Town Meeting Warrant

(As Known February 18, 1957)

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Pine Blister Rust.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used for Rag Weed Control.

Article 5. To see what action the town will vote to take to provide for the disposal of rubbish and garbage and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Vital Statistics, the Littleton Hospital and expenses of the Health Department.

Article 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of highways and bridges, snow removal, oiling of its roads, and for Town Road Aid.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,700.00 for the lighting of streets for the ensuing year.

Article 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the highway department.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise

and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for sidewalk up-keep and repair.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Abbie Greenleaf Library the sum of \$500.00 for librarian's salary.

Article 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

Article 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to care for town poor.

Article 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of its cemeteries.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$173.77 to the White Mountain Region Association, being 10c per \$1000 of the assessed valuation (1/100th of 1%) for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter and advertising and otherwise publicizing the advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the region.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for maintenance of the Information Booth at the Town Building.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for legal expenses.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 to defray the town's share of Employee's Social Security.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the following: \$2,500.00 to pay the amount maturing on the Town Building and Water Works bonds; \$1,000 on outstanding Fire Equipment and Garage notes; \$1,200 on outstanding Mittersill

Road Construction notes; also the sum of \$650.00 to pay the interest on said indebtedness and on temporary loans.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,700.00 for payment of the Grafton County Tax.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for new hose and the installation of as many 2" hydrants as possible for fire prevention.

Article 22. To see what action the town will take in regards to repair and paint, or replace fence at cemetery and raise funds.

Article 23. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to defray expenses of planning board committee.

Article 24. To see what action the town will take in regards to further study of town history and raise necessary funds.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,620.00 for Capital Reserve Fund to be used for purchase of new equipment as instructed at the 1956 Annual Town Meeting.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to allow a discount for early payment of taxes.

Article 27. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

*Report of the Trustees of the Abbie Greenleaf
Library for 1956*

The organizational meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Abbie Greenleaf Library was held early in March. At this time Miss Elizabeth Billington was elected Chairman; Mr. Philip Struhsacker, Treasurer; Mrs. Howard Maybury, Clerk. Mr. Everett Grass was put in charge of maintaining the building and equipment; Mr. Struhsacker, grounds and Miss Billington, with the aid of the Librarian, books and periodicals.

The Board and Librarian continued to meet quarterly throughout the year.

Two trustees attended the Second Governor's Conference of Public Library Trustees at the State Library in Concord, and Mrs. Maybury attended the three day Library Workshop held in Littleton.

Early in May work was started on pointing-up the bricks, repairing drains and waterproofing the exterior of the library building. The interior was painted throughout. Lights were installed on each side of the entrance and new outlets and a cellar switch were added inside. The broken globes on the lights at the end of the walk were removed and the poles cut off. As the posts no longer serve a purpose, it is hoped they also may be removed in the future.

Mr. Warren Miller became janitor of the library in November and it is hoped that he will have time to care for the grounds during the summer.

Several special board meetings were called to discuss and make plans to apply for State Aid to build up the reference library, and thus be of greater service to the high school students. This application was duly made and on August 15th Mrs. Mildred McKay,

State Librarian, and Mr. Emil Allen, Ass't. State Librarian, visited the Abbie Greenleaf Library and interviewed the Librarian and Trustees. The library made a very favorable impression and the trustees were congratulated on their plans for the future. The application was approved and the library was granted \$300.00 State Aid to purchase young adult non-fiction and reference books.

The Greenleaf Civics Club has become interested in the project and is presenting the library with a table and suitable chairs for a "Children's Corner" in the reading room. This section will also contain the children's Bookmobile books. At the present time the Bookmobile is servicing the school through the library as a further endeavor to fill the reading requirements of our young people.

It is regrettable that between Friday evening, October 12th, and Monday afternoon, October 15th, the library was forcibly entered. The leaded glass window in the door leading to the basement was broken to gain access to the first floor. The Librarian's desk was pried open and \$15.47, received from gifts and fines, was stolen. The theft was immediately reported to the police.

The Board of Trustees wishes to take this opportunity to thank the faculty of Dow Academy and the Greenleaf Civics Club for their cooperation and encouragement.

Business meeting for consideration of the articles of the warrant will be called to order at 8:00 P. M.) to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary officers for the School District for the ensuing year.
2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
5. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid Fund together with other

income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

6. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for, and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State agencies.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE—1956

The school health program consisting of complete physical examinations, eye and ear testing, was carried out in Dow Academy. All pupils were eligible for physical examinations. Forty-eight were examined. All those participating in sports were given an athletic exam. Dr. Ralph Parker serves as School Physician.

Eye tests were done on all pupils. Hearing tests on the first through the eighth grades.

Polio clinics were held at Dow Academy. 167 injections given to students. This includes first, second or both shots.

Tuberculin patch tests offered to grades two, six, eight, and twelve. Twenty-five were tested, results very good.

Registration day for incoming students was held in June. Response was fair. This first step in a child's school life is an important one. I hope for 100% response next year.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

As I read Mr. Cole's excellent report it appears to me that school statistics have been fully covered and that I may well write a paragraph on the small New Hampshire high school and its future in New Hampshire.

Recently the State Department of Education has had committees working on the "Framework For Secondary Education in New Hampshire." These are preliminary proposals of standards for New Hampshire high schools about which you may wish to know more. I have listed below a few requirements that Dow Academy will probably be asked to meet in September, 1958.

1. Health and physical education will be offered two periods a week and the school shall provide at least three opportunities in the fine arts areas such as glee club, orchestra and art.
2. All staff members must be fully certified.
3. No teacher shall be assigned a teaching schedule with more than 5 different academic class preparations.
4. There shall be an effective organized guidance program.
5. A good school library.
6. Minimum school program of studies will provide 8 required units and 24 elective units, 12 of which are academic and 12 vocational and practical arts.

This last requirement is particularly difficult for us. It means that we must add new courses and extra

teachers. Your School Board is studying this problem and will present recommendations at the proper time.

Your School Board is to be commended for its interest in the welfare and education of Franconia children. I wish to thank each of you who help us in this important work.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I herewith submit my second annual report as Principal of Dow Academy. Insofar as much of last year's report remains unchanged, I shall concentrate in this report on those phases of school life and activities where changes of note have taken place.

ADMINISTRATION

The present school year began on Monday, September 10, rather than the traditional Wednesday after Labor Day. This year has seen the addition to the staff of two new elementary teachers and three new high school teachers. Mrs. Evelyn Howe of Bethlehem is teaching Grades 3 & 4 and Mrs. Jane Evans of Lisbon is teaching Grades 5 & 6. In the high school, Miss Laura Beth Barry of Franconia is teaching Commerce. Mr. Alvin Chase of Keene is teaching Chemistry and Shop, and Mr. Malcolm Sibulkin of Haverhill, Massachusetts, is teaching Social Studies. Teachers returning from last year include Mrs. Alice Leavitt, Grades 1 & 2, Miss Janet Stewart, English and Foreign Language, Mr. George McLure, Band, and Mrs. Marion Callender, Music. The community is fortunate to have in these times of teacher shortage such experienced and capable people on its staff.

The enrollment of Dow Academy is 130 students. A breakdown of this figure shows that 12 are in Grade 1, 14 in Grade 2, 8 in Grade 3, 14 in Grade 4, 11 in Grade 5, 7 in Grade 6, 11 in Grade 7, 10 in Grade 8, 13 in Grade 9, 9 in Grade 10, 12 in Grade 11, and 9 in Grade 12. 105 students live in the Town of Franconia, 6 are from Easton, and 22 are from the Sugar Hill-Streeter District.

Merton Shores continues to do a fine job in carry-

ing out his duties as school custodian. His presence and work in the building are invaluable. We should consider ourselves fortunate to have him.

CURRICULUM

Three new courses have been added to the High School curriculum. They are: Problems of Democracy, Senior Science, and Latin.

Physical Education has been added to the curriculum of the first eight grades.

SCHOOL LUNCH

The school lunch program, under the direction and guidance of Mrs. William Boutin and Mrs. Robert Stevens, is progressing nicely. Additional state aid is continually being received. However, more local support is necessary to provide your children with the type of program they should have.

SCHOOL HEALTH

Dr. Ralph Parker and Nurse Phyllis Rogers have given complete physical examinations to all students whose parents so desired. Mrs. Rogers has conducted eye and ear examinations. Polio vaccinations were made available to all students in a clinic conducted under the supervision of State District Nurse, Mrs. Loretta Russell and Dr. Parker.

SCHOOL BANKING

A school savings plan is now in effect for its second year. This is done in conjunction with the Littleton Savings Bank. The purpose of this program is to instill into our students the habit of regular saving. At present, the first seven grades are participating by adding to their individual accounts weekly.

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Dow Academy's activity program includes a variety of activities that try to meet the needs and desires of all its pupils: In athletics, golf, basketball, skiing, and baseball or softball are the major activities.

Dow's golf program was climaxed by a golf tournament, which was won by Robin Ball and Thomas Hunt.

Basketball was made available through the coaching services of Mrs. Agnes Andross of Lisbon and Mr. Curtis Brockelman of Franconia. Many thanks should go to those two people for the work they have put into our basketball programs.

Skiing continues to grow as the major school activity. Approximately seventy-five percent of our students participate in this program, which includes ski instruction, standardized ski testing, and competitive skiing.

Other activities consisted of: Student Government, Glee Club, Dramatics, Yearbook, Junior and Senior Prize Speaking, made possible by the Trustees of Dow Academy, Cheerleading, Dances, Food Sales, and Mountain Climbing, a new activity instituted and directed by Mr. Sibulkin.

This year has seen an increase in the participation in the activities, which has resulted in an improved program. Through their interest and by working together, the students and their advisors have made this program enjoyable and worthwhile.

CONCLUSION

Once again I wish to express my thanks to the people of Franconia, the Board of Education, Super-

intendent Ronald Perham, the faculty and students
for their cooperation and assistance.

Report from the White Mountains Region Association

Thanks to the fine cooperation of the towns in our Region, the Association has been able to carry on an extremely busy program aimed, as always, toward the benefiting of the entire northern part of New Hampshire.

To this end we have cooperated wherever it has been possible with any and all agencies that have been working along any lines that promised eventual benefit to any sort of business within our state and region borders. This is in line with the original Regional concept, that pooling of efforts can accomplish more than can be done by a lot of separate, smaller and uncoordinated efforts. Nevertheless, along with this we continue our own individual projects and plans, where these promise to be more directly productive.

Again we have distributed all over the United States nearly 100,000 pieces of promotional literature of all types—maps, lists of places to stay, picture folders, hunting-and-fishing folders, and winter-vacation brochures. We know these arouse interest and bring business because people write for them from all over the map; they also tell us later on that these folders were of definite help in causing them to decide where to spend their vacation time—AND MONEY! Your town was represented in each and every one of these folders.

Our 4-H Awards Program continues to encourage boys and girls to take part in, and do better in, this fine and worthwhile program. Through cash awards to members and clubs, we are proud to be helping these youngsters to be the constructive farm citizens of our Region in the future.

We have planned and cooperated with the planning and carrying out, as well as the publicizing of Old Home Days, Woodsman's Contest, Guides' Show, Community Festivals, Horse Shows and the like, as well as planning and setting up one of our own, the White Mountains Region Art Center. We have spent a lot of time on the road attending shows visited by hundreds of thousands of people in Boston, Hartford, and Philadelphia, and are planning more of such work.

As to results, we have again run a mail survey to find out what good we were accomplishing. From just one small sample (10% of 4000) of our mail requests, we turned up 148 parties numbering 440 people who came here. Only part of those told us how much they spent here, but that small part spent \$18,571.00!! Seems unbelievable until you realize you can't get by vacationing on much less than \$7.00 a day. Anyway, what they alone spent means that from that small group came back into this Region $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the total amount appropriated by our towns.

What this means to every taxpayer is that much money, either direct income or tax income, came here to help take the burden off the local people. The man who never sees a tourist would be paying much more on his tax bill all through this state if visitors were not paying a substantial share of the freight!! With your help, we'll continue to do our part in keeping the money coming in.
