To the Inhabitants of the Town of Auburn, in said County, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Auburn on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First. To bring in your ballots for:

Town Clerk for the ensuing year,
One Selectman for three years,
Tax collector for the ensuing year,
Town treasurer for the ensuing year,
Highway agent for the ensuing year,
One library trustee for three years,
One cemetery trustee for three years,
One trust fund trustee for three years,
Three auditors for the ensuing year,
Overseer of the poor for the ensuing year,
Police chief for the ensuing year.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M., the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second: To see if the town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

Third: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate long term notes or bonds, in the amount of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00), to be retired annually at the rate of \$1,000.00, plus interest; said notes or bonds to be for the purpose of financing permanent improvements to the Town Hall, and said improvements to be of such nature as the town shall by vote determine.

Fourth: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Fifth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for town officers' salaries.

Sixth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for town officers' expenses.

Seventh: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for election and registration.

Eighth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of municipal court.

Ninth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of town hall and other town buildings.

Tenth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Police department expense.

Eleventh: To see if the town will vote to raise and appriate the sum of \$250.00 for Forest Fire department.

Twelfth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Volunteer Fire department.

Thirteenth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appriate the sum of \$45.00 for the Health department, including Vital Statistics.

Fourteenth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for maintenance of summer roads, \$3,800.00 for winter roads, \$600.00 for bridges and culverts, and \$500.00 for general expenses of highway department.

Fifteenth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for street lights. share).

Sixteenth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appriate the sum of \$576.58 for Class V roads, (TRA—town's share.)

Seventeenth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the library.

Eighteenth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for old age assistance, (town's share).

Nineteenth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Memorial Day and Veterans' Associations.

Twentieth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$210.00 for rent of hydrants.

Twenty-first: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Village Cemetery.

Twenty-second: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for town dump maintenance and rental.

Twenty-third: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for interest on temporary loans.

Twenty-fourth: To see if the town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham fund for schools or library.

Twenty-fifth: To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have come in during the past year.

Twenty-sixth: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the land and building known as the Police Station, and to further authorize the Selectmen to apply the proceeds of said sale toward the expense of repairs and improvements to the Town Hall, or in such manner as the town may by vote direct.

Twenty-seventh: To see if the town will vote to close that portion of the Deer-neck Road (so-called), from the Bunting Place (so-called), to Deer-neck Bridge.

Twenty-eighth: To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), to continue tarring the road from the new cement bridge, near the No. 4 school-house, up Pingrey Hill road, to the Chester line.

Thirtieth: To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for building a gravelled road, and tarring same, beginning at end of black road, near Frank Seavey's residence; continuing by Albert Eaton's, Joe Davis', and to the home of Elmer MacKenzie.

Thirty-first: To see if the town will vote to establish a planning board of five, (or 7), members, with duties as set forth in sections 3 to 15, inclusive, of Chapter 53 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, 1942, to make a study of the town's development and report to town meeting appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the town's best development, and to serve as a zoning commission to study and recommend a division of the town into zoning districts and recommend such reasonable regulations in each as will conserve the value of buildings, encourage the best use of land, and in general promote the development of the community, the board members to consist of one selectman, and four, (or 6), other citizens appointed by the selectmen as provided in Chapter 53 of the Revised Laws.

Thirty-second: To see if the town will vote to close the road leading from route 101, by Severance school, across the B & M R.R., to Lake Massabesic; or to discontinue same as an open highway and subject to gates and bars.

Thirty-third: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

ENROLLMENT

The schools of the nation face many problems in the years immediately ahead. One of the most critical is that of school housing. The schools of the district felt the pressure of increased enrollments in the fall. A study of the enrollment figures for the past four years indicates the problem that faces the district in this area of school administration.

The increase in actual enrollment at the above date is 36 pupils and the percentage increase is 34.95. The total enrollment shows a greater increase with a total increase of 45 or 43.69% increase. If this trend continues a solution of a serious housing problem will face the district. The housing facilities are at capacity now and further increases will create a serious situation. A further analysis of the figures indicates that the increase is not concentrated in any one grade but is general throughout.

This table is set up so that comparable enrollment for a particular grade may be seen for the preceding year. With the exception of the present sixth grade every grade has in-

creased over the 1945 figure. In addition the first and second grades reveal that the prospective enrollments are definitely higher so that as they advance through the grades our problem will be aggravated. In the face of this fact a critical study and survey should be made in the ensuing year and recommendations made to the district which will present possible solutions of the problem.

PHYSICAL PLANT

The present plant is approaching the time when it can be classified as thoroughly modern. The Village School has been in that category since its erection. The school board has in the past few years followed a definite program which has aimed at placing the Severance School in the same class.

The first and easiest step in that direction was the redecoration of the rooms with an oil paint so that cleaning of smoke stained walls could be effected. The installation of a modern heating plant and modern toilet facilities followed. The consummation of the full program is still in the future. Future developments call for the modernization of the lighting facilities, insulation of both schools and the erection of chain link fence at Severance as a safety measure. At the same time the classrooms which now have non adjustable seating facilities are or will be gradually having replacements so that seating facilities will have chairs that can be adjusted to them rather than the reverse. In addition a beginning was made on the grading of Severance yard during the summer. This grading will eliminate the puddles and mud in the spring it is expected. This program will be continued and some work done on the drive and front of the Village school. The program is one that will over a period of years result in fine buildings and grounds well adapted to the recreational and educational needs of the pupils.

INSTRUCTION

The up grading of the physical plant has not resulted in the neglect of other phases of the educational program. The book purchases aim at providing greater range of subject matter and to cover a wider range of abilities and interests. Science

texts are gradually being provided, a new language series is in the process of adoption, a spelling program will be in the hands of all pupils before the end of the year. This program of book purchases will over a comparatively a short time provide the kind of educational opportunity that every parent desires for his child. The program did not make as much progress as hoped for due to the increased enrollments and the resulting necessity of supplemental book purchases.

The provision made for the children of the district as far as physical instructional needs plus good service from the instructional staff will result in the finest type of educational opportunity for your children.

BUDGET

The total payments in the proposed budget are in excess of last year's budget by \$457. An increase in estimated income of slightly more than \$500 presents a slight decrease in tax levy. With the exception of two items, teachers' salaries and new equipment, the other increases in the budget are occasioned by increased costs of supplies making up the particular items involved. In face of increased operational costs such a nominal increase in the overall budget and a slight decrease in tax levy is unexpected. The tendency over the state is expected to be upward. The peak will probably not be reached. On the basis of present data the peak enrollment will not come until 1956. As enrollments increase, operational costs will also increase.

CONCLUSION

The progress of pupils and the improvement of school facilities are progressing satisfactorily. The devotion of school board members to the many details of school operation, the conscientious efforts of teachers, and the cooperation of pupils and parents makes such progress possible. I appreciate sincerely the attitude on the part of all to make his contribution to the progress of pupil and school.
