Warrant for Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, County of Hillsborough, and State of N. H., qualified to vote in Town and State affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet in Daniels Academy Hall, in said town on Tuesday. March 14, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects, and any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

1. To choose all town officers for the ensuing year.

2. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating to same.

4. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.

5. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

6. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the town will vote to allow any discount on property taxes or take any action relative thereto.

9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen

to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day or take any action relative thereto.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Cemeteries or take any action relative thereto.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Aid for permanent improvement of Highways or take any action relative thereto.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money necessary to install a new heating system in the Daniels Academy Building or take any action relative thereto.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to paint Daniels Academy Building or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase new fire hose or other necessary equipment for the fire department.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for Forest Fire fighting equipment, or take any action relative thereto.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary for repairs to the Ladies Rest Room in Daniels Academy Building, or take any action relative thereto.

18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the appointment of a "Hurricane Reconstruction Committee" with discretionary powers to sub-divide certain lands owned by the town in the north part of Brookline and to acquire options on certain other hurricane devastated property, the same to be offered "free gratis" in house-lot plots to prospective builders who will agree to build thereon permanent residences having a property valuation of at least \$1,000.00 each. The purpose of such action being to encourage new building, and to add to the town's taxable valuation in order to offset the timber losses of Sept. 21, 1938.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any money to match Federal Funds for W. P. A. projects or other Federal projects.

GRAVE FOREST SITUATION FOLLOWS SEPTEMBER HURRICANE

Woodland problems of timber salvage and fire control created in many towns by the September hurricane are of the greatest importance. GOOD CITIZENSHIP CALLS FOR PERSONAL AND WIDESPREAD ACTION!

The salvage of every thousand feet of logs which can be sold means money for landowners, wages for workers, employment for trucks, teams and machinery, as well as reduced forest fire hazard for all. If owners of windthrown timber have not yet acted, they should communicate with those who can help. TOWN CHAIRMEN are fully informed: STATE ADVISORY AGENTS can help to start logging by suggesting names of operators and giving other useful advice; Federal Agencies are increasing the number of log storage places as rapidly as possible. INDIVIDUALS MUST NOW CO-OPERATE!

Forest fire danger for several years will be greater than usual. So much work must be done by public agencies to reduce hazards along roadsides, near improved and other exposed areas that many places will remain hazardous for some time to come. INDIVIDUAL LANDOWNERS MUST TAKE A PERSONAL INTEREST! Aid in clean-up work through the Agricultural Conservation Program is available to any woodland owner at \$4.00 per acre on areas up to 15 acres. The County Agent should be consulted.

Support your local Forest Fire Wardens and Deputies. They are planning, with State and Federal agencies, an intensive campaign to control fires. Help them by strict observance of the fire laws. Kindle no open fires without a permit from the Warden except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooperate by reporting fires you may see and in other ways. Fire fighting tool supplies are inadequate and should be reasonably increased by many towns. YOU CAN HELP, AND IT WILL PAY. TO PREVENT FOREST FIRES!

9. To see if the District will vote to increase the amount of insurance carried on the Primary Building and raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to contract for High School tuition with a district maintaining an approved High School, grades IX-X-XI-XII, or take any other action in relation thereto.

11. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to sell playground equipment or take any other action in relation thereto.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE

The joint committee appointed at the last district meeting for the purpose of overseeing the alterations at the Primary school building report the following completed work.

The appropriation of \$650 for the installation of flush toilets and a water system appeared to be entirely inadequate. The school board succeeded in securing a W.P.A. project to further help with the work. \$1,651.40 of government funds was thus added to the district appropriation and sixteen local men received approximately two months work on the project. A deed covering the water rights was passed between the school board and David and Clara Charait. A fine twenty-six foot well now supplies water through heavy copper pipes to the Primary building. These pipes are all encased so that there will never be need to disturb the road surface. The basement was enlarged so that now it extends under the entire building. This has been cemented and two flush toilets, two wash bowls and the water system installed. A dry well and cement septic tank of approximately 1000 gallon capacity was also made. The inadequate space for wood and other storage has been amply enlarged. A new bubbler for drinking water has been installed in the primary room. This water has been twice tested and approved by the state department of Public Health. A detailed account of expenditures for alterations to the Primary school building appears below. The deficit between the amount appropriated and the total cost has been paid for from funds which the School District had on hand.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Brookline:

I herewith submit my twentieth annual report which is also the twentieth in the series of such reports.

Supervisory Union No. 40

The same five districts comprise this union as it was reorganized and grouped in 1833. At the annual meeting of the joint board of the Union last spring the apportionment of expenses was changed somewhat so that now the several districts contribute to the superintendent's salary account as follows: Amherst 17 per cent; Brookline 8 per cent; Hollis 14 per cent; Milford 56 per cent; and Mont Vernon 5 per cent; and to the office expenses (clerk, postage, office supplies etc.) Amherst 25 per cent; Brookline 10 per cent: Hollis^{*}, Milford 60 per cent; Mont Vernon 5 per cent.

* Hollis later voted to pay \$50 for the current school year.

Teachers

All teachers of last year accepted re-election so there have been no changes in the staff which is as follows:

Miss Alice Ouellette, grades VI-VII-VIII, 27 pupils at the Grammar room in the Daniels Academy Building.

Miss Madeline Nash, grades III-IV-V, 30 pupils, at the Intermediate room in the Primary building.

Miss Doris Campbell. grades I-II, 19 pupils, at the Primary room in the Primary building. Class instruction for grade III is divided between Miss Nash and Miss Campbell.

Miss Elsie F. Wheeler serves as Music Supervisor. Her weekly visits are on Wednesday afternoons.

Repairs and Alterations

Extensive changes have been made at the Primary Building under the authority and direction of a special committee appointed at the annual district meeting in March 1938. This committee consisted of Ernest W. Nye, William P. Lathe, Eldorus C. Fessenden and the members of the School Board. Their report including a financial statement will be found on another page.

A special appropriation of \$35 made at the last March meeting has been used as directed to improve lighting at both the Primary and Grammar buildings. Larger electric light globes and fixtures have been installed resulting in a decidedly better quantity and quality of artificial light.

Adult Education

Again there is an opportunity for correspondence courses for persons over sixteen years of age who are not in school. Mr. Albert N. French of Durham continues in charge of this area with headquarters at Milford. Mr. Edgar L. Paris is now State Supervisor, replacing Mr. F. C. Reagan who served us so well in that capacity.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To: Mr. Harold C. Bales. Superintendent of Schools. Brookline, New Hampshire:

The following is my sixth report of the health work in Brookline schools.

The medical inspecion was made in October by Dr. Abbott L. Winograd of Nashua, the nurse assisting. A report of the same will be found in the School Physician's report.

A dental clinic was held at the Daniels Academy Building in May at which nineteen pupils were treated by Dr. Arthur Danforth of Manchester, N. H. This was made possible by contributions and fees paid by pupils. I hope these clinics can be continued in the future as we find the condition of the pupils teeth to be better each year.

Examination of the eyes was made by the nurse, and six children were found to have defective vision. Some of these have had the necessary attention and I hope arrangements can be made for the others in the future.

The hearing test was made with the state audiometer and five pupils were found to have defective hearing. Some of these children had just recovered from head colds, and I believe these should be tested again.

The well baby conference and pre-school round-up was conducted in May under the auspices of the State Board of Health. This conference was well attended and volunteer helpers were very valuable in the management of the clinic. Diphtheria innoculations were given at this time.

Thirty-two class room visits have been made to the schools for health work. Home visits have been made as necessary for remedial work.

Several boxes of clothing have been given by the Red Cross where needed. Cod liver oil was also furnished by the Red Cross to the children needing it.

In closing I wish to thank all those who have given

service and aid in any way during the year, and I want parents to feel free to talk over health problems with me at any time.
