To the Inhabitants of the Town of Peterborough, in the county of Hillsborough, in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the fourteenth of March next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon, (Polls close at 6 P.M. unless otherwise voted) to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and to vote to see if beano shall be legalized in said Town.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, Expenses and Election and Registration, District Court, Town House, Police Department, Fire Department, Civilian Defense, Care of Trees, Health Department, Town Dump, Vitals, for laying out and repairing of the Highways, Street Lighting, Old Age Assistance and Town Poor, Memorial Day, Adams Playground and Pool, Putnam Park, Cemetery, Town Library, Town Water Charge, Monadnock Region, Town Planning Board, and for any other charge arising within the Town.

Article 3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward paying the Town Debt and Interest.

Article 4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts to the Town in trust or otherwise by any individual or individuals.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Ninety Eight Dollars and Twelve Cents (\$1,298.12), provided the State gives Eight Thousand Six Hundred Fifty-Four Dollars and Fourteen Cents (\$8,654.14), for the construction of Class IV and V Highways. Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint the Highway Agent at the next Town Meeting, March 12, 1968 instead of by ballot, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and use the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$2,450.00) from the income of the Albert W. Noone Trust Fund to seal and reline two tennis courts and to paint and reline the swimming pool, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be expended under the direction of the Adams Playground Committee to implement and staff a year round recreation program, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new Police Cruiser and exchange the present one and raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for same, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to review and set the pay scale of all Town Employees to be effective upon passage.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), to purchase the land now under option with P.I.D.C. for the purpose of a Lagoon Site, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote, raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of:

- 1. Deluge Nozzle
- 2. 3 Scott Air Packs
- 3. Radios

or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a Town Tax Map, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pipe water from Bailey Brook to Cunningham Pond or take any other action relating thereto. Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Civil Defense Director to purchase the following equipment: Radio, Siren, Generator, and vote to raise and appropriate for same, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to surface Blueberry Lane or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and place in a Capital Reserve Fund for the rebuilding of the so-called Noone's Bridge, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the surfacing of the roads to be accepted at P.I.D.C. Development, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a new lease for the Town Dump or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to make repairs to the Library Roof or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. Because of the scenic beauty of our Town is of economic and other value to the residents of the Town, and because preserving certain roads contributes to that scenic beauty, it is directed that the Selectmen take steps to prevent any widening of Middle Hancock Road or any cutting down of trees along Middle Hancock Road along the portion of the road north to the Hancock town line from where work was stopped last Fall.

Article 23. That the Town instruct our representatives to the Legislature in Concord, to have prepared and introduced in the General Court now in session an act to restore the management of the water works in the Town of Peterborough to the provisions of the original charter, granted by the State of New Hampshire, Chapter 177 of the Laws of 1895, and approved February 21, 1895, by striking out the amended Sections 4 and 5 as amended by the Legislature, approval dated April 15, 1935, and effective May 1, 1935, with one exception: – delete from Section 4 of the original Charter the following:

"No more than two of whom shall belong to the same political party."

Article 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to modernize the electrical board and the Town House heating system or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will authorize the Planning Board and the Fire Department to hire an appraiser, surveyor, architect, and engineer, and acquire land options for the location and construction of a fire station or the remodelling and expansion of the existing station, and to submit a report of their findings and recommendations at the 1968 Annual Town Meeting; and to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for that purpose.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$8,-500.00) as the Town's share of reconstructing bridge number 127/133. Total cost Twenty-Five Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$25,500.00) or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to reconstruct the sidewalk on the east side of Grove Street or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to reconstruct the drainage system from Currier Ave. along Hunt Road or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to obtain an option for the purchase of additional land on the west side of the Contoocook River between the Contoocook River and Hancock Road in North Peterborough for the site of sewage treatment facilities, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to revise the water rates, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to install the following Street Lights and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any other action relating thereto:

- 1. One new 3500 Lumen light at the intersection of Route 101 and Mercer Ave.
- 2. One new 3500 Lumen light at the intersection of Route 101 and Hatch St.
- 3. One new 7000 Lumen light at the intersection of Sand Hill Road and Old Street Road.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to officially name the following streets, or take any other action relating thereto:

- 1. Blueberry Lane, which is the street off Sand Hill Road serving the Peterson housing development.
- 2. Reynolds Road which is the street off Sand Hill Road serving the Lloyd Reynolds development.
- 3. All new streets in the Pineridge housing development, which are: Lounsbury Ave., Picard Drive, Nichols Road, Taylor Road, Aimless St., Pineridge Road, and Keenan Drive.
- 4. Change the name of Mountain View Terrace to Mountain View Drive.

Article 33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the preparation of final plans and specifications for the construction of sewerage collection and treatment facilities through the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the Town, and to see whether the Town will authorize the selectmen to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued, including their sale, and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of RSA 33 and the amendments thereto.

Article 34. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to make temporary repairs to the Fire Station floor, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00). This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year

or to be expended for the purposes of the Commission or added to by gifts of money. Explanation: See Annotated Act, Conservation Commissions 1964.

Article 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of New Voting Booths, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 37. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed.

Article 38. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow in anticipation of collection of taxes for the current Municipal Year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in the current Municipal Year from taxes collected during the current Municipal Year.

Article 39. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE RESULTS OF THE TOWN MEETING 1966

Article 2. The Total appropriation under this article was \$204,922.74 plus amendments as follows: Re-appropriate \$850 from money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated to complete the Town Map and Directory, also, increase the Road Agent's Salary to \$6,500 a year and permit him to hire his help and pay.

Article 3. Town Debt and Interest \$2,000. Motion Passed.

Article 4. Trust Fund. Motion Passed.

Article 5. Report of Committees Passed.

Article 6. Class IV and V Highways – \$1,295.07. Motion Passed.

Article 7. Police Cruiser – Exchange 1965 Police Cruiser for a new 1966 Model and not exceed \$1,000. Motion Passed.

Article 8. Noone Bridge – \$5,000 to be held in Trust until 1967. Motion Passed.

Article 9. New Highway Truck – Exchange 1958 G.M.C. Truck for a new one and equipment at a sum not to exceed \$9,100. Motion Passed.

Article 10. Fire Alarm Boxes – Referred to Planning Board. Motion Passed as amended.

Article 11. Powersbridge Road Water Line – Referred to Planning Board together with the Selectmen for agreement on completion of water line. Motion Passed as amended.

Article 12. Town Meeting at Night. Motion Lost.

Article 13. Modernization and Reorganization Committee – appoint a committee of seven to study all phases of Town Government. Motion Passed.

Article 14. Conservation Commission – Provisions of RSA 36A – Selectmen to appoint a Conservation Commission. Motion Passed.

Article 15. Elm Street Sidewalk – To be built from Apportionment "B" Fund and repairs to Elm Street if necessary. Motion Passed.

Article 16. Water Department Capital Reserve -

Withdrawal from Capital Reserve Fund money necessary for emergency expenses of the Water Department for 1966 only. Motion Passed.

Article 17. Town Ordinances – As presented. Motion Passed.

Artice 18. Fire Station Study – Referred to Planning Board. Motion Passed.

Article 19. Mobile Home Ordinance – Ordinances regulating Mobile Home Parks. Motion Passed.

Article 20. Conservation Commission Taking Down Trees. \$1,000 appropriated. Motion Passed.

Article 21. Option Land for Sewer System. Selectmen to obtain purchase of land at North Peterborough for site of sewerage treatment facilities for the sum of \$2,000 to be appropriated. Motion Passed.

Article 22. Advancement from U. S. Government to defray cost of Sewer Construction – Authorize the Selectmen to file with the U. S. Government in behalf of the Town of Peterborough to obtain the advance of \$70,000 to defray cost of final plans and specifications for the construction of sewerage collection and treatment facilities. Motion Passed.

Article 23. Sewer Study Committee – That the Town continue Sewer Study Committee. Motion Passed.

Article 24. Pollution of Rivers — Study by Sewer Committee and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 — to determine what method of taxation is to be used in allocating costs of said system. Original Motion as amended Passed.

Article 25. Police Radios — Selectmen to purchase two radios for the Police Department and appropriate the sum of \$1,189. Motion Passed.

Article 26. Highway and Water Department Radios – Selectmen and Radio Study Committee to purchase Highway and Water Department equipment and \$900 be appropriated for the Highway Radio, \$300 be withdrawn from the Water Department Capital Reserve for the Water Department. Motion Passed.

Article 27. Changing the Town Water Charter at 1967 Legislature. Motion Lost.

Article 28. Bowling Alley and Billiard Licenses – Lawful to operate on Sundays. Motion Passed.

Article 29. Increase of Water Department Rates – Increase rates by 75%. Motion Passed. Direct charges increased to \$7,544.38. Motion Passed.

Article 30. Albert W. Noone Trust Fund – Adams Playground – Withdraw from the accumulated interest of the Albert W. Noone Trust Fund for the following: Resurface four Tennis Courts, paint interior of Pool, build a new Skating Area on the south side of Tennis Courts and install hydrant – amended to read not to exceed \$2,400. Amendment Passed.

Article 31. Street Sweeper for Highway Department – Highway Department authorized to purchase a Street Sweeper at the sum of \$2,000. Motion Passed.

Article 32. Fire Alarm Board – Fire Department authorized to purchase a Fire Alarm Board and appropriate \$2,000 for same. Motion Passed.

Article 33. Dispose of Real Estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed. Motion Passed.

Article 34. Borrowing in anticipation of Taxes. Motion Passed.

Article 35. Estimated Revenues. Motion Passed.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

In a year when inflation continued to take its toll in rising costs, we feel that our proposed base budget, up less than 2% from last year, is realistic and we hope that you will support this budget mainly covered in Article 2 on Town Meeting day. You can also note in the Warrant more special articles for this year than at any time in the recent past. These will take a considerable amount of study on our part and it would be premature to make detailed recommendations at this time except in a few specific cases and therefore we will save our comments on many of these specials for airing at Town Meeting.

PROPOSED SEWERAGE SYSTEM

Elsewhere in this Town Report you will find a detailed report of our Sewer Study Committee and we commend it to your study for use in intellegent voting on the Articles which pertain to that subject. As has been publicized recently, the going has been a little slow on this project due to the availability of funds from the Housing and Urban Development Commission (HUD). At this writing the State Pollution Control Commission is recommending that towns proceed on the engineering phase of this program with their own or borrowed funds to be eligible for construction funds at an early date.

TOWN GOVERNMENT MODERNIZATION

We are grateful to the members of the Town Government Study Committee that devoted so much of their time to this important project and for their recommendations shown in this Town Report. The program which they have suggested, we feel is basically sound and something which we will endeavor to implement during the coming years. This year we will do our best to implement those enumerated below. We urge you to support the recommendations for an appointed head of Town Public Works and if approved, we will take immediate steps to begin a search for such a man to take office as soon as the existing term expires.

We will take action this coming year to provide records of our regular Selectmen's meetings. While the bookkeeping and clerical operation of our office is presently under study, it may not be possible for us to work out a clerk this year, however, we will take minutes of all our meetings and have them on file in our office for future reference.

We will recommend to Chief Jackson that he enlist

legal counsel, when necessary, for court cases. We will, as recommended by the Committee, actively support, this year's House Bill #180 to remove the archaic controls imposed by the Public Utilities Commission in the area of accounting and records so that modern data processing can be used to speed up our billing and accounting procedure and will continue our efforts to modernize the entire bookkeeping system with the help of those experienced in that field. We will take steps to assure that all equipment is charged to the department account using it and while we do not favor, at this time, the building up of a reserve fund for the purchase of equipment, we will guarantee that the system of charging various town departments is carefully respected.

HIGHWAYS

This year with Highway Agent, Robert Martin leaving we spent time, before Town Meeting, planning the 1967 road program with him. He has been most helpful and we thank him for this effort. We will complete the TRA projects started on the Middle Hancock Road this year in accordance with surveys and plans made by the State last year. This is the completion of a 2 year project. If there is any TRA money left from this project, we plan to spend it on a project, recommended by the Planning Board, improving the corner at the junction of Cheney Avenue and Old Street Road to provide better visibility.

MacDOWELL RESERVOIR

The MacDowell Reservoir recreational area is still alive, however, the new appropriations being made by this year's administration have not been approved at this writing. We have noted that a sum has been entered in the Federal budget to cover the cost of planning such a development. We will keep you posted on this as developments proceed.

CONSERVATION

During the past year we transferred the land taken for tax purposes in Swamp Woods to the Conservation Commission for their management. This is probably the first of several such actions which might take place in the coming years and we will await further proposals from that Commission prior to taking further action.

TOWN DUMP

Our Town Dump lease runs out in 1968 and we will be asking for your authorization this year to negotiate for a re-leasing for the present land or the selection of a new site. While we have not had an opportunity to explore all the possibilities, we feel that this is an issue which will have to be resolved in 1967 and will be interested in any opinions you may have on this subject during Town Meeting.

TAX MAP

During the year we were visited by a civil engineering firm who proposed that we use a new method of tax mapping by aerial survey. We have inserted an article in the Warrant for your consideration. While this method is relatively new, many towns in New England have taken advantage of this lower cost system of making tax maps. Inasmuch as we do not have a property or tax map for record purposes it is felt that we should get this project underway at once. The map could be used for many other purposes than tax assessing and at least the aerial photographing and initial layout of the map could be done with this year's appropriation. Additional property and subdivisions could be added in the future with additional appropriations over a four-year program. We hope this merits your support.

CONCLUSION

Our Selectmen's Report this year would not be complete without paying a fitting tribute to a fellow townsman who has left us this past year. The Town affairs and preparation for Town Meeting this year has not seemed the same without Martin Keenan's valuable help and assistance. He will be sadly missed for many years to come, however, we are most grateful for the opportunity we had to serve with him and for the help he was able to give us while he was here.

BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT, 1967

The chief aim of the Budget Committee this year was to review each department's requests with complete objectivity.

Of perennial importance is the town's responsibility to support education. The prospect of a new school has led the committee to carefully scrutinize expenditures that may be duplicated in the near future.

Recognizing the town's responsibility to provide adequate salaries, the committee has suggested a few salary adjustments. The Selectmen's proposal to institute a review of the town's salary structure is endorsed. Such a study is necessary in order that the town may continue to secure competent personnel.

Approval of some needed capital improvements at this time is deemed wise to avoid the effects of inflation.

All town budgets have been carefully reviewed. Reductions, wherever prudent, have been recommended with no sense of false economy.

The committee endorses the proposal of the water study committee that the basic water rates be reduced from 75% to 60% over the rates in effect in 1965 as was indicated in this committee's 1965 report.

SEWER STUDY – The recommendation of the Sewer Study Committee to obtain a municipal loan of \$70,000 for detailed planning of the sewer project is sound. To await the availability of an interest-free loan from the federal government may prove to be shortsighted in view of rising construction costs and the prospect of Federal and State enforcement of water pollution standards in the near future. Appropriations of \$5,000 to purchase the site for the lagoon, and \$1,000 to obtain options on the Vose property are approved.

TOWN OPERATING BUDGET

The Budget Committee approves a base budget of \$210,363.16. This is an increase of \$5,440.42, or less than 3%, over last year's budget. The Selectmen and various department heads are to be commended for their efforts in keeping the total budget within a reasonable figure in spite of general rising costs.

TOWN OFFICERS – Up \$1,000 over last year's budget request to \$20,000 to cover possible wage adjustments.

POLICE DEPARTMENT – Up \$1,465 over last year's

budget request to \$23,965 to cover possible wage adjustments.

FIRE DEPARTMENT – Up \$1,500 to \$10,500. The increase is caused by two major items; replacement of signal wire and hose. It is the intention of the fire department to gradually replace and update these items.

CLASS V HIGHWAYS – The budget request of \$1,298 is to be used to complete Middle Hancock Road. Any surplus will be used to remove a rise on Old Street Road at the intersection of Cheney Avenue.

PLAYGROUND AND POOL – Up \$650 primarily due to higher salaries.

TOWN SPECIAL ARTICLES

The number of special articles and the total amount of money requested has substantially increased. The merits of each have been carefully studied. The following comments are submitted:

POLICE CRUISER - \$1,050 for replacement of the cruiser is approved. Since a program of annual replacement has been established it might be well in the future to include this item in the police department operating budget.

FIRE DEPARTMENT – An appropriation of \$1,200 is approved for one deluge nozzle and three Scott air packs. A request for three Johnson Radios to be installed in the cars of the Chief and Deputy Chiefs which would facilitate communication with the Fire Lookout Tower is not approved because it is not felt to be essential.

PLAYGROUND AND POOL – Financing of the following projects from the income of the Noone Fund is approved:

- 1. Seal and reline two tennis courts.
- 2. Paint and reline the swimming pool.

AERIAL TAX MAP — This committee was favorably impressed by an example of an aerial tax map. This program will be of great aid to the Selectmen in assessing properties. The first phase of the project will cost \$6,000. It is anticipated that the project can be completed in four years at a total cost of \$21,000.

CIVIL DEFENSE — This agency is requesting the sum of \$1,200 to be applied to the purchase of a generator, base station radio and siren to implement its emergency oper-

ating center. This committee is not convinced that the Town really needs these items. This request is not approved.

BLUEBERRY LANE – Expenditure of \$2,000 to improve this road is approved. It is recommended that the Planning Board consider whether the subdivision ordinance should be amended to require the developer to surface road improvements before acceptance.

LIBRARY – \$3,500 for necessary roof and chimney repairs is approved.

FIRE STATION — The Planning Board's request for \$1,500 in connection with possible enlargement of the fire station property and building is approved for the following items:

- 1. Boundary Survey
- 2. Estimate of cost for repairs and expansion
- 3. Land options.

OTTER BROOK BRIDGE – The town must pay onethird (8,500) of the cost of replacement of this bridge before State aid is available for improvement of town owned bridges such as Noone's Bridge.

NOONE BRIDGE – Addition of \$5,000 to the reserve fund for reconstruction of this bridge is approved.

GROVE STREET SIDEWALK – No cost figures have been received for reconstruction of the sidewalk on the east side of Grove Street from Legion Hall to the Granite Block. This project is not approved at this time.

CURRIER AVENUE – Appropriation of \$3,000 to correct serious drainage problems is approved.

RECREATION DIRECTOR – There is much merit in the program that is being presented by the Playground Committee and supported by several other groups. The Budget Committee wishes to point out that, if adopted, the Recreation Director program as presented will represent a tax increase of about \$.50 for each \$1,000 of assessed valuation. The basic idea is sound. The program has not been supported by cost figures. Therefore, this committee is unable to make a valid recommendation.

TOWN HOUSE – An appropriation of \$3,000 is requested for electrical and heating improvements as firm estimates have not been received, no recommendation is made. **BAILEY BROOK** – It is proposed that \$25,000 be expended from the Water Department Capital Reserve Fund to divert water from Bailey Brook to Cunningham Pond. No detailed engineering plans are available. It is recommended that this project be deferred until professional engineering advice is obtained as to the feasibility and planning of this project.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION – An appropriation of 1,000 is approved to fund the operations of this agency.

SCHOOL BUDGET

As in the past, the School Budget is the major concern of the taxpayer. This year the total budget is up approximately \$47,543. The largest increase is in teachers' salaries (\$34,105). This increase includes \$5,500 for a new teacher for the fourth section of the second grade. The committee has kept in mind the strong competition for qualified teachers existing throughout the area.

WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

The program started in 1965 to create larger reserves and extend the distribution system of the Peterborough Water Department has been completed. It has not been found necessary to draw on the Capital Reserve Account to complete this construction and therefore that account remains intact. An additional balance of about \$20,000. is also left from the bond issue. We are asking that this balance be used this year for the diversion of Bailey Brook into Cunningham Pond. This has been recommended by engineers and Study Committees in the past. With the increased usage in the high service area, it has been noted in the past that it has been exceedingly difficult to maintain the reserves needed in Cunningham Pond and while further expansion of the high service area may in some future time demand a booster pumping system and a tank to supply that area, it is felt that this small step will have the effect of at least extending that costly alternative. The diversion would be an easy one consisting of a small retaining dam being constructed to divert the water through a pipe to the pond. During periods of extreme run-off the dam would be constructed in such a way to allow emergency run-offs to follow the normal brook course.

We estimate that by making this diversion even during the slowest periods of flow the brook could almost sustain the daily usage now being consumed in the high service area at the present time. This on top of the normal reserves at Cunningham Pond would also allow us to carry out a more rigorous flushing program to minimize the rust situation.

Pump Repair

Now that our North Peterborough well is operating smoothly it has been recommended by our engineers that we recondition and examine the South Peterborough well. This will be done in the spring of 1967 as soon as necessary parts and pumping equipment can be obtained. This well has run for a period of some 12 years without mishap and it seems risky to push it any further without an inspection.

Water Meters

We are accelerating our program this year of installing outside recording meters. All new homes now being constructed have had these meters installed in the past few years, however, we are going through a retrofit program on all old meters to aid in the difficulty of obtaining meter readings, not only from the labor standpoint but also from the return trips made necessary by hidden meters in the cellars.

Modernized Billing System

As mentioned in the Town Government Study Report we will be supporting House Bill #180, which will give the authority to the Selectmen and Water Commissioners to use home rule in modernizing our billing and accounting system. We have several good proposals which have been made not only by the Town Government Study Committee, accounting members, but also members of the Water Study Committee and should this bill pass, we will take speedy action in implementing these changes.

Water Rate Study Committee

We certainly appreciate the work done by the Water Rate Study Committee during 1966 and 1967. They have made constructive suggestions on the improvement of our Accounting System as mentioned above as well as changes in our rules and regulations.

PETERBOROUGH TOWN LIBRARIAN'S REPORT For the Year 1966

Expanding library service for an ever-growing community continues to be the policy of the Peterborough Town Library.

Many areas of reference have been strengthened during the year 1966 with continuing in-library reference training of staff members. As an indication of the developing strength of the Town Library's subject collection, 203 fewer titles were requested from the New Hampshire State Library. Along with books, recordings, films and other library materials are always available through the Library from the State Library.

The Gaylord Automatic Charging system was installed April 1 providing each patron with his personal identification card and number. The system speeds book charging, minimizes errors in sending out overdues, and provides realistic registration figures. Student library cards are filed at the Circulation Desk; high school freshmen graduate to adult registration.

Monthly exhibits featuring books of varied interests have proven popular and have served to acquaint patrons with many books that might be overlooked. The Bookmobile with its regular visits every six weeks complemented the Library's adult fiction and non-fiction collection. The Peterborough Transcript has printed "The Library Corner" as a monthly feature.

During National Library Week, patrons were invited to record on a large board in the main Reading Room their "Favorite Books . . . to Read, Enjoy and Share." Children's Book Week was highlighted by room visits from the lower elementary grades of the Peterborough Consolidated School. The children were given a tour of the Library, a brief talk about books and library manners, and a special book-mark to take home. Instead of the regular Storytime, a lively film-book talk about "Won Kim's Ox" was presented by Mrs. Helen Sondrol of Amherst to 70 attentive youngsters.

An increase in the overall attendance at Story-time shows an average of 40 children participating weekly in this stimulating program. Reading lists of children's books have been compiled as aids to good reading and as suggestions for gifts. "Vacation Readers Go Everywhere," a summer reading club, had 25 participants.

Expansion of the student area in the Reading Room was made possible by a gift from George Abbot Morison of a handsome study table and six chairs. An anonymous friend of the Library immediately gave a matching set. These thoughtful gifts have doubled the seating capacity of the study area.

A new set of bookcases has been added to the arrangement in the Adult Fiction department; a picture book table and bench, round tables, eight chairs and a coat rack have been added to the little children's department. For the safety and convenience of Library patrons, an automatic outside light was installed in the rear parking area.

The Peterborough Lions Club, as part of their sightconservation program, gave the Library a check for \$100 towards the purchase of sight-saving books. Bookmarks, always much appreciated by borrowers, were given by the First National Bank of Peterborough and the Bellows-Nichols Insurance Agency. Gifts of money for memorial books have made possible many fine additions to the general collection. The Extension Group, in appreciation for the use of the Library hall, gave for the public kitchen a much-needed large coffee-maker.

"The Story of the Peterborough Town Library" was compiled by the Trustees and, printed through the courtesy of the Peterborough Savings Bank. Anyone desiring a copy may request it at the Circulation Desk. The portraits of the early friends of the Library were identified, reframed and hung in order on the west wall of Reading Room. A brief description of the various subjects and their relation to the Library was prepared and is available at the Circulation Desk.

During the spring, the librarian attended a ten week extension course on book selection for adults and young adults. Professional meetings were attended throughout the State by Trustees and librarian. The latter was among the 6,800 librarians who were present at the American Library Association annual convention during July in New York City; she also joined state, school and public librarians at the New England Library Association annual meeting at Wentworth-by-the-Sea in October.

The Reading Room ceiling and walls, and the ceiling and east wall of the old stack room were repaired and painted a soft green by Mr. Wesley Myhaver and his crew. Half-screens were made for each window of the Eben Jones wing. Our able custodian, Mr. Alfred McLaughlin, painted the floors of the lower hall, kitchen, lavatories and Trustees' room; designed and built a compact record bin and bock-shelf unit as well as carrying out his regular duties. Heavy rains over Labor Day so weakened the portico's plastered ceiling that a large part of it collapsed. Temporary repairs were made but water leaking through the damaged roof continued to be a problem and a hazard in freezing weather. Copper valleys installed at the junctions of the new and old buildings have eliminated the internal water seepage in the corner walls during the winter months.

Regular monthly meetings were faithfully attended by all Trustees and librarian; and staff meetings were held as the need arose.

Contributing much to the smooth operation of the Library have been loyal and dedicated staff members: Mrs. Helen Richardson, Mrs. Vivien Whitney, Mrs. Frances Russ, Mrs. Josephine Franklin, Mrs. Gloria Murray, Miss Marsha Baker (page), and Mr. Alfred McLaughlin, custodian. Mrs. Emily Dusser de Barenne and Mrs. Oscar Starrett have been generous with help as volunteer workers and Mrs. E. Benjamin Armstrong was a source of special delight to the boys and girls during a special Storytime in the spring.

Only the interest, support and cooperation of community, patrons, friends, staff and Trustees has made possible the achievements of the past year. The librarian is most grateful.

FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people – those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966).

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.

2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres . . . a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits

are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.

2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.

3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.

4. Most important — instruct your children that matches are not play things.

HIGHWAY AGENT'S REPORT

The following is a brief summary of what was accomplished during the past year by the Highway Department.

General Maintenance

Projects pertaining to maintenance done this year were: Road patching, street cleaning, cleaning culverts, ditches, and catch basins, lining streets and parking lots, cutting brush, care of gravel roads and signs, and some tree work. During the winter months, snow removal is the chief project, which is done mostly at night.

Betterment Projects

MacDowell Road has new drainage and has been surfaced for about 6 tenths of a mile. This surface was only one coat and it will have to be sealed in the Spring. This was done to make it easy to maintain and to stop washouts.

The Crosby Road also has new culverts and better drainage and surfaced with asphalt to stop washing on the hill.

Special Projects

Elm Street was rebuilt and new sidewalk put in from Winter Street to the By-Pass. After the new water line was laid, there wasn't much left to the street. It was therefore rebuilt and a sidewalk put in for the school children.

The street was surfaced with an asphalt penetration, and the approaches were hot-topped.

Water Department

The new line extension was laid on Scott Street with a hydrant for a blow off so the water could be cleaned if there was a water break.

Also, all water services in the new housing developments were installed by the Department. These developments were Highland Meadows, Reynolds Development and P.I.D.C.

After all the new line extensions were completed by the contractors the surfacing of all the water ditches was done by the Town so some of these roads could be widened a few feet.

I wish to thank everyone who has contributed in any way to make the Highway Department job easier. As my last year in office, I wish to say it has been a pleasure to serve the people of Peterborough.

ADAMS PLAYGROUND COMMITTEE 1966 Report

The 1966 pool and playground program is behind us and your committee feels that it has been an extremely successful one. In going over several reports from previous years it has always been referred to as a year round recreational program. We feel that this is a fallacy. The 1966 program opened its formal ten week program on the 27th of June and ended on the 3rd of September. This, in the eyes of the committee, is not a year round program. The pool and playground close on Labor Day and not another program is available for our children until the skating season, which does not start until around the first of the year, and when the skating season ends around the middle of March there is no program until the middle of June. There lies the fallacy.

It is a recommendation of your committee that a Superintendent of Recreation be considered so that he can initiate a twelve month program to include the following:

To study and evaluate existing programs and provide supervision for new ones.

To establish maximum recreation services at low cost.

To provide and increase an efficient use of existing facilities.

To encourage individual citizens to volunteer their time.

To maintain systematic records of programs and finances.

To encourage weekly teen age dances and activities and to centrally locate a community center.

The 1966 ten week program, as we mentioned, was a successful one and as your committee we would like to report to you the activities that took place during that time.

Since the swimming program has grown to such great heights, we felt it imperative that we have a Swimming Director, Terry Lowe, with his staff, to devote full time to the instruction of swimming. Since Mr. Lowe would be devoting his full time to swimming it was the opinion of the committee that we should have a Playground Director devoting her full time to the playground and programs such as arts and crafts, games, tennis, field trips, etc. This Director, Susan Rainier, and her staff did an excellent job. The arts and crafts programs were broader this year than ever before, reaching children of all ages, and the assistant, Virginia Clark, did an excellent job in organizing games to occupy the children who were not interested in the swim program. We certainly recommend that this program be continued and broadened in future years.

The Swim Team enjoyed a very successful season, beating just about every team that came along. The swim program had an enrollment of over 300 and four instructors were pressed every minute in handling this number. The adult swim program, Monday through Thursday evenings, was very successful this past year. We hope this will continue.

Concluding the year was a Gala Water Carnival and the competition for the Major A. Erland Goyette Memorial swim trophies given annually to the best boy and girl swimmers at the pool. The Carnival gave parents the opportunity to watch their children show off their skills. Swimming certificates were awarded for achievement, and the Carnival closed with the traditional watermelon scramble and feast. The Major A. Erland Goyette Memorial Awards were presented for the fourth year. The lovely silver trophies, donated by Mrs. Goyette, are presented each year, with the winners having their names engraved on them, and receiving a plaque as a memento of their achievement. This year's winners were a brother and sister combination, Ginger Pettee and Kevin Pettee.

\$2,450 from the Arthur Noone Fund was used to resurface two tennis courts and to construct a new skating area. Both of these projects were completed. We recommend that the last two tennis courts be resurfaced in 1967 and that the swimming pool be painted. We request from the Noone Fund the amount of \$2,450 again to meet this expense.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Planning Board has suffered a great loss with the death of its Chairman, MARTIN J. KEENAN, on January 13, 1967. His wisdom, guidance, attention to detail, and thorough familiarity with the Town, its inhabitants and its history, made him an invaluable member of this board which he has faithfully served since 1949. His absence has created a void that will be impossible to fill.

Since the 1966 Town Meeting the Planning Board has approved three major sub-divisions: Lloyd G. Reynolds' Foote land off Sand Hill Road (6 lots); Phase II of Peterborough Industrial Development Corporation's Pineridge project in North Peterborough (47 lots); and the Highland Meadows development (17 lots) of John and Walter Peterson. The Land Sub-division Ordinance was revised and amended on July 14, 1966.

Several meetings were held with the Chief of Police concerning parking problems and possible solutions.

Two members of the Board attended a 9-meeting seminar on planning conducted at the State House in Concord by the State Department of Resources and Economic Development and the University of New Hampshire.

The untimely death of our chairman delayed the completion of the Town Map and Directory, but it is hoped to publish the same in the summer of 1967.

Several matters which were referred to the Planning Board by the 1966 Town Meeting have been considered, as follows:

(1) Article 10 – extension of the fire alarm system to West Peterborough at Windy Row. NOT RECOMMENDED. The information presented to us indicates it would be too expensive and would result in many false alarms. (Only two box alarms in 1966, both false.) The Fire Department feels the telephone is an adequate substitute and points out that many other high-density areas have no alarm boxes.

(2) Article 11 - Water extension to South Peterborough. NOT RECOMMENDED. The benefits to the Town and the water system are not justified by the expense involved.

(3) Article 18 - Fire Station Study. The present fire station was constructed in 1913 and has a frontage on Main Street of approximately fifty (50) feet and a depth of about seventy (70) feet. The exact dimensions are un-known. The Fire Department now has two new LaFrance trucks, plus the Forest Fire Power Wagon. It should also have a 3000-gallon tank truck for use in areas outside of the hydrant system. The present station has no room for expansion and has some structural defects. The Planning Board feels that now is the time to plan for the present and future needs of the Fire Department while land in the downtown area is available and crisis conditions do not yet exist. In order to evaluate properly the problem and the solutions, the Planning Board and the Fire Department are asking for \$1,500 to secure the services of a real estate appraiser, a structural engineer, an architect and a surveyor and options to purchase land so that at

the 1968 Town Meeting we can present a comprehensive report of a financial and technical nature as to the future space needs of the Fire Station and the cost of satisfying the same.

SEWERAGE STUDY COMMITTEE

Preface

Several actions taken by the Town Meeting of 1966 with reference to the work of the Sewerage Study Committee at long last put the town's 1959 Camp, Dresser & McKee report on the pollution situation on the road to final action.

First of all, the Town voted to continue the committee for an indefinte period of time. The Town also voted the sum of \$2,000 to acquire options on land that will be needed for the sewer lagoons. The Town also authorized the Selectmen to file a request for a \$70,000 interest free loan from th Federal Government to acquire final construction plans for the proposed sewer system. The Sewerage Study Committee was granted an appropriation of \$3,000 to determine the rates to be charged for the sewer system and to study other costs involved.

1966 Progress

The Sewerage Study Committee worked closely with the Selectmen in acquiring an option from the Peterborough Industrial Development Corporation with reference to the land needed for the sewer lagoons. PIDC granted an option to the Town for an option payment of \$1,000 for the following:

> Approximately 43 acres of land plus one other acre for the sewer pumping station site, a permanent right of way into the lagoon site and a sewage easement from the bridge at North Peterborough to the lagoon site.

The balance of the cost to the Town at this coming Town Meeting to acquire the land easement and right of way will be \$5,000.

The Board of Selectmen during the month of October filed the Town's application for the \$70,000 interest free loan from the Federal Government and since that time word has been received that delays in granting these loans are now running between twelve and eighteen months.

The Sewerage Study Committee, although granted an appropriation of \$3,000 to make its study of rights and other costs, has not used any of this appropriation due to the fact that no work can be done until final plans are available and these are contingent upon the Town's paying the consulting engineers to develop these plans.

Committee Recommendations

The Sewerage Study Committee has inserted articles in this year's town warrant which the committee feels will speed up the work needed to be done to implement construction of the town sewer system.

1. The committee is asking the Town to appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to acquire the land easement and right of way needed for the lagoon from PIDC. The total cost of this land is \$6,000 and \$1,000 has already been paid for the option which is applicable to the total cost.

2. The Committee is asking the Town to appropriate \$1,000 to take an option on the remaining 18 acres of land needed at the lagoon site.

3. The Committee is asking the Town to re-appropriate the \$3,000 which the Committee may have need of during 1967 to begin its study of the methods of financing and administration of the sewer system. This, of course, is contingent upon receiving final plans during this time.

4. The Committee is asking the Town to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$70,000 to pay for final plans of the system.

The Committee feels that because of the delay in receiving the interest free loan from the Federal Government that in the long run the Town, by borrowing the money itself and not relying upon the Federal Government, will save substantial sums of money in final construction costs.

REPORT OF WATER RATE STUDY COMMITTEE

Since the 1966 Town Meeting your Committee has met in semi-regular sessions discussing the Rules and Regulations of the Water Department. Some changes are hereby recommended as a result of these discussions.

Specific consideration of Water Rates was impossible until actual cost of the expansion became known and financial results for 1966 operations were complete. Several attempts were made to consult with the Water Department accountant but weather conditions were persistently unfavorable. Ultimately a meeting was planned and executed.

As a result of this meeting there was general agreement and your committee recommends the following changes in the water rates:

(a) That the 75% increase voted at the 1966 Town Meeting be allowed to expire on March 31, 1967.

(b) That, effective April 1, 1967, Section VII of the Rules and Regulations of the Water Department be revised to read as follows.

SECTION VII

A. All water users not now metered, to be metered as soon as possible.

B. To read all meters and render all water bills on a quarterly basis.

C. For any commercial users, until metered, the rate to be determined by the Selectmen or Water Commissioners.

METERED RATES

1. The minimum quarterly rate for all water services shall be \$6.40 with 1000 cu. ft. of water or less allowed. In cases where the meter reading shows a greater amount of water consumed than is allowed under the minimum charge, the following schedule of QUARTERLY rates shall be charged in proportion to the water used, as shown by said meter:

The first 1000 cu. ft. or less - \$6.40 minimum Next 1500 cu. ft. @ 56¢ per 100 cu. ft. Next 2500 cu. ft. @ 40¢ per 100 cu. ft. Next 25,000 cu. ft. @ 24¢ per 100 cu. ft. All above 30,000 cu. ft. @ 16¢ per 100 cu. ft.

2. (a) All non-metered houses - \$8.00 per quarter until metered.

(b) Where more than one family house – \$4.00 per quarter, per family extra.

(c) All stand pipes, sill cocks and water outlets that do not pass through meter - \$8.00 per quarter, until removed by owner.

- 3. Direct Charges to the Town:
 - (a) Community Hospital, \$200.00 per quarter.
 - (b) Hydrants (town owned) \$25.00 per quarter.
- 4. Public Buildings and grounds:
 - (a) School District, \$200.00 per quarter.
 - (b) Town House, \$32.00 per quarter.
 - (c) Fire Station, \$16.00 per quarter.
 - (d) Library, \$8.00 per quarter.
 - (e) Town Garage, \$16.00 per quarter.
 - (f) Cemeteries, \$20.00 per quarter.
 - (g) Swimming Pool, \$120.00 per quarter.
 - (h) Adams Playground, \$8.00 per quarter.
 - (i) Putnam Park, \$8.00 per quarter.

(j) The above schedule of prices to be a direct charge against the appropriations for the various divisions of the town's operations and to be included in making up the various budgets.

5. Construction Work — For water furnished for construction work where, in the opinion of the Superintendent of the Water Department, it is not practical to install a meter, a minimum charge of 20.00 will be made for the water used.

Your Committee agreed that the following changes in the Rules and Regulations of the Water Department are desirable for clarification and they are hereby recommended.

(1) Section X part B Cost of New Service-be changed to read as follows:

B - Cost of New Service.

1. The Water Department or its agents will, except as hereinafter provided, furnish and install the service line from the water main to the property line and provide a curb cock or gate valve.

a. A payment of \$100.00 to cover the cost of the installation, will be required for each such service before the work is started.

b. A subdivision developer may furnish and lay the service line at his own expense, subject to Water Department approval, in which case no payment will be required. 2. The service line from the curb to the meter shall be at the expense of the property owner subject to Water Department approval.

3. The Water Department shall be responsible for the repair of the part of the service pipe which is within the limits of the street.

4. In no case will a water main be tapped more than once to the same lot unless all the expense is borne by the property owner.

(2) Section XI – Meters – the first sentence of part A be deleted and the following new sentences substituted:

The Peterborough Water Department will furnish and install all meters up to one inch (1") in size, including an outside meter-reading device for a flat charge of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00).

And that the second sentence of part B be deleted so that part B shall read as follows:

B. If any premise requires a meter larger than one inch (1") diameter, it must be furnished and set by the property owner, and kept in repair by him.

(3) Part E of Section XI be changed to read as follows:

E. Meter Testing – The Water Department may test all meters at least once every five (5) years at Department expense.

1. Consumer may request a meter test at any time in writing, accompanied by a deposit of 5.00 for a meter one inch (1") or less in diameter. For meters larger than one inch (1") an additional charge of 2.50 per inch shall be required.

Present sections 1 and 2 be renumbered as 2 and 3.

(4) Present Section XIV – Main Line Extensions – be deleted and the following section substituted.

Section XIV – Main Line Extensions.

Extension of water mains will be made upon petition of prospective customers; provided such prospective customers are located on already accepted roads, subject to the following conditions:

A. Each shall be known as a "guaranteed extension" and the owners of the properties supplied with water therefrom shall be required to pay for the water at the regular metered rates.

B. The size of the water main shall be determined by the Water Department, giving weight to the conditions surrounding the extension, including the possibility of future expansion. The cost to the petitioners shall be based on six (6) inch main line installation. C. Each petitioner shall pay, in addition to the regular water rates, a quarterly investment charge. The charge shall be computed at $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ per quarter on the petitioners share of the total cost of the project. The charge will be billed from the completion date of the extension for a period of up to twenty (20) years, or until the investment has been recovered.

D. The investment charge guarantee will be assumed on an equal basis by the extension customers served by such extension unless otherwise mutually agreed. The length of the guarantee period may be changed by the Water Department.

E. The Water Department may refuse to make an extension under the terms set forth above if such extension does not appear to be in the best interests of the Town.

The revised rates as recommended are calculated to assure the continued solvency of the Water Department. Other changes in the Rules and Regulations are designed to clarify areas over which there has been much confusion and heated debate.

The section covering Main Line Extensions is a compromise among differing views — all of which deserve some consideration. It is an area which we believe should be further studied in depth, particularly in view of the prospect of a Town Sewer System.

Your Committee appreciates the assistance of the Selectmen, Water Department advisers and Budget Committee observer. The concluding sessions of your committee were saddened by the absence of the late Martin Keenan. His wise and conscientious counsel were most helpful to us.

We had the cooperation of the American Guernsey Cattle Club in obtaining tabulations of the use experience of two of the three Water Districts. It is our recommendation that all of the customers of the Water Department be properly tabulated. Such tabulation should include name, meter identification and provision for a record of water usage. The Water Department would then be able to analyze its operations more effectively. Furthermore, such action would simplify billing and bookkeeping for the department. It is our understanding that there is available time on data processing equipment presently installed in our community.

REPORT OF THE TOWN GOVERNMENT MODERNIZATION AND IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE

AUTHORIZATION

At the 1966 Peterborough Town Meeting, the Board of Selectmen offered the following motion:

"MOVED: That the Moderator be authorized to appoint a committee of seven, one of whom shall be a Selectman, to study the modernization and improvement of all phases of town government, including the town's auditing and accounting system; this committee to elect a chairman from its members, and bring in a report and recommendations at the next annual Town Meeting."

This motion was passed and the Moderator named the following committee: John Clements, Selectman, Charlotte S. Derby, Harlan E. Karr, Norman H. Makechnie, Kenneth M. McPartland, A. Edward Rowse, and Frederick P. Smith.

TOWN ADMINISTRATION

Your committee began its study fully cognizant of the historical importance of the New England **Town Meeting-Selectmen** form of government. It has served the citizens well over 300 years, and there is sufficient reason to expect that it will continue to function in substantially the same form for many decades to come.

Nothing which the committee recommends or suggests should be interpreted to mean that we advocate any lessening of the authority and responsibility of the Selectmen. In fact, the contrary is true. Those portions of our report which refer particularly to the work of the Selectmen have as their purpose the strengthening and clarifying of the lines of authority, furnishing assistance in routine duties, and freeing the Selectmen to function as administrators of town affairs and as coordinators of plans for the future.

There have been changes within our towns which cannot go unnoticed, and for which compensations must be made. Population has increased, services have been added, and community living has become infinitely more complex.

When new laws relating to towns have been passed, and when new services, programs or codes hav_e brought their accompanying regulations, it has been the custom to phrase the law, "The Selectmen shall . . . " for the reason that they have the ultimate responsibility for supervision of both the implementation and the compliance.

However, there has to be a practical limit to the time and attention which Selectmen can give to their work, especially when they have their own business obligations. It is doubtful, too, that there is any valid basis for assuming that the Selectmen must attend personally to every detail of the multitude of activities for which they have supervisory responsibilities. If there has been any such assumption in the past, it cannot be true now, and certainly it will be out of the question in the future.

To help alleviate the pressure of the Selectmen's work load,

WE RECOMMEND – that they be empowered to appoint a head of all the town's public works (highways, water, sewer, etc.) – a man qualified to administer, under their direction, all the details of maintenance, as that term is generally understood, and as more fully described in, but not limited to, Ch. 245:6 and 245:7 RSA. His job description should include also such items as maintenance of equipment; checking, for the Selectmen, on compliance with subdivision regulations; and overseeing the physical details of town projects.

We further recommend that the Selectmen take appropriate steps to make an orderly change from the **election** of a Highway Agent to the **appointment** of the above-described official, and that the Selectmen be free to negotiate the salary to be paid to a man with the training and experience necessary for such a responsibility.

WE RECOMMEND – that the Selectmen appoint assistant assessors to assist them with the time-consuming details of assessing. They have the authority to do this, but the Selectmen themselves must bear the full responsibility for the final assessments made on property.

WE RECOMMEND — that, for their own protection and to provide a public record, the Selectmen have a clerk at their meetings to aid them in keeping complete and permanent minutes.

In other areas where the Selectmen have general supervisory responsibilities,

WE RECOMMEND — that the Selectmen appoint a legal counsel to aid the Police Department in the preparation of its court cases.

WE RECOMMEND – that the Selectmen actively support, through our representatives and senator, House Bill #180, "An act to remove the control of the Public Utilities Commission over the accounts and records of municipal lighting and water systems."

WE RECOMMEND — that the Selectmen continue their efforts to modernize the town bookkeeping system, and urge them to seek the assistance of persons experienced in modern methods of accounting to aid them in this task.

WE RECOMMEND — that the Selectmen take steps to establish centralized purchasing for the departments under their jurisdiction, and to develop a system of inventory control.

WE RECOMMEND — that the Selectmen take steps to arrange for an equipment rental account through which each town service shall be charged with its full share of the us_e of town machines and their operators, and out of which maintenance costs may be met.

PLANNING FOR ORDERLY GROWTH

It seems certain that the growth the town has experienced in the past few years will continue, and appropriate plans must be made now if the growth is to be orderly.

To the Planning Board, and to all elective officers – such as the Selectmen and the Budget Committee – who have the responsibility for coordinated work in planning,

WE RECOMMEND — that the subdivision ordinance be clarified especially with regard to its enforcement procedures.

WE RECOMMEND — that a building code be developed, and steps taken to institute plumbing and wiring codes for the protection of our citizens, and that effective means be developed for supervising compliance.

WE RECOMMEND — that at least the first steps be taken to provide an aerial tax map.

WE RECOMMEND – that consideration be given to the need for a Master Plan as described in Ch. 36:13-15 RSA.

WE RECOMMEND - that the Planning Board arrange immediately for the numbering of all lots on accepted streets to aid the fire, police and water departments and all others who need to know the location of persons or property.

A QUESTION AND ITS ANSWER

During our study, one question has come up repeatedly — Which town officials should be elected and which should be appointed?

Although lengthy answers might be given to this important question, we feel it is useful to record here the very simple answer given at one of our meetings by David Mann, Executive Director of the New Hampshire Municipal Association.

"ELECT POLICY OFFICIALS AND APPOINT ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICERS."

CONCLUSION

Our committee regrets that available time has not permitted us to study in detail many areas of local government. If the committee is continued for another year we shall endeavor to complete the task.

D. REPORT OF DISTRICT CLERK RECORD OF THE PROCEEDINGS:

1.

At a meeting of the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Peterborough, N. H., qualified to vote in District affairs, holden at the Peterborough Consolidated School on Wednesday, the 2nd day of March, 1966 at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

The Moderator, Maurice M. Blodgett, called the meeting to order, and proceeded with the business as follows:

Under the School District Warrant:

Art. 1: Motion presented by Mrs. Clement, Chairman of the School Board—Moved: That the salaries of the District Officers for the ensuing year be as follows: Each School Board member \$50.00; Treasurer, \$75.00; Clerk, \$10.00; Moderator, \$10.00. Motion passed.

Art. 2: Motion 1. Moved: That the reports be accepted as printed and placed on file with the Clerk. Motion 2—Moved: That the Hampson Report be accepted and carried out as soon as possible. These motions passed.

Art. 3: Moved: That the District petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting. Passed.

At this point it was voted to consider Art. 7, and under this article the following motion was presented by the School Board and explained by Mark Wheeler. Moved: That the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,328.00 to meet the expenses of the area-Co-operative School District Planning Committee. Motion Passed.

Art. 4: Presented by the Chairman, Mrs. Clement, and various items in the budget explained by her. The motion: Moved: That the School District raise and appropriate \$595,-941.91 for the support of Schools, for the payment of salaries for School District Officials and agents and for payment of the statutory obligations of the District. An amendment to the motion was presented by Mr. Alluisi of the Budget Committees as follows: Moved: That the School Budget be reduced by \$8,000. This reduction to be accomplished by the elimination of the request for an assistant principal. Messrs. Karr, Ray, Broyles of the Budget Committee spoke in favor of the amendment, as in their opinion an assistant principal was not necessary at this time. Speaking against the amendment was Mrs. Clement and Supt. of Schools Dr. Kelly. A rising vote was taken-The Moderator appointed Robert Dart and George Eastman as tellers, and the vote showed 44 in favor of the amendment and 66 against. So the amendment was lost. A vote was taken on the original motion and it was passed.

Art. 5: The following motion was presented by the Schoolboard. Moved: That the School Board be authorized to make application for and accept on behalf of the District, any or all grants forthcoming under Title III, V, or VIII, or any combination thereof, of the National Defense Education Act. Public Law 85-864 or any or all grants of other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act. This motion passed.

Art. 6: Motion presented by Mr. Wheeler of the School Board. Moved: That the School Board be authorized to place any unanticipated income received from tuition during 1965-66 into the General Fund. Motion passed.

Art. 8: Motion presented by Stanley Peters of the School Board. Moved: That the School Board be authorized to include a contingency fund item in the regular School Budget and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. for this purpose. Motion passed.

Art. 9: Motion presented by the School Board. Moved: That the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,125.00 to erect a chain link fence on the Summer Street side of the athletic field. Motion passed.

Art. 10: was laid on the table.

Mr. Kenneth Whiton presented Mrs. Margaret Clement with a certificate in appreciation for 12 years of dedicated service as a member of the School Board. A rising vote of thanks was also given Mrs. Clement as she is retiring this year. A motion presented by Mr. Yeo representing the teaching staff to do away with publishing teachers' salaries was passed.

At the election of School District officials held on March 8th the following officers were elected:

B. SCHOOL PROGRAM

ELEMENTARY—GRADES 1-6

The teaching staff in the elementary grades has changed very little during the past year. However, we have been fortunate enough to add some very capable members to our staff. Mrs. Linda Dwyer came to us in September to teach an additional section of grade one. Mrs. Linda Oja has replaced Mrs. Hammond in grade four. Mrs. Johanna Kennett has filled the void created when Mrs. Deschenes retired. Mrs. Kennett is teaching grade three.

Once again we have the opportunity to do something that gives us a great deal of pleasure as well as causes us a good measure of sadness. At the end of the 1965-66 school year Mrs. Mae Deschenes decided to retire from the teaching profession. Each time a teacher retires we always feel happy that the teacher can get a well deserved rest but also we feel sad that a dedicated person will no longer be with us to help in our very crucial endeavors. Mrs. Deschenes was a very special teacher, and even more important, is a completely honest and wonderful human being. We miss you Mrs. Deschenes, and we hope your retirement brings you as much pleasure and profit as you have given your students and fellow faculty members.

Our sixth grade students attended Sargent Camp this fall. The program presented this year was truly an outstanding one. The experiences enjoyed by the students have done much to motivate the pupils to continue studies started at Sargent Camp.

Ability grouping in math has been initiated in grade three this year. The program has moved along very well and seems to have achieved the advantages we hoped it would. The teacher is able to use her teaching time to better advantage and more individual attention is given.

Parent-Teacher conferences have been continued in grade one at the end of the first marking period. This method of reporting has been very satisfactory because it brings the home and school much closer together. Teachers have an opportunity to discuss problems and report the success of individual pupils. We would like to thank the parents who took the time to visit with us to discuss their child's progress.

During the past year Mrs. Morris and Mrs. Tobey participated in a union-wide science curriculum study group. This group reviewed all of the latest materials available in relation to the objectives of our science program. After a very comprehensive study the D. C. Heath program was chosen as the one that most nearly filled our needs. This group was under the direction of Mr. Donald Carle, the Assistant Superintendent.

The Monadnock Council for Retarded Children very generously has subsidized a program which has enabled the administration to put a helping teacher in the special class. The addition of this position has made it possible to offer a much more suitable program to children of widely scattered ability and chronological ages. Mrs. Paul Salamy accepted this position and has been doing a very fine job.

GRADES-7 TO 12

When the Study Committee released its report a few years ago the committee indicated that the school personnel would have to face many problems in regard to space facilities until probably the year 1969. This committee predicted correctly the space utilization. Despite this handicap, we feel that progress has been made in some areas, that new adjustments have produced good results, and that both students and faculty members are making the best out of a necessary situation.

NEW TRENDS AT P.C.S.

The new rotating schedule adopted this year seems to be operating very well. It must be remembered, however, that any schedule has some drawbacks that affect some teachers and some pupils. We have tried to reduce these problems to a minimum.

The addition of the new fence on the play area and the new additional play area on the Larrabee property are really appreciated by the administration and teachers.

Mr. Snell, the new Curriculum Coordinator, has contributed much to the total operation of the school administration. He has been instrumental in bringing in new ideas, new techniques, and new approaches to help our teachers. Progress already has been made in coordinating the junior high and senior high curriculum.

Our athletic program has taken on a new life with the acquisition of new coaches in the varied sports program. The school Track and Field team and the Cross-country team, under the able direction of Coach Yeo brought state championships to PCS.

For the first time to any magnitude, we found it necessary to have some of our teachers handle classes both in the senior and junior high school. This situation presents problems because teachers in the senior high school prefer teaching grades 9-12 because of their college training which is primarily geared to this range of students.

During the Summer, the custodians divided one of the class rooms on the top floor of the high school, painted the corridors, painted the rest rooms, and prepared the Larrabee property for the Special Class.

NEEDS AT P.C.S.

One will be able to spot some needs as this report con-

tinues by departments. However, the greatest need at the present time seems to be in the Cafeteria. This area is used to feed between 500 and 600 students each day and is also used for study halls during the school day. We feel, as indicated in the past, that some means can be found to reduce the noise. Some sort of insulation on the brick walls and lowering of the ceiling could be an answer to this problem.

SELF-CONTAINED JUNIOR HIGH CLASSES

As our program progresses through its fifth year under the direction of Mrs. Gagnon and Mrs. Fontaine we find ample evidence in our ex-pupils who are now high school students that we have made considerable success in relation to our long range goals.

Many students have found the more individualized program a definite help in overcoming academic, psychological, or physical problems. Close cooperation between the school and the parents has also contributed to our success.

That this is a national situation is evidenced by the increasing amount of individualized material offered by publishing companies. We are happy to say that this material has greatly aided our teaching each student as an individual.

As the eighth grade prepares to choose its high school courses, it has been a great reassurance to many students that this type of personal attention will be available to them throughout their school years.

SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL SELF CONTAINED CLASSES

Classes for high school slow learners and/or potential dropouts, started during 1964, now include grades 9, 10, and 11, and will also take over grade 12 during the coming school year. Class work, in all areas of academic studies for these pupils, is based on standards which are attainable as well as functional, and assure each youngster of a considerable measure of success.

A program of "Work Experience," or part time "on the job training," which was recommended one year ago, was initiated this year for pupils in grade 11 from this group. This program is functioning remarkably well and plans are now underway to include both grades 11 and 12 during the year 1967-68. The "Work Experience" program, designed to give the pupils the opportunity to learn a skill or trade on released school time, is now being followed by eight members of the class with training in garage work, hospital housekeeping, sales, construction, electrical installation, and cabinet making. An academic course in "On the Job Training" is also being provided for these pupils in an attempt to give them a better understanding and knowledge of the world of work.

The cooperation of local business men and organizations, in their willingness to assist in making this program a success, has been most gratifying. The guidance and training, which they have given these boys and girls, plus the reports and suggestions which they have made to the school and to the teacher in charge, Mr. Faunce, have been of tremendous help.

GROWTH IN LATIN ENROLLMENT

The growing interest in Latin, evident in educational reports throughout the nation, is reflected in increased enrollment and in extra-curricular activity in P.C.S.

The advantages of Latin study in preparing for courses in medicine, law, mathematics, nursing, teaching, and in English itself are apparently felt by parents and students.

Last years unusually heavy enrollment required two divisions of first-year Latin. Pre-registration figures for next year indicate that, for the first time in recent history, both firstyear and second-year Latin will be needed. (At least 25 have registered for Latin II, and 29 have registered for Latin I with entering freshmen from surrounding towns not yet included.) It is hoped by Mrs. Sawyer that third-year Latin may eventually be added.

Enthusiastic student interest in extra-curricular work in Latin culture and ideas is shown in the formation this year of a Latin Club with forty members. The Club has been given official recognition as a chapter of the American Classical League, and is making plans to send delegates to regional, state, and perhaps national conventions of the Junior Classical League.

THE SHOP PROGRAM

This year the Shop Program has felt the benefit of the new schedule which seems to fill our needs a great deal better than the old one. The longer classes provide a larger and more convenient instructional unit permitting adequate lecture and demonstration by the instructor followed by a much more meaningful application period for the student. The fact that classes arrive at different times each day is also very beneficial from an educational standpoint. As much or more material has been covered because of the efficient schedule; we are, in addition, constantly trying to expand our curriculum.

With regard to curriculum and expansion, it would seem at the moment that portions of our program may be curtailed or even eliminated due to space limitations caused by annexation of the shop area. We will know next year at this time how much our offerings may be affected as a result of encroachment by the academic section.

THE ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

As is true with other departments this year, the English Department is experiencing the problems of inadequate classroom space as well as the lack of facilities for carrying out the total program, particularly in the area of audio-visual aids.

Realizing that many of the present problems which confront us are, hopefully, of a temporary nature, we are endeavoring to maintain the standards of instruction which resulted in the recent revision of the English curriculum.

Because of the increasing enrollment, our English teachers are responsible for more classes and pupils than last year. This, of course, reduces the effectiveness of the English program.

From an over-all point of view, however, the department is functioning well. We are endeavoring to adjust our curriculum to the various levels of ability represented within the student body. We hopefully trust that the day will not be far distant when we shall have the classroom space and other facilities that today's education requires.

LIBRARY

The high school library is in the process of gradual growth to meet the ever increasing reference needs of the students. Many new books have been added during the past year, the selections being made by the high school librarian in cooperation with department heads. At the present time the total number of volumes is approaching 4,000. Fifty current periodicals and five newspapers are available for use during the school year. Past issues of magazines are on file for reference.

Book additions have been made possible by high school library budget fund, the federal ESEA Title II grant, and by local gifts of books, magazines and money for which the school is most grateful.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

With the addition of two new teachers in this department the aim has been to reach every boy and girl and get them to achieve some degree of success in some activity. This poses a problem as students are hetrogeneously placed in classes and often range in ability from low motor skill levels to talented athletes. By offering a variety of individual and team sports each pupil should find an area they enjoy.

The new schedule, with hour long classes, is especially beneficial to the physical education where changing of clothing is necessary. Actual activity time is nearly doubled. The field space behind the school has been increased and the outdoor program will grow accordingly.

MATHEMATICS

The "stretching" of all available space has presented problems in all areas of instruction. Here are some which have shown up in the math department.

Last year three high school teachers conducted 15 classes a day in math. This year the high school math instruction has been compressed into 13 periods a day in order to allow one of the high school teachers to teach two junior high math classes. The result of this is that one of the high school teachers has classes with an enrollment of nearly 40 pupils. Another disadvantage of the "stretch" program lies in the fact that the four math teachers are so widely separated in their teaching stations that communication and sharing of library and laboratory materials are difficult. One of the teachers is scheduled for any room which happens to be available, necessitating carrying materials with him wherever he goes. Mathematics is no longer a pencil and paper subject; it involves models, charts and apparatus for demonstration.

To this extent then we are cramped for space and elbow room. We look forward to a new school plant where these difficulties can be remedied. In the meantime we must hopefully make do with the present situation. The Advanced Placement Program continues. Some of the students from this program are in colleges where they have been able to take more advanced courses because of the high school program. There are also PCS students doing well in college, who were not in the Advanced Placement Program.

The course in Plane Geometry is being scheduled for Sophomores instead of for Juniors as it has been for several years. The complete change may take more than one year because of schedule accommodations.

The 7th and 8th program is so well geared to the high school math program that the Advanced Placement Program gets a very good start from the beginning with no time wasted in teaching attitudes and preliminary vocabularies.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

This year the Science Department introduced the new **Introductory Physical Science** course. This course takes the place of the general science and physical science courses that have been offered in the past.

The Introductory Physical Science course is a one year course suited for either the terminal student or the student who plans to go on with his schooling.

The course tries to answer the question, "What is matter"? To do this the student starts on the first day of classes to examine matter by taking wood apart or in better terms by the fractional distillation of wood. This experiment brings out many new questions that will need to be answered before the student can answer, what matter is.

The course then progresses via experiment (approximately 70% of class time is laboratory time) to develop a reasonable explanation of what can be observed in the matter around us, arriving finally at an atomic model of matter. This model of matter allows the student to explain his observations of matter.

The course ends with the kinetic picture of heat, heat being a phenomena that can be easily related to molecular motion.

The great number of experiments that are performed creates much student interest. This contrasts with the usual apathy shown in general science courses where an attempt is made to cover everything from Astronomy to Zoology with the result that a little bit is said about everything often repeating what the student had in the seventh and eighth grades.

The course is an excellent preparation for chemistry and physics. It has been successful here and will be offered again next year.

READING DEPARTMENT

The Remedial Reading Program includes 42 Elementary and 6 High School students. The children are recommended by their classroom teachers and the High School guidance director. After testing, studying the guidance folders and teacher conferences, eight groups were scheduled for 30 minute periods four times a week. A ninth group of fifth graders meets only three times a week. Due to the rotating schedule in the High School, these students only receive one period per week.

The Reading Program is Preventive Teaching of Reading so that problems which arise in the primary grades may be checked before they become complicated and a child meets failure. Our program includes Grades 2-6 for the first semester and Grades 1-4 for the second semester.

There are many students in the High School and the Junior High who would profit from help in reading instruction but one teacher can not possibly handle them and the Elementary Program. It is recommended that a full time Reading Teacher or Consultant be added to the teaching staff at Peterborough. This person could organize reading classes, conduct in-service training classes with the faculty, secure materials to be used at various levels of instruction in the content areas and perform many other useful services.

With someone of this type many academic failures could be prevented.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT

JUNIOR HIGH GENERAL MUSIC

The Eighth grade meets once each week for the first semester followed by the Seventh grade the second semester. This year a greater emphasis is being placed on the listening lesson. Through the study of the history of the various instruments of the orchestra, their appreciation of music and their ability to listen has greatly increased. From the results thus far, I am encouraged to believe the Jr. High students are successfully building the foundations for cultural attitudes which will remain with them throughout their lives.

I hope that, in the not too distant future, we may add a High-School music appreciation course. ELEMENTARY INSTRUMENTAL PROGRAM

Forty-five members of the fourth and fifth grades are enrolled in our class instrument program. All of the advanced students from the fifth and sixth grades are furthering their instrumental training by participating in the elementary band program which meets once each week. A number of our elementary children are participating in the class piano program this year. I feel that we are very fortunate in having Mrs. Mac-Naught to teach this course.

JR. HIGH CHORUS

The new Jr. High chorus, with sixty members, meets once each week on a rotating schedule. The chorus has performed at assemblies and for the Peterborough Woman's Club.

JR. HIGH BAND

The Jr. High band has thirty-five members and meets for twenty-minutes each day. I must say that in all of my teaching experience I have never seen a group of young people so eager to learn as these.

SR. HIGH CHORUS

The Sr. High Chorus has a membership of fifty-five students and like the Jr. High Band meets twenty minutes each day during lunch time. To date they have appeared in a concert for the Woman's Club and presented a very fine Winter Concert in February.

All of the chorus members are extremely proud of one of their members, Bonnie MacMulkin, who was invited to perform in the New Hampshire All-State Chorus.

SR. HIGH BAND

The regular forty-five members of our "Highlander" Band have been progressing most satisfactorily. The band has performed at many school functions and will appear in the coming Winter Concert.

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Peterborough School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1965 and June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$46,386.08 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—

Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$15,408.07, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$13,451.36, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,956.71. Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1966, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Statement of School Lunch Account: (Exhibit F)

A statement of the School Lunch Account for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit F.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Peterborough is presented in Exhibit G. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1966, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1965-66 School Tax of \$400,183.23

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit H.)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1966, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

PART VI. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

A. HEALTH, 1966

"In my view, one standout duty of this great institutional parent (the school) is to raise children

....who have knowledge of health

....and who act intelligently on that knowledge

....and who therefore grow to a full and promising manhood and womanhood from a firm foundation of good health."*

The School Health Services are only one of the aids the school offers to help Peterborough children reach the objective set forth in the above quotation from SOMETHING ELSE THAT JOHNNY DOESN'T KNOW, by Hollis S. Ingraham M.D., Commissioner, New York State Board of Health. The classroom teacher is the most influential person in the school as he/she, concomitantly with other subjects, teaches Health. Helping her to motivate the child to use his growing knowledge are administrators, counselors, specialists is speech and reading, and the school physician and nurse.

Presented here are some of the efforts made this past year toward good health for the children of the Peterborough Consolidated School.

HEALTH APPRAISALS

The policy of the past four years has been continued. Children in grades one, four, seven, ten and twelve were ex-

amined by the school physician. Also examined were new students, all athletes, those referred by their teachers, and those in need of special followup. Health problems found to exist were made known to the parents with a recommendation for examination by their family physician.

TESTING PROGRAMS

Vision Screening—Each child is tested by way of the Telebinocular Vision Tester yearly, or oftener if a teacher or parent so requests. Professional vision examinations for several children were made possible through the generosity of the Lions Club.

Hearing Screening—Twenty three children were found to have varying degrees of hearing loss when tested on an air conduction audiometer. All but one are under the care of ear specialists.

Tuberculin Testing—Dr. Mahlon Mason gave Heaf Tuberculin Tests to four hundred sixty two children and seventeen staff members in April. Tuberculosis is certainly on the decrease. However, it has not yet been eradicated and a high percentage of new cases occur in persons under twenty five.

With the aid of these easily administered and painless tests it is possible to find the source of possible future tuberculosis cases. If a child reacts positively to the test it means that he has had tuberculosis at some time in his life. It does not necessarily mean that the germs have damaged his body, but it certainly does mean that he should be referred to his family physician for examinations and chest x-ray. It is also important that close associates should be examined.

Materials and equipment for the Tuberculin Testing program were supplied, without cost to the school, by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis and Health Association.

Chest X-ray Clinic—On May 4th the portable chest x-ray equipment from the New Hampshire Tuberculosis and Health Association was at the school for two hours. Sixty five people were x-ray'd at a cost of \$1.00 each. Included were the children who had reacted to the tuberculin test and their families. Also, staff members and a few townspeople were x-ray'd. No active cases of tuberculosis were discovered.

IMMUNIZATION CLINICS

There were no immunizations offered this year. Influenza Vaccine was given at cost to staff members who wished to have it.

DENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM

Our dental health program is a fine example of cooperation between school, community and state. One half of the six hundred dollars available for dental care for pupils is provided by the Peterborough Parent-Teachers' Association. This is matched by the Division of Dental Public Health, Department of Health and Welfare, and Dr. Robert Duhaime and Dr. Robert Johnson provide the professional services.

Eligibility for dental care is on the basis of financial need. Priority is given to the younger children in an effort to preserve the newly erupting permanent teeth, and to teach the need for good dental hygiene at home.

During "Dental Health Week" teachers taught dental health units, using film strips and other materials provided by a tooth paste manufacturer.

HEALTH EDUCATION

Five classroom periods were devoted to ALCOHOL AND TOBACCO in each of the four grave VII groups. The State Department of Health and Welfare, Commission on Alcoholism, provided a teaching unit, films and other materials on a loan basis.

Mr. Desmond O'Hara, Executive Director, New Hampshire Tuberculosis and Health Association, was the speaker at an assembly for grades seven through twelve, when the subject was "Smoking and Its Effect on Health." The film, POINT OF VIEW was shown and discussed.

Classes were held for Grade VIII students. Subject: Growing Up.

A class in "Personal Hygiene" was held for girls in grades V and VI.

Several classes were held for the Senior Family Living group at the invitation of Mrs. Faunce.

HOME VISITS

Probably the point at which the program was weakest this year was in the area of home visiting. This is regrettable, since often a friendly talk with a parent in her own home is the best way to enable her to reach a conclusion about seeking help for her child's health problem. Because of busy days within the school and the fact that many mothers are out of the home during the daytime, only sixty five home visits were made this year.

HEALTH COUNSELING

Health Counseling is very important in the school health program. It is on-going this year and every year. It is helping teachers to adjust the curriculum for the boy with a health problem. It is talking with teachers about children with emotional problems. It is keeping in close communication with guidance counselors and administrators.

It is being there when a confused first grader needs a respite from the classroom. It is being a "listening post" for the teenager or just perhaps providing her with a place to cry. It is answering the questions about themselves. "Will I ever grow, or am I always going to be a runt?"

It is knowing the health resources of the area and being able to help a worried mother get help for her crippled son. It is talking with a social worker in the community about how the school can best help one of our children.

MISCELLANEOUS

Dr. Mahlon Mason, who has served as School Physician for the past several years resigned in June and has been succeeded by Dr. Peter Jeffries.

Your School Nurse has been privileged to participate in several community endeavors this year:

Served on Evaluation Committee at Kennett High School Assisted at Red Cross Bloodmobile drawings

Assisted at pre-school measlse vaccine clinic

Served as Chairman of Education Committee, N. H. School-Nurse-Teacher Association

Served on Nursing Program Committee for N. H., Tuberculosis and Health Association Golden Jubilee Celebration Year.

Many individuals and groups in this area have been most helpful in making our program possible. We wish to offer them our sincere thanks.
