## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 14th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for a term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote in favor of revoking the Town Manager Plan, as provided in Chapter 55 Revised Laws of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting, "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town?"

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the Health Department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous ex-

penses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for protection of the premises on the Ammonoosuc River from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister control, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the Skating Rink, and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 5. To rescind all previous votes of the Town relating to a new bridge on Cottage Street, to appropriate a sum of money for the construction of a new bridge on Cottage Street across the Ammonoosuc River and for this purpose to authorize the issue of public improvement bonds or serial notes of the Town in a sum of \$30,000.00, under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute.

ARTICLE 6. To raise and appropriate a sum of money for the reconstruction of Cottage Street from the Boston & Maine Railroad crossing to the Hospital; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of public improvement bonds or serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1950, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 8. To rescind all previous votes relating to town audits and to authorize the Selectmen to have the accounts and records of all town officers examined and audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant beginning with the fiscal year 1950.

ARTICLE 9. To provide for the appointment of a Zoning Commission to study and recommend boundaries of various zoning districts and appropriate regu-

lations to be enforced therein, for the purpose of promoting the health, safety and general welfare of the community.

ARTICLE 10. If the Littleton Union School District votes to build a new elementary school at its annual meeting and the voters of the district desire to locate the school at Remich Park, to see if the town will permit the district to locate said school in the west end of Remich Park on land now owned by the town of Littleton.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 8, 1949

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ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, and one Trustee of Trust Funds.

After the close of the polls, the following results of the balloting for officers were announced: Town Clerk, Walter N. Heald, 1415; Selectman, Daniel M. Ellingwood, 867; Van H. Gardner, 780; Treasurer, Lawrence M. Colby, 1324. Library Trustees, George H. Richardson, 1200, Alexander J. Corey, 1184, Clarence I. Wiley, 1133. Trustee of Trust Funds, Lawrence M. Colby, 1213.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction of highways and bridges, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the Health Department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for protection of the premises on the Ammonoosuc River from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister control, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the Skating Rink, and for all other town charges.

VOTED; That the sum of \$150,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the following purposes: Town Officers Salaries \$7,700.00; General Government Expenses

\$6,400.00; Election Expenses \$250.00; Municipal Court \$800.00; Town Building Maintenance \$4,000.00; Police Department \$10,000.00; Forest Fires \$300.00; Blister Rust Control \$400.00; General Highway Maintenance \$16,500.00; Snow Removal \$7,000.00; Resurfacing \$7,000.00; Town Road Aid \$1,000.00; Village Streets \$12,000.00; Street Lighting \$8,000.00; Health Department \$300.00; Littleton Hospital Association \$6,000.00; District Nurse Association \$1,650.00; Vital Statistics \$300.00; Town Dump \$1,000.00; Local Welfare \$3,000.00; Old Age Assistance \$13,000.00; Recreation \$5,000.00; Parks and Playgrounds \$1,900.00; Community Center \$5,000.00; Public Library \$5,600.00; Cemeteries \$1,000.00; Memorial Day \$200.00; Advertising \$300.00; White Mt. Region Association \$600.00; Payments on Town Debt \$14,666.66; Interest on Town Debt \$1,333.34; Police car with radio \$2,500.00; Town Hall Improvements \$5,300.00.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State Aid for construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an Act to provide State Aid and for expenditure of public monies in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its Town highways.

VOTED; To pass over, subject included in Article 2.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies from time to time for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1949, and to be paid therefrom.

VOTED; That the Board of Selectmen be authorized to borrow monies from time to time, on the credit

of the Town, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1949 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action of the 1948 Town Meeting whereby it adopted the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law.

VOTED; To rescind the action of the 1948 Town Meeting whereby it adopted the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate 1/100th of one per cent of the Town valuation for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the Town, in co-operation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

VOTED; To pass over, subject included in Article 2.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Town Manager Plan in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 55 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire as amended, the following question to be placed on the ballot to be used at said meeting: "Do you favor continuing the Town Manager Plan as provided by Chapter 55 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, as amended?"

VOTED; To pass over, provisions being made for the same on the ballot, result of balloting for continuing Manager Plan, Yes, 1149; No, 445.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to continue for the year 1949 the present Aviation Committee, as provided in ARTICLE 13 of the Town Meeting of March 9, 1948.

VOTED; That the Moderator be authorized to ap-

point an Aviation Committee to represent the Town in all matters pertaining to aviation, to participate in long range airport development plans for Littleton and to co-operate with any similar efforts which might be made by neighboring towns or the White Mountain Region Association.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will approve the acquisition by the United States Government of 0.17 acres of land situated in the Town, such land to serve as a residence and headquarters for the U. S. Forest Service personnel, and described as follows:

All that certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in the Town of Littleton, Grafton County, New Hampshire; situated on the westerly side of Maple Street, with a frontage of 83.93 feet thereon; and on the northerly side of High Street with a frontage of 84.41 feet thereon, and known as the Horace J. York tract.

VOTED; That the Town approve the acquisition by the United States Government of 0.17 acres of land situated in the Town, such land to serve as residence and headquarters for U. S. Forest Service personnel, and described as follows:

All that certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in the Town of Littleton, Grafton County, New Hampshire; situated on the westerly side of Maple Street, with a frontage of 83.93 feet thereon, and on the northerly side of High Street with a frontage of 84.41 feet thereon, and known as the Horace J. York tract.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will elect to approve of the including of its officers and employees in the Employees' Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 201

of the Laws of 1945, and any subsequent amendments thereto.

VOTED; That the Moderator appoint a committee of three voters, which committee shall study the advisability of the Town adopting for its employees the Employees' Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, said committee to report its findings to the annual Town Meeting in 1950.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money for the purpose of providing funds for the Town's contribution to said retirement system for the coming year.

VOTED; To pass over.

ARTICLE 12. To see what action the Town will take relative to the adoption of a retirement plan for the employees of the Littleton Water and Light, under the Employees' Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, if authorized by the Legislature or under such plan as the Town may vote to adopt, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of providing funds for such retirement system.

VOTED; To pass over.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to borrow or hire such sum of money on the credit of the Town as may be necessary or advisable for the purpose of maintaining and operating its Water and Light Works and Department and to issue negotiable notes or bonds of the Town therefor payable at such time or times and upon such terms and rates of interest as they may think proper, and to authorize such officials as they may deem proper to sign and deliver said notes or bonds in the name of and in behalf of said Town, and to perform such other acts as may be required to

make said notes the official legal obligations of said town.

VOTED; The Selectmen are hereby authorized to borrow or hire such sum of money on the credit of the Town as may be necessary or advisable for the purpose of maintaining and operating its Water and Electric Light Works and Department and to issue negotiable notes or bonds of the Town therefor, payable at such time or times and upon such terms and rates of interest as they may think proper, and to authorize such officials as they may deem proper to sign and deliver said notes or bonds in the name and in behalf of said Town, and to perform such other acts as may be required to make said notes or bonds the official obligations of said Town. This vote subsequently declared illegal.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to investigate all matters pertaining to the construction of a new municipal building and report their recommendations to the Town Meeting of March, 1950.

VOTED; To authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to investigate all matters pertaining to the construction of a new Municipal Building and report their recommendations to the Town Meeting of March, 1950.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to look into the possibilities of a municipal swimming pool and report to the Town Meeting of March, 1950, and possible sites and costs.

VOTED; To authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to look into the possibilities of a municipal swimming pool and report to the Town Meeting of March, 1950, and possible sites and costs.

ARTICLE 16. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

VOTED; That the printed reports covering Town, Village and School receipts and expenditures be accepted, approved and placed on file.

ARTICLE 17. To choose any other necessary town officers for the ensuing year and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

VOTED; That the Selectmen and Town Manager be authorized to choose any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that has been passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

VOTED; That all previous votes of the Town relating to a new bridge on Cottage Street be hereby rescinded, and that the Selectmen be and hereby are authorized and instructed to borrow on the credit of the Town, the sum of \$55,000.00 to be repaid at a rate not exceeding \$3,000.00 per year, the same to be appropriated for the construction of a new bridge and approaches on Cottage Street across the Ammonoosuc River, subject to 50% Federal Aid participation. This vote subsequently declared illegal.

VOTED; To adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the legality of some of the votes and proceedings at the Town Meeting of the Town of Littleton, held on March 8, 1949 has been questioned; and

WHEREAS, it is the sense and opinion of the voters

present at said Town Meeting that the actions taken at said Town Meeting represent the wishes and intent of the majority of the voters of the Town of Littleton; now therefore be it

RESOLVED by the Town of Littleton in Annual Meeting convened: That the representatives to the General Court from the Town of Littleton are hereby instructed to introduce a bill in the Legislature at Concord legalizing the votes and proceedings at the Annual Town Meeting of Littleton held on March 8, 1949. Such a bill was introduced, but failed in passage.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

**Scope of Audit**

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds and Municipal Court. The accounts of the Water and Electric Light Department and the Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

**Financial Statements**

**Comparative Balance Sheets—December 31, 1948—  
December 31, 1949: (Exhibit A)**

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1948 and December 31, 1949, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$20,325.50 in the year 1949.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which effected the change indicated therein.

**Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C and D)**

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$39,134.82, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$104.31, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$39,239.13.

**Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit P)**

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1949, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit P.

**Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)**

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1949, is indicated in Exhibit F.

**Parking Meter Account: (Exhibit H)**

A summary of the Parking Meter account is presented in Exhibit H.

**Audit Procedure**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices

and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the collector's records.

### General Comments

#### Current Surplus:

The Current Surplus increased from \$748.35 on December 31, 1948, to \$7,407.19 on December 31, 1949, as indicated herewith:

#### State Aid Bridge Construction Account:

As of December 31, 1949, the liability to the State of New Hampshire on account of the town's proportion of the construction of Cottage Street Bridge to that date, amounted to \$22,657.19. This has been set up as a liability in the Balance Sheet (Exhibit A).

Also included as a liability is the item "O. W. Miller Co., Inc.—Cottage Street Bridge a/c—\$900.00". This represents the amount due Contractor as of December 31, 1949.

#### Accounts Payable—\$3,467.25: (Exhibit A and Exhibit Q)

On February 1, 1950, the auditors examined the 1950 paid invoice files to ascertain the amount of 1949 bills which were unpaid as of December 31, 1949. Exhibit Q

details such unpaid 1949 bills, of larger amounts, which were paid during the month of January 1950. The total amount of such bills was \$7,015.59, and from this amount we deducted \$3,548.34, representing invoices for December charges which normally are paid in the following month and charged to the next year's appropriation. This left a balance of \$3,467.25 of 1949 bills paid in January 1950, covering charges incurred prior to December 1949. This amount, \$3,467.25, has been included in the Balance Sheet of December 31, 1949, as "Accounts Payable."

It must be stated, however, that this computation was based entirely on the amount of 1949 invoices actually paid in January 1950, and does not include any 1949 bills which may have been unpaid on February 1, 1950.

#### **Tax Collector's Warrant :**

In our audit report of last year we commented upon the fact that the regular form of Tax Collector's Warrant Book was not being used, and that in place thereof tax collections were entered on individual card records. It is again brought to your attention that while an individual card system of this sort may serve as a subsidiary record, it does not replace the warrant book.

It is therefore again recommended that the regular form of Collector's Warrant Book be used when the 1950 tax warrant is committed to the Collector, and that all collections of taxes and interest as well as a record of abatements allowed be properly entered in this book by the Collector. It is very important that the warrant book be properly kept and retained as a permanent town record.

#### **Conclusion :**

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its es-

sential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Littleton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library, the Annual Report of the Librarian is Herewith Submitted:

The Littleton Public Library lent over 4,000 more books in 1949 than in 1948, a substantial increase in the use of the library. A generous book budget seems to have been one factor and it is hoped that the gain may be maintained and improved on in 1950 by supplying a good selection of the new and needed books.

This library has always taken full advantage of the services offered by the N. H. State Library and has borrowed by mail many books not in the Littleton collection. A recent cut in State Library funds has forced it to curtail its loan service to some extent. It means that this library will have to buy more books to meet the local demand or disappoint some patrons. This fact, too, should be considered when book budget figures are set.

By meeting certain standards and presenting a worthwhile objective, the library was fortunate to qualify for State Aid during the year. This consisted of about \$300 worth of new reference books which have brought the reference collection really up to date. The selection was done by the librarian and approved by the State Library. Careful future buying in this department should keep it useful and adequate.

Books received as gifts were much appreciated and provided extra enjoyable reading for patrons. The librarian will be very glad to call for any books the public may wish to donate. Books in memory of Mrs. Selma Linden, Mrs. Sylvia Reynolds and Miss Harriett Bickford were presented, adding to the

growing list of memorials received since the beginning of the custom a few years ago.

The rooms on the main floor of the building were completely repainted in December and the improvement is striking. The new fluorescent lights in the stackroom plus the light paint have made that room more usable and inviting to browsers who have commented enthusiastically on the change.

The librarian much appreciates the help and interest of the trustees and patrons who furthered the work of a successful year.

## FOREST FIRES—OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fire, but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the Warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Littleton Village District for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, which was made by this Division. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of this report.

**Financial Statements**

**Comparative Balance Sheets—Dec. 31, 1948-Dec. 31, 1949: (Exhibit A)**

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1948 and December 31, 1949, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt increased by \$12,067.12 in the year 1949.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Village District is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which effected the change indicated therein.

**Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures: (Exhibit C)**

A comparative statement of appropriations and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, is presented in Exhibit C. As indicated therein overdrafts of appropriations of \$1,647.18, less unexpended



balances of appropriations of \$797.35, resulted in a net overdraft of appropriations of \$849.83.

**Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit F)**

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1949, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit F.

**Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit D)**

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1949, is included in Exhibit D. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1949, is indicated in Exhibit E.

## GENERAL COMMENTS

**Accounts Payable: (Exhibits A & G)**

On February 1, 1950, the Anditors examined the 1950 paid invoice files to ascertain the amount of 1949 bills which were unpaid as of December 31, 1949. Exhibit G details such unpaid 1949 bills, of larger amounts, which were paid during the month of January 1950. The total amount of such bills was \$2,384.36, and from this amount we deducted \$283.91, representing invoices for December charges which normally are paid in the following month and charged to the next year's appropriation. This left a balance of \$2,100.45 of 1949 bills paid in January 1950, covering charges incurred prior to December 1949. This amount, \$2,100.45, has been included in the Balance Sheet of December 31, 1949, as "Accounts Payable."

It must be stated, however, that this computation was based entirely on the amount of 1949 invoices actually paid in January 1950. It does not include any 1949 bills which may have been unpaid on February 1, 1950.

**Equipment Purchased from Departmental Appropriations: (Exhibit C-1)**

It was noted that in addition to the equipment purchased out of the proceeds of the bond issue other equipment was bought and paid for out of the regular departmental appropriation. Such expenditures, amounting to \$6,627.74, are listed in Exhibit C-1.

**Conclusion:**

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Littleton Village District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

We drew off a list of the major items of inventory, comparing the quantities on hand at December 31, 1949 with the quantities on hand at the close of the previous year and found many items to be slow-moving. We were informed that a certain margin of inventory must be maintained from year to year as a stand-by in case of a major breakdown in the services of either department.

Innumerable adjustments were necessary to bring quantities per perpetual inventory cards into agreement with the results of the physical count. More care should be exercised to make certain that a requisition is made out covering material as withdrawn.

**Fixed Assets—(Net \$561,768.54):**

The Fixed Asset values as at December 31, 1949 are as reflected in the accounts of the Department and are without verification by us. A perusal of some of the entries made in these accounts since January 1, 1939 seemed to indicate the desirability of having detailed analysis made to ascertain the

extent to which accounts have not been correctly credited with respect to assets replaced, sold, or scrapped. The expected result of such analysis would not affect the net balance sheet values, as any required adjustment would be a proper charge to Depreciation Reserve in accordance with Public Service Commission regulations. Such adjustment would, however, result in a reduced gross asset value and a resultant reduction in the amount of future depreciation provision.

## Report of Board of Education

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To the Citizens of Littleton:

We herewith submit the annual school report. The report includes budgets and estimated receipts for this year and next year; report of the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission for the fiscal year July 1, 1948 to June 30, 1949; and written reports of the superintendent of schools and the headmaster of the high school.

An increase in the budget is necessary this year due to increased costs for services and an increase in costs of operation of the school plant. No balance can be anticipated as of June 30, 1950. Last year the assessment of \$106,925.00 requested by the district was reduced by the State Tax Commission to \$105,425.00. This reduction was possible because of an unexpended balance as of June 30, 1949. The budget this year calls for an appropriation of \$118,079.00. After deducting estimated receipts of \$5,110.00, the balance of \$112,969.00 shall be raised by taxation.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report relative to your schools.

Several changes have taken place in the faculty membership since my last report. Two replacements were necessary in the high school and five were necessary in the elementary grades.

Miss Janet Tinker of Wolfeboro, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire in 1949, was elected as girls' physical education coach and teacher of English to replace Miss Joyce Cleland who resigned to get married.

Mr. James Horton of New York and Kittery Point, Maine, a graduate of Trinity College and with a master's degree from Columbia Teachers College, and with two years' teaching experience was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Thelma Partridge, teacher of English and Latin, who resigned to get married.

Mrs. Lila Nutbrown of Berlin, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, with ten years' experience in the towns of Whitefield, Raymond, Hooksett and Errol, was elected sixth grade teacher in the Kilburn School to replace Mrs. Anne Cookman who resigned to accept a similar position in New Jersey.

Mrs. Frances Simonds of Lancaster, a graduate of Patterson State Normal School of New Jersey, with eleven years in that state, was elected second grade teacher in the Kilburn School to replace Mrs. Edna Holman.

Mrs. Dina Williams of Lancaster, a graduate of

Plymouth Teachers College, and with two years' teaching experience in Milford, was elected second and third grade teacher in the Apthorp School to replace Miss Norma Nichols who resigned to accept a position in Concord.

Mrs. Mavis Rutledge of St. Johnsbury, a graduate of Lyndon Normal School, with seventeen years' experience in the towns of Concord, Derby and Waterford, was elected to replace Miss Dorothy O'Neill who resigned to accept a position in the training school in Plymouth.

Mr. William Bigelow, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with three years' experience in Center Sandwich and Errol, was elected to replace Miss Pauline Spitzner who resigned to accept a position in the training school in Plymouth.

Mrs. Hilda Ahern of Rochester, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with two years' experience in Hillsboro and Ashland, was elected as a second teacher in the commercial department of the high school.

Mrs. Edna Holman was elected a special teacher to handle pupils with reading difficulties in the Kilburn School.

The usual minor repairs to keep the buildings in good condition were made during the summer months. A shower room with gang showers was set up in the boys' locker room in the high school building. Desk tops in two rooms in the high school building were refinished. At the Apthorp School the playground equipment was repaired and reconditioned, electric clocks were obtained for all rooms, the electric wiring in the basement was extended and made safer, and the fence around the school grounds was painted and tightened. At the Kilburn School, the fire escapes were



repaired and made safe for use in case of an emergency.

The report of the school nurse shows that 569 pupils were examined and the following defects found and reported to parents: Nutritional 146, defective vision 41, defective hearing 10, heart condition 5, defective teeth 189, diseased tonsils 51. Since the last report the following treatments were received by pupils: Heart 5, skin 3, teeth 192, tonsils 12, orthopedic 3, thyroid glands 2 and speech 1. It was noted that 32 cases of defective vision were corrected or improved. Dental clinics were held where 71 pupils received fluoride dental treatments. Vision clinics were held monthly and chest x-rays of contact tuberculosis cases were held twice during the year. Group and single audiometer tests were administered.

The penny milk program is being continued as in the past but at a greater cost to the district because of a reduction in the amount of reimbursement from the Federal government. A hot lunch consisting of one hot dish is served at cost during the winter months in all the schools to supplement the lunch brought from home in the lunch box.

The visual aids program has been extended this year. This improvement has been recognized by the Department of Secondary Teachers of the National Education Association, and Littleton schools have been designated as pilot schools for the area in this field.

A serious teacher shortage still exists in New Hampshire, especially in the elementary field. This same situation, however, exists in all states in the country except Arizona. The number of teachers that will be available for this next year in New Hampshire is estimated to be 300 short of the demand.

The condition of the roof on the high school building

deserves your attention. The 20 year bonded roof that is on the building is now 24 years old. It has given good service. Roofing experts have examined it and state that it is possible to patch the main roof but this type of job cannot be taken with too much responsibility. I recommend that you give serious consideration to renewing this roof in the near future. Should serious leaks occur, much damage might be done to walls and ceilings.

Prices on school supplies and equipment are still high. There does not seem to be any indication that they will drop, neither is there any sign of immediate increases. Your schools have been provided with a sufficient quantity of needed materials.

The statistical report and school calendar will be found on other pages of this report.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the citizens of Littleton, the school board, teaching staff and other district employees for their hearty cooperation during this past year.

## HEADMASTER'S REPORT

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To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following is my second report as headmaster of Littleton High School.

### REGISTRATION

The total number of pupils registered in the high school for the first semester is 292. This is an increase of six over last year's enrollment for a similar period; broken down this would mean an increase of nine seniors, one freshman, and six eighth graders while there was a decrease of one junior, four sophomores and five seventh graders. This indicates a fairly stable high school population.

Of the total indicated seven have left school since September, three of those seven having probably terminated their education, while the other four have moved out of town and entered other schools.

### CURRICULUM

The course of study in the high school has not changed from last year. The Driver Education course introduced last year has proved to be a most worth-

while addition. Thirty-four pupils, seniors, and juniors, with the exception of one sophomore, are taking the course. This constitutes a maximum for the time available. In another year I expect we shall be able to open the course to any sophomore fifteen years of age or older, thereby getting more pupils who have not already learned to drive.

As last year, I again recommend the addition of a full time physical education instructor who could make greater use of our physical education facilities. One of the functions of the high school should be a compulsory course in physical education whereby a pupil could earn a credit toward graduation. Such a move would also result in a better distribution of teacher load throughout the high school.

#### TEACHING PERSONNEL

Three new teachers were added to the Littleton staff this year. Of these three one was an additional commerce teacher to share the load of an ever increasing demand for commercial subjects. All teachers have shown a sincere professional as well as personal interest in the school and its pupils. Sincerity of purpose and cooperative spirit are requisites of good school morale. Littleton High school has all of these.

#### EXTRA-CURRICULA

The school is maintaining its activities program as it did last year. Twelve different organizations meet at least once during each week. These groups include the following: Freshmen boys' basketball, Girls' intramurals, Orchestra, Hunting and Fishing, General Art and Printing, Student Council, Boys' and Girls' Glee Clubs, the Record Staff, Dramatic Club, Public Speaking Club and Knitting Club.

A program of Varsity, Junior Varsity and Freshman boys' basketball is being handled by Mr. Knowles and Mr. Root, who also have a program of basketball for boys of elementary and junior high age every Saturday morning at the high school.

The Student Council, under Mr. Pasichuke, is beginning to function as a school governing body and is now working on a number of worthwhile projects.

Bearing in mind that all of these groups, with the exception of boys' varsity and junior varsity basketball, meet during the activities period at some time during the week, it would seem there is something of interest for most of the pupils in the high school.

## GRADUATES

Our 1949 graduates numbered 46. Approximately 30% of this group went on to school and I believe it a healthy sign that there have been no drop outs to date. The following is a breakdown of schools being attended by last year's graduates.

The remaining thirty-two are creditably carrying out the traditions of Littleton High School in all

walks of life from housewives to service in our Armed Forces.

### INSTRUCTION

Our visual aid program has expanded tremendously and is proving itself as an instrumental medium. Local professional and business men have made themselves available to many of our classes.

We are still holding "Open House" in order to give parents and teachers an opportunity to discuss such problems as marks, behavior, and any others pertinent to school work. This can, and should, be a great help in fostering better parent-teacher-pupil relationships. The teachers are making themselves available; I wish more parents would take advantage of this chance to help us better meet the needs of their children.

The staff is anxious to serve the students of Littleton to their fullest capacity. It is the students' responsibility to take advantage of this opportunity.

### CONCLUSION:

We of the staff feel that Littleton has a good school, but will not be satisfied until we have made it a still better school. We all are appreciative of the fact that our superintendent feels as we do, and are happy in the knowledge that we are all working together to achieve the same goal, the development of a rich, full, educational experience for the students of Littleton High School.

## Report of the Committee on Plans for a New Elementary School

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At the regular school district meeting held at the town building on Saturday, March 12, 1949 the final action taken on Article 8 was as follows:

Voted, that the district authorize the school board and two other legal voters of the district appointed by the school board, to act as a special committee recommending to the district at either a properly called special meeting or at the next annual meeting, a site for a new elementary school, to engage an architect to assist in the preparation of preliminary plans for such a building and to provide \$700.00 to be made immediately available for this purpose.

### **The Committee**

The school board, in compliance with the vote of the district appointed Vonley Ruggles and Trevor Mooney to act with the board as a committee.

The first meeting of the committee was held on April 14, 1949 at which time Kenneth Bixby was elected chairman, Trevor Mooney, vice-chairman and Supt. Leslie S. Cummings, clerk.

### **Meetings**

Ten meetings have been held by the committee to consider possible sites, architects and plans. After interviewing a number of architects, your committee voted to engage Hudson and Ingram of Hanover, New Hampshire to assist in the preparation of preliminary plans. As is customary, it was agreed that this firm shall be retained as architects until the building is completed or a period of five years has elapsed.

## Sites

Sites that have been given serious consideration include the southwest corner of Remich Park and the combined properties on Union Street comprising those known as the Emery Houle place, the Jewell Homestead and the Goad property. Both of these sites have characteristics that make them worthy of consideration. Mr. George Richardson was engaged to survey the sites and send his elevations to the architects.

## The Building

The architects have submitted a number of sketches that have been studied by the committee. These have been revised and re-drawn to meet the recommendations of the group. Final revisions were made at the meeting held on February 7, 1950. At this time the architects were instructed to prepare presentation drawings that might be shown to the voters of the district.

A description of the building recommended by the committee is as follows:

A one-story elementary school with twelve classrooms and an additional room for kindergarten. In addition to the regular classrooms is a combination auditorium, playroom and lunchroom 40'x64' with stage. Adequate space is provided for kitchen facilities adjoining the lunchroom. Other units include necessary toilet facilities, a health unit, teachers' room and adequate storage space.

A typical classroom will have wardrobes for pupils' clothes, a sink with bubbler, steel sash windows with directional glass blocks above windows, unit ventilators, low counter in rear and on window side of each room. Rooms for the first three grades will have toilet facilities adjoining each room.

The auditorium, lunchroom, playroom will have in-wall tables that may be easily moved from floor space when room is to be used for play or auditorium purposes. Auditorium will seat approximately 400 persons. The kitchen adjoining the auditorium will be adequate to permit the preparation of school lunches.

Construction of the building will be of brick and cinderblock. Ceilings will be of suspended acoustical tile, floors of asphalt tile and corridor walls will be of glazed tile for a height of 4'.

### Costs

Preliminary estimates on the cost of the building are as follows:

Competitive bidding may cause a reduction in the above costs.

### Conclusions

The committee feels that the building as planned by the architects is very good. Mr. Paul Farnum, Chief of the Division of Administration, of the State Department of Education, has studied the plans and was impressed with the general layout. He added that they had some excellent features and should serve the community well.

No one site is being suggested at the exclusion of the other. It is hoped that the voters of the district will consider the possibilities of each as a functional playground area for the children of the community, considering such factors as safety, possibilities of

expansion and possibilities for play areas for the various age groups.

Since this building will do so much toward improving school facilities and broadening the school program afforded our children it is recommended that serious consideration be given this report.
