To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of firemen.
- 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Trunk Line maintenance.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid construction.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and construction of sidewalks.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid maintenance.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the tarring of roads.
- 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.
- 16. To see what action the town will take relative to the installation of fire alarm boxes.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to discontinue two short sections of the Daniel Webster highway.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Years ago when scientific discoveries were beginning to reveal possibilities of great power, the prediction was made that poetry and fiction had served their purpose and that henceforth men would be educated on facts and get their inspiration from scientific marvels. Wonders beyond the imagination of the people of that time have become commonplace events of today but novels and poems have greatly multiplied and are more widely read than ever.

A visitor to our library or its Penacook Branch will find that not only are stories and poetry much read but also books of history, biography and wonderful scientific facts. There were 847 non-fiction books read by adults to 7937 of fiction. And in the Juvenile section 967 non-fiction to 2153 of fiction.

A wonderful work with the children is carried on every vear by our efficient and devoted librarian. Story hours have been held, three at Boscawen and five at Penacook. The Vacation Reading clubs are adding much interest to the reading of books by our vounger patrons. At Boscawen thirty-three boys and girls received certificates presented by Miss Boothman of the Public Library Commission and at Penacook twenty-one received them from Miss Annable, Secretary of the Library Commission. The latter was at the observance of Book Week, which deserves more than passing mention. About a hundred children and twenty adults were present, stretching the seating capacity of the Hose House hall. Nursery rhymes were acted out in a most realistic manner, the boys and girls all enacting well their parts while the lively spider which frightened Miss Muffet as well as the mouse nimbly running up and down the clock will be long remembered.

A flower contest was conducted with nineteen participating. Four contestants brought in over 200 varieties each and each received a copy of Reed's "Guide to Wild Flowers."

We feel that there can be no over estimation of the good accomplished by our popular librarian in this work with the boys and girls whereby they eagerly read good books in vacation and leisure time and come to look upon the library as their own to use rightly and to enjoy.

On May 23, a Neighborhood meeting was held in the Boscawen Library with an attendance of thirty-four from fifteen different towns.

Our librarian attended the week of Summer School at Durham and the sessions of the N. H. Library Association in Concord.

A more complete cataloging of our books was necessary in order to make possible the full use of the library. We were fortunate to secure for this work the services of Miss Frances Hobart, formerly of the Public Library Commission. Since all the bequests to the library state that the money is to be expended for books, we have only a limited amount available for this work and find it advisable to ask for an appropriation of \$500 this year.

Our extra dividend money made possible the purchase of a new Encyclopedia Britannica and a new Webster's Unabridged Dictionary and increased the number of new books placed on our shelves.

We gratefully acknowledge the gift of four magazines and we have subscribed for eleven. Also we thank those who have presented books: 31 books from Rev. O. W. Peterson; 12 volumes of "America" from Mr. Gerrish; 10 books from Mrs. Clara K. Ayers; 3 from Mr. Buxton for the Penacook Branch; 2 each from Miss Stammers, Horton, Blake and Mrs. Clark; 1 each from Miss Goodhue and Mrs. Dresser.

The increase of book circulation over last year is 1137, magazines, 183. No additional branches or stations have been opened, just an increase of interest among the same people. There have been 224 books added in 1929. Our total circulation was 11,904 books and 497 magazines.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENTENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

It is interesting to note the sudden growth of the schools in the last two years. Last year the average membership was sixty-nine, an increase of thirty-six per cent over the average for the ten years previous. At the present time the membership is seventy-eight, an increase of fifty-four per cent over those ten years.

The High Street school which we expected to close, when last year's report was written, is nearly twice as large as last year. At present, it has one more pupil than Water Street school.

Our estimates of last March provided for the employment of three teachers and the transportation of pupils then attending the High Street school. By keeping the High Street school open, and transporting children inside the two-mile limit during the winter, our expenditures for teachers and transportation have exceeded our estimates by about four hundred dollars. We believe, however, that a deficiency appropriation of one hundred dollars will carry us through the year because the amount of State Aid we have received is more than we anticipated when making last year's estimates.

It now seems likely that it will be necessary to maintain the four schools next year. The budget provides for four teachers of training and experience.

This year, as last year, all but one of our teachers is teaching in Boscawen for the first time. As a rule it is better to change teachers less frequently. The results being obtained in Music show the value of retaining the same teacher over a period of years.

The Attendance Table for last year shows a good per cent of attendance at Water Street and Plains Grammar schools, continuing the good records of the previous year. At High Street the attendance has been poor, both here and at the Plains Primary being lower than last year. In tardiness, last year shows considerable improvement over the previous year, except at Water Street school. During the first half of the current year there have been very few cases of tardiness at High Street and Water Street, but at the Plains the half year has shown nearly as many cases as the entire previous year.

For the highest efficiency we must have not only good teachers, but regular attendance during the entire time schools are in session,

New tanks have been placed in the toilets at Water Street. They now drain into underground cesspools and are properly ventilated. The larger school at High Street makes necessary some improvement of the toilets there.
