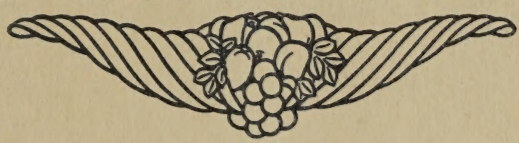

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack, in said state qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Loudon on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day.
4. To see if the town will accept state aid for highways.
5. To see if the town will vote to build one permanent bridge.
6. To see if the town will vote a discount of two per cent on all taxes paid on or before June 15, 1923.

7. To elect one selectman for three years.

I trust that a few of the parents in Boscawen and Canterbury will note that their children have given their towns a bad tardiness record. The parents and citizens of Canterbury and Salisbury should realize that the poor attendance in their towns is wasteful of the teachers' time and the town's money.

In small New Hampshire towns, whose inhabitants are largely of old New England stock, it ought not to be necessary to employ a truant officer to drive children to

school. School Boards, however, neglect their known duty if the conditions shown are allowed to continue indefinitely.

I am glad to report that changes in the teaching force last September were few and that the changes during the year have been fewer still. The salary range is from \$576 per year to \$936, Loudon paying the highest and the lowest salary. Only two graduates of normal schools are employed by the rural towns of the union, one by Loudon and one by Boscawen. These teachers receive salaries higher than any other teachers in the union, outside of Penacook.

Several excellent teachers are employed who are not graduates of normal schools. A number of these have recently taken summer courses. All the other teachers would receive help and inspiration from a six-weeks course during the coming summer.

The character of instruction throughout the union is improving and will continue to improve if the teaching force can be made fairly permanent. We should plan to retain most of our teachers for another year, urging several (and requiring a few) to attend summer school. In perhaps no case would there be a gain in changing teachers unless we should be willing to pay a higher salary for the new teacher.

The institute for rural school teachers held in Loudon last Fall gave practical help to the teachers who attended. I hope some other town of the union will try to secure such an institute during the coming year.

In Loudon the income from Mr. Sanborn's bequest for maps has become available. The maps, ordered in the Fall, have finally arrived and are now ready for distribution. In a few years we shall have an ample supply of maps.
