SELECTMEN'S FOREWORD

Looking back we see 2002 was a year of many changes. We welcomed Mrs. Sandra LaPlante as our new Administrative Assistant. Sandy brings to the job a solid background in accounting as well as municipal government. She is an EMT on our Ambulance squad and gives much of her time to helping the Town of Marlborough. We are fortunate to have her services. Ms. Linda Duffy also joined us this year as Office Assistant and Welfare Officer. Linda has extensive business experience and is doing an excellent job maintaining the property records.

The police department has undergone major changes in personnel. Chris Simmons, joined the department in the spring of 2002. Chris is proving to be a great addition to the department. Sgt. Garrett Chamberlain resigned this year to become the Chief of Police in the Town of New Ipswich. Garrett will be greatly missed and New Ipswich has gained a competent officer.

By April of 2003, three very dedicated officers of the Fire Department, Wayne Crowell, Fire Chief; Carl Russell, Forest Fire Warden; and Ed Wilson, Deputy Fire Chief, have given over 125 years of service to the Town of Marlborough. Please join with the Board of Selectmen in commending these three gentlemen for their service, dedication, and hard work. This is truly a major achievement.

The Sawyer Road bridge was completed this summer to alleviate repeated flooding of adjacent properties.

More new homes were built in the Town of Marlborough this year than in the past five years. We issued the greatest number

of building permits in one year since 1985. We welcome these new residents to the Town.

The Town website was installed this year thanks to the efforts of Bill Heyman. The website is www.MarlboroughNH.org. It is a great place to find out about your town. There are all kinds of information such as census data, maps, town reports, and meeting minutes, as well as links to other sources of information about Marlborough. The website is evolving so any suggestions on how we can make it better are always appreciated. It is a place where you can give us your feedback. E-mail us anytime.

In 2003 the Board of Selectmen will continue to evaluate the tasks performed in the town offices. A new process for issuing building permits is being implemented. We will be upgrading the water/sewer meter reading equipment. We will be automating the billing process to save time in the Town Clerk/Tax Collector office. We are going to revise assessments of current properties. At the urging of the Department of Revenue Administration, we hope to undertake a statistical analysis of our property base to bring the value closer to the real estate market and to avoid the need in 2005 for a complete revaluation. All in all 2003 looks like a very challenging year.

*****ATTENTION DOG OWNERS*****

All dogs six months or older must be licensed by May 1, 2003. Licenses are available from the Town Clerk's office at the Town Offices.

An animal population control fee is now part of the license fee. This money will be sent to the State and given to low income persons to have their dogs and cats sterilized. The fees are as follows:

\$6.50 for neutered or spayed animal
\$9.00 for female or male animal

Note: Persons over 65 years of age may license one dog for \$2.00.

Late Fees: \$1.00 per month shall be charged if fees are not paid by June 1, 2003.

Any owner keeping a dog contrary to the provisions of NH Statutes RSA: 466 shall forfeit \$25.00 to the Town in which the dog is kept in addition to the above \$1.00 per month charge.

Note: Marlborough's leash law has been in effect since 1975.

2003 WARRANT AND BUDGET**

2003 TOWN WARRANT
Town of Marlborough
State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Marlborough, in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified that the Annual Town Meeting and elections will be held at the Marlborough School Gymnasium in said Marlborough on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March 2003. The polling area for questions to be decided by official ballot will be in the gymnasium. The Polls will open from 1:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. to act on the following subjects to be considered upon the official ballot:

Article 1: To choose by ballot all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Further, the voters are notified that the Town business meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. to act upon the following:

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Three Hundred five Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-seven Dollars (\$1,305,669.00) which represents the recommended operating budget for the year 2003. The sum does not include the warrant articles addressed.

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) for the purpose of funding the Community Kitchen. Recommended by Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars (\$2,538.00) for the purpose of funding the Monadnock Family Services. Recommended by Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) to be added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund previously established

and to designate the selectmen as agents to expend. Recommended by Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established and to designate the Selectmen as agents to expend. Recommended by Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for a partial revaluation, Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to be raised by taxes and authorize the withdrawal of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund previously established for purpose. Recommended by Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a lease/purchase agreement for the purpose of leasing a new One-Ton Dump Truck for the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000.00) for the first year's payment for that purpose. Recommended by Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to change to Budget Advisory Committee structure from eleven (11) members to three (3) members. Recommended by Selectmen.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to increase the Veteran's Tax Credit for every resident of this Town who served not less than 90 days in the armed forces of the United States in any qualifying war or armed conflict listed in this section and was honorably discharged or an officer honorably separated from service; or the spouse or surviving spouse of such resident from \$50.00 to \$100.00 per RSA72:28 V & VI. (Ballot vote required) Recommended by Selectmen.

Article 11: Whereas, the Bill of Rights of the United States Constitution and the Constitution of New Hampshire guarantee those living in the United States the following rights: Freedom of speech, assembly and privacy; the rights to counsel and due process in judicial proceedings; and protection from unreasonable searches and seizures; and Whereas, we believe these civil liberties are precious and are now threatened by (A.) The USA Patriot Act, which all but eliminates judicial supervision of telephone and Internet surveillance; greatly expands the government's ability to conduct secret searches; gives the Attorney General and the Secretary of State the power to designate domestic groups as "terrorist organizations"; and grants the FBI broad access to medical, mental health, financial, library, educational and other records of and about individuals without having to show evidence of a crime and without a court order; and (B) Federal Executive Orders, which establish secret military tribunals for terrorism suspects; permit wiretapping of conversations between federal prisoners and their lawyers; lift Justice Department regulations against illegal COINTELPRO-type operations by the FBI (covert activities that in the past targeted domestic groups and individuals); and limit the disclosure of public documents and records under the Freedom of Information Act: and Whereas,

this law and these Executive Orders particularly target foreign nationals and people of Middle Eastern and South Asian descent, but could effect any one of us in the U.S.A. acting and speaking legally in opposing government policy; and Whereas, the Executive Order on secret military tribunals also undermines the U.S. government's ability to denounce atrocities carried out in secret by military tribunals elsewhere in the world; and Whereas, several law enforcement officials, including previous heads of the FBI, have decried the USA PATRIOT Act and these Executive Orders as unnecessary to the prosecution of, and protection from, terrorism; Now, Therefore be it resolved, that we the citizens of Marlborough, New Hampshire, acting in the spirit of the U.S. Constitution, the N. H. Constitution, and our community, do hereby call upon our local, State and Federal officials: (1) To continue to preserve residents' freedom of speech, religion, assembly, and privacy; rights to counsel and due process in judicial proceedings; and protection from unreasonable searches and seizures, and to participate, to the extent legally permissible, in law-enforcement activities that threaten civil rights and civil liberties of the people of Marlborough, such as surveillance, wiretaps, and securing of private information, which the Act and Orders authorize; even if requested or authorized to infringe upon these rights by federal law enforcement acting under new powers granted by the USA PATRIOT Act or orders of the Executive Branch; (2) When acting within the Town of Marlborough, to work in accordance with the U.S. and N.H. Constitution and the policies of the Marlborough Police Department, and in cooperation with the Department, not engage in or permit detentions without charges or racial profiling in law enforcement; (3) To report to the Marlborough Board of Selectmen regularly and publicly the extent to and manner in which they have acted under the USA PATRIOT Act, new Executive Orders, or COINTELPRO-type regulations, including disclosing the names of any detainees held in New Hampshire or any Marlborough residents detained

elsewhere; (4) Including our United States Congressman and Senators, to monitor the implementation of the Act and Orders cited herein and actively work for the repeal of the parts of that Act and those Orders that violate fundamental rights and liberties as stated in the Constitutions of the State of New Hampshire and the United States of America. (Majority vote required) (Petition Warrant Article).

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to send the following resolution to the New Hampshire General Court: Resolved, in its first two years of operation the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) has helped communities throughout New Hampshire preserve their natural, cultural and historic resources and, therefore, the State of New Hampshire should maintain funding for LCHIP in its next biennial budget.

Article 13: Whereas, New Hampshire residents pay the 12th highest cost of insurance in the country; and Whereas, the cost of health insurance premiums for families has increased by 45% over the past three years; and Whereas, 100,000 New Hampshire residents have no health coverage and 77% of them have a full-time worker at home; and Whereas, due to these rising costs almost half of New Hampshire's small business cannot afford health insurance coverage for their employees, therefore be it resolved That we, the citizens of Marlborough, New Hampshire, call on our elected officials from all levels of government, and those seeking office, to work with consumers, businesses, and health care providers to ensure that: Everyone, including the self-employed, unemployed, uninsured and underinsured, and small business owners has access to an affordable basic health plan similar to what federal employees received; Everyone, including employers, consumers, and the state, local and federal government makes a responsible and fair contribution to finance the health care system; Everyone receives high quality care that is cost efficient and medically

effective; and That these efforts help control the skyrocketing cost of health care. (Majority vote required) (Petitioned article).

Article 14: To give the Town of Marlborough an opportunity to vote for or against a U.S. war with Iraq, giving citizens a clear voice in the decisions of the U.S. Government. (Petitioned Article).

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a portion of land at the end of Highland Avenue for a turn-around. Recommended by Selectmen.

Article 16: To hear reports of Town Agents, Auditors, and Committees.

Article 17: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting, or take any action thereon.

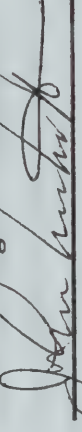

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

The enclosed "Report Of The Trust Funds Of The Town Of Marlborough" provides a detailed view of their status as of December 31, 2002. They total \$1,460,571 on a market value basis and provide supplemental income to many of the Town's departments and organizations.

The year 2002 marked the third year in a row that the market declined. The economic recovery was disappointing and scandals over corporate accounting and leadership seemed to come to a head. Technology and telecommunications companies continued to experience problems. Late in the year the market seemed to stop declining but questions remain as to when it will improve.

On a net basis the Trust Funds' portfolio increased about 1% in 2002. This was due to its conservative asset allocation among equities and fixed income investments.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

About the Marlborough Police Department

The Marlborough Police Department is a full-time professional police agency with a mixture of patrol, investigation and call time. We have three full-time officers, one part-time officer, one secretary and a school crossing guard. We make every effort to maximize our resources to patrol all areas of town, investigate all reported crimes, engage in community policing projects, initiate crime prevention strategies, and provide for off duty call time coverage. Please report all emergencies by dialing 9-1-1 and providing your name, location and the nature of your emergency. For business matters, you can reach us at 876-3311. Homeland Security

As reported last year, every effort is being made to work with the fire department, the ambulance squad, and emergency management to ensure that Marlborough is prepared to deal with any situation that may arise from any terrorist attack. The police department routinely receives intelligence reports from various state and federal agencies apprising us of information gathered regarding possible attacks. While nothing has been received regarding Marlborough specifically, we ask that you remain vigilant and report anything you see that appears suspicious or "strikes you as odd."

Activity

A considerable amount of time was spent this past year on criminal investigations, including seven burglaries, abuse of two dogs, several bad check cases, numerous gas drive offs from local business, runaway juveniles, child abuse and neglect, domestic assaults, violation of protective orders, criminal mischief's, telephone harassment and dog complaints. Many of these case investigations are labor intensive and consume a lot of time. Additional time was consumed responding to routine calls for service such as motor vehicle complaints, noise complaints, abandoned 911 calls, drunk and disorderly subjects, civil complaints, OHRV complaints motorist assist, among others. In addition, several traffic crashes were responded to and investigated. Despite being shorthanded for almost half of the year and given the volume of cases, we believe we have a good handle on most of them.

However, some did not get the attention they should have. We are working diligently in an attempt to get all the cases concluded successfully.

Regional Prosecutor

At last years Town Meeting, article seven was approved authorizing us to join the Swanzy Regional Prosecutor program. This, probably more than any other project undertaken since I've been police chief, has been the most beneficial to the operations of the police department. We now have a fully trained, highly competent professional attorney prosecuting all cases except minor traffic violations. This has led to much better handling of our court cases, resulting in better dispositions in court. Additionally, the training offered by the regional prosecutor, both on individually specific cases, and overall general training, has led to higher trained and better-qualified police officers. On several cases, the regional prosecutor wais consulted for advice on how to proceed, resulting in better investigations and increasing the efficiency of the department. I thank you for your support on this issue.

Personnel

This past year saw two personnel changes within the department. First, Officer Christopher Simonds successfully completed our field-training program, and then completed the twelve-week NH Police Academy basic training in Concord. Officer Simonds has now completed one year of service to the Town, and is progressing quite well. Officer Simonds will be attending several in-service training classes, both at the academy and elsewhere, as his career progresses. I believe Officer Simonds has proven to be a great addition to the police department and the Town. Secondly, Sergeant Garrett Chamberlain left the force in November to assume the police chief responsibilities in New Ipswich. While his leaving has left a huge void in the department, New Ipswich, in my opinion, will benefit from this highly competent and quality professional. We wish Chief Chamberlain well. We are currently working to replace Sgt. Chamberlain. Training of officers is ongoing, but can be a double edge sword. I've always been committed to putting the most highly trained and competent police officer on the street as I possibly can. Training is the cornerstone of that process. On the other hand, in this very competitive environment, our people

our people become highly regarded talent and are aggressively recruited. The Selectmen and myself continue to struggle in our attempts to keep people here. We have made adjustments to the budget to accomplish this in a manner that keeps us competitive, fulfills our mission, and within the limits of resources available to the Town.

Final Note

I would like to thank the citizens of this community for your support. This is very critical. Many of our cases are solved when citizens approach us and provide us the information necessary to resolve them. Moreover, many resources are required to complete our jobs and the citizens of this community have provided that and then some. Thank you very much. I also wish to thank the Board of Selectmen, Mrs. Sandra LaPlante, Ms. Linda Duffy, Mrs. Ellen Orkins, Mrs. Heidi Laffond, Mr. Harry Patnode, Chief J. D. Morse and Mrs. Susan Leach. Their assistance is very much appreciated. I also wish to thank the staff of the Marlborough Police Department. It's an honor to serve with such dedicated personnel. Without them, this job doesn't get done, period! Finally, I want to express my gratitude and heartfelt thanks to three individuals who have announced their retirement from public service. Fire Chief Wayne Crowell, Deputy Chief Ed Wilson, and Forest Fire Warden Carl Russell. While many people have assisted me in my duties here, these three have always responded and been there when asked, without question. I for one will miss the wisdom and experience they bring to each and every event we find ourselves working together on. It's because of them that the citizens of Marlborough enjoy great public service from its safety agencies. Gentlemen, good luck to you, I wish you well.

To the kids of Marlborough, you are great. To the boy's middle school soccer team, well done!

REPORT OF THE FIRE WARDS

The Fire Department responded to 81 calls during 2002 the same number of calls as in 2001. A breakdown of the 2002 calls is:

Of the four structure fires three resulted in minor damage and the fourth in moderate damage.

For 2002, spending was approximately \$400 under budget. However, \$3,755 shown as an expense was offset by a like amount received from the Federal Government and shown as revenue elsewhere. Training, radio maintenance and building maintenance were significantly over budget. Several members took training during the year including one who became state Firefighter 1 certified and two who started the process and should be certified in 2003. While training is expensive it will make the Fire Department more effective. When we updated our pagers, it was felt radio maintenance would go down and the budget was reduced for this line item. Instead we have seen a number of the pagers and chargers require attention. Several have been sent back to Motorola for repair. A few of

them were still covered by warranty. The building generator required repair on two occasions causing building maintenance to be over budget.

For the last few years the Fire Department has been pushing the use of Knox Boxes. These boxes are used to store a key or keys, for gaining access to public building and businesses, on the outside of the building. This allows the Fire Department, who has a master key to the boxes, to gain entry any time of day when the building is locked without having to break in or wait a long time for a key holder to show up. There are currently 8 boxes in use. Anyone interested in learning more about them contact the Fire Chief.

We extend our sincere appreciation to the Fire Company, Ladies Auxiliary, Police and Highway Departments, Selectmen and Community for their support and cooperation.

REPORT OF THE FROST FREE LIBRARY

Library users have a new free resource to use in their home or at the library on the computer. NHEWLINK provides access to over 12 Ebsco databases through the internet. One database, MasterFILE Premier contains full text for more than 1,900 periodicals covering all topics. To check out this resource click on its icon on the library portion of the town's new webpage (www.marboroughnh.org) or type the following address (<http://search.epnet.com/cpidlogin.asp?custid=nhstate>) and enter your 14 digit barcode on the back of your grey plastic library card when prompted.

Licensing for NHEWLINK was purchased by the New Hampshire State Library last year. As a participating member of the New Hampshire Automated Information System the Frost Free Library is able to offer you access to online databases in addition to all the materials available in the state through inter-library loan. Your hometown library card offers you information within and beyond its granite walls.

This January the library's computer network was upgraded to meet our changing software needs. The Friends of the Library purchased a large flat-screen monitor for the circulation computer and two printers for the public access computers. In December the New Hampshire State Library installed and activated a new system for running inter-library loan and cataloging resources. Staff members had their initial training in November and continue to learn the system's capabilities. Marlborough's new webpage was activated in November. Library events are recorded there and we hope to link our own

library webpage to the town's site in the next year or two.

While technology was a major component of the library's services last year, many programs and people provided a broad range of activities at the library. If you have any suggestions or ideas for other programs please let us know at rufus@frostfreelib.mv.com or 876-4479.

Last winter a writing group was revitalized with a local leader, and the group continues to meet at a member's home. Our reading group, which started in 2001, continues to meet every 4th Wednesday of the month at 7pm. Another writing group met in the fall for six weeks and has planned another session for the winter. Yoga classes for children and adults were offered on Wednesday afternoons by a local yoga teacher working toward certification. The concert committee created a terrific six week series of concerts on the lawn--although some had to be held in the school gym due to rain.

Storytime sessions for preschoolers were featured in the fall, winter, spring and summer. Our annual K-4th grade class visits happened in the spring and early summer and featured 'virtual library tours' and a preview of the summer reading program. That program was "Lions and Tigers and Books, Oh My!" Along with the usual prizes and decorations there were special 'Wild Wednesday' programs supported by the Friends of the Library. Squam Lakes Natural Science Center brought a coyote, porcupine and an owl to meet and learn about. Alice Funk spoke of working in the Cincinnati Zoo, Irene Ruth explained what a wildlife rehabilitator does, Sy Montgomery told about the man-eating tigers of Sundarbans, and Mr. Phil

performed 'Wild Tails of Magic' at the closing party. Our float in the "Old Home Days" parade in July, decorated around our lions and tigers theme, even won a prize.

We welcomed a new trustee to the library board in July. Father Jim Walsh joined the trustees when Father Thom Duston was transferred to Londonderry. We wish to thank Father Thom for his part in the 'Barnes & Nobleization' of the library. In our effort to make the library a more inviting place to browse and read, Thom suggested new display ideas and was instrumental in setting up our reading nook with mission furniture.

In October the Friends of the Library held their annual book sale. It was a success despite being held inside due to rain. This year Mrs. Morse's students at the Marlborough School were a great help to the project.

This year even more volunteer hours (1,564) were donated to the library. If volunteers were paid minimum wage that represents a gift of over \$8,000. Thanks to our volunteers for giving their maximum effort to the library.

We, the staff, appreciate all your help and your comments and continue to enjoy providing you great books, videos and tapes, accurate information, a welcoming gathering place, and connections beyond our walls.

Finally, we now have a worldwide "audience" thanks to our new web page: <http://www.marlbroughnh.org/recycle.htm>. "Chez Dump", our make-believe restaurant continues to operate and is still the source of many smiles. The Swap/Gift shop is always busy with folks eager for a bargain (everything is free).

As far as the day to day operation is concerned, we have had another accident-free year. We produce a number of marketable products, such as baled cardboard and chipboard, baled aluminum cans, baled plastic items, non-baled 5 cent

returnables, and loose-packed newspaper, plus junk mail/newspaper inserts, all of which help offset the cost of our operations. Our membership with the Northeast Resource Recycling Association is a great asset; this outfit locates the best markets for our commodities.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING AND ZONING BOARDS

Last year was quite busy for both Boards since the number of public hearings was higher than usual.

Among those actions taken by the Planning Board in 2002 were proposals for amendments to ordinances affecting the definition and location of manufactured housing.

The Zoning and Planning Boards conducted joint hearings for special exceptions and site plan reviews of a dental laboratory and marketing office at 678 Main St.; a 90-ft wireless communication tower on Old Chesham Rd.; and a firewood cutting business at 369 Jaffrey Rd.

A joint hearing was also conducted for a variance and site plan review of an addition to a commercial building at 8 Roxbury Rd.

In separate hearings, the Zoning Board of Adjustment denied use of a former residence (house trailer) as a caretaker residence on Old Chesham Rd. and approved an equitable waiver for a house at 27 Porter Lane.

The Planning Board conducted site plan reviews for self-storage buildings at 302 Main St.; a pet supply store at 135 Main St.; and a florist shop at 157 Main St.

The Planning Board also approved a subdivision for property off the south side of Old Chesham Rd.

The Capital Improvement Plan was updated in June.

This past year, we welcomed Dana Carley as our new Clerk for the Land Use Boards. Dana has done a wonderful job so far and we hope she will continue as the Board clerk for a long, long time. Marlene Miller, who served as clerk earlier in the year, also did an excellent job. We were all sorry to see her leave. The Board extends best wishes for her retirement and good luck on all her fishing expeditions!

The Conservation Commission in the past year continued its monitoring of the conservancy areas of the "Marlborough Farm" on Roxbury Rd. and acres on Meeting House Pond. Committee member Ernie Linders completed annual tests of Stone Pond and other Marlborough waters.

The Committee also held hearings and collected information concerning future possible uses of the town's newly acquired rail bed.

The resignations of Ben Rice and Katrina Maloney leave the commission short members and would welcome anyone interested in serving on the commission.

Current members are: Mike Krinsky, past chairman, Bill Heyman, Vic DeForest, Ernie Linders and Ira Gavrin, current chairman.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMITTEE

This past year the Recreation Committee has continued to make progress on many of the projects we have been working on, including the Skatepark, Pavilion, and Ball Fields.

At the Skatepark all the ramps were completed and painted. All that is left to do is some landscaping and installing a fence or barrier to keep cars from driving onto it. We have also added an area, similar to a motor-cross course, for kids to ride their bicycles with piles of dirt, which they are free to move around to constantly change the track.

At the Pavilion we had to replace/upgrade the lighting system. After years of having the lights smashed out, the light sockets were damaged to a point of being a hazard.

We continued to improve safety concerns at the Ball Fields by adding more fencing around the area of play helping to keep spectators and players protected from foul balls.

We were unable to find a director for Summer Theater last year and are looking for help from the committee in finding someone to run the program and/or direct the 2 plays this summer. If you or someone you know would be interested please notify someone from the Recreation Committee.

REPORT OF MARL-HARRIS AMBULANCE SQUAD

The year 2002 brought 178 tones for Marl-Harris, which included 5 cardiac arrests and 23 motor vehicle accidents. We continue to be covered by Diluzio Ambulance Service if we are already out on a call or if we need a Paramedic Intercept. Paramedics are predetermined by the Dispatch Center or Hospital, as well as by our members if we request this service.

We are currently a squad made up of 1 First Responder, 13 EMT's and 6 EMT-I's. In addition, we also have 5 non-medical members.

Currently 5 of our members are attending school; Brendan Manning for Physician's Assistant, Gregory Manning for Paramedic, Mitchell Cady for Safety, Brian Ryll for Fire Fighting and Matthew Lincoln for Pre Med. We are proud of them all and look forward to their visits home.

This past year also included the passing of one of our own members, Corinne Trudell. Corinne will not be forgotten by any of us and we thank her family for sharing her with us. Her years of hard work and dedication are something we all aspire to.

Our service is comprised of volunteer members from the Town of Marlborough as well as Harrisville who continue to strive to be trained and prepared to help our fellow townspeople. Our goal continues to be that anyone in need of service from or in Marlborough or Harrisville will be able to call on our service and not worry about the cost when they are ill or injured.

REPORT OF THE WELFARE ADMINISTRATOR

June 2002 brought a new outlook to my professional experiences by accepting the position of the new Welfare Administrator. Everyday is a new learning experience and most rewarding.

The primary need was for rental assistance, utilities, food and fuel assistance. Rents are still at an all time high. Unemployment is a major factor affecting clients seeking assistance along with the approval for disability. Fuel assistance was at a low in 2002, but could change due to recent factors announced by Southwestern Community Services due to their federal funding for 2003.

We continue to refer clients to outside programs such as The Salvation Army, Federated Church, The Community Kitchen, St. Vincent DePaul, and Southwestern Community Services.

The NH Local Welfare Administrators Association piloted a new software package developed for the daily maintenance of municipality Welfare Administration known as NH Maps, which has been acquired by the Town. This will be implemented in 2003.

REPORT OF THE HERITAGE COMMISSION

The Heritage Commission is dedicated to preserving and protecting those features of our community which are significant resources relative to our historic, cultural and aesthetic qualities, and to promoting the recognition and use of these resources for the benefit of present and future generations.

The Heritage Commission had a productive year, with the completion of several projects and the discussion of new ideas for the future. As for completed activities, these are summarized with the following list:

The Meeting House site on Frost Hill Rd:

Installation of a bronze marker, refurbishing of the stone marker and brush cutting.

The Sign at the Town Pound walkway: Painted the marker sign letters white – to improve readability.

The Maynard-Gates House (our oldest framed house – 1767) located just off Rt. 101: Completion of carpentry work to prepare the second small room for painting. Development of a policy for use of the house by our townspeople and groups. Initiated work to apply for a listing on the NH State Registry of Historic Places.

Cemetery Signs: Completed the project, as a member of the sign committee, with installation of the Pine Grove Cemetery granite sign, the last of five signs installed since late 2001.

Web site page: Designed our page for the town web site: www.marlboroughnh.org/herigate.htm.

Barn preservation: Information was mailed out to about 20 barn owners to inform them of new legislation to promote preservation of historic agricultural structures.

Preservation Alliance/Div. Of Historic Resources sponsored conferences: Some members attended two conferences: one in April and another in November.

During the latter part of the year the Commission members began discussions on different ideas for future projects. Possibilities which were discussed.

Applying to the State Division of Historic Resources to list the Maynard-Gates House on the NH Registry of Historic Places (positive action on this item was decided in Dec.).

Evaluating the feasibility and potential cost to restore the historic town pound and, in conjunction with that, exploring possible uses for the adjoining 1 ¼ acres of town-owned land.

Launching a survey to establish an inventory of historic barns, and later on historic homes and prominent buildings.

REPORT OF THE MONADNOCK ADVISORY COMMISSION

The Monadnock Advisory Commission is charged by the State of New Hampshire under R.S.A. 258:1 to advise and guide the Department of Resources and Economic Development (DRED) on the management of their lands and leased lands of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests (SPNHF) and the Town of Jaffrey. The lands are located on Mt. Monadnock, Gap Mountain, and Little Monadnock Mountain.

For the past two years the Monadnock Plan Steering Committee, appointed by the Division of Parks, has met on a monthly basis to develop a Master Plan for Monadnock State Park and environs which would "balance the needs for recreation, conservation, education and financial stability."

At a November 20, 2002 meeting at the Jaffrey Civic Center this Steering Committee passed its plan on to the Advisory Commission for conclusion and implementation. In the early months of 2003 the Monadnock Master Plan (draft) will be made available for public comment on the WEB: www.nhparcs.state.nh.us, in local newspapers, at MAC Town Offices and libraries, and at public information sessions. The final plan is to be completed by the end of June, 2003.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands cooperate and coordinate to reduce the risk of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ALL outside burning. Fire permits are mandatory for all outside burning unless the ground where the burning is to be done (and surrounding areas) is completely covered with snow. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail, plus suppression cost.

A new law effective January 1, 2003 prohibits residential trash burning (RSA 125-N). Contact New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services at (800) 498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information

Help us to protect you and our forest resources. Most New Hampshire wildfires are human caused. 2002 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

Moderator John Fletcher declared the voting polls of the Marlborough Town Meeting open at 1:00 PM o'clock on Tuesday, March 12, 2002. He presented the empty ballot box to the election workers and citizens present and announced voting could begin. The polls were scheduled to close no earlier than 9:00 PM o'clock.

The Moderator convened the deliberative session of the meeting at 7:05 PM. He requested that all present stand for the presentation of the colors and pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. A tape of "God Bless America" sung by renowned vocalist Kate Smith was played as Members of the Croteau-Coutts American Legion Post 24 presented the colors. The Pledge of Allegiance was lead by Mr. Fletcher.

It was requested that the Selectmen and Town Clerk seated at the head table introduce themselves. They were Selectmen John Northcott, Gina Paight, and Lawrence Robinson, and Ila Walton, Town Clerk and Tax Collector. Selectman Robinson then presented the Clerk and Tax Collector who is retiring, with a beautiful bouquet and honorary plaques for community service and services rendered to the Town.

The Moderator announced that the Parliamentary Rules of the State of New Hampshire would be the accepted procedure for the conduct of the meeting and read the Warrant Articles which were:

Article 1: To choose by ballot all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2: To vote by ballot on the proposed amendments to the Town of Marlborough Zoning Ordinance. Official ballot attached hereto.

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,230,398. which represents the recommended

operating budget for the year 2002. The sum does not include the warrant articles addressed.

Selectman Robinson rose to move that the town appropriate \$1,226,227. as the operating budget for year 2002 due to changes in budget items. Second by John Northcott. The Moderator requested that Mr. Northcott present the budget to the assembly noting the reason prompting the requested increase. Selectman Northcott so complied.

Mr. Lawrence Biron then rose to amend the budget further; I move that the Town of Marlborough Operating Budget be increased by \$35,000., the sum of which is to be used to increase the Deputy Town Clerk position to full time with benefits (\$9000); to increase the selectmen's clerk to full time with benefits (\$25,000); and to allow overtime pay for the Business Manager in the amount of \$1000.

Note: This will increase the tax rate by 40 cents or \$40 on a \$1000,000. home. Second by Pat Derby. Pat Derby and Lawrence Robinson spoke to the Amendment. David Durocher and Ken Kerber spoke against it. An indeterminable voice vote was taken so the question was put to ballot. The amendment failed.

Total Votes Yes 42 No 61

The question of the budget, Article 3, was then put in the amount of \$1,226,227. Moved by Lawrence Robinson. Second: John Northcott. Voice vote taken. Passed in the Affirmative.

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9000.) for the purpose of funding a regional prosecutor, or take any action related thereto. Recommended by Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Moved: John Northcott Second: Lawrence Robinson Voted in the Affirmative

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Eleven Dollars (\$2,511.) for the purpose of funding the Monadnock Family Services. Recommended by the Selectmen. (Majority vote required) Moved: Lawrence Robinson Second: Gina Paight Passed in the Affirmative.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-one Dollars (15,671.) for the purpose of paying the final lease payment on the front-end loader (the lease was authorized by Town vote in Article 7 at the 1998 Town Meeting). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required.) Moved: Gina Paight Second: Lawrence Robinson. Passed in the Affirmative.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.) for the purpose of funding a regional prosecutor, or take any action related thereto. Recommended by Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required) Moved: John Northcott. Second: Lawrence Robinson. Passed in the Affirmative.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of future purchase of a fully equipped new Police Cruiser and to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9000.00) to be placed in this fund and appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend from the fund. Recommended by Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required) Moved: Lawrence Robinson. Second: John Northcott. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Budget Advisory Committee. (Majority vote required) (Petition Warrant Article) Moved: Sanford Johnson. Second: John

Northcott. Larry Robinson requested ballot vote. So granted.
NO – 61 YES – 42 Article failed passage.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35 for the future revaluation of the municipality and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.) towards this purpose, and to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend from the fund. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (Majority vote required.) Moved: John Northcott. Second: Lawrence Robinson. Passed in the Affirmative.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.) to be added to the Sawyer Road Bridge (formerly the Ryan Rod Bridge) Capital Reserve Fund previously established. Eighty percent (80%) from New Hampshire Bridge Aid and twenty percent (20%) from the Town appropriations. Recommended by the Selectmen (Majority vote required). Moved: Lawrence Robinson. Second: Gina Paight. Passed by acclamation.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.) to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established and to designate the Fire Wards as agents to expend. Recommended by Selectmen. (Majority vote required.) Wayne Crowell spoke to the Article and moved the Question. Second: Lawrence Robinson. Passed by acclamation.

Article 13: To hear reports of Town Agents, Auditors, and Committees. Moved: Lawrence Robinson. Second: John Northcott. Passed by Affirmative Vote.

Article 14: To transact any business that may legally come before this meeting, or take any action thereon. Moved: Lawrence Robinson. Second: John Northcott.

1. David Durocher requested that the misspelling of his name on page 58 of the Town Report be corrected from "Derocher" to "Durocher."
2. Richard Butler, Chairman of the Historic Commission announced "A Liberty Tree Memorial and a commemorative plaque will be dedicated on Saturday, May 4, at 2:00 PM near the Bell Tower in Marlborough. The memorial is made possible by a donation from the Maurice Whitneys & Elm Research Institute agent.
3. Holli Nadeau spoke of inherent danger to children and the baseball flats from a beaver dam built across a stream above the flats. She requested help in getting rid of the damn. The Selectmen said they would look into it.

There being no further business the Moderator accepted a motion from Selectman Robinson that the deliberative session of the meeting be closed and ballots be counted.

CHAIR'S REPORT

Greetings from the Marlborough School Board! On behalf of my colleagues, I am again pleased to provide the community with an annual report on the state of the Marlborough School District.

I would like to focus my comments this year on three general areas that the board has worked on this year: academics, finances, and facility concerns. If you would like more specific details on any of these areas, I urge you to review the minutes of the school board meetings (which can be found online at <http://www.sau29.k12.nh.us/marlborough/>) and to read the annual principal's report.

ACADEMICS

Two indicators of how well our students are being served at Marlborough School are their performance on standardized tests and in the high school. In both regards, we have much to be proud of – and a few things to improve upon. Our students continue to perform well on the grades 3, 6 and 10 NHEIAP tests (the New Hampshire Educational Improvement and Assessment Program), as well as the SATs. On the whole, our students' academic success at Keene High School is also very strong, and their adjustment to the academic rigors of the high school is a smooth one. It is comforting to know that the staff here in Marlborough is doing such a fine job preparing our students for the challenges they will face in their academic lives for years to come.

One of the goals we have developed for the school is to improve upon the 3rd and 6th grade proficiency test results. While we are pleased with the scores our students receive (and with the understanding that, given our small class sizes, any one or two students who over or under perform can significantly change the category percentages), we want to maximize the number of students who score in the two highest levels, proficiency and advanced. The teachers are working hard to make this happen, and we are confident that their efforts are moving us steadily in that direction.

An important item to note is that, several years ago, the board requested and the town approved the hiring of a reading specialist to assist our students in their language arts skills. Combined with the additional writing components in all of the classes, we are seeing positive results, both academically and financially. Though we'll never be able to affix an exact dollar amount saved by this position, it certainly appears to be money well spent.

As you will see in the principal's report, we continue to receive strong community support for our Best School's program, Make A Difference Day, and the student safety initiatives we've undertaken over the last several years. If you would like more information – or better yet, to get involved in any of these projects -- please feel free to contact our principal, Ms. Leach, or any of the school board members.

FINANCES

Speaking of finances, our budget for FY '03 ended up strongly in the black – much to our surprise. As late as June of last year we were not expecting to be able to fully fund the special education reserve fund, due mainly to the fact that we had some unanticipated special education costs. As you may have read in the paper, thanks to some equally unanticipated changes in the special education program and several other areas, we were able to return approximately \$60,000 to the taxpayers after fully funding the special education and capital reserve funds. In addition, many of these changes will flow over to the current academic year, resulting in even greater savings (which is a good thing, given what we have to discuss in the facilities section).

You will again see at the district meeting a request for \$20,000 to be put in the special education reserve fund. When this fund was created several years ago, it was thought that \$60,000 might be a reasonable amount to hold in reserve and, given our "fortunate" circumstances with sped costs this last year, some might continue to think this is the way to go. The truth is that, while we were indeed fortunate this year, we could just as easily have been unfortunate and, given what some of our fellow "unfortunate" districts have had to face budget-wise, the school board thinks it both prudent and wise to increase this fund to a minimum \$100,000. Thus, the reason for the \$20,000 warrant article for this year and our recommendation for a \$20,000 warrant article again in 2004.

Special education costs are a very sensitive and divisive topic. I want to assure you that the board is, and will continue to look out for the best interests of the town regarding this issue, which is why we are recommending the \$100,000 reserve. Given the rhetoric coming out of Concord, catastrophic special education reimbursements could be on the chopping block, which makes this amount all the more important. (On a side note, I personally have written both of our senators and Congressman Bass regarding the federal government's failure to fully fund the 40 percent of special education costs it said it would when the law was created; I urge all citizens of Marlborough to do the same.)

We are currently in the process of negotiating a new teachers' contract; though nothing has been finalized as of this writing, we certainly hope to have a contract before the voters at the district meeting in March. We will also be monitoring the staffing patterns and, if numbers dictate, look to again right-size the staff as we did last year.

FACILITIES

We finally received a response to our response to the State Fire Marshall's report from two years ago; the news is good and bad. While we will not have to do everything on the report, we will need to make a number of substantial modifications to the building by 2005. The Facilities Committee has prioritized most of these items, including building egress, fire/smoke detection and alarm systems, and structural improvements, and we will continue to work on them as the year progresses.

While we were reviewing those issues, we also requested a report on the state of our heating, ventilation and plumbing systems. The news is not good. As you might expect, with the original systems virtually untouched since their installation, the band aid fixes we have been using to keep them operating have finally caught up to us. While investigating what we would need to do to make these systems right, we uncovered the fact that our existing electrical system, which we knew was maxed out, will also need to be upgraded. Of course, in order to make one fix, we would also need to make the other and, when combined with the work we have to do regarding the Fire Marshall's report, we realized it was time to look at the entire facility to see what needed to be done and in what order. As such, the board has decided to bring in an engineering firm to review the state of the building and set up a proposal for us to address ALL the work that needs to be done in the building.

Over the last several years, the board has worked with the administration to do a good job keeping up with the aesthetics and cosmetic needs of the facility while plugging away at the underlying structural needs. It appears that now those efforts will have to be redoubled, and the cost will be substantial. We promise to keep you up to date as this work progresses, and I again encourage you to check the web site for details in the minutes.

I hope this gives you a feel for at least some of what your school board has been addressing the last twelve months. If you would like more information, please do not hesitate to contact any one of us. Better yet, stop by one of our monthly school board meetings. We'd love to see you!

Let me end by saying that it has been my pleasure to serve as the chairperson of your school board this last year. The hard work and positive attitudes of the board members, staff and students has made this challenging position a very rewarding experience.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Review of the year shows a very productive and positive one with respect to criteria needed for a successful school. Improvements in student performance across all grade levels were in evidence. The staff has made a strong commitment to curriculum improvements and professional development. Community involvement and support continues to be very high.

With the passage of the new federal legislation, No Child Left Behind, accountability is a major focus. There are a number of ways in which to measure student performance. One is test results. Marlborough students' performance on the state mandated testing program (NHEIAP) reflects consistent performance. The New Hampshire Department of Education comparatively reports schools' scores as the percentage of students performing at the "Basic or better level". They equate this with performance at grade level or better. At the third grade level, three-year average scores for those scoring Basic or better on the English/language arts component of the test show Marlborough students scoring 68 percent, which is slightly below the state average of 74 percent. However, in mathematics, the only other subject tested at this level, Marlborough students' three-year average scores (85 percent) are better than the state scores (78 percent). At the sixth grade level, Marlborough students' three-year average scores are at or exceed the state scores in all areas tested -- English/language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. Of particular note are the scores in mathematics, which reflect a 12 percent difference between Marlborough's scores and the state scores.

Another measure of success is classroom performance. Marlborough had 104 students enrolled at Keene High School this past year. Their grade point average (GPA) in the core subject areas increased slightly from the previous year. In English, 60 percent of the students earned a grade of "B" or better. Approximately 20 percent of the students were enrolled in honors level English classes. Fifty-one percent of the students taking math courses earned a grade of "B" or better, and 18 percent of those taking math classes were enrolled in honors level classes. Fifty-five percent of the students in science classes earned a grade of "B" or better, and 37 percent were enrolled in honors or advanced placement level classes. In social studies, 64 percent of the students earned grades of "B" or better. Although a smaller percentage (5 percent) took honors or advanced placement level courses, they all earned a grade of "B" or better. Seventy percent of students who were enrolled in a world language earned a grade of "B" or better.

Student involvement and behavior is yet another way in which a school can be assessed. Student involvement in co-curricular activities, athletic as well as non-athletic, remains high at Marlborough Elementary and Keene High School. The Destination Imagination and Math Counts teams, as well as a number of other academically related clubs, continue to provide students with enrichment activities. Also of particular note is the level of community service our students demonstrate. Their volunteerism -- which involved doing yard work, conducting story hours, assisting senior citizens, or babysitting -- earned them national recognition in *USA Today*. More importantly, it helped them develop a sense of ownership in the community and civic responsibility.

One factor leading to school improvement is the work of the school staff which has continued its efforts to review and revise curriculum. Federal funds have been used to assist the staff (i.e., provide the training) in its efforts to refine curriculum. This year, the Marlborough School District received considerably more money (approximately \$30,000) from the federal government to support professional development activities for teachers. Some of these include topics related to effective teaching practices, teaching in the content area, meeting the needs of children with disabilities, classroom management, and technology. Federal funds have also been used to enhance student accessibility to computer technology.

The staff and school board continue to work cooperatively toward a common purpose of school improvement. The staff and board met to identify goals for the year. These included goals related to: instruction (high level of achievement on the state tests); social responsibility (achieve a positive school environment characterized by clearly stated expectations and appropriate student behavior); communication (inclusion of community members in issues related to the school); and technology (utilization of technology to enrich instruction, improve management efficiency, and strengthen communication). The staff and board have worked to provide quality programming while, at the same time, working to find external sources of revenue and maintaining needed funding levels that reflect the community's ability to financially support its school. The proposed 2003-2004 budget reflects a decrease in spending of \$65,000, which is a reduction of 1.9 percent from this year's budget.

Community involvement and support remains high and greatly contributes to the quality of programming at Marlborough School. The work of those associated with the Best Schools Initiative is exemplary and has served to strengthen the school-to-home relationship. Volunteerism remains high and greatly reinforces the efforts of the staff to provide students with positive and productive experiences. The work of many school and community people has resulted in a very constructive relationship -- one that fosters open communication, understanding and pride. I trust that, with continued effort, this will continue. I hope that you will plan to attend the annual district meeting on March 6 at 7:00 p.m. in the school gymnasium.

We had a mild summer as far as renovations and construction work are concerned. We replaced ceilings and lights in two middle school classrooms and the nurse's office and carpeted Mrs. Morse's room and the nurse's room. The repairs and replacements were safety issues expressed by the fire marshal.

Before the school year ended, to encourage our children to keep the academics flowing over the summer, our "Parent Institute Committee" developed a "summer packet" for every student. This packet contained math and reading activities for the children to complete over the vacation. At the end of July, many students returned to school to have their packet checked. They were then taught the science behind making ice cream and, to celebrate their accomplishments, they made and heartily consumed their homemade ice cream.

We have three new staff members this year: Mrs. Loretta Palmisano is replacing Maria Ginn, our school nurse, who retired after nine years of service; Ms. Amy Stolarik is replacing Sandra Helgeland (special education) who has taken a year's leave of absence; and Mrs. Darlene Harde is replacing Mrs. Coutts as Title I teacher. We also have a new Assistant Superintendent, Wayne Woolridge, who is replacing Tom Kane.

Due to the decrease in student enrollment, we downsized our staff by two teachers. A fourth grade teacher and a special educator resigned and Mrs. Puleo, who was teaching second grade, is now a special educator.

With one less teacher in the fourth and fifth grades, Mrs. Caron and Mrs. Chiang-Nielson combined the classes to make two grade four/five combinations. Mrs. Caron teaches the language arts and social studies to two groups of fifth (15 each) and one group of fourth graders (23); and Mrs. Chiang-Nielson teaches all the science and math to the same groups of students. Although it took time for the fourth and fifth graders to adjust to the switching of classes and two teachers, the students have met the challenge and are on their way to a successful and rewarding school year.

This year the middle school students, who do not plan to take Spanish in high school, were offered a newspaper/journalism class. Mrs. Morse, Mrs. Stone, Mrs. Murphy, and the young journalists produced their first newspaper in November. It is evident there are some quality journalists emerging. We are still looking for community members to become involved so we can create a town newspaper. Please give the school a call if you are interested.

The enrichment groups are continuing to grow. We have four Destination Imagination teams with 26 students participating. We also have two Math Counts teams involving eight middle school students, as well as four Enrichment Reading groups in the elementary grades, and one in the middle school. A Geography Bee Club, two Spelling Bee Clubs, (one for grades 1-3 and one for grades 4-8) have been formed. I commend Mrs. Harde for all the time she has spent organizing this program. If you have a special interest you would like to share with a group, please call the school.

Marlborough has entered its third and final year of the Best Schools Initiative. We have several projects in progress: a staff handbook to improve communication, a bullying policy and several projects to encourage student responsibility. In June, the team held a community gathering in which we featured Mark Roberts who presented the first part of a four-week program entitled "Parent to Parent". This program showed parents and community members how to keep our children safe in our "Toxic Culture". It was an informative meeting for every adult in attendance. Please help to continue these activities by informing the school you will support the continuation of the Best Schools Initiative.

The Student Leadership Team of Best Schools wrote a grant to hire Betsy Sweet, from the Committee on Hate and Violence, in Maine to visit our school. Betsy's topic, "The Power of Words," was presented to grades 4-8. She had planned a variety of group activities to show how unkind words and actions can lead first to bullying and then to violence. The student team is now working on an action plan to prevent bullying. They hope to have the plan ready by late spring or early fall. We are so proud of this Leadership Team!

In October of 2001-2002, the middle school participated in National Make A Difference Day. On that day, these students worked around the community making a difference. One group cleaned the ball flats; others raked Stone Pond, filled care boxes for children overseas, or spent the morning entertaining folks at Pierce House. Several students raked leaves around homes in Marlborough and others held a car wash. The funds earned from the car wash were given to the Community House for those needing food during the holidays. As a result of their work, the middle school students were presented with an award by the *Sentinel* and *USA Today*. Nearly every week in March there was a full-page picture in the *Sentinel* praising our children.

This year, the students again participated in Make A Difference Day and continued helping around the community. This time their fund-raising activities were for a defibrillator to be kept in school for any emergency, whether it is a school activity or a town activity. The ambulance would be called, but this machine could keep one alive until the professionals arrive. The children have already earned, and/or received from donations, enough money to purchase the defibrillator. We thank those community members who donated to such a cause. Our students and community have once again "made a difference".

Mitchell Watson, a sixth grader, prevented a potential disaster from occurring. During Fire Safety Month in October, he remembered what the fire department had taught him. Mike Laffond, Captain; Alyssa Thomas and Chris Batchelder, EMTs and former students, demonstrated to the middle school students how to use a home fire extinguisher. Mike even started a very small fire and had two children use the extinguisher. When Mitchell saw a fire by a truck outside his home, he grabbed his extinguisher and went outside to help douse the fire. Later, when Mitchell could see the fire was still not out, he called 911. Thanks to Mitchell and the lessons taught by our fire department, a tragedy was averted.

Our Safety Committee continues to develop procedures for a “lockdown”, fire drills or other emergency evacuations. This year we have worked on a student release procedure. This procedure would be used if our children were unable to return to school due to a fire or other hazard. Only authorized people will be allowed to pick up children to take them home. We are proud of how well our staff and students carry out these procedures.

As a result of our Safety Committee’s efforts, in November there was an article entitled, “Schools Now More Secure,” on the front page of the *Sentinel* which described what several schools in the area have accomplished to build a more safe environment for their children. I feel we took top billing on this report. We have also had several articles written in the *Sunday Sentinel*, in the Education section, commenting on the activities going on at Marlborough School. To feel proud about your school and community, you may want to check out the *Sunday Sentinel*.

To attain this goal, we have hired consultants to work with our teachers on “curriculum mapping,” a process which will align what we are teaching to the state standards. It also allows us to see where there may be gaps in our teaching and where there may be redundancies. Where these occur, we will make changes in order to have a more integrated curriculum in grades K-8. This is a long process, but the staff and I are committed to its success.

Our reading specialist reports that, since the year 2000, according to our new Star Reading Test, there were 27 students who have advanced from below reading level to on or above their reading. This has been a team effort with our reading specialist, our Title I teacher and our classroom teachers. We have such a quality staff!

You can see that our children and staff are very special people and I am proud to be a part of this school and community. Thank you for your support. Please come in and visit sometime or volunteer to read, sing, discuss or share a hobby or interest. You, too, can “make a difference”.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board

Marlborough, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Marlborough School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2002 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Marlborough School District has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Marlborough School District as of June 30, 2002, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Marlborough School District taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Marlborough School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.
