TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.) To the inhabitants of the Town of Unity in the County of Sullivan qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet in said Unity on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects for the ensuing year:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 3. To choose a member of the Board of Selectmen for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
 - 5. To choose a Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.
- 6. To choose all other necessary Town Officers and Agents for the ensuing year.
- 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Librarian's Salary and Library Tax.
- 8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Old Age Assistance and Town Poor charges.
- 9. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise to pay other town charges.
- 10. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Just Debts of Town.
- 11. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for Maintenance of Highways and Bridges, including Snow Removal, and determine what price shall be paid for labor, trucks and tractors.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Construction of Class II Roads, known as Second New Hampshire Turnpike, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$471.00 for said purpose. The State will allot \$2,266.39.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust Control.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$20.00 for Fire Fighting Equipment.
- 15. To vote by ballot to see if the Town will Authorize the Selectmen to Dispose of Any Real Estate Acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote a Discount On Taxes paid on or before June 1. and September 1, 1943.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to Borrow Money in anticipation of taxes.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to buy any Snow Fence or other equipment, and raise and appropriate money thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of 471.00 for Town Road Aid. The State will allot the sum of \$2,266.39, it being understood that if T. R. A. is accepted the Town will not be entitled to State Aid Construction.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

As the tempo of America's war effort mounts, demands upon its citizens for service become more numerous and exacting. To some comes the call to arms; others to public service and still others to defense industries and organization. No one can possibly escape if he would. All must bear a proportionate share of the burden and the sacrifice. Strong first line fronts on land, sea and in the air are needed and can be developed and maintained only if there is unity of purpose and common determination behind the home front.

As men are drawn into service the burden of carrying on rests more heavily upon those who remain at home. Here, team work becomes increasingly important because of constantly diminishing manpower. A general breakdown in essential local activities and law observance can only be prevented by wholehearted cooperation between citizens and leaders.

There is no field of endeavor where cooperation and compliance with law and regulation are more needed than that of forest fire control. The most effective and economical effort in this field of activity is that of prevention. The old adage "an ounce of prevention" being "worth a pound of cure" was never more aptly applied than to forest fire control.

The forest fire warden is, by law, the designated local leader in forest fire matters. He exercises his prerogatives and discharges his duties as such under the direction of the District Chief and the State Forester. There was never a time when the warden needed each citizen's good will and cooperation more than he does now. With manpower waning, fire prevention, through efficient preparation, care with fire and compliance with all laws and regulations become a vital duty of citizenship.

For years efforts have been made to improve the usual bad Spring and Fall fire record. It was not until this year, however, that this problem was, to a great extent solved when permit burning was more rigidly restricted. Forest fire wardens were instructed not to issue permits except on rainy days and even then not to issue permits for burning in or near large slash or blow down areas. This plan worked out so well it has been decided to make it the established policy governing legal burning.

Everyone is well acquainted with the several civilian defense groups. Many of our fellow townsmen are serving in one or more of them. It is only recently, however, that the Office of Civilian Defense, recognizing the threat forest fires are to our timber facilities and resources and the possible disruption of war activities in critical areas, established the "Forest Fire Fighters Service." Its purpose is to provide fire fighters, equipped and trained, to strengthen the hand of the local forest fire warden; to acquaint the people in the area with their responsibility in fire prevention and suppression and to provide an opportunity for people in and near forested areas to participate in the war effort.

The State Forester is the State Coordinator; the District Chiefs are District Coordinators and the Warden is the Local Coordinator. The Forest Fire Fighters Service personnel will be registered under the direction of the Office of Civilian Defense; it will be trained by the warden and other assistants, aided by the District Chief. Individual citizens are urged to join this service group by applying to the forest fire warden

or to the Civilian Defense Chairman. By becoming a part of this organization locally, individuals can contribute their share toward the protection of our forest resources which are so vital to the war job.

It is recommended that the small amount of \$20.00 be made available for the purchase and keeping in repair small forest fire hand tools. These small tools can be obtained through the State Department at one half the cost to the State.

During this critical period it is more than ever the part of good and prudent citizenship to remember—

- That permission to burn in or near woodland or where fire may be communicated to woodland must be secured from the forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- To be careful when smoking in or near the woods and not to throw or drop lighted cigars, cigarettes or matches.
- 3. To notify your local warden promtly of any fire you see.
- 4. That fire prevention is the best and cheapest fire insurance.
- 5. To be fire-minded; be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden prevent forest fires. This is patriotism at work.

REPORT OF SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

To the Unity School Board;

The system at the West Side School has not been changed. Transportation is used to divide the work with four upper grades at one school and four lower grades at the other. Miss Gladys Britton teaches the four lower grades at the County School and Mrs. Doris Monblo, the four upper grades at the Church School. Both are able, experienced teachers and good work is being done. The weather and bad roads have hampered some.

The system at the Center and East Schools have been radically changed because the School District did not vote to raise enough money to support the Board's estimated budget. There is now eight grades and only one teacher at each school.

Mrs. Donald Cole kindly consented to teach at the Center until a permanent teacher could be found. Miss Helen Berry was hired later in the fall. Miss Pearl Loiselle is teaching the East School. Both teachers are able and under the extremely difficult conditions, excellent work is being done at both schools. The Center School has twenty-six pupils and the East School, thirty-two.

Teaching is hard work and it is especially hard in school with all eight grades to keep the pupils' work progressing to modern requirements, prepare each day's work and correct papers.

The shortage of teachers is alarming. Patriotism and higher salaries have called many from the teaching profession to other fields. It is expected that many will stop teaching as soon as their contracts run out in the spring. I recommend if possible we hold the same faculty for next year.

Financially, teachers have been hard hit. Teachers' wages always have been low, in the comparison to years of study and expenses required to prepare for their work. According to a study made by the N.E.A. the cost of living already has risen 19 per cent since the war began; food, 35 per cent, and clothing, 25 per cent. The wages of factory workers have gone up 59 per cent and teachers' salaries only seven per cent. Another inducement that kept teachers in their position before 1939 was that they had no income tax to pay.

Transportation is another serious problem. The cost is higher and it will soon be hard to find good drivers. Without transportation, however, we would be forced to open up a large number of small schools with the difficulty of finding teachers.

Books are in good condition and teachers can get along with less supplies than would be desirable. Unless new homes are built we will not need new furniture.

I appreciate the help and sympathy that I received from the School Board, the teachers, and pupils during my sickness. I am sorry for the inconvenience brought to them and wish to thank them for the extra work they so willingly have done.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE January 1942 to January 1943

School health activities tend more and more to spread from the school proper into the home and community. It is now taken for granted that the various infectious diseases and defects of the eyes, ears, teeth, nose, throat, general nutrition, posture, speech, etc., form the chief object, sought in routine health inspection. Experience teaches that many of these and other important irregularities are traceable to circumstances and conditions which parents do not recognize as unhealthful. Also that necessary measures for these corrections and other unfortunate sources of health disturbances often lie chiefly in the hands of the parents.

The nurse and teacher, by training and experience, become able to recognize these causes and often to suggest corrective measures necessary. They may, therefore, in corporation with the parents, be of great service. Both nurse and teacher wlcome these opportunities for service.

During the year I made 53 visits to the schools and on 63 occasions have visited the homes of pupils. Many of the nurse's activities, especially those done in the home, cannot be enumerated.
