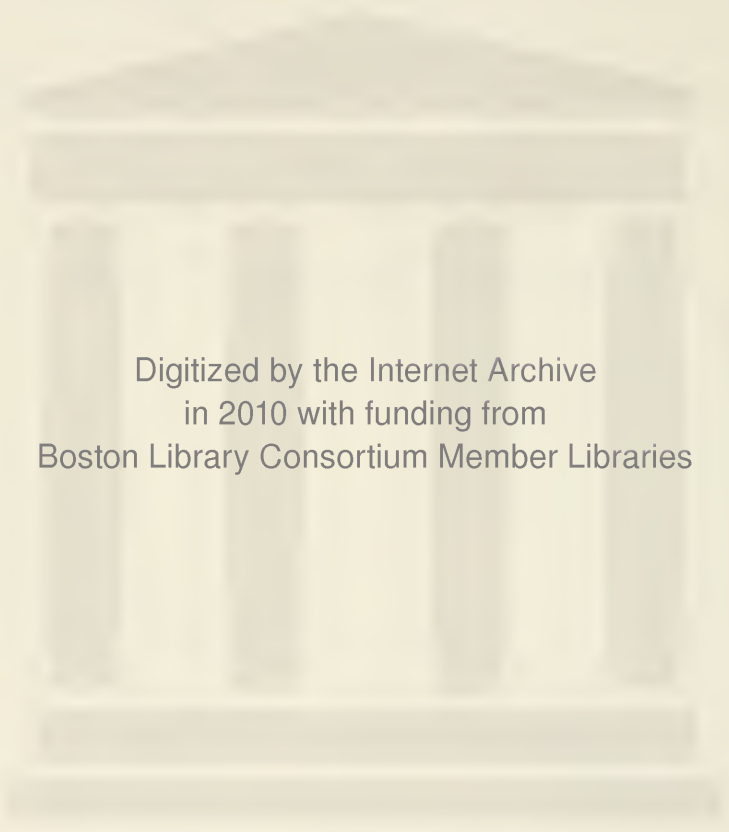

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time the polls shall be opened and shall close not earlier than nine o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following articles: all articles not on the ballot will be acted upon at seven-thirty o'clock in the evening.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its high-ways and bridges.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Cemeteries.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common and the daily raising and lowering of the flag.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the LaMott-Kenneson Post No. 76, American Legion for Memorial Day and other patriotic purposes.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$343.36 to secure from the State \$2,289.09 to be expended for Town Road Aid.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in co-operating with other towns in the Lakes Region.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the operation of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital in Plymouth, N. H.

14. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to Civil Defense and raise and appropriate money for same.

15. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Legal Advice.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control Program in co-operation with the Forestry and Recreation Commission.

17. To see if the Town will vote to add to the Capital Reserve Fund in the amount of \$1,500.00 to be transferred from surplus funds for the purpose of purchasing Highway Equipment.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town at any of its tax collector's sales.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

20. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to the playing games of Beano be adopted in this town.

21. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

There is a new booklet called Fallout Protection which is very good. If you haven't a copy ask for one at the library or your director.

A Bendix meter for reading fall-out has been added to our Civil Defense equipment.

Once again I urge all families to prepare for emergency. Any shelter is better than none and the thicker the covering the better you are protected.

I wish to thank all who have helped in Civil Defense this past year. It was greatly appreciated.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations - hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you —

1. Follow the warden's directions.
2. Secure the required burning permit.
3. Keep your fires under control.
4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

During the calendar year of 1961 five new trust funds were established and several were increased in amount, for the care of cemetery lots so that a total of 141 funds are now being administered. During the year we received stock dividends of 60 additional shares of our mutual fund holdings besides cash dividends. One of the mutual funds shares was sold at a gain of \$1,756.13 and the proceeds invested in another fund from which we have received both stock and cash dividends.

This makes our total holdings worth more than the purchase price which we paid in November 1959 by \$2,967.13. The Town continues to add \$2,000.00 yearly to their Highway Equipment Fund as voted in 1960.

Details of the various funds follow this report.

SYNOPSIS OF THE WATERSHED STUDIES BEING MADE ON THE BAKER RIVER

Through the years, the Baker River Valley has been subjected to severe flood damages as experienced by storms occurring in 1927, 1938, and 1959. This history of flooding prompted interested local people to submit an application under the sponsorship of the Grafton County Soil Conservation District and the New Hampshire Water Resources Board for assistance through the Small Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (Federal Public Law 566.) The application was approved for preliminary planning studies in June, 1961.

This is a program run by local people with Government assistance. The United States Soil Conservation Service has chief responsibility for administering the program under the Act with additional assistance provided by State and other Federal agencies.

Studies are presently under way to determine the feasibility of a program involving land treatment, channel improvement, and flood-water retarding dams to alleviate future damages in the Baker River Valley. Local communities are encouraged to develop other resources in the watershed, such as fish and wildlife, recreation, and municipal water supply as a part of the comprehensive plan.

Planning studies must show that benefits from this project exceed the costs. If plans are approved for construction, the United States Soil Conservation Service will supervise and pay for the construction cost of all structures installed for flood prevention. The sponsors working with local people would be responsible for land treatment, easements and rights-of-way, administering contracts, and carrying out future operations and maintenance.

It is anticipated that it would require from five to eight years to accomplish the plan.

It is believed that the comprehensive treatment of the Baker River Watershed can be of tremendous benefit to the entire valley. Valuable farmland and urban developments would be protected from flooding, erosion, and sedimentation. The plan would offer opportunities for more intensive use of agricultural lands, and further development of industrial, recreational, and residential property. Carrying out the proposed plan would mean much to the general economy of the area.

REPORT OF PUBLIC SCHOOL HEALTH NURSE

Dear Sirs:

The following is a report of the activities conducted by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for the Town of Rumney for the year 1961. Please have printed in your town report.

A Tuberculin Streeneedle Testing program was conducted in the school of March 7th, 1961, by Dr. William Prince of N. H. Department of Health, assisted by Mrs. Lois Reed, R. N., Public Health Nurse, N. H. Department of Health and Mrs. Helen Fisher, R. N., Local School Nurse. They were assisted with the clerical work by members of Rumney P.-T. A. A total of 138 received the test. A follow-up with home visits on the reactors to the test with tests on various contacts of the members of the families. The reactors were checked by Chest X-rays at the Plymouth Clinic held in Plymouth in April. The Chest X-ray Clinics are held in Plymouth in the Spring and Fall, conducted by the N. H. Tuberculosis Association and the N. H. Department of Health. Reports are mailed following these clinics to all parties concerned, by the Public Health Nurse. Several families from Rumney take advantage of these clinics.

There were no immunization clinics held in Rumney this year but many children took advantage of the Wentworth clinic in August and received immunizations and physical examinations. The nurse was assisted at this clinic by members of the LaMott-Kenneson Legion Auxiliary.

Many home visits have been made by the nurse. Children have been referred to the various clinics as necessary.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE RUMNEY SCHOOL BOARD

Hereby submitted is my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year began in Rumney with three changes in the teaching staff at the school. One of them had not been anticipated when contracts were let out and the other two had been planned for some time. Early last year it was expected that the Russell sisters would retire at the end of the 1960-61 school year and preparations had already been made to employ their replacements. A ruling was clarified in June which would have allowed them to teach one more year but plans had advanced to the point where to do this was impossible. However, when Mrs. Greenwood did not return, Miss Mary Russell was given a contract to come back for one more year to fill the position which had been assigned Mrs. Greenwood. Mrs. Marilyn Britton, a graduate of Keene Teachers College replaced Miss Ruth Russell and Conrad Graham, a Plymouth Teachers College graduate who had practice taught at the school, was given a contract to teach in the upper grades. In my opinion, the school is being run efficiently and well. This year for the first time we have tried extending departmentalization down to the Fifth grade. Under this system, the teachers who are strongest in various areas teach these subjects in grades 5-8. In this way I feel the whole program is strengthened. Teachers and pupils seem to like this system and I have been more than satisfied to date with the results. Because of it, a minor scheduling problem developed. During the summer, Miss Ashley and myself worked on this and came up with what seems to be a good solution.

Our educational offerings remain essentially the same and with the addition of educational television, we have a well-rounded program. Our textbook situation and testing program remain as in the past year and at present I recommend no change.

We were sorry to have Mrs. Cross retire as Supervisor of Hot Lunch but Mrs. Lyon who helped her for some time was elected as Supervisor and the program continues to be a good one. It is still considered to be one of the best small programs in the state.

I would like to call your attention to the fact that the Plymouth area has had several meetings and are considering a regional school in the immediate vicinity. Your school board has conscientiously attended these meetings to gather information and in all probability at the next school district meeting will ask for a committee of citizens to work with them to make a wise recommendation to the district as to what course to follow. The advantages to the district of becoming part of such a program I think would be tremendous. Plymouth High School, at the present time, can make over no more classrooms to accommodate an increased enrollment and to remain in the present quarters will mean that in a period of a few years, some tuition pupils will have to be turned away. On the other hand, if a Cooperative or Regional School is formed, the surrounding towns who do not become a part of it cannot expect those towns who do to build facilities for them. This problem requires some serious thinking on a local level to decide which action is best to take. From the experience in other communities, I think it would initially cost the district more to be part of such a project but not to too great a degree and at the same time the district would have part ownership in the school and a voice in its organization and administration. Also, wherever these schools have operated, the trend has generally been that over a period of years, costs have tended to be no more than what they would have been under a straight tuition program.

I am sure that there will be more talk about this as the year goes on and I would be very happy to furnish any information or advice I may have concerning your school problems. Please do not hesitate to ask it any time if I can be of assistance to you. It has been a good year to date and I have enjoyed the co-operation of the School Board and the teachers.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1960-1961 received a salary of \$8,050 which was made up as follows: \$3,750 paid from the per capita tax and \$4,300 prorated among the several school district. Allowance of \$1,200. for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above.

The table shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.
