REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The following report of the School Board of Fitzwilliam, for the year ending March 1, 1891, is respectfully submitted :

In reviewing the work which has been done the past year in our schools, we feel that there has been an increasing interest among the parents and scholars.

We have endeavored to look well to the interests of all concerned, having made during the past year at least eighty-six visits, and requesting teachers to report to us the condition of their schools weekly.

The law compelling the town to furnish text books has been a great expense, and caused much extra labor for the School Board and teachers.

In some of our teachers we have been disappointed in their ability to teach and control those under their care, making it necessary to shorten their term of service.

A few whose work was fairly done would have been more successful had they performed their labor with more life and energy, while others have worked in a whole hearted manner, sacrificing their ease and convenience in school and out for the good of their pupils, teaching them how to think, how to study, and creating in them a desire for a higher standard of excellence ; with such teachers we would have been glad to supplied all our schools.

A word to the parents : We urge you to look after the schools where your children attend, let them feel that you, fathers, as well as mothers, are interested in the progress they are making in each particular branch ; that you are interested in the way they conduct themselves in school and around the

school buildings; encourage them to feel that they represent the honor of your homes, and their conduct reflects credit or discredit upon the family of which they are members.

It is a mistaken idea that the town system removes all responsibility from the parents to the School Board. It is by no means the case. It is impossible for the members of the Board to know as soon as the parents, if little by little, disorder, idleness and mischief creep into the school room, or if there is a lack of love and unity between teacher and scholars; we deem it a duty on your part and a favor to the Board, to inform them as soon as possible if such is the case, that they may have the opportunity to correct the trouble, if may be, otherwise to close the school without needless expenditure of time and money.

Thanking you for your co-operation in our endeavor to elevate the condition of our schools, we would respectfully suggest that the same liberal amount of money be appropriated as last year for the support of schools.

The library now contains 3017 volumes. The circulation has been at the rate of 3245 per annum. We trust an appropriation will be made at our next town meeting, sufficient to enable us to maintain at least our present standard. Many of the older books will soon be worn out and have to be cast aside. Good congenial books are very desirable company at any time, and especially so in our long winter evenings.

The multiplication of free public libraries is one of the honorable distinctions of the present. We would like to have the standard of our library so high that none need go beyond the limits of our own town in the prosecution of any study to which they may be inclined. The majority of our young men go out from us to gain a livelihood, or to seek what is called a fortune, elsewhere. If this be a necessity that is laid upon them, as they affirm, we can hardly be too liberal in providing them with the means of qualifying themselves beforehand for honor and success: and surely it is well that life should be sweetened as much as possible for those who must stay behind.

It is desirable that all drawers of books make use of the cards which have been provided for that purpose.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Fitzwilliam, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1.—To choose a moderator to preside in said meeting.

ART. 2.—To hear and act upon the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen.

ART. 3.—To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 4.—To choose by ballot an agent to have charge and control of town house, and determine the amount of his salary.

ART. 5.—To raise money to defray town charges, and determine the amount.

ART. 6.—To raise money for schooling, and determine the amount.

ART. 7.—To raise money for the repairs of highways and bridges, and determine the amount.

ART. 8.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed one hundred and fifty dollars, to build a lockup, and locate the same.

ART. 9.—To see if the town will vote to sell the hay scales.

ART. 10.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to complete the grading and fencing the new cemetery lot.

ART. 11.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars to build a school house near Fitzwilliam Depot.

ART. 12.—To see if the town will raise a sum of money, not exceeding three hundred dollars, for the purpose of erecting a soldiers' monument on the common.

ART. 13.—To see if the town will vote to instruct the School Board to return to School District No. 1 all the seats that said Board have taken from the said school house.

ART. 14.—To see if the town will vote to extend the time of allowing the five per cent. discount upon taxes, so as to include all taxes paid on or before October 1, of each year.

ART. 15.—To see if the town will vote to fix the price to be paid by residents and non-residents for lots in the new addition to the town cemetery, and also to determine what disposition shall be made of the funds collected for the sale of the same.

ART. 16.—To see if the town will vote to choose a committee of three persons to survey, and lay out, the avenues and lots in the new addition to the town cemetery, and construct a suitable and convenient entrance and gate to the said new cemetery; and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one hundred dollars, to be expended by the committee for that purpose.

ART. 17.—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to apportion to each highway district, their proportion of the highway taxes, according to the valuation in said districts.

ART. 18.—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from James Holman's house, south, to the end of said road.

ART. 19.—To see if the town will vote to allow J. Page's account against the town.

ART. 20.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed one hundred dollars, to purchase hose for the fire engine at the depot.

ART. 21.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars annually for the purchase of new books and repairs of old books until otherwise ordered by vote of the town; said sum to be expended under the direction of the Librarian and Supervisors of the library.

ART. 22.—To see if the town will raise fifty dollars for the purchase of books for the library.
