## School Report.

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The closing report of the School year calls for a report of the work done.

The general policy of the school board for the time covered by this report has been the same as in previous years, and many of the suggestions offered in former reports have equal force now.

In general terms we may say our schools have been successful. There have been no failures. Every teacher has completed the term of her engagement, except in the grammar school, where sickness of the teacher prevented, and in the Jamestown where the school house was rendered unfit for use by fire.

If they have not reached the full measure of our hopes, they have been as good as could reasonably be expected considering the want of interest manifested by some of those who have children in the schools, and by nearly all who have not. The public schools are largely what the town makes them. Every town exhibits its true character in its schools. If the standard of our citizenship is high our schools will be of a high order.

We can not hope to compare favorably with towns containing large villages with well graded schools, but we shall suffer in reputation and character if we do not equal adjoining towns that have no better facilities than our own. In order to do this, there must be an appropriation of money by this district to secure more weeks of schooling and more efficient teachers.

Good teachers command good wages. When their services are sought, their first question is "how much do you pay, and how many weeks in your school year?" and their decision usually depends upon the answer. We should not be satisfied with the results obtained from inexperienced teachers, who come on trial, remain until they prove a success or a failure, and then go, or are sent away. We should be able to pay such wages as will prevent our best ones from leaving for better situations or more lucrative employment. Teachers, like other humans, work for money.

There are good teachers working in the mills rather than at their chosen vocation, because they can earn more money. The average wages paid teachers in this town, offer but little inducement for young ladies to prepare themselves for the work. In order to be successful a teacher must be thoroughly interested in teaching in general, and

particularly interested in the school of which she has charge, and should have no outside employment, or amusements which will in any way divert attention from the school, and the highest interests of the scholars. With a single exception we believe our teachers have met this requirement

All the houses in which schools have been kept are in good condition except the Bennett and the Jamestown which was injured by fire.

In compliance with an act of the legislature approved July 30th, 1889, we have procured books and other supplies for the schools at an expense of \$421.73. About three-fourths of the books were loaned to the scholars, and at the close of the schools were returned to us for safe keeping; the balance are kept in stock for future use. The bill for supplies was about \$40, nearly all of which is used. There were no changes made in the text books in use except in geography, and this was an absolute necessity as the publishers had so changed the later editions of their work, as to make it practically a new book.

Whole number of scholars in town not under five years of age who have attended district schools not less than two weeks 164, number of children in town between the ages of five and fifteen years as reported by the selectmen, males 94, females 75, total 169.

Number of persons between the ages of fourteen and twenty-one years who cannot read and write, four.

The chairman in resigning his position and retiring from the board, while deploring the results of that shortsightedness which induces some to oppose any measure looking to the advancement of our school interests, especially when it involves a departure from the beaten track of the past; would heartily thank all those who by word or deed have kindly assisted in the performance of the responsible and perplexing duties of the school board.

#### DETAILED REPORT.

LADD HILL—Miss M. Isa Thyng teacher first term, and Miss Eudora B. Kimball second term.

They came to us without experience in teaching, but brought to the work good scholarship, and decidedly good notions of the way a school of this kind should be conducted. Progress good.

We are quite confident the parents and scholars would welcome either of these young ladies as their teacher another year.

UNION—Spring and fall terms taught by Miss Susie M. Eaton.

This was Miss Eaton's first experience as a teacher, but she met with complete success. Good order prevailed and consequently good advancement was made.

We are pleased to note a decided improvement in this school

JAMESTOWN—Spring term taught by Mrs. Alice E. Durgin.

Mrs. Durgin is well-known as a successful teacher. She fully sustained her good reputation during this term, and the result was good advancement.

Fall term taught by Miss Mary M. Emery. This being Miss Emery's second term, she had not the degree of confidence acquired by teachers of more experience. She labored hard and with good success. Good progress was made. Gile.

#### VILLAGE.

The village schools were taught by the same teachers during the year.

Rounds of Plymouth, her first term was an apparent success, but at the beginning of the fall term the school increased in size and the health of the teacher gradually failed, so the work was very hard and the school was closed before the end of the term and there was no examination.
