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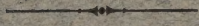

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

In presenting our annual report for the school year of 1923, we wish to call attention to the increasing difficulty in obtaining efficient teachers of experience to take a country school. The higher salaries paid in large villages and cities of our own state, and still higher salaries offered in other states, is but one of the many inducements which attract teachers away from the district schools of our rural communities. Better boarding places, good sidewalks to and from school, moving pictures and other forms of amusement all help to draw the teachers to the larger places. The shortage of **really good** teachers is another important factor.

With these conditions in mind we feel some pride in the average efficiency of our teaching force. There is always a chance for improvement and it is the aim of your School Board to co-operate with the Superintendent in getting for New Hampton the best teachers who will take up work in our community. In other words, it is our firm conviction that the most important thing which can be done for a rural school is to hire the best teacher who will accept the position and when a good one is secured, keep her if possible no matter what the cost. In no other way can we get an approximate value in education for our children from a dollar expended.

We also call attention to the progress our town is making in modernizing its school buildings. As voted at the last meeting, the Plaisted school room has had a complete over-hauling. It is now the most attractive school room in town, with new hard-wood floor, slate blackboards, new ventilating jacketed heater, and new adjustable seats. A rearrangement of the windows cor-

rects the lighting and a new chimney decreases the fire risk. The entire room was replastered, the wood-work painted and walls tinted.

The village school-room was also painted, the seats rearranged and the tops refinished. Also the toilet arrangements were perfected to comply with the state requirements. Minor repairs were made in other buildings.

For the coming year we recommend some outside painting on our schoolhouses, and inside overhauling of the Old Institution and Hanaford District buildings. These two school-rooms should also be supplied with new blackboards, and the Old Institution building should be fitted with new seats at the earliest opportunity. Our estimate below covers all of these recommendations except seats.

We submit herewith the Superintendent's report; the report of your School Treasurer and the properly audited financial statement required by the State Board of Education. Also as required by law we make the following estimate of the amounts necessary for the support of schools for the year beginning July 1, 1924.

The above table shows that the Winona school had the highest percentage of attendance and the smallest number of tardy marks. The excellent attendance of the Village, 94%, is marred by 170 cases of tardiness. The Old Institution has the wretched record of 157 cases of tardiness for an average membership of 17. It seems rather unfair for these otherwise excellent schools to bear alone the burden of such records. Parents and guardians are responsible under the law for the attendance of their children all the time school is in session. I suggest that if there is not a very marked improvement in the matter of tardiness the names of the parents and guardians of the worst offenders be published with the rest of the report in order that the citizens of the town may know all the facts of the case.

Habitual tardiness may be due to various causes. Sometimes it is the teacher's fault in part but in most cases it is due to carelessness in the home though all sorts of more or less plausible excuses may be invented. Occasionally perhaps a parent really believes that it doesn't matter or he has been too credulous of some childish excuse.

If we wish our children to have a fair start in life we must work together to develop in them the habit of being on time.

The home, the community and the school are all actively educating the child and each may have duties that are peculiarly its own, but in most cases the formation of good habits is dependent upon the cooperation of all three.

The home should start the child for school on time.

The community should frown on slackness in attendance.

The school should be punctual in its own time table.
