To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their annual report for the year ending December 31, 1921, together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Jailer, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician and Auditors for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1921.

Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam are still in charge of the County Farm and House of Correction. They have served the County well and faithfully, during their long term of service.

We wish to acknowledge our appreciation to the Superintendent and Matron of the Almshouse, and all other employees engaged in taking care of the inmates, and those employed on the farm, for their cordial cooperation at all times.

The farm known as the Judkins Place, consisting of about three hundred (300) acres has been rented by the County for twelve years. Feeling that it might be for the interest of the County to own the same and being supported by the County Convention, we purchased this farm in March 1921.

The Overseers and Selectmen, in the several towns, have rendered valuable assistance in looking after the needs of the poor.

Superintendent's Report

Of Sullivan County Farm and House of Correction

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners for the County of Sullivan:

The general conditions of the Institution are in nearly a normal state. A large part of our inmates are of advanced age and affected as such. Every necessity and such comforts as the means at our disposal would allow, we have tried to furnish.

To the House of Correction, both male and female have been committed, all of whom have been employed as their conditions would permit.

The crops this year have been very good, with the exception of the hay. There has been added a cement floor in the basement of the new cow barn.

Our livestock consists of horses, hogs and hens, also 76 head of cattle, which have stood the subcutaneous test by Dr. D. J. Smith; also the Federal test by Dr. Leonard Haubrick, both pronouncing them free from any trace of tuberculosis. Am taking this way of notifying all concerned.

To the W. C. T. U., and all organizations who have remembered our inmates so bountifully with gifts of toys, fruits and candy, we extend our thanks in behalf of the inmates.

To the officers of the Institution, who have faithfully performed their duties and to whom a share of the success belongs, it is our pleasure to extend our thanks.

To the Messrs Commissioners we extend our heartfelt thanks for the considerate courtesy and assistance which we have received in helping us to perform the duties at the farm; also to our County Physician, Dr. Emery M. Fitch, and our Chaplain, Rev. Harold M. Frye, we gratefully acknowledge their assistance.
