## FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee held eight meetings, and welcomed many new members. Every article involving a proposed appropriation was reviewed and proponents of petitioned articles and representatives of organizations were given the opportunity to present reasons for their requests and were questioned by members of the Committee on any point needing clarification. After all requests were discussed, the Committee voted on all the articles. The results of these votes are recorded with the article.

The following gives a brief explanantion of the Committee's negative split on certain articles:

Article –6 - Health Department

Hospitals

The Committee felt this appropriation was being requested by two area hospitals involved as a bail-out for services rendered for individuals who were unable to pay, not necessarily Tamworth residents.

Article -21 -Tamworth Fire Department

Forest Fires and Related Equipment

The Committee would like to recommend that this money be used exclusively for Forest Fires and / or Forest Fire Equipment only; and not allow the Tamworth Fire Department to use any part of this for equipment for their Department.

Article -23 -Tamworth Fire Department Dump Fires Only

The Fire Chief expressed that the Fire Department was going to show the Dump Personnel and Highway Department the proper use of the necessary equipment needed in case of a fire; therefore, we felt this was an unnecessary request.

Article -28-Lakes Region Planning Commission membership/dues.

The Committee felt a request such as this, should come from our own Tamworth Planning Board and not from the Lakes Region Planning Commission.

Article -30- Tamworth Support of Little League

Due to many reasons for this appropriation, the Finance Committee felt this should be discussed openly at Town Meeting.

Article -31- Tamworth Outing Club

The Committee felt this should be discussed at Town Meeting due to many factors involved.

Article -37- Center of Hope, Inc.

Five of the seven members felt due to the loss in tax revenue from the building that is currently being erected in Chocorua, that this appropriation could easily be consumed by the Corporation itself with no hardship.

Article –40- Carroll County Mental Health Services

The Committee was unsure as to exactly what this appropriation would do for Tamworth residents; two of the seven felt this was for Administrative purposes and not for client defrayment as clients are still charged for any services rendered.

Article –45- Memorial Hospital

Whereas this request was so much greater than the other two, we felt compelled to vote in the same manner.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL FINANCE COMMITTEE

On August 28, 1984, the School Finance Committee met for the first time with the School Board, school principal, and the business administrator for an organizational session. At this meeting and the following, we examined the 1984-85 budget.

At the next three meetings the committee examined the proposed budget for 1985-86 by line item. At our final meeting on January 16, the Finance Committee invited the teachers and staff to express their concerns with the new budget. After hearing their opinions, the Finance Committee give their final input on the budget.

The Finance Committee feels that the Tamworth School Board showed a great amount of determination in trying to keep the budget down through State Energy Grants; solicitation of gifts, labor and materials, particularly in the area of the library; and also through line cuts wherever possible. We commend their cooperation in working with the Finance Committee and in hearing our recommendations.

The Fire Department held 12 regular monthly drills and participated in 2 mutual aid drills in 1984. Walter Upson, Jed Pike and David Bowles completed the Certified Firefighter Level 1 Course and passed the exam.

Tamworth is still having its share of chimney fires. The main cause is not keeping the chimney clean. Almost anyone can check their own chimney by using a mirror inserted in the cleanout or thimble on a bright day or by using a bright light. If you think your chimney is not structurally sound, have a qualified mason inspect it.

We would like to ask everyone that takes their wood ashes to the Town dump to please not dump them into the garbage pit because they are quite often hot enough to start fires. Please ask the caretaker where to dump them.

As last year, the Fire Department is need of some dedicated firefighters and if you are interested, see a firefighter for an application.

### REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Person kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

### TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION

### Report for 1984

TRAILS. In April a trail link-up was made from the Commission's Black Spruce Bog trail to the White Lake State Park trail through the Pitch Pine National Natural Landmark area. This was done in cooperation with the State Division of Parks, and Office of State Planning. The latter has published an attractive brochure of the Pitch Pine area and link-up which is available at both libraries, Laundromat, Inn and Hamels as well as at the State Park. The Commission's own trail brochure is also available at these locations. The link-up trail is marked with white paint to differentiate it from the orange marking on the Black Spruce Bog Trail.

Other conservation commission trails have been brushed out. And on Jackman South trail a weatherproffed map has been posted, showing natural features of the area. Tamworth Pre-School, which received a federal grant for work around Jackman Pond, had the map made.

DREDGE AND FILL. The Commission has checked on and reported to the State Wetlands Board two dredge and fill applications, both for culverts - on Route 25 and on the road leading to the Tamworth Sand & Gravel pit. Both permits were approved by the Board.

Investigation was made of possible dredge and fill violation near Deer Hill Road and it was reported to the Wetlands Board that application should have been made for a permit.

TAMWORTH PLANNING BOARD has asked for advisory input from the Conservation Commission on major projects. Commission members have made three field trips at the request of the Planning Board: to Sterling Associates planned subdivision on Deer Hill Road and to two proposed gravel operations - on Pine Grounds Road and on Bryant Road.

LAND. A boundary dispute has arisen as to a small, open field adjacent to the Bearcamp River in Whittier donated to the Commission by Charles Thompson, a part of the field being claimed by the abutter to the east of the tract. The Commission has engaged a surveyor to check records and attempt to find the correct location of the boundary.

PRIME WETLANDS. Work has been completed with a full report and maps to describe and locate prime wetlands, in order that they may be given additional protection. Commission members are studying these to plan further action.

MEETINGS. Two Commission members attended the annual meeting of the N.H. Association of Conservation Commissions, one member attended the Municipal Association's Seminar on Natural Resource Protection held in Concord, and one an informal meeting with state highway, legislative and town officials on plans for rebuilding Mill Brook and Swift River bridges on Route 113.

NEW COMMISSION MEMBERS. In April the Selectmen appoint two new members - Harold Cook and Randall Hayford. The Commission held interviews with all who wished to apply, and reported to the Selectmen. In August the Selectmen appointed Dana Steele to fill out the term of Earle Wason who had resigned. The Commission is most grateful for the years of service given by the retiring members - Red Perkins (a founding member), Ralph Weymouth and Earle Wason.

OTHER ACTIVITIES. The Commission has joined with Tamworth-Sandwich Garden Club in sponsoring a Tamworth student at the Forestry Society's Conservation Camp, as it has done for some years.

Two reference booklets have been purchased - "Preparing for Groundwater Protection and Planning" published by Water Resources Research Center of University of New Hampshire, and the Forestry Society's revised edition of Forest Laws of New Hampshire.

### MEETINGS, CONFERENCES AND WORKSHOPS

Monthly meetings of the Carroll County Community Health Professionals, which are held at the Carroll County Home and Health Care Services. At these meetings, various health care professionals share information about services and programs. Patient care plans are discussed and inservices provided.

Two meetiings with Debra Peasely, R.N. Moultonboro visiting nurse, for peer review and record review.

May 7th and 8th - Conference on Pain - Assessment and intervention in nursing practice. Maro McCaffrey, R.N., M.S., F.A.A.N., a noted clinician, spoke on the assessment of pain, the use of drugs for pain and non-invasive measures for pain control such as message, relaxation and distraction techniques.

May 22nd, - both June Donovan and I attended a conference on Facing Death. Robert Gass, Psychologist, assisted us in an exploration of our feelings and beliefs about death. This conference basically helped us to understand our own views on death which then would enable us to better help the person who is dying.

Lifeline Screening Committee Meetings in which one Tamworth resident was chosen to receive the lifeline unit. This unit is similar to the medi-alert. The patient has a medalion which they wear. In case of emergency they press a button and a signal is transmitted through the telephone wires to a computer in Concord. Help is then called. The lifeline units were given to the Carroll County Home and Health Care Agency by Community Action Program.

Attended workshop on Exercise for the Elderly in North Conway. This workshop was held by the Visiting Nurse Service of Northern Carroll County and sponsored by Mrs. D. Hope, PHD.

### **COMMUNITY PROJECTS:**

Meals on Wheels is now in its sixth year. During 1984 there were between 7 and 8 clients receiving this service. The meals are prepared by the Ossipee Concerned Citizens, Inc. and delivered by their volunteers to White Mountain Subaru. They are picked up by our volunteers and delivered to the Tamworth people. Once again, a sincere thank you to Charlotte Remick, Coordinator and all of our great volunteers.

In May, a monthly blood pressure clinic began. This clinic is held on the last Wednesday of every month during the lunch hour from 12:00 P.M. to 1:00 P.M. Several people have been attending on a regular basis but I would like to see more people taking advantage of this free blood pressure check.

The dental program continued in 1984. With this program 27 children received dental care at Dr. Michael Glick's office in Ossipee.

At Thanksgiving there were three baskets delivered. Many thanks to the Women of St. Andrews Church who did a beautiful job in preparing them.

Santa, Albert Ecker, and his helper delivered gifts and food to 64 individuals and 5 families on December 19th. This was only possible due to the generosity and caring of the townspeople. The deliveries were made during the first big snowstorm of the year which was apappropriate. Many warm thanks to all of you who helped, also the Kenneth Brett Student Council, St. Andrews Food Pantry which is supported by churches in the area, the Lions Club and the Tamworth Community Guild.

During this past year through the Community Action Program and a matching grant, we received five infant/toddler car seats to loan.

I would like to extend a sincere thank you to June Donovan our very valuable secretary. To Connie Curtin, R.N. and Michele Downes, R.N. who covered the service while I was on maternity leave from July 18th to October 15th, please accept my gratitude and thanks.

### **ANIMAL CONTROL 1984**

In response to 73 Animal Complaint Calls in 1984 I impounded 30 dogs and travelled 1137 miles. Three dogs were euthanized and six dogs were accepted for placement at the New Hampshire Humane Society.

Four problems involving violations of the dog ordinances required court procedures.

On Saturday April 14, 1984 a Rabies Clinic was held at the Tamworth Town Hall. Tevis Kraft DVM officiated and Barry Wade again voluntered his time to help with the paper work. A Rabies Clinic will be held in the early spring of 1985. WBNC and the Carroll County Independent will advise the exact date and time.

Dogs running at large continue to be a problem. It is not necessary for the person complaining about a dog to be named to the owner of the dog, but it is impossible for me to carry through with further complaints needing court action without the cooperation of the complainant.

I continue to enjoy serving you in the capacity of Animal Control Officer and again my thanks to the Carroll County Sheriff's Office, Troop E, the Tamworth Selectmen, Chief Watson and Ruth Beckwith for their help in facilitating my efforts to do the best job possible.

### **COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY**

Tamworth N.H.

In 1984 patrons made 6.126 visits (a new high) to the library to borrow 8,464 books, magazines, records, tapes, etc. We purchased or were given 582 books. We received through the state 211 books on Inter-Library loan at the request of individual patrons. We borrowed children's films from the state for 98 showings for Day Care & the Summer Story Hour and we offer this service to any community group. Other services to the public include Large Print books & magazines and Talking Books for the visually handicapped.

Cook Memorial Library may be used for meetings (97 times last year by 17 groups) by local organizations by making reservations with Trustee Bernard Ulitz. The Library serves as the storage center for the town movie projector (\$1.00 maintenance fee), speakers and screen as well as cassette players and oral history cassette tapes. Tapes and players may be borrowed by patrons and the projector may be reserved by town groups. Our new video disc service was a success last year (27 flims viewed by 518 people) and we continue to show—as a community service—the best of moview on Wednesdays at 2:00 and 7:15 from November through May.

We miss the presence of Ruth Flaccus at the library. She was a faithful library volunteer, lover of books, dispenser of wonderful advice and a good friend. We thank you for donations made in Ruth's memory as well as those made in the memory of other good neighbors and friends—Connie Hughes, Merle Dunn, Jenny Watson, Joseph Wiener and Mary Carroll Purvis. Books were purchased and inscribed in their names—a lasting memorial.

My thanks to volunteers Bertha Eastwick, Elizabeth Spicer, Martha Sylvia, Sally Zink, Isabel Hoag and to Brett School volunteer Jenny Brothers for their help to me each week. The Tamworth Garden Club has again beautified our window boxes for each season. We are grateful to friends and patrons for gifts of paperbacks, books, magazines, newspapers, financial donations and memorials. Any material we cannot use is placed in our annual book sale.

In early March we opened the library a couple of days for the 6th, 7th and 8th grades of Brett School to acquaint the students with their local public library and with the proper use of the card catalog for researching reference material to complete a science project. In the spring we changed the stock of paperbacks at Remick Acres for a fresh supply. Under the leadership of Pat Kyprides, the Chocorua Library and Cook Memorial Library sponsored 3 programs under the N. H. Council of Humanities—N.H. Citizen Legislature-Fact or Fiction in June at Chocorua, People of the Dawn-N.H. Indians in July at Cook and The Notch Through the Ages in August at Chocorua. The two libraries also sponsored under Kay Hanson's direction reading and discussion programs on New England Women and Men which were held in October and November at Chocorua.

The Friends of the Library meets on the 4th Tuesday of each month (except in the winter) at the libraRY AT 1:30 and new members are always welcome. Christmas decorations inside and out were again set up by the Friends. They also sponsored the Summer Story Hour for children which was ably directed by Louise Wrobleski and Sally Vittum. The Friends have been raising funds all year for the purchase of a copier for the library. They have ordered it and expect it to arrive at the end of January. Many thanks to all who helped.

The Library Board meets on the 2nd Monday of each month at 4:00 at the library and the public is always welcome. Please note that either Chocorua Library or Cook Memorial Library is open part of every day of the week except Friday:

The Tamworth Recreation Committee accepted with regret Dom's resignation on July 1st effective September 1. We wish to thank him for his creativity in bringing in new recreation programs.

The Committee secretary, Kay Hansen, advertised the position job description in local and state newspapers. We had 17 respond of which we invited 10 to be interviewed. Of these six candidates were interested in being interviewed. The screening committee submitted the applications of al candidates and scoring sheets on those interviewed to the Selectmen. The scores were based on: Experience & education 40%, personality and initiative 20%, job knowledge 25%, confidence 10% and appearance 50%, including comments from the interviewing committee.

The Selectmen appointed Bill Wrobleski for his qualifications, the fact he is married and established in the community and for his plans for family recreation.

The philosophy of the town recreation committee is to provide recreation for all ages and for the community needs. The impact of the number of working families and single parents necessitates the need for family recreation to release some of the pressures and stresses that go along with these changes of society.

The recreation dept. also wants to work with other existing recreation groups so that we do not duplicate of interfere with their programs or volunteers but remain open to augumenting new programs.

During the year, the town recreation accounts changed from the recreation dept. to being kept by the Town Clerk, with a separate line item for these accounts. The teen account remains with the recreation director as signee.

There is a town policy regarding the use of the town house which is available from Bill Wrobleski where you schedule events. Basically there is a fee for non profit groups, a portion of which is returned if building is left in good condition.

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The advisory board decided on a policy of rotating its members with an option of renewal of one term. We encourage your interest and participation and being on the board. Monthly meetings are advertised in the CC Independent. Copies of our monthly meetings are on file at the selectmens office.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT By Dr. Francis M. Murphy THINGS ARE LOOKING UP

This has been a banner year for education, both here in SAU #9 and in the nation. The concern for college board scores that have declined steadily for 20 years, was eased a bit when nationally the scores improved this year. Nationally, the improvement was by two points. Here in Kennett High, our scores went up by 54 points.

I do not believe college board scores are the best way to evaluate school quality, nor am I sure that this change in the scores in Kennett is a permanent, nonreversible event, but the news is heartening. The New Hampshire state average scores continued to be the highest in the nation; and for the first time in many years, we beat the New Hampshire average scores. I am very proud of the students, parents, and teachers that caused this improvement.

This year, we instituted for the first time in several years a comprehensive testing system for our elementary schools. This testing battery measures Aptitude (mental capacity) and Achievement (how much the student has learned).

Using this system, we had hoped not only to measure whether we were above or below national norms, but how well our students do compared to what they are capable of doing. We found some problems at some grades in some subjects. Generally, we will have to work harder in the areas of number facts, capitalization, punctuation, and spelling. However, even in these areas, the tests revealed that by the time the students arrived in the seventh grade, when considered as a group, they were not only above the national averages, but their performance in actual academic subjects had exceeded what could be predicted based on their ability.

The complete program of studies was redone this year at the high school. In addition, the high school English curriculum is being revised as is the 7-12 Science curriculum and the K-12 computer curriculum. We are convinced that this effort will lead to a better program for all students at all four levels of study at the high school. We have reintroduced the seven period requirement in science for students in the college entrance and advanced level. We have made the offerings in the three junior highs the same in science, so that the students from Bartlett and Tamworth will be able to compete with the Kennett students at every level of challenge. We have increased the number of 400 level (advanced) courses in science from one per year to five. We have added an advanced topics in science course and several courses for the non-college bound.

In English, we have begun a three year phase out of most of our elective programs. The eventual course structure in English will have all ninth graders start with a course involving a major emphasis on writing, grammar, and vocabulary. The tenth graders will study British literature, the eleventh graders will study American literature while they are taking American History, and the twelfth grade will focus on world literature. At every grade, these courses will be offered at all four levels of difficulty, and there still will be a few electives.

We will be increasing the graduation requirements in social studies from two to three years. Every student will take courses in citizenship/economics and American History. There will be electives in geography, psychology and sociology/anthropology. In the foreign languages, we have added an advanced course in conversational French.

The Vocational Education Department is combining its two wood programs. It is adding a second computer class, as well as making the first course a requirement for all students. In Home Economics, we are adding a course in commercial cooking. We will also be trying out a course in horticulture in our vocational agriculture program to see if we can encourage students to enroll in it. The business program will substantially increase its offerings next year.

We are adding a requirement in health education and a course requirement in art or music. We have revised the art and music programs substantially. Both departments are pleased with the changes. The physical education requirement has been increased from ¼ credit to one full credit. Accordingly, we have focused our efforts on one full year course for all freshmen 5 days per week.

Students will be able, in the new program, to get pluses and minuses, and not just straight letter grades. Students in the advanced programs will be allowed to take supplementary courses in art, music and the vocational program, without hurting their standing in the class. The remainder of the program of studies will be relatively unaffected.

These changes will bring us into compliance with the new State standards and, with the possible exception of meeting the arts requirement, may be accomplished without adding a single new staff member. I am very proud of the department chairmen and the high school staff for their success in assembling this new program of studies.

The year has been a good one on a number of other fronts as well. Nearly all of our athletic teams are doing as well or better than they have in recent years. Debbie Ayers was named New Hampshire Art Educator of the Year. We will be hosting the first New Hampshire State Scholastic Art Competition for students in grades 6-12. We are hosting the All State Band Competition. Our teachers are taking advanced courses in unprecedented numbers.

Madison has a plan for a new building I hope the voters will support. In Tamworth, the library was developed within the budget, the front energy efficient windows were added, and we were able to hire a part-time librarian. The curriculum at Freedom continues to take better form. Bartlett's school community newsletter emerged from the Mott Foundation grant. Jackson's exit test for sixth graders has been requested by the overseas schools because they were so impressed with this ''homegrown'' product. The Pine Tree School has been taking the lead in the ''school effectiveness'' research. Conway Elementary School has been working on a plan to assure the safety of all children in SAU #9 against childnappers. John Fuller School has continued to put its emphasis on reading and writing skills.

I invite you to come see your schools. The students are better disciplined than they have been in years. The schools are cleaner. The food is better. We do try harder, and it has been one fine year for your schools.
