

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Jackson on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Summer Highways.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Snow Removal.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Highways and vote to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise One Hundred Sixty-eight Dollars and Ten Cents (\$168.10) Town Road Aid so-called.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Poor Relief.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for support of Library.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) for painting Church.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for repairing and painting Town Hall.
- 12. To see what action the Town will take to provide for Selectmen's Office and for care of Town Books and records and appropriate money for same.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for repair and construction of sidewalks.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for support of cemetery.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Seventy-four Dollars and Forty-seven Cents (\$1,574.47) to re-imburse Town Treasury for expenditure in fiscal year 1938 for construction of State Aid Bridge on Carter Notch Road.
- 16. Petition by George T. Chubbuck and others to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve the surroundings of Perkins Spring.
- 17. To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate Seventy Dollars (\$70.00) for support of White Mountain Region.
- 18. To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) its proportionate share relative to total taxable valuation of Carroll County to cover deficiency in allotment for maintenance of County Extension Service Recreational Agent to end of fiscal year inclusive of July 31, 1939.
- 19. To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00)—an equal sum to be alloted from State Forestry Department—for tools for fighting forest fires.

- 20. To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) for pumping unit recommended by State Forestry Department for fire fighting.
- 21. To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for maintenance of slopes and trails, relocation of trails and maintenance of other skiing facilities.
- 22. To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for construction and upkeep of Skating Rink.
- 23. To see if Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for construction and operating expenses of Information Booth.
- 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the dual purpose of providing our town children with healthy recreational center and providing our summer visitors with a swimming pool to be constructed under a plan formulated by the Jackson Ski and Outing Club.
- 25. To see if Town will vote to discontinue use of that part of so-called Mile Circuit Road in Jackson Village extending from residence of Harry A. Thompson to site of Ellis River Bridge near entrance of Iron Mt. Road.
- 26. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Board of Trustees of the Jackson Public Library:

I beg to submit herewith my report of the work done by the Library and a statement of its condition for year ending 1939. The Library has been open 116 days; from July 1 to October 1, the hours were from 10 a. m. to 12 noon daily; for the remaining months from 2 to 4 p. m. every Saturday. In this time the total number of books given out was 2434.

There has been added to the Library by gift 19 volumes and by purchase 42 volumes, making a total number of books in the library 4247. About one hundred obsolete books have been removed to give more room for new books. In addition to the above we have on file the following magazines: National Geographic, Atlantic, Good Housekeeping, Saturday Evening Post, Popular Mechanics, Ladies' Home Journal, Pictorial Review, American, Woman's Home Companion, Home Arts, Colliers, Better Homes and Gardens, Child Life and Jack and Gill.

We gratefully acknowledge from Miss Bertha F. Rogers a gift of \$25.00 for new books.

The Public Library Commission's bookmobile service has been greatly appreciated. It has been coming once a month, beginning in July, from the State Library in Concord. The Jackson Library and the Dundee District, which is in charge of Mrs. Daniel Dinsmore, has had the benefit of the following number of volumes: Jackson Library: 35 adults, 20 juvenile; Dundee: 16 adults, 34 juvenile.

To the School Board and Citizens of Jackson:

The most notable achievement of the year is the improvement in the physical equipment of the Jackson village school. The installation of steam heat and of modern toilet facilities indicates a desire and willingness on the part of the citizens to give the children of the district superior conditions for carrying on school work.

It is a pleasure to report that under the direction of a competent staff of teachers there has been a notable improvement in attendance and in general morale of the school.

It is desirable to install new blackboards in the Dundee school where the present blackboard equipment is very unsatisfactory. The village school also needs painting both inside and outside.

There are at present eleven Jackson pupils in attendance at New Hampshire high schools. This is an indication of an increased interest in education.
