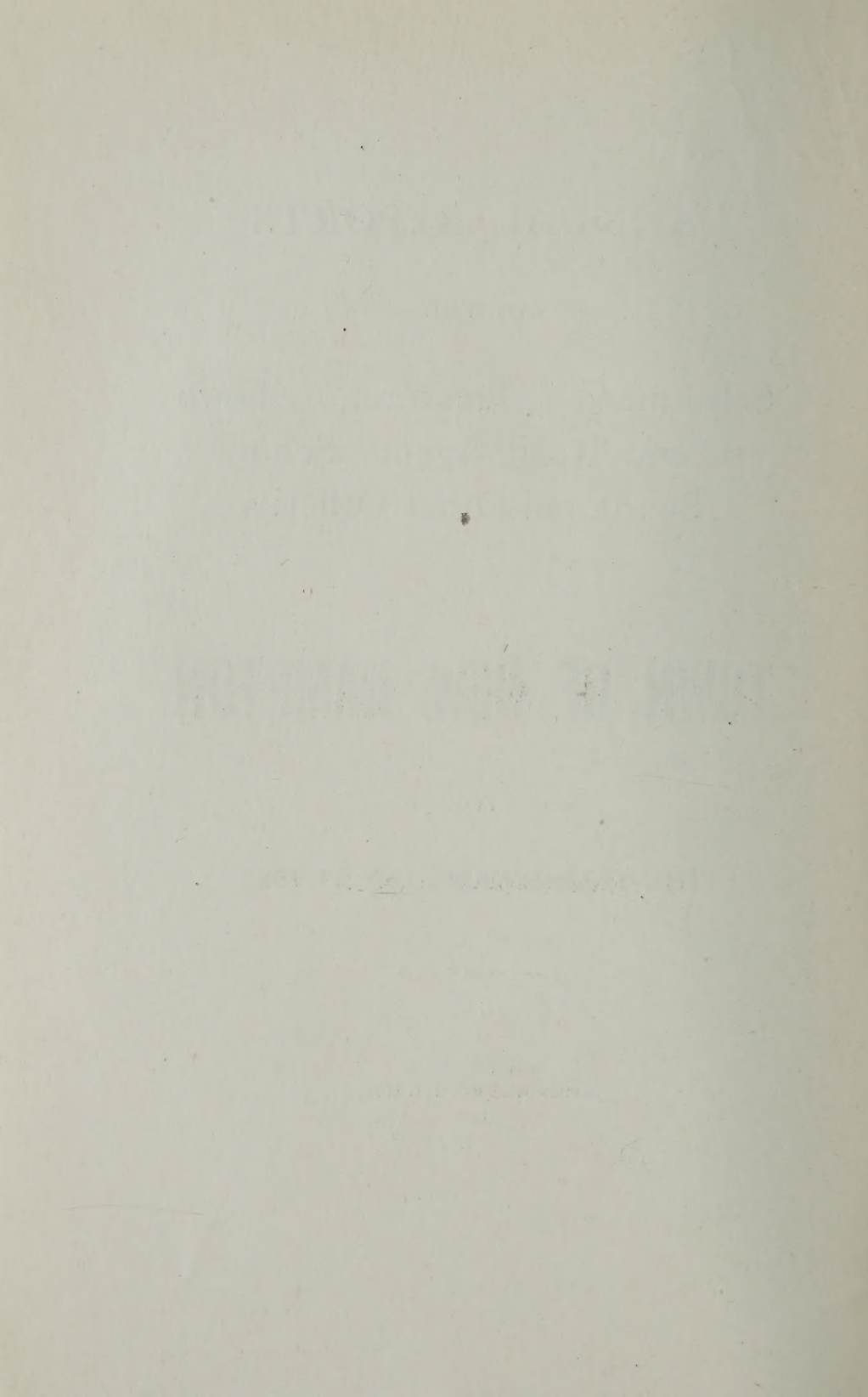

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

As each school year begins July 1 and ends June 30, a report issued in the middle of the year following must of necessity deal largely with matters somewhat out of date at the time of publication. Thus the figures given in the following reports of your School Treasurer and in the financial statement required by the State Board of Education cover expenditures to July 1, 1924, and from appropriations actually voted and authorized at the annual meeting of March, 1923.

The policy of your committee, therefore, is and has been to make its report deal with matters relating to the current year, and to suggest such appropriations for the coming year as will enable your new school board to continue giving our children the best schools of which it is capable.

For several years your board has concentrated its efforts upon a few essentials which we firmly believe are necessary for good schools: 1st, good teachers; 2nd, comfortable, clean, sanitary buildings; 3rd, good fuel.

Each year brings some changes in the teaching force, and it was with much regret that we could not induce Miss Goodwin to continue longer in our village school. We were, however, fortunate in securing a teacher of long and successful experience in handling large schools, and we feel she is doing excellent work in this district.

We were also fortunate in being able to induce Miss Marion Woodman to again take up work in the Plaisted school where an experienced teacher was much needed. Mrs. Elva Sanborn was secured for the Old Institution

district, thus, of our six teachers, four hold State Certificates and three are Normal Graduates. We doubt if many towns of six schools in the state can show a higher average efficiency in its teaching force.

In the matter of repairs on our buildings, a general inside overhauling was given to the Hannaford school room. A new hard wood floor, new slate blackboards, rearrangement of the heater, ceilings and walls tinted and woodwork painted. The south side of this building and both sides of shed were reshingled. At the Fiske and Old Institution buildings, the ceilings and walls were newly tinted and new sets of slate blackboards installed with some other minor repairs in sheds, toilets, etc. The village building was repainted.

As to fuel, your committee has adopted a policy of arranging for its wood a year in advance so that it may be cut, dried, fitted and housed ready for use when wanted. This proves not only economy but for the most part we are able to get better wood.

For the coming year we feel that the district should appropriate enough for repairs to refloor, repaint, and retint the interior of the Winona School house with such other minor repairs as will bring this school room up to the present standard of our five other buildings. The Hannaford building should have one coat of paint outside, and the Plaisted needs two coats of outside paint, while the Fiske School house should be reshingled. We recommend all these repairs in the interest of economy, but leave it for the district to determine how much of the work shall be done this year.

As required by law we make the following estimate of the amounts necessary for the support of schools for the year beginning July 1, 1925.

These records for the most part are very complimentary to the teachers and the communities. Such a marked improvement can come only when there is good cooperation.

Tardiness

During 1923-24 there were 47 fewer tardy marks than the year before, with a marked improvement at Old Institution and Winona. Plaisted and Hannaford went the wrong way and materially hurt the record. There should not be over 200 cases of tardiness in the whole town.

Parents, the teacher and probably the superintendent are at fault when a school has an average tardiness of 10 per pupil.

Children's Fair

The New Hampton Grange certainly exemplifies the best teachings of the Order when it sponsors and encourages such an enterprise as the Children's Fair. To the Superintendent such an event was entirely new, but he was thoroughly converted to the idea and hopes to be able to give more intelligent aid in the coming year.

All of the schools were represented and took part in the exercises. The Village school did an especially good piece of work with the little play, "Fire Prevention."

Winona was again acclaimed as the Blue Ribbon School for its excellent general exhibit.

The prizes were quite generally distributed throughout the town, so that many had a share in the awards.

The boys and girls will watch their gardens with more critical eyes hereafter because of the lessons learned.

The schools are doing better work this year in reading, spelling, and arithmetic. The first and second grades are showing marked improvement and there is a

general increase in accuracy of work in the upper grades.

The town is greatly indebted to its School Committee for its intelligent, economical and systematic care of the school properties.

It is well to bear in mind also that without State aid it would be difficult if not impossible to maintain the present average of high grade teachers without excessive taxation.

Last year there were 302 visits by parents and citizens to the schools. This shows an excellent interest, but we hope for an increase this year. These visits stimulate the teacher and the pupils and are generally helpful to the whole community.
