WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg, in the County of Coos, in the said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Pittsburg, on Tuesday the 8th. day of March, next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget, and raise the money for same.
2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to distribute blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for the same.
5. To see if the Town will vote to elect a committee to set a date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
6. To see what action the Town will take in regard to skating rinks, and raise money for the same.
7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to selling the Town Farm.
8. To see if the Town will raise the amount of \$500. to lay out and gravel the Stewart Young road.
9. To see if the Town will vote to add qualified names to the War Memorial and raise money for the same.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000. to extend the Hollow Cemetery.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000. to widen the road in front of the Indian Stream Cemetery.

12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to having one Road Agent for the 3 districts, to be effective a year from this meeting, and to fix a salary for the same.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 for repairs to the River Road bridge.
14. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 154, to authorize the Selectmen to appoint three Firewards, one of whom shall be appointed Chief Fireward, to administer the affairs of the Pittsburg Fire Department in accordance with said chapter, including the appointment of necessary firemen and their organization into companies, the firemen to have the right to elect or appoint their officers.
15. In the event that the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the voters will authorize the Pittsburg Fire Department to go to the aid of another city, town, village or fire district within or without the State, for the purpose of extinguishing fires therein, charges or reimbursement for such outside services to be established by the Firewards.
16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) for the purchase of Scott Air-Paks for the Fire Department.
17. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under Article 18.
18. To bring in your ballots for the election of one Selectman for three years, one Road Agent for the Lake District, one Road Agent for the Middle District, one Road Agent for the Lower District, a Town Clerk, a Treasurer, three Auditors, one Overseer of Welfare, one Library Trustee, and one Trustee of Trust Funds.
19. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Polls shall be opened at 10 a.m. and not to be closed before 6 p.m.

Worked in cooperation and attended meetings with the White Mountains Recreation Association, Coos County Rural Areas Development Committee, Coos County Planning Committee, Carroll County Rural Areas Development Committee, N. H. Ski Areas Operators Association, White Mountains Region Industrial Council, the Coos, Carroll and Grafton Counties Community Action Program. The association with these many groups has been mutually helpful in developing new projects and programs in the north country.

To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate for the balance of the current as well as for the

forthcoming school year.

8. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title III, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board.

Superintendent's Report

To The School Board and the Citizens of the School District
of Pittsburg

FOREWORD

If the age old saying "the proof is in the pudding" still holds true, and it is strongly suspected that it would be extremely difficult to come up with anything the contrary, then it would seem to follow that possibly a brief look at two of the outcomes attributed to our overall educational effort provide opportunity for comparison. The two areas we have particularly in mind, the technological and the sociological, in so far as performance is concerned, furnish perhaps as contrasting pictures as could be chosen. Certainly, from the standpoint of the utilization of know how in the former, no matter in what direction we may look, as compared to that of a decade ago, our accomplishments have been truly phenomenal. We are told that, so tremendous has been the acceleration of the progress made during this short period of time, what has been accomplished exceeds even that of the whole previous century. And now to actually witness what is taking place in our present day space program is almost beyond comprehension.

To turn now from the first of the two pictures we are to examine to look at the second, we are struck with the contrast of the hue between the two. This second one, which has to do with how we get along with our fellowmen, does not have the luster and the definiteness that stands out so eminently in the first. It jolts us into a greater awareness of that which every single one of us very well knows, whether or not admitted, that it is one matter to determine what things can do and in getting them to do it, and that it is quite a different matter to determine what we can or should do and in getting us to do it. The distance across this wide gap between really knowing and actually doing, considered either individually or collectively, has been narrowed little if any down through the many years. How to bring these two parallel fields of endeavor nearer together is still our greatest unsolved problem, and should constitute our major educational objective. The big question is, will we ever acknowledge this grave responsibility that is ours and really face up to the challenge? Past circumvention causes one to wonder.

TEACHERS

Three new teachers have joined the staff this year. Mrs. Donna J. Gesner, a graduate of Farmington State Teachers College in Maine, teaches Home Economics in Grades 7-12, and General Science in Grades 7-8. Perley Henderson, an experienced teacher, who received his training at Plymouth State Teachers College, and who has served in the Armed Services, teaches English and Social Studies in the 7th & 8th Grades and Mathematics in the 7th Grade. Winston J. Young, whose undergraduate work was done at the University of New Hampshire and at New England College teaches English and Social Studies in the High School and coaches Girls' Basketball. In addition to the three new faculty members, David Hall has been employed, also, to coach Boys' Basketball.

The teachers who have returned to work with Grades 7-12 with respective subjects taught are: Principal Stephen E. Dehl, Mathematics; Floyd F. Burrill, English, French; Joanna T. Manning, Social Studies; Raymond P. Stuart Sr., Shop; and Katherine B. vonDohrmann, Business. The teachers who have returned to work with the first six grades and their respective grades are Alma B. Chappell 1-2, Rosalie F. Hawes 3-4, and Doris J. Chappell 5-6. School Librarian, May F. Thibeault, works full time now with Grades 4-12, and Louis E. Micucci, employed on a part-time basis to teach Music, works with pupils at all grade levels.

SCHOOL NURSE — HEALTH

We are very much pleased to report that in addition to the vitally important work customarily done by our school nurse in safeguarding the overall health of our children through the conducting of periodic checkups, physical examinations, and various clinics that a beginning has been made in dental care this year. This has been brought about by every district in the supervisory union taking advantage of a program sponsored by the State Department of Health and Welfare wherein up to a specified limit funds raised by a local school district are matched dollar for dollar for the care of children's teeth. It is noteworthy, too, that in recognition of the urgent need of dental care even beyond that which is indicated above, that the Pittsburg School Board has included an article in the warrant to provide an opportunity to raise additional funds for this work.

ENROLLMENT AND ATTENDANCE

Although the combined enrollment of the elementary and high school is only one more than that of last year, it reflects the

trend of the past seven years of a continual increase. For purposes of comparison the number of pupils enrolled in Grades 1-8 and 9-12 for the past six years beginning with the current year shows successive counts of 105 and 69, 106 and 67, 102 and 47, 101 and 39, 113 and 38, 120 and 36, 113 and 41. Ten high school and two elementary pupils are enrolled at the present time from Clarksville. The average percentage of attendance for the past year was 96.72 in Grades 1-8 and 96.84 in Grades 9-12 while the total number of tardinesses for these respective groups was 13 and 5.

RENOVATIONS — MAINTENANCE — EQUIPMENT

With the moving of the Typewriting Class into a larger room, and in converting the one formerly used for use by smaller classes in other subject fields, somewhat more extensive renovation work was required than is usually done. The inside windows on the north side of this room were covered with plywood panels, the bulletin board was moved to a new location, two blackboards were installed, and bookshelves were constructed.

In addition to the work done in this room, sliding doors were installed on the front of the storage space in both the main and 3rd & 4th Grade rooms; more shelves were put up in the same rooms; the heavy duty shelving in the library was extended to provide needed space for more books; the tops of a considerable number of elementary pupil desks were refinished; such window shades as showed excessive signs of wear or did not operate properly were replaced; and extensive interior painting of the walls was done through practically the entire area on the first and second floors.

Items of equipment purchased during the past year included 2 sets of lockers for the Gymnasium; 18 transfer cases, 2 dozen slide rules, 10 stools, and 8 radio kits for Shop; 3 typewriters for the Commercial Department; 5 molecular models, a primary and a secondary coil, a revolving stool, a tuning fork set, a wave tank, a styrofoam ball set, a bicycle wheel gyro, and 4 programmed learners for the Science Department; and a piano, tape recorder, and combination slide-film strip projector to be used by the entire school.

NOTES ON THE BUDGET

The School Board's Budget for 1966-67 is \$115,457.00 in comparison to \$110,078 for the current year. This amount is reduced by estimated receipts of \$12,000.00 which leaves \$103,457.00 to be raised by taxes by the town as compared to \$98,078.00 for this

year. Examination of the budget breakdown found on subsequent pages in this report will show that, by and large, provision for increases in salaries and for greater supervisory union expenses explains the increase in the budget.

MISCELLANEOUS

With our librarian employed now upon a full time basis, and with services expanded to include the 4th, 5th, and 6th Grades in addition to all those above, a much greater opportunity is provided to assist the pupils in these groups with important supplementary information in the various subject fields. Of equal or perhaps even greater value, too, from the long range point of view, is the opportunity for the pupils through the experiences gained in studying and working in a library to develop a greater interest in the value of books and a fuller understanding of how very much their use may help them in the future.

As has been cited before, the extra-class and extra-curricular activities conducted by the school contribute very materially to the overall life of the school, and provide experiences for the arousing of interests and development of potentialities which otherwise might never be revealed.

The continued patronization of the school lunch program by a relatively large number of pupils down through the successive years speaks their appreciation of what is done for them, and for the school, in the building and maintaining of good morale, good health, and physical well being by this vitally important activity. No small factor in the success of this program has been the dependable and efficient help employed.

CONCLUSION

As has been done many times previously, I wish to express my sincere and deep appreciation to the members of the School Board, parents, teachers, and citizens for all the assistance and cooperation received as we have worked together down through the years to provide and maintain high standards in our schools.
