To the Citizens of Rye:

We wish to thank Mr. Hartford of the Portsmouth Herald for the Life Boats that were given to Wallis Sands Beach and Jenness Beach. These are a great addition to the Beach areas. We thank the Rye Beach Operators for their excellent help during the year. We are going to miss them very much.

The Department has had a very busy year and it looks as if our work is steadily on the increase. Our ambulance calls almost doubled this year. Several of the Doctors used the ambulance to take people to the Hospital when they were able to go in their own cars. This was originally set up for use in emergency cases but now we are asked to take all sick people to the hospital. We must have another man with the Ambulance on every call in case we have a stretcher case.

Again our parking was our biggest trouble during the weekends in the summer months. We are setting up a parking ordinance with the Selectmen and Commissioners of the three precincts and this will be in the Warrant for the next meeting.

As our population increases our Police requirements increase and the citizens have more complaints. We need another officer on duty at night to give the citizens the necessary protection that they are entitled to. I have enough work to keep me busy during the day and it is very hard to give you the proper coverage alone. During the summer months we need another officer to cover the beach area and assist the life guards

at the several beaches. These guards are all alone on these beaches and when they have troubles they have to call the cruiser to assist them. On the Beaches where there are mostly private homes the traveling public take over the Beaches and the owners have no place to use for themselves. Beer parties seem to be the most of our troubles in front of the cottages.

Civil Defense

I was appointed your Civil Defense director in the middle of the year upon the resignation of Director Abbot B. Drake and the activity of the department has been small. We had a meeting with the Rye Junior Women's Club and they are very anxious to help the Department. The Department could use an Assistant

Director who has a lot of time to devote to the organization of the Department.

We also would like to organize an auxiliary Police Department to assist the Fire and Police Departments in time of an emergency. Through the State Civil Defense Department we were allotted matching funds for our Fire and Police Radio systems. We also will receive two portable radios, one for the Fire Department band and one Police Department band. These will be very handy in a bad fire or people who are lost in the wooded areas, also any emergency on our seacoast.

Our air raid warnings will now come through the Fire Station at Rye Center and when the new Alarm System is installed our mobile siren system will be revised so that the warning will come by the Fire Department air horn.

After several delays the fire department was finally able to occupy the new building. We now have three paid men to cover the twenty-four hours.

The Volunteer firemen and men on duty have done a great deal of work inside the building and would be very pleased for the townspeople to inspect the building at any time.

Permits for outdoor fires can be secured at the firehouse and all oil burner installation permits must be secured before any installation is made.

Our field day of 1955 made it possible for the Volunteers to purchase enough tables and chairs to seat 100 persons. This equipment has been used by several organizations in the town. We wish to thank the

Auxiliary for donating dishes and silverware to serve 100 persons, also curtains and shades for the windows and to thank Samuel Adams for donating a billiard table.

I believe it is time to start thinking of replacing some of our equipment. Our newest truck is ten years old, and equipment that was sufficient for the town ten years ago, is not so today. Things are so crowded that the ability of the men is greatly impaired. Perhaps the best way to bring this in view is by this method: Most of us somewhere in our homes have a drawer with a little of everything in it, all of which is essential to the home. Try finding one particular item in this drawer of many things — especially in the dark.

Our new alarm system is not as yet complete. We hope to add a little each year until the town is covered.

We wish to thank everybody for the support we have received and if at town meeting our budget seems high, talk with your fire ward and I believe you will find it actually low.

Health Officer's Report

A few communicable diseases occurred during the year but none in epidemic form.

During the year a total of three cases of poliomyelitis were reported in Rye while the total number of cases reported in the State up to December 1, 1955 were 235.

A few cases of chickenpox and scarlet fever have occurred this fall but the cases have not been reported to the local health officer.

The State law requires that all the following diseases be reported to the local health officer and isolation enforced:

Chickenpox, diphtheria, German measles, measles, meningitis, mumps, poliomyelitis, scarlet fever including streptococcal (septic) sore throat, smallpox, and whooping cough.

Of these only diphtheria, poliomyelitis, scarlet fever (septic sore throat) and smallpox require strict quarantine of children (15 years and under) who are contacts.

Librarian's Report

1955 has been a busy year at the Rye Library. Circulation of books in general increased to a new high of 19,143. The circulation of children's books has shown a slight decrease, due, perhaps, to the increased use of Bookmobile books and to the addition of many supplementary reading books at the school. 2,197 books, a record for one month, were circulated during August. It is during July and August that many summer visitors avail themselves of the privilege of using our library and it is always most gratifying to hear their favorable comments.

661 new books have been added during the year and we continue to take advantage of the services offered by the State Library Bookmobile and borrow from sixty to seventy books on each of its regular visits. Our magazines are much appreciated and circulate widely. The reference books available are used to good advantage, especially by Junior High and High School students.

Again this year I have been most grateful for the valuable assistance of Miss Marjorie Chapman, especially during the busy summer months and during my hospitalization and illness this fall.

The story hour on Wednesday afternoons during

the winter months is a source of pleasure for all the five and eight year olds who attend. This is ably conducted by Mrs. Earl Walker and we welcome all children in this age group to share it with us.

been placed under a large portrait of Miss Rand in the Reading Room.

We greatly appreciate the interest shown by so many persons and organizations and hope that we will continue to merit that interest.

School Board Report

Your School Board respectfully submits the following report:

First we wish to thank the members of Rye Bethany Church for their kindness in allowing us to use the two Primary rooms in their new Parish House. The use of these rooms allowed us to move the two first grades there, thus making room for our rapidly expanding upper grades.

There were a number of changes in the teaching staff this year. Mr. Irving W. Reade comes to us with several years of experience in teaching Mathematics. Mrs. Lillian Carney, also an experienced teacher, replaced Miss Joyce Spinney, and Mrs. Anne Kirk La-Mothe replaced Mrs. Cleo Neary in the two fourth grades. Two second and two first grades were formed and Mrs. Frances M. Paul was hired to teach one of the first grades. Due to the increased enrollment and the demand for a School Band it was necessary to employ a full-time teacher for combined music and art instruction. Mrs. Rena E. Lovett is the able teacher in this department. We hope from this beginning we will be able to develop a School Band.

We have had asphalt tile installed on the second floor classrooms and the Principal's office in the old part of the School House. This has aided greatly in maintaining a cleaner building.

Two new sewing machines replaced the very old and much used ones in the Home Economics Department this year.

We wish to express our appreciation for all the gifts that have been donated to the School and to the pupils by citizens and the various civic groups in the Town. These included the Every Other Tuesday Club graduation gifts, and the several projects sponsored by the P. T. A.

We also wish to thank Mrs. Emery and all those who helped her for continuing our outstanding Hot Lunch Program again this year. The program has expanded with the increased enrollment. With the two first grades in the Parish House a new method of service was started. The hot lunch is prepared in the present school and transported to the Parish House where it is served on individual travs to the children in the class room. This has proved to be a rapid and acceptable method of serving, with surprisingly little spilled food. A similar method is proposed to be used in the New School Building. The food will be transported to the class rooms by push carts and served on individual trays, thus saving the expense of cafeteria tables and chairs, and leaving the multi-purpose room free for class activities.

At the School District meeting on March 5, 1955, it was voted to authorize the School Board to issue bonds of the District not to exceed \$225,000 to build a new one story Elementary School House. It was left to the discretion of the School Board to select an Advisory Committee to work with the Board in selecting a location for the new school. Many hours were spent in interviewing land owners before deciding upon a ten acre field, owned by Elmer Trefethen, located near Lang's Corner.

We would like to thank the following members of the Committee who served so faithfully and gave so much of their time: Richard Lord, Harold Tucker, Charles Gordon, Patricia Jenness, Estelle Reardon, John LaSeur, Delwyn Philbrick, Philip Drake, G. Wellington Moulton, and John Goggin, Principal of the School.

The Board interviewed several architects and studied

many building plans before selecting the Alfred T. Granger Associates of Hanover, N. H. Plans for the new building have been drawn and are now in the hands of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Washington awaiting their approval before making a decision whether or not Rye qualifies for Federal Aid for School Construction.

Legal difficulties which arose over the issuing of bonds, due to Legislative changes to the Municipal Finance Act have been straightened out after a public hearing which was held on December 22, 1955 by a Committee headed by the State Tax Commissioner.

We anticipate that work will begin in the Spring as soon as weather permits, and that a beautiful new modern school building will be ready for occupancy in the fall.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools TO THE RYE SCHOOL BOARD:

I herewith submit to you my 26th report as Superintendent of your schools. The current year began on Wednesday, September 7, 1955 with an initial enrollment of 387. As of November 1, 1955 we have a total enrollment of 397. The increase of 147 pupils since the construction of the addition to our building caused the District to face a serious situation. Because of this condition, articles were placed in the School Warrant of 1955 "to see if the School District will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars, (\$225,000) or such part thereof as the School Board shall find to be necessary, to enable them to finance the building program as authorized

under Articles 11, 12, and 13 of the warrant." This article was passed, a building committee appointed and architects and contractors consulted. A meeting was held with the Committee of Investigation at the Rye Town Hall on December 22, 1955. This Committee is reporting favorably to the Governor and Council. With this report, and the consent of the Governor and Council, we can proceed as expeditiously as possible with the construction of the new building.

The new school is planned to house grades one through six in fourteen class rooms, together with adequate services. An activity room of sufficient size for the elementary grades is provided. Equipment and space for a school lunch program are planned. We are expecting to establish a library and provide for remedial reading service. The entire project will be patterned to children of these grades. Such construction leads to a happy school where each item speaks to the child in terms of his individual well being.

The present program for our Junior High School is now under handicaps which must be corrected if we are to continue the adequate education to which Rye is accustomed. Provision must be made for Home Economics Work which is now held in the Cafeteria. There is no room for Science instruction save in a corner of the basement. Good library space is considered a necessity for a modern school. Our seventh grade, with an enrollment of 46, must be divided. The two divisions of grade one must be moved from their present quarters in the Church vestry to the school building.

The present Rye School can furnish the needed improvements for grades seven and eight. If it should be considered best, the ninth grade could also be housed in this building. With such a plan, Rye would adopt the 6-3-3 plan which is followed in Portsmouth. Our pupils would then enter the new Portsmouth High

School at the same time as their local pupils and would have had comparable courses and services.

Rye is a pleasant town in which to live. It naturally attracts people to its borders. Increased school enrollment would have been inevitable. However, the Portsmouth Jet Bomber Base has placed an added burden on the district. Federal funds do take care of an appreciable amount of the cost for educating children whose parents work at this base and the Portsmouth Navy Yard. During the past completed school year, the district received \$18,026.45 from this source. Application has been made for such aid during the present school year and is now being processed by the federal authorities.

As further help in the construction of the new school, application has been filed with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for construction aid. Such aid is dependent upon the department and upon Congress and is not certain. However, towns similarly situated have received funds.

I was pleased that the Rye district decided to adopt the Rinehart Handwriting System. The results speak for themselves. I believe the parents are pleased with the results secured. I know the teachers and pupils feel definite improvement in this department.

Because of increased enrollments it became necessary to employ two additional teachers. The result has been felt in relieving crowded conditions in two departments. By this much, the work of our school has been strengthened. Under the leadership of our Principal, good work is being accomplished under difficult conditions. With the construction of our new school, the learning situation will be correspondingly improved.

The Parent Teacher group has proved itself a worthy ally of the school. Ever ready to support means of improving the effectiveness of our program, it can be counted on to aid any worthwhile project. Of particular value is the service of its members to the School Lunch Program. Without this help it would be very difficult to furnish the outstanding meals which Rye offers to its children.

Rye has a firm basic curriculum. It guards well the physical health of its pupils. An efficient school nurse, a physical education program somewhat limited by overcrowded conditions, but sound in practice, as well as the careful supervision of each teacher on the staff, guards our children during school hours. The daily lunch is a physical and mental health measure. Fundamental subjects are coordinated between divisions and among the grades. A pupil's progress is graduated by even and consistent steps.

Careful testing of atypical children has resulted in a more individualized approach to fundamentals. As a further help to these children I am again recommending the employment of a remedial teacher. Such a teacher would be of help to pupils which may be having difficulty with a particular subject. Under special care and with careful analysis many children have been able to rectify their difficulties. Pupils absent for an appreciable length of time may, in this way, "catch up" with the class. The result of this service upon the pupils affected, is a great improvement on their morale and their whole attitude toward their education. It means a special teacher but the results for the pupils are immeasurable.

You, as a Board, have faced many difficult problems during the past year. Your thought has always been the welfare of the children of Rye. The teachers, without exception have been faithful to their pupils' welfare. As these conditions are true, our school must be a success.

The Hot Lunch Program of the Rye School opened the 3rd of October with 285 children taking lunches, which includes 30 first graders that we feed at the church. In the 18 days of school, that month, we fed 5,391 children and 158 adults.

The cost of meals is the same as last year, \$1.00 and \$1.25 per week.

The lunch program handled over \$11,000. this past year.

Report of the School Nurse

As school nurse, I have worked in the Rye Center School one day each school week from January thru June, and then two days a week since September.

All children were weighed and measured and inspected in general throughout the year.

Eye examinations were given all the pupils. The telebinocular eye testing machine was used on pupils from the fifth thru the eighth grades. Four were found to have defective vision and have already received medical attention. Parental co-operation is excellent.

The Maico Audiometer, hearing testing machine, is also being used at the school.

Doctor James Sanders, school physician gave a thorough physical examination to the pupils in the two second and two sixth grades. All the boys participating in sports were examined and parents were notified of any dejects.

Seventy-seven pupils were given two innoculations of the Salk vaccine at the spring and fall clinics.

A spring round-up clinic was held at the school in June and thirty-four preschool children and parents attended. This was very gratifying.

Classroom visits are made weekly and home visits made as necessary.
