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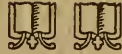

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE
TOWN WARRANT

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia, N. H., in the
 County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in
 Town Affairs:*

[L. s.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Moore School Auditorium in said Candia on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town, using the checklist and printed ballots, will vote to adopt a Zoning Ordinance establishing the boundaries of various districts in the Town and the regulations to be enforced therein, in accordance with the final report of the Planning Board, voted at the 1957 Town Meeting, as follows:

An ordinance to promote the health, safety, morals, convenience and general welfare of the community by regulating and restricting the use and construction of buildings and premises in the Town of Candia.

ARTICLE I

Preamble

In pursuance of authority conferred by Chapter 31, Sections 60-89, Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire 1955, as amended, and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals, prosperity, convenience or general welfare, as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development of the incorporated Town of Candia, New Hampshire, by securing safety from fire, panic and other dangers, providing adequate areas between buildings and various rights of way, by preserving the rural charm now attached to our town, the promotion of good civic design and arrangements, wise and efficient expenditure of public funds, and the adequate provision of public utilities and other public requirements, and by other means, now, therefore, the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of Candia, New Hampshire, in official meeting convened.

ARTICLE II

Districts

For the purpose of this Ordinance, the Town of Candia is divided into districts as shown in the Zoning Map filed with the Town Clerk and dated February 18, 1958, and including the following: (1) Residential-Agricultural District; (2) Commercial District; (3) Industrial District.

ARTICLE III

Definitions

For the purpose of this Ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section.

- A. *Home produce and products* means and includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident, also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bona fide resident of any property.
- B. *Right of Way* means and includes all town, state and federal highways and the land on either side of same as covered by statutes to determine the width of rights of way.
- C. *Permanent residents*. A family shall be considered permanent residents when they have used any building continuously as a residence for a period of six months or more.
- D. *Tourist Home* shall mean any place consisting of a room or groups of rooms located on one premise where transient accommodations for sleeping or living purposes for not more than six persons are provided for a price.
- E. *Front Yard*. A space extending for the full width of a lot between the extreme front line of a building and the nearest side of the right-of-way.
- F. *Frontage* shall mean the length of the lot bordering on the public right-of-way.
- G. *Juhk* means any old metals, old bottles, cotton or woolen mill waste, unfinished cloth, unfinished cotton or woolen mill yarns, old paper products, old rubber products, two or more unregistered motor vehicles which are no longer intended or in condition for legal use on the public highway, and other second hand articles the accumulation of which is detrimental injurious to the neighborhood.
- H. *Nonconforming use* means a building, structure or use of land existing at the time of enactment of this ordinance and which does not conform to the regulations of the district in which it is situated.
- I. *Trailer camp* means a land area, occupied or designed for occupancy by two or more trailers or camp cars in use for living purposes.

- J. *Industry* is the gainful activity involved in producing, distributing and changing the form or raw materials, or of assembling components and parts, packaging, warehousing and transporting finished products; such production involves the employment of management, labor, machinery and real estate to create tangible products, or utility services having value.

ARTICLE IV

General Provisions

- A. No junk yard or place for the storage of discarded machinery, vehicles, or other scrap materials shall be maintained in any District, excluding the area known as the Town Dump, except that after public hearing in which evidence on both sides is heard, the Board of Adjustment shall have authority to decide whether the permit shall be issued or not.
- B. No owner or occupant of land in any District shall (1) permit fire or other ruins to be left but shall remove the same within two years.
- C. Any continuing or reoccurring uses that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of the production or emission of odor, dust, smoke, refuse matter, fumes, noise vibrations, or similar conditions, or that are dangerous to the comfort, peace, enjoyment, health or safety of the community or lending to its disturbance or annoyance are prohibited in any District.

ARTICLE V

Residential-Agricultural District

- A. The Residential-Agricultural District shall enjoy the following provisions:
1. It shall be a district mainly of farms, residences.
 2. There shall be between the nearest portion of the traveled highway and extreme front of any building a yard having a minimum depth of fifty feet and no building shall be located within twenty-five feet of the side property line, except that such distance may be waived in part in writing by the Board of Adjustment in the case of a one or two-stall garage appurtenant to a dwelling.
- 2 (a). Excepting a one or two-car garage may be built up to within 10 feet of the right of way.
- 2 (b). And unless lot of minimum requirements is on record at time of passing of this ordinance.
3. Home produce and products may be bought and sold and exposed for sale in this district.
 4. Tourist homes may be maintained and operated in this district.
 5. Residences may be used to house such uses by the owner of tenant as offices for doctor, engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate and insurance, or other recognized profession,

and such occupations as hairdressing, dressmaking, manufacture of craft products, manufacture of food products, except that the number of persons employed at any location in such occupations, shall not number more than three persons in addition to the owner or tenant.

6. Churches, schools, sanitarium, fraternal organizations and clubs other than social clubs are permitted in this district.
7. Frontage. Each lot shall have a frontage of at least 150 feet.
- 7 (a). Unless lot of minimum requirements is on record at the time of the passage of this ordinance.
8. Minimum Land Area. No lot shall be less than 25,000 square feet.
- 8 (a). Unless lot of minimum requirements is on record at the time of the passage of this ordinance.
9. No privy, cesspool, septic tank, or sewage disposal area, shall be constructed or maintained less than 75 feet from the edge of a public water body; from a well; or from a dwelling other than to which it is appurtenant.
10. All general farming activities shall be permitted except that the raising of hogs or fur bearing animals for sale or in commercial quantities, the maintenance of dog kennels, and the operation of farms for the disposal of garbage, sewage, rubbish, offal or rendering plant shall be permitted only if the Board of Adjustment shall rule that such uses under conditions and in such buildings as it may prescribe will not be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood.
- 10 (a). Raising for sale or in commercial quantities:
 - (1) Six or more pigs, 6 months old.
 - (2) 75 breeding does.
 - (3) One pair of any other fur bearing animal.

ARTICLE VI

Commercial District

The following shall be permitted in the Commercial District:

1. Any use permitted in the Residential District under the same provisions as apply to residences in that district.
2. Lodging houses, apartment houses, hotels, motels, tourist courts or cabins, including such retail businesses within these permitted buildings as are conducted for the conveniences of the residents or guests.
3. Shops, restaurants and other retail and wholesale businesses.
Garages, parking lots and filling stations.
5. Business offices and banks.
6. Theaters, halls, social clubs.

7. No building in this district shall be located within 25 feet of any right-of-way; no minimum frontage or area is required.
8. If any proposed use is such to attract vehicles, ample space shall be provided on the property to accommodate all such vehicles attracted by the business.

ARTICLE VII

Industrial District

The following shall be permitted in the Industrial District:

1. All uses permitted in other districts shall be permitted in this district except that buildings permitted in the Residential District shall be excluded.
2. All manufacturing.
3. The storage of and facilities for the distribution of petroleum products, coal products, grains, fertilizers, lumber and lumber products, products of mines, quarries and gravel deposits.
4. Such other uses which are not obnoxious or offensive by reason of the emission of smoke, dust, gas, noise and odor.
5. No building in this district shall be located within 15 feet of any right-of-way.

ARTICLE VIII

Nonconforming Uses

- A. Any nonconforming use other than uses specified in B and C below may continue in their present use except that any nonconforming use or building may not be:
 1. Changed to another nonconforming use.
 2. Re-established after discontinuance for one year except to a use conforming to the District in which it is located.
 3. Extended;
 4. Rebuilt after damage exceeding 50 per cent of its value;
- B. No junk yard may continue as a nonconforming use without special permit from the Board of Adjustment, for more than one year after the effective date of this Ordinance, except that a junk yard may continue as a nonconforming use in a Commercial District or Industrial District if within that period it is completely enclosed within a continuous solid fence of such height, not less than eight feet high in any case, as to screen completely the operations of the junk yard. Plans of such building or fence shall be approved by the Board of Selectmen before it is erected.

ARTICLE IX

Enforcement

- A. It shall be the duty of the board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.
- B. There shall be an Inspector of Buildings who shall administer the provisions of the Ordinance.
- C. The Building Inspector shall issue any and all permits requested when said permit is in accordance with this Ordinance.
- D. After passage of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect any structure or building, or alter any building or relocate any building, except accessory building, without first obtaining a building permit from the Building Inspector.
- E. No permit will be required for remodeling where the purpose for which the building is to be used is not changed.
- F. The fee for a building permit is \$2.00.
- G. Chimney construction. Chimneys shall extend at least three feet above the highest point where they pass through the roof of a building and at least two feet higher than any portion of the building within ten feet. No chimney shall be built unless tile lined, and no chimney shall have its base resting upon any floor or beam of combustible material.
- H. NO PERMIT, HOWEVER, SHALL BE ISSUED UNLESS THE PROPOSED STRUCTURE WILL PRESENT A REASONABLE APPEARANCE AND WILL BE IN KEEPING WITH THE NEIGHBORHOOD AND UNLESS THE BUILDING IS TO BE FINISHED ON THE EXTERIOR IN A PERMANENT MANNER AND IS TO BE SUITABLY PAINTED ON THE OUTSIDE WHENEVER THE SAME IS OF WOOD OR A MATERIAL CUSTOMARILY PAINTED. THIS IS INTENDED TO ELIMINATE THE ERECTION OF STRUCTURES OBVIOUSLY OUT OF PLACE FOR THE NEIGHBORHOOD WHERE THEY ARE TO BE LOCATED AND WHICH MAY HAVE A DETRIMENTAL EFFECT ON THE PROPERTY VALUES AND NEIGHBORHOOD CHARACTER. WHEN AN OBJECTION ON THE ACCOUNT OF THE APPEARANCE OF A PROPOSED STRUCTURE, AS ABOVE DICTATED, IS RAISED BY A MAJORITY OF THE FAMILIES RESIDING OR OWNING PROPERTY WITHIN A RADIUS OF 2,500 FEET OF THE PROPERTY IN QUESTION, THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT SHALL HOLD A PUBLIC HEARING TO RE-

CEIVE THE EVIDENCE ON BOTH SIDES AND SHALL HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO DECIDE WHETHER THE PERMIT SHALL BE ISSUED OR NOT.

- I. Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated the selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the superior Court or by any other legal action.

ARTICLE X

Board of Adjustment

Within thirty days after the adoption of this Ordinance and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to a Board of Adjustment of five members conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire 1955, as amended. Thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the appointing authority shall be responsible for filling vacancies and maintaining full membership on the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment shall conform in membership and term of office to the provisions of Section 67, of said Chapter 31, as amended. In addition to the general powers granted said Board by said Chapter 31, it may, in harmony with the subject to its provisions:

- A. Permit a non-conforming temporary use for an initial period of not more than two years. Permits may be renewed by the Board of Adjustment or successive periods of not more than one year each.
- B. Waive the Residential District frontage requirement where there are unusual conditions of street curvature. In such cases however, the average width of the lot shall be equal to or greater than the frontage requirements.
- C. Permit in a Commercial District manufacturing which is incidental to a retail business where articles are sold at retail on the premises and where not more than five (5) operators are employed in such manufacturing.
- D. Permit in a Commercial or Industrial District camps or mobile-home subdivisions provided that no trailer or mobile-home shall be located on a lot smaller than 10,000 square feet in area and follow the regulations adopted by the Selectmen and as outlined in the regulations of the State Board of Health.

ARTICLE XI

Amendments

This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting, and when such amendment has received a public hearing, which hearing has been advertised and given a legal fifteen day notice.

ARTICLE XII

Penalty

Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars upon conviction for each day such violation may exist.

ARTICLE XIII

Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not effect the validity of any other provision.

ARTICLE XIV

When Effective

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for Memorial Day. The money to be expended under the direction of the American Legion Post.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the use of Smyth Public Library. The money to be expended under the direction of the association.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred six dollars and ninety three cents (\$706.93) for Town Road Aid, to which the State will contribute four thousand, seven hundred and twelve dollars, and eighty eight cents (\$4,712.88).

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty five hundred dollars for summer maintenance of roads and bridges, to be spent as follows:

General expense of Highway Department	\$500.00
Maintenance of tarred roads	2,000.00
Maintenance of gravel roads, and cutting bushes	3,000.00
Rebuilding New Boston bridge	1,000.00

8. We the undersigned, do hereby sign this petition to see if the town of Candia will vote to tar the Island road, running from north to south, from the continuation of Critchett road to Route 101. Approximately one mile (1).

9. To see if the town will vote to spend a part of Town Road Aid Funds to build a tarred road, from the end of Merrill road, continued to Smyth School site, at the corner of Perdunk road. Approximately one half ($\frac{1}{2}$) mile. As petitioned by Henry A. Davis and eighteen others.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Volunteer Firemen's association. The money to be expended under the direction of the Association.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the maintenance of Red Phone Fire Alarm System, for the fiscal year, the money to be expended under the direction of the Association.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the maintenance and improvement of cemeteries, the money to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen and Superintendent of Cemeteries.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) to which the State will contribute twenty five dollars (\$25.00) for clearing fire road, under the direction of the Forest Fire Warden.

14. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a road running northerly from Route No. 101B to Hooksett line, known as Knowlton road.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the improvement of Moore Park field, or take any action relative thereto.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the care and maintenance of the town dump, or take any other action relative thereto.

17. To see if the town will vote to exchange with Norman Goff land at the four corners, near Goff's Garage, for land at side of garage joining land near Firemen's Hall or take any other action thereto.

18. To see what action the town will take after hearing a report on the proposed acquisition of the "Charming Fare Inn" as a Community Center.

19. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have been received in the past year.

20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to negotiate temporary loans, in anticipation of taxes.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to take down the dead Elm trees in the Villa or take any other action thereto.

22. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the Budget, not already acted upon, and authorize the Selectmen to raise and appropriate money for same.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Polls to close at 6:00 P. M. unless otherwise voted at meeting.

FINAL REPORT

This final report is submitted in accordance with the vote at the 1957 Town Meeting, under Article 17 of the Warrant, as amended, that a Planning Board be established to investigate zoning measures for the Town of Candia and report to the 1958 Town Meeting.

ZONING GENERALLY

In recommending a proposed Zoning Ordinance, we have been influenced by the following considerations:

- (1) Zoning is not a new or untried "fad"; the State law permitting towns to zone themselves was passed in 1925 and there are now *zoning ordinances in 69 New Hampshire communities*, including Bedford, Hooksett and Auburn.
- (2) The cost of zoning is insignificant; in nearby towns last year, for example, Bedford appropriated \$200., Hooksett \$100., and Auburn nothing as the ordinance was entirely self-supporting. Accordingly, zoning does not increase the tax rate.
- (3) The enforcement of zoning is not a problem; in the 32 years since zoning started, the New Hampshire Reports show **ONLY ONE LAWSUIT INVOLVING TOWN ZONING ORDINANCES** (Lancaster, 89 N. H. 483.).
- (4) Zoning works no hardship on the present inhabitants of the Town; the State law expressly forbids changing or restricting present uses or buildings that were legal before the zoning ordinance was passed. (R.S.A. 31:62) As a further protection, the State law requires a Board of Adjustment of five members to protect property owners from "a literal enforcement of the provision of the ordinance [which] will result in unnecessary hardship." R.S.A. 31:72.)

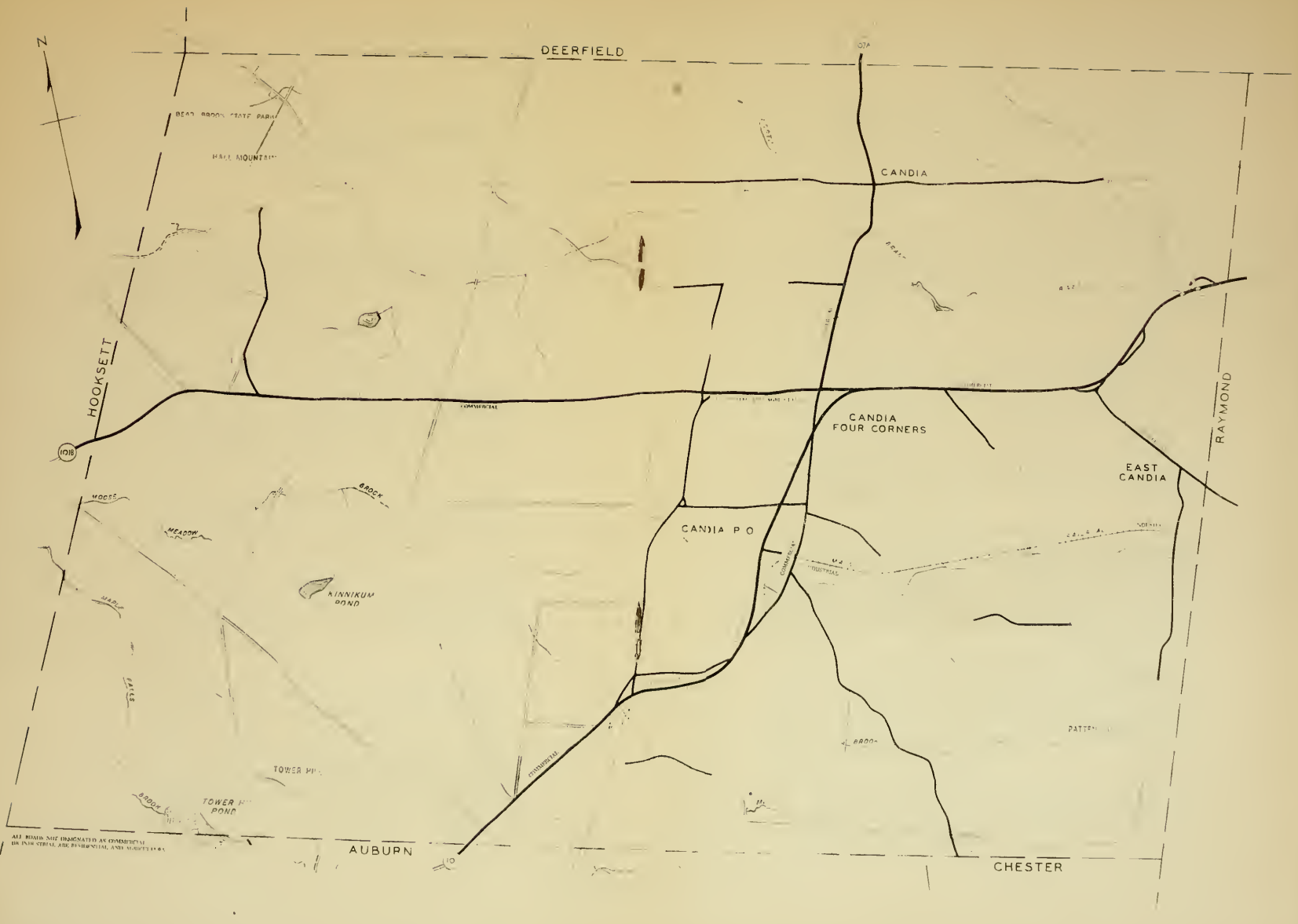

- (5) Building costs are not increased by a zoning law which has no building code or regulations (except to require a safe chimney) and does not require any grading, landscaping, etc.
- (6) By requiring an adequate-sized lot for sewerage and wells, the new owner is protected from congestion and population concentration resulting in either expensive private sewerage and water systems or an increase in the tax rate to provide public sewerage and water systems, school transportation, etc. In a town where land is plentiful, the cost of such a lot is insignificant compared to the cost of building a house.
- (7) Zoning protects the person of modest means who can afford to build a \$7,000.—\$15,000. home but who cannot (as a wealthy person could) to buy up adjoining land so that he will not lose the value of his home by having a business, industry, or "eyesore" started next door to him.
- (8) Industry and business are encouraged by having a definite, logical area where they know they can develop without raising a public outcry or running into crippling restrictions.

PROPOSED FINAL DRAFT

In preparing a zoning ordinance, we have followed the State Law which requires a preliminary draft and public hearings with legal notice, etc. In addition, members of the Board have had several meetings with church groups, fraternal organizations, PTA—in fact any group who would hear them.

None of us were experts in zoning laws and none of us either asked to be on this Board or sponsored the article calling for this study. In zoning, as in everything else, it is impossible to satisfy "all of the people all of the time." However, as a result of our study of the State law and the ordinances of other towns and our many meetings with the townspeople, we feel that our final draft

- (1) complies with state laws;
- (2) conforms generally in scope and general provisions to laws in the other 69 communities, although briefer and less restrictive than many;

(3) reflects the general opinion of the townspeople (except a small group opposed to any zoning).

The Final Draft changes many provisions of the Preliminary Draft and, for the convenience of the townspeople, we invite them to compare the following provisions:

ARTICLE III G (motor vehicles classified)

ARTICLE IV

A (Town Dump)

B (No. 2 incomplete buildings deleted)

C ("continuing" odor, smoke, etc.)

ARTICLE V

A 2 (two family—deleted)

A 3 (garage and lot of record—added)

A 6 (clarified—3 person limit applies only to listed *occupations*, not to professions, farming, etc.)

A 8 (signs—deleted)

A 9 (frontage reduced to 150 feet; VI 7—no frontage for commercial zone)

A10 (minimum lot reduced to 25,000 sq. feet)

A12 (commercial, etc. clarified)

ARTICLE VII (no frontage)

ARTICLE VIII C (signs—deleted)

ARTICLE IX (rewritten to require no permits for remodeling, etc.; chimneys clarified, etc.)

MOORE PARK REPORT

Since no report on Moore Park has been issued in recent years, a few notes on progress and plans may be of interest. Appropriations for the years 1955, 1956, and 1957 total \$200.00, with the full amount expended on a variety of development jobs.

The interest of the Candia Improvement Club was drawn to the Park through the development of a roadside picnic area in the pine grove. The State has provided the tables, and the Club has taken care of the trash disposal. The Club has mounted a prize bronze plaque. Town work in the grove area includes: removal of hurricane stumps; gravel fill of stump holes; finish grading and mowing; removal of hurricane logs; and the building of a good privy nearby. Care of the young pine has been started by Scouts, with thinning, weeding, and planting of red pine. This work should be continued. More finish grading is needed in the grove area so that more of the ground can be mowed. Extending the gravel fill along the swamp edge will bring waste ground into use.

The big need ahead is improving the surface of the Moore Park Field. This need was pointed out by the Fish and Game Club members preparing the area for a day of field games. The center of the field is of low fertility, with little or no grass, some patches smooth, some patches quite rough. The outer edges have been growing up rapidly to brush. For general recreation, a uniform grass surface is needed. Cost of the re-surfacing will run approximately \$400.00, the job to include plowing, fertilizing, and re-seeding of the 2½ acre area. Some preparation has been done. A bulldozer has dug out the field boulders, and all loose rocks have been removed. A compromise field line was staked out, and the brush cut to this line. The re-surfacing is a big job, and one that cannot be done piece-meal. Nor can it be started until funds are available for its completion.

Voters are urged to walk over the field to study its condition. The Park is a valuable recreation asset, particularly suited to use by large groups. Its field should not be lost through neglect.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1958

To the School Board of Candia:

May I present my eleventh annual report of the Moore School and at the same time express my appreciation for your interest and help in trying to make the educational system worthwhile in its desire to meet individual differences of the boys and girls of the community.

Schools opened in September 1957 with ten teachers and 260 pupils. Since that time we have had to add one more teacher while the total registration to date has been 276 children. Just after the opening of school it was found that because of the unexpected large entering class, Mrs. Sanborn had over 40 children in her room, a new teacher was added so as to adjust the children in all the rooms to meet this situation. Therefore, the first of October we were very fortunate to get Mrs. Velma Quimby from Fremont to enter the system.

This meant that we hired five new teachers this year to complete the staff—Miss Edna Kimball, Mrs. Lillian Bleumer, Mrs. Glen Phelps, Mrs. Marion Thorell, and Mrs. Velma Quimby. The remaining members of the staff are still Miss Hazelton, Mr. Lord, Mrs. Wheeler, Mrs. Harris, Miss Fellows, and Mrs. Sanborn.

However, just before the holidays it became necessary to replace Miss Kimball. Since teachers are very hard to find especially at this time of year, it was necessary to get some substitute to fill her place. Mrs. Helen Volk was kind enough to help us out until we could find a replacement. Up to the present time this has been impossible although some very poor specimens have made applications. It is here that we are still searching for a teacher to take Grade 7. It is possible that we may have to replace another teacher before the end of the year.

Why do these conditions persist in connection with our teacher situation? Every year we have to replace two and sometimes more teachers because of various reasons. In my opinion, the most important factor in this quest for good teachers is money. Of course, this is not the whole story because transportation and community activities are also very

strong reasons. Out of the eleven teachers in our system at the present time, ten of them live outside the town and travel to and from school every day. These towns cover Manchester, Raymond, Goffstown, Auburn, Chester, and Fremont. One of the first questions asked by a candidate for a position in Candia is the need for living in the town. They had rather live at home and commute instead of living in the community in which they are teaching. And what is more important to me, if we should require them to live here, they would pass up the position because they can get jobs which will allow it. It follows, then, that we not only have to get our teachers, but we must also take into consideration this transportation problem. This involves more money; more for better teachers and more to get to the school from out of town.

We do have some excellent teachers, but at this time every year we hope that those towns that can offer more money will not hear about them because we know that they are looking for greener pastures. When there are to be 500 vacancies to be filled in the state for next September with only 150 candidates being graduated from our colleges, is it any wonder that we have teacher troubles every year. This will continue as long as teachers are scarce and salaries are low.

For next year, we shall be able to drop a teacher, at least temporarily, because our enrollment estimates show that two teachers should be able to handle groups A, B, C. However, unless we can give the remaining teachers somewhere near what they are asking for salaries, then more replacements will be necessary.

At the time this report is being written, three and possibly four new teachers will have to be elected for 1958-59. Teachers just out of college are asking \$3500 and getting it. What do you suppose teachers like Mrs. Sanborn, Mrs. Thorell, Miss Fellows, and one or two others are going to ask with, from two to twenty years experience. There is only one answer.

The largest item on the budget will be tuition. Most of your children go to Manchester to high school. The tuition rate this year is \$372.00. Next year it will be \$384.00. Estimates show that we shall have about 61 pupils attending Central in the fall with about 20 children attending Raymond at approximately \$310.00 per pupil. It is not too difficult to figure that the tuition bill for 1958-59 will be close to \$30,000, an increase of about \$6000 and the chances of drop-outs becoming less and less especially for the next two or three years.

If you have a few moments, may I discuss with you the increase in enrollments of the Moore School and estimate the chances of another building program.

The new building has three rooms which have between 30 and 40 children. There will be about 55 children in the first three groups next year and these children will be housed in two rooms with about 23 to the room. This is enough for any primary teacher. With the elimination of one teacher another year, we shall have a room left in the basement in case of an unforeseen enrollment. But when this room is not available, where shall we put the increase? This question will be an important one within the next year or two. The census for September shows that unless we have people leaving the town, there will be more children enter the first grade than ever before. This is a question that the town will have to face in a very short time; why not begin to make plans now?

The year so far has been a hard one if we include all the problems we have had to face. However, there have been times when the pressure has not been too bad and even improved here and there.
