WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster. in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the eight day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town changes for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
 - (a) Town Maintenance.
 - (b) Plowing and sanding roads.
 - (c) Oiling town roads.
 - (d) General expense of Highway Department.
- 4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$497.41 for Class V Road construction.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to construct a new State Aid bridge to replace old bridge at Snyder's Mills and appropriate an amount of money not exceeding \$5,000 for same.
- 6. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for Public Welfare.
 - (a) Town Poor.
 - (b) Old Age Assistance.
- 7. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for the support of the Town Library.
- 8. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for Patriotic Purposes.
 - (a) Old Home Day for 50th anniversary.
 - (b) Memorial Day.
- 9. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary to support the Hy-Mar-Fire Department.

- 10. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town by the issuance of notes, a sum not exceeding \$8,000.00 in anticipation of taxes for the year 1949, said notes to be expressly payable from said taxes within one year from date of issuance and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.
- 11. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new snow removal equipment.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for use in connection with the State's program for the eradication of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 13. To raise and appropriate \$150.00 for aid to the Concord Hospital.
- 14. To appropriate the Fund for Future Town Buildings, containing \$5,472.87, and the Fund from the Sale of the Town Hall, containing \$11,639.85, and any interest on said funds, for application to the School District appropriations, if the School District shall vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$45,000 for the construction and equipment of a new school building and for the acquisition of land as a site therefor.
- 15. To authorize the Selectmen to pay over to the Treasurer of the School District the sum appropriated under the preceding article.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Webster, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said district on the 8th day of March, 1949, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the District will vote to pay transportation for High School Pupils and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00: the sum necessary to pay for same.
- 10. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 to cover the deficit of 1948-1949 appropriation.
 - 11. To elect a building Committee.
- 12. To authorize the Building Committee to have suitable plans drafted for a new central elementary school building and to enter the necessary contracts with an architect to be selected by the Committee, for this purpose.
- 13. To appropriate a sum not exceeding \$500 for the purposes specified in the preceding article.
 - 14. To select a location for the new school building.

- 15. To authorize the School Board to acquire by purchase or by right of eminent domain such land as may be necessary and desirable for the site of the new school building at the location selected by the District.
- 16. To authorize the construction and equipment of a new school building.
- 17. To appropriate a sum not exceeding \$45,000 for the construction and equipment of the new school building and for the acquisition of the land for its site.
- 18. To borrow in the name of the District by the issue of serial notes or bonds, as provided in Chapter 72, Revised Laws 1942 and amendments thereto, a sum not exceeding \$26,600 for the purposes specified in the preceding article; and to authorize and empower the School Board to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest on such notes or bonds, and to do whatever may be necessary to the issuance thereof.
- 19. To authorize the School Board, action on the advice of the Building Committee, to enter into all necessary contracts for the construction and equipment of the new school building.
- 20. To authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now, or hereafter, be made available by the Federal Work Agency, or other United States Government or State agencies.
- 21. To see if the District will take any action to make alterations on present schoolhouses (if they do not take action on a new schoolhouse) to make necessary room for all of the pupils and raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary for this purpose.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Any report by the Superintendent must cover three school years and also attempt to provide a suitable educational program for the expected number of children in the next six to ten years. There are three critical problems facing the Webster School District. They are as follows: teacher shortage, school housing and insurance of high school education for all who wish to have it.

The teacher supply is more critical at this time than it was last year. I need two more teachers in the Union even if all the teachers return which I know they will not. Webster will have to have a teacher for the Putney Hill School as Mrs. Call does not plan to teach in Webster another year.

The present school houses are inadequate and, if the present enrollment continues to increase as we are sure it will, then you cannot even house the children let alone provide minimum educational opportunities. I discussed this in some detail in last year's report. I know that a building committee is working on plans for a new building and I hope that they will have had their public meeting before this report is before you.

Two towns in the Union have already provided transportation for high school students, which is in keeping with the general trend. Also there is a bill being introduced in the Legislature to provide state aid for high school transportation. Then there is the problem of having a high school to which our Webster children can be sent.

Many towns in the state have been providing high schools for towns which do not maintain such schools. This was fine when the enrollments were low. However, with increased enrollments, it has become more of a problem of what to do with the tuition pupils. If additions have to be made in the present school plant, who is to pay for the additions? Last year there were 110 pupils registered at Simonds. Forty were from Warner; seventy were from outside communities. Yet Warner was paying for about 63% of the cost. A rather unenviable situation for Warner.

Plans are being made to study the possibilities of a cooperative school to meet some of these problems.

My relations with the school board, teachers and town people have been very pleasant. I have missed meeting with the people in the P.T.A. Several times I have planned to attend social meetings in Webster but each time something has come up to prevent my attendance. I do feel that I know quite a few more people in Webster and I certainly know the children better and I must say that I enjoy them.
