THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Marlow qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Jones Hall in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a town clerk for the year ensuing.
2. To choose a selectman for the three years ensuing.
3. To choose a selectman for the two years ensuing.
4. To choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor.
6. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid for highways and to raise money for the same.
7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of trunk line and state aid roads.
8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of highways and bridges.
9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town library.
10. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the observance of Memorial Day.
11. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the observance of Old Home Day.

12. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges and to apply on town debt.

13. To see if the town will vote to paint Jones Hall and raise money for the same.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising money for the control the White Pine Blister Rust.

15. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of three hundred dollars, the income thereof to be expended yearly in caring for two lots in the village cemetery, under conditions defined in the will of George E. Reed, a copy of which will be presented at this meeting.

16. To bring in your ballots upon the question as to whether the amendment proposed by the Convention to revise the Constitution shall be approved.

17. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway in said town leading from the Fox hill road to the Mansfield place, so-called.

18. To hear the reports of officers, agents or committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating therto.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board of Marlow, N. H. :

The statistical tables, giving data concerning the schools are appended to this report.

The gradual improvement of the schools, under the plans laid down during the chairmanship of the Rev. H. A. Cooper, regarding the physical condition of the building, have been carried out by the present board. Under the conditions, it seemed impossible that so much improvement could have been accomplished with the limited funds at hand. By careful management and sacrifice of personal time, two floors instead of one will be in position this year, removing the unsafe and unsanitary conditions present while the old rough board floor was in place.

The advent of Mrs. L. Alice Douglas, a teacher of vision, imbued with fine community spirit, increased still more the educational advantages offered the children. She is ably assisted by Miss Doris Fletcher, formerly teaching in Acworth.

Under Mrs. Douglas' management, with her enthusiasm, it was not hard for the children to arrange for a school fair. The proceeds went towards a Victrola for the lower grades, and a drinking fountain for the upper.

We believe that a comparatively small outlay of money to make the school building more attractive will result in greater pride, and in greater interest, on the part of children and parents. Lack of suitable playground space is indeed unfortunate. The children have far less suitable playground

space than is found in the average crowded city school, with land selling at a much greater cost per square foot.

The superintendent recommends the following plans, not to be carried out all at once, but as something to look forward to, in a gradual improvement program:

1. Refinishing the hallways to the schoolrooms, to use them as coat and cloak rooms.

2. Partitioning off a part of the hallways and installing chemical toilets.

3. Far better lavatory facilities, so that better cleanliness of hands and faces can be secured during the actual school hours when the children are not under the usual cleanly surrounding found in their homes.

4. Drinking fountain installation for the lower grades.

5. Ventilating stoves for both rooms.

6. Adjustable shades.

7. The replacing of old and worn out desks by adjustable desks.

8. Full equipment of maps.

The superintendent desires to express his pleasure at the cooperation and friendliness, coupled with sound advice and progressive spirit, which he has found present always in board or personal conferences.
