WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg, in the County of Coos, in the said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Pittsburg on Tuesday the 9th. day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget, and raise the money for same.
2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to distribute blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for the same.
5. To see if the Town will vote to elect a committee to set a date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
6. To see what action the Town will take in regard to skating rinks, and raise money for the same.
7. To see what amount of money the Town will raise for a new water line from the Town Hall to the Willie Judd house.
8. To see if the Town will vote to accept and extend, the Stewart Young Road, so called, to his new residence, the road to be 20 feet wide, and 650 feet long, and raise \$650 for the construction thereof.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$900, for the contribution to the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital Association.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$3,000 (\$1,000 for each district) for gravel resurfacing.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to re-surface and tar the Back Lake Beach Road, a distance of 1.3 miles.
12. To see if the Town will vote to require a Road Agent to be with his crew, while they are working.
13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to having 1 Road Agent for the three districts, to be effective a year from this meeting.
14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of the three covered bridges
15. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under article 16.
16. To bring your ballots for the election of one Selectman for three years, one Road Agent for the Lake district, one Road Agent for the middle district, one Road Agent for the lower district, a Town Clerk, Treasurer, three auditors, one overseer of Welfare, one Library Trustee, and one Trustee of Trust Funds.
17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Polls shall be opened at 10 a.m. and not to be closed before 6 p.m.

**PROGRAM OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION
ASSOCIATION FOR 1964**

The White Mountains Region Association this year has published and distributed 136,000 promotional folders and cooperated with the five other Region Associations in publishing 400,000 copies of the New Hampshire Accommodations Booklet.

We received a total of 7,500 individual inquiries about the Region which were answered with a package of folders and with personal letters. Because we are closely associated with the State of New Hampshire promotional effort, we receive in our office inquiries which are generated by the State. The Region Association's address is listed on one and one-half million individual pieces of literature published by the State.

In addition to maintaining an active and effective mailing office, the Association has encouraged and promoted many important developmental projects for the region. Such projects include Northern Ventures, a venture capital corporation to assist people who have ideas for industry; Temple Monorail System at Twin Mountain; the Kilkenny project in Lancaster; Mt. Agassiz Development in Bethlehem and Big Bear Ski area at Bartlett.

Through our Industrial Council we have changed the emphasis of industrial development of the State of New Hampshire so that it includes the northern three counties and also encourage a "do it yourself" attitude with industrial development groups.

Last year we assisted in promoting an appropriation of \$65,000 for the construction of the Whitefield Regional Airport and went on record opposing the Livermore Falls Dam in the Pemigewasset Valley.

Presently we are planning to establish an active Historical Sites Committee who will encourage the development of major historical sites in the region, an asset which we have which has not been developed to its full potential.

The work of the Association is continually hampered by a lack of adequate funds. In order to do the work necessary to raise our economy, the full support of all towns in the region is needed.

Superintendent's Report

To The School Board and the Citizens of the School District
of Pittsburg

FOREWORD

Present indications are that more time will be given to education in legislative halls during the current session at both national and state levels than at any other time in the history of our country. Without question, the unprecedented tremendous volume of lip-service given to education by laymen as well as by professionals in the last decade has had much to do in bringing this about.

What is going to be interesting to watch now, will be the educational developments during the next ten years. As is so very well known, for an extended period of time much has been heard about what should be taught, how it should be taught and the necessity of a relatively large unit if it is to be done at all effectively. It has long since been discovered, also, that to convert most of the theories advanced into action that it invariably results in one thing. It costs more money. Hence the legislator is appealed to for help. For, by and large he is not consulted relative to subject matter content or the most effective way to get it across to the pupil. Generally speaking, he is approached only after it is realized that additional funds will have to be forthcoming if the desired objectives are to be reached.

Of perhaps even greater significance than the educational developments during the next decade, will be the outcomes achieved as a result of what is done. Possibly, more conclusive evidence will be available then to substantiate the broadly accepted belief at the present time, that with the organization into larger units and the spending of more money a superior education follows. It is suspected though that it may still be difficult to really determine this point. For, as has been true since our schools were first instituted a long time ago, it is not so much what is taught or how it is taught as it is what the learner does with it after he gets it.

Teachers

Two new teachers have been employed this year. Floyd E. Burrill, who is a graduate of the University of Maine at Orono, Maine, and who has had previous teaching experience in that

state, teaches English and French. Miss Ellen V. Johnson, a graduate of Keene State College, teaches Home Economics and General Science.

The teachers returning to work with Grades 7-12 with respective subjects taught are: Principal Stephen E. Dehl, Mathematics, Science, Athletics; Joanna T. Manning, Social Studies, Shorthand; Raymond P. Stuart Sr., Shop; Katherine B. von-Dohrman, Commerce; and Brian L. Dent, English, Social Studies. Teachers returning to work with in the first six grades with respective grades taught are Alma B. Chappell, Grades 1-2; Doris J. Chappell, Grades 5-6; and Rosalie F. Hawes, Grades 3-4. Louis E. Micucci, employed on a part-time basis, teaches music at all grade levels.

School Nurse — Health

As has been cited again and again the importance of the work done by the school nurse in maintaining overall good health contributes very materially to the effectiveness of the academic work done and to a happy and successful life of the pupils in our schools. The comprehensive program conducted includes clinics, immunizations, physical examinations, frequent check-ups on height, weight, hearing, and eyesight, and continuous supervision of general health.

As much as these services contribute to what is accomplished healthwise in our schools, however, one of the utmost vital importance - dental care - still urgently needs to be included. A dental clinic conducted once or twice a week throughout the entire school year is most urgently needed if there is to be any semblance to what is done in this area in most schools up and down the state.

Enrollment and Attendance

The enrollment in the high school is the largest that it has been in a long time, and in the elementary grades it is the largest in the past three years. For purposes of comparison the number of pupils enrolled in Grades 9-12 and 1-8 for the past three years beginning with the current year shows successive counts of 67 and 106, 47 and 102, and 39 and 101. Of the present number enrolled in the high school, 9 are from Clarksville. The average percentage of attendance for the past year was 95.86 in Grades 1-8 and 97.22 in Grades 9-12 while the total number of tardinesses for the same groups was 17 and 1. The continuance now over a period of a number of years of comparably good attendance and tardiness records merits commendation.

Notes On The Budget

As will be noted the School Board's Budget for 1965-66 of \$110,078.00 is appreciably larger than the \$100,355.00 budget plus the additional \$1,800.00 raised under a special article in the warrant to make a total of \$102,155.00 for the current year. This amount is reduced by an estimated revenue of \$12,000.00 which leave \$98,078.00 to be raised by taxes by the town in comparison to the estimated \$93,885.00 for this year. Examination of the budget breakdown found on subsequent pages in this report will show that, for the most part, provision for increases in salaries, and the employment of an additional teacher explains the increase in the budget.

Grounds - Building - Equipment

Thanks to the work done in adding loam, leveling, and seeding down the previous year, outside of filling in some low places in the driveway with gravel, work done on the grounds during the last summer was confined to the customary maintenance.

The external appearance of the building has been improved noticeably by giving all the wood surfaces, windows and doors, a much needed coat of new paint. The attractiveness of the classrooms was enhanced, too, by the painting of the window sash and casings on the inside. Additional interior decorating included the painting of the walls in the 5th and 6th Grade room, and the stair treads and rails in the stairwalls. Name plates, also, containing the teacher's name placed over the door to each classroom adds a personal touch to the overall fine interior appearance of the building.

Additional shelves have been installed in the library to provide needed greater space for the continuously expanding book collection, and shelves and cupboards have been built in the science laboratory to provide needed space for the storage of new pieces of apparatus and materials.

A considerable amount of equipment has been purchased during the past year for use in the Science Department including a spectroscope, microscope, and aquarium, plus several charts, collections, kits, film strips, and numerous small pieces. Items purchased for other departments included a tape recorder for English and French; typewriters for Commerce; acetylene welder and electric furnace for Shop, sets of dishes and miscellaneous cooking utensils for Home Economics; and gymnasium mats and lockers for Athletics.

Miscellaneous

Although only in its second year of use, the value of the high school library in the overall educational effort of the school is

already apparent. The new experience of having ready reference material at hand has encouraged both teachers and pupils to take advantage of its availability. Its demonstrated great worth to the high school grades, within a comparatively short period of time, bespeaks consideration being given to the employment of our librarian on a full time basis, purchasing books at the different grade levels, and extending the advantages to the elementary grades.

Of great value to the overall life of the school also, are the experiences gained through taking part in the different extra-class and extra-curricular activities. It is through such experiences, many times, that interest is aroused and potentialities are developed which otherwise would never take place.

Of the several program conducted year in and year out in our school, without question there is none that contributes more to the building of good morale, mainenance of good health, and to study physical development than the School Lunch Program. Much credit for the success of this vitally important activity is due the operator, Mrs. Helen A. Foote.

CONCLUSION

May I again express my deep appreciation to the members of the School Board, parents, teachers, and citizens for all the assistance and cooperation received in our working together during the past several years in a joint effort to provide and maintain high standards in our schools.
