, the English author and philosopher, who said that "Cruelty is the chief sin". Cruelty, or any harshness of manner, never entered into the heart of our Major friend. Always gentle, always wonderfully courteous and thoughtful, he walked among us as one of earth's noblemen, demonstrating in his own life, the character of the man who lives the religion we profess. He becomes for us, a shin-

ing example of community loyalty, of personal integrity, and of true gentleness and nobility of character.

Today we are all bereaved. We all will miss his friendly handclasp, and his kindly smile. Yet we must not say that we are utterly bereft. Christian faith forbids it. We still have cherished memories that will become increasingly precious. We have the Christian assurance that we shall see him again, and in the conviction of Christian faith, we know that earth's loss is Heaven's gain. We are satisfied that the parting from us involves the Father's welcome: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord".
