To the Citizens of Belknap County.

In compliance with the laws of this State, we, as Commissioners of Belknap County, present to the citizens of the County our annual report, with the reports of the other officers of the County; also the report from the County Convention.

That the expenses of supporting the external poor have been in excess of any former year, the report will show. The reason we feel was beyond our power to remedy, and at the same time deal justly with the poor who "We have always with us."

The County Farm for the year past has been managed by Mr. and Mrs. Thomas L. Smith. Commencing their duties one year ago, laboring under several disadvantages, not necessary here to mention, we think they have well performed the duties new to them. The general appearance of the house, as to its sanitary condition, and the general health of the inmates, attest, in a measure, to the success of their administration. Mr. and Mrs. Smith have been employed for another year by the Commissioners.

By the report of the Superintendent it will be seen that the number of inmates has been larger than any previous year, while the number committed to Jail and House of Correction has very far exceeded any year in the history of the County, so far as we know. Of course this large increase has made a corresponding increase in the expenses of the Farm. The Young Men's Christian Association of Laconia have held religious services at the Farm every Sabbath afternoon. As these services are entirely gratuitous, on their part, they certainly are entitled to the thanks of the Commissioners as well as all others. On Christmas day the inmates were bountifully remembered by citizens of the County, many of whom, by their presence on that day, and adding to the well loaded and fruitful Christmas tree, made it a day long to be remembered by those who have but little sunshine in life.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

TO THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS :

The cases on the printed docket September term, 1890, were disposed of as follows: Five were continued, the respondents being out of the State; four were marked "not to be brought forward"; one was continued, the case being before the full bench; one was continued to await the trial of a civil case involving the same facts; one was dismissed on payment of costs, and a fine and costs paid in one. At that term thirty-four indictments were found: One for rape, which was tried by the jury, the respondent found guilty and sentenced to five years in the Industrial School; one for assault, wherein the respondent was found guilty and sentenced to six months in jail and a fine of \$10.; one for assault, with a sentence of three months in jail on plea of *nolo*; one for assault, with a sentence of six months in jail on a similar plea; eleven for burglary and receiving stolen goods. The respondents entered the plea of *nolo*. Most of them paid the costs, and all recognized in the sum of \$200 each for their appearance at the next term. This disposition was made after full advisement with the Attorney General; five liquor indictments against each of three parties, who entered the plea of *nolo*, paid all costs, \$100 each, received sentences of three months each in jail and \$200 additional in fines, mittimuses to issue on call of the State Counsel; one liquor indictment, which was continued; one for cruelty to animals, which was *nol pros'd.* for lack of evidence; two for adultery, which were continued. Two witnesses came before the Grand Jury, under the State's summons, in an intoxicated condition, and, on being brought before the Court were sentenced to thirty days in jail for contempt.

The remainder of the above cases were disposed of as follows at the March term, 1891: four were marked "not to be brought forward"; sixteen were continued, and one *nol pros'd.* In one liquor libel forfeiture was ordered on default. A second liquor libel was tried in behalf of a claimant before the jury, but the claim was not sustained and the liquor declared forfeited. At this term thirty indictments were returned: One for larceny; the respondent was a boy, entered the plea of *nolo*,

and was allowed to go in the care of his mother after recognizing in the sum of \$300 for his appearance at the next term; one for mayhem, and on a plea of *nolo* the respondent was sentenced to two years in State prison; two for keeping gambling places. Pleas of *nolo* were entered and each respondent paid a fine of \$25 and costs; one for assault with intent to kill, which was continued; two for adultery, and on pleas of *nolo* the respondents were sentenced to jail six and eight months respectively; one for aggravated assault, which was tried before the jury and the respondent acquitted; one for burglary against three respondents who entered the plea of guilty. Two were sentenced to two years each in State prison and one for three months in jail; two indictments for obtaining goods under false pretenses. One case was tried, the respondent convicted and sentenced to six months in jail, and the second case was continued; five liquor indictments against each of three respondents, to all of which pleas of *nolo* were entered. One respondent was sentenced to three months in jail, \$300 fine, on payment of costs, mittimuses not to issue until called for by the Solicitor; one was sentenced to two months in jail, \$300 fine, all costs paid, jail sentence imposed, and the mittimuses for the fines not to issue till called for by the Solicitor; one was sentenced to four months in jail, \$300 fine, all costs and \$50 paid, jail sentence imposed, and the mittimuses for \$250 not to issue till called for by the Solicitor; two indictments for sales of liquor, one of which was dismissed on payment of costs, and a fine of \$50 and costs paid in the other; one for suffering liquor to be sold on the premises, which was continued on account of the sickness of the respondent; one for simple assault wherein a fine of \$10 and costs were paid.

The county has had no case on the civil docket.
