REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING DEERING, N. H., MARCH 13, 1945

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of Deering, N. H., was called to order by the Moderator, Carlton M. Sherwood, at 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth, it was voted to close the polls at five in the afternoon.

Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson, it was voted to take up the articles after article one, at eleven o'clock.

Article 1. Votes were cast for all officers on the Australian ballot as follows:

Selectman for three years: Carroll E. Greene had 29 votes, Ernest Johnson had 55 votes and took oath of office.

Town Clerk: Marguerite L. Dutton had 70 votes and took oath of office.

Town Treasurer: Marguerite L. Dutton had 71 votes and took oath of office.

Overseer of Poor: Chairman of selectmen had 25 votes; Arthur O. Ellsworth had 51 votes and took oath of office.

Tax Collector: Chester P. McNally had 74 votes and took oath of office.

Road Agent: Howard E. Whitney had 78 votes and took oath of office.

Auditors: Marjorie A. Holden had 73 votes and took oath of office; Eunice E. Willgeroth had 77 votes and took oath of office.

Library Trustee: Helena I. Taylor had 30 votes; Clara Rich had 37 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years: Hilda Wilson had 18 votes; Gladys Ellsworth had 57 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds for 2 years: Leonard Gray had 29 votes; Charlotte K. Holmes had 40 votes and took oath of office.

Constables: Sherrod Ashby had 17 votes; Harold G. Wells had 48 votes and took oath of office; William J. Dumais had 75 votes and took oath of office.

Surveyor of Wood and Lumber: Everett H. Abbott had 71 votes and took oath of office.

- Article 2. Upon motion made by Leroy H. Locke it was voted to raise \$2000.
- Article 3. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$3000.
- Article 4. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$300.
- Article 5. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted to raise \$250.
- Article 6. Upon motion made by Louise Locke it was voted to raise \$300.
- Article 7. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted not to raise \$300.
- Article 8. Upon motion made by Leonard Gray it was voted to raise \$40.
- Article 9. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted to raise \$600.
- Article 10. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted to authorize selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 11. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted to authorize selectmen to deliver inventory blanks when assessing.

Article 12. Motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth to pay road agent seventy-five cents, other rates to be the same, was defeated by a vote 14 for and 27 against.

Article 13. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted to appropriate \$5700 for a new tractor, when and if available. This amount is to be deducted from present surplus.

Article 14. Upon motion made by Leroy Locke it was voted to accept the Memorial Tablet from Wolf Hill Grange. It was also voted that a list of contributors be included in the 1945 town report.

Article 15. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$649.50 for T. R. A.

Article 16. Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to approve the article. There were 55 votes for and none opposed.

Article 17. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted to pay the moderator \$10 for conducting town meeting. It was voted to adjourn without date.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deering, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House, in said Deering, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$320 for street lights.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$300 for Blister Rust Control or pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$750 for purchase of road grader.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise a sum of \$40 for Monadnock Region Association.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$600 for Old Age Assistance and town poor.

- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing.
- 13. To see if the Town will raise \$649.50 for T. R. A.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise money for use on water supply for town hall.

THE GENERAL REPORT

The annual report should perhaps give us some kind of a picture of the kind of education being provided for our youth from the first grade on, but when town meeting day comes around we get all "steamed up" over some little item on the warrant so our over-all problems wait yet another year for discussion. Probably the most distressing feature of present day reaction to educational matters is the extreme inertia of the layman. This inertia results in a lack of information which promotes a lack of understanding and a lack of sympathy towards the whole problem of education. Most distressing is the vehemance and the ignorance with which views about education are expressed publicly and privately by many prominent people.

The basis of American democracy is that ALL people have value. Each individual has potential abilities, and given a chance, can make a unique contribution to the good of all.

Even from a narrow, selfish point of view, we cannot afford to have an ignorant and suppressed segment in our society. Whether we like it or not, these people are with us. Each individual becomes a producer and a consumer, hence an asset to our economic life, or he fails to produce and becomes a liability. Such persons become expensive liabilities if they have to be institutionalized, when for evidence we consider that America's annual crime bill exclusive of poverty is TWELVE billions annually while her total bill for education is nearer TWO billions annually.

In the East Deering school, Miss Milliken, is striving to promote the cause of worthwhile citizenship in the heart of every pupil.

Excellent judgment on the part of the school board has resulted in the seventh and eighth graders being transported to Hillsboro. This is of direct benefit to every person concerned. Particularly the smaller children who have a more homogeneous grouping in the Deering school. Similarly commendable is the decision to retain Miss Milliken, at a favorable salary. Continued association of a good teacher with her pupils is extremely important, whenever possible, in the learning process.

Hillsboro high school continues to provide a worthwhile and expanding educational program for our older pupils. As citizens, it is our solemn duty to make sure that every boy and girl gets a full education. It is perhaps quite easy at times to let the pupil stay home for some reason or other which later contributes to his losing interest in the better goal in life.

Please pay particular attention to the accompanying reports. They serve to inform us of educational progress in our community.

My greatest joy comes from the patient cooperation among parents, teacher, and school board in the community program.
