Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. declared the polls open at 11:00 AM for voting by ballot on Article 1 (the election of Town Officers), and Article 2 (Zoning Amendment). The polls will close at 7:30 PM. The meeting will be called to order at 7:30 PM at which time the remaining articles will be acted upon.

ARTICLE 1. To vote by nonpartisan ballot for the following Town Officers:

One Selectman to serve for a term of three (3) years

A Town Treasurer to serve for a term of one (1) year

A Town Clerk to serve for a term of one (1) year

A Tax Collector to serve for a term of one (1) year

An Overseer of Public Welfare to serve for a term of one (1) year

A Library Trustee to serve for a term of one (1) year

A Library Trustee to serve for a term of three (3) years

A Town Auditor to serve for a term of one (1) year

A Trustee of Trust Funds to serve for a term of three (3) years And such other Town Officers as may be required by law.

To see if the Town will vote to amend the existing Sugar Hill Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board which would amend Section 409. The official copy of the amendment is on file and available to the public at the Office of the Town Clerk and will be on display on the day of the meeting. The following question is on the Official Ballot:

"Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing Sugar Hill Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?" (The purpose of this amendment is to clarify Section 409 with regard to temporary permits by including specifically that any such structure shall not be used as a dwelling.)

Results of Article 2. Yes 86, No 48

7:30 PM. The meeting was called to order by Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. of the newest and best town in the State of New Hampshire.

The posting of the warrant was read by Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr.

The Moderator announced that the runner for the evening was Paul Pinkham, Jr. Moderator Whitney asked if there were any non-eligible voters in the room. They were asked not to vote by hand, voice or ballot. Article 1 and 2 have been voted on by ballot.

ARTICLE 3. Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. said he would go through the items one by one and if anyone has a question or comment to please raise their hands.

Moved by Richard Bielefield and seconded by Michael Hern.

A short discussion followed concerning legal expense and street lighting.

All in favor of Article 3 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. No opposed votes.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to elect members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment pursuant to RSA 673:3.

Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. If we vote to elect members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment under Article 5 we may elect today or we may allow the Selectmen and Moderator to appoint the 2 trustees for this year. If we allow the Selectmen to appoint this year, since we have had no notice of this we will elect next year as their names will appear on the ballot assuming they file.

ARTICLE 5. If Article 4 is approved, to see if the Town will vote to either (1) elect persons to fill existing vacancies on the Zoning Board of Adjustment at this meeting by nomination from the floor and voting by ballot or (2) authorize the Selectmen and the Moderator to fill the existing vacancies on the Zoning Board of Adjustment until the next annual Town Meeting as provided in RSA 669:17.

Moved by William Norton, seconded by Meri Hern, for the Town to elect members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment and under Article 5 to elect next year not today. The motion to combine Article 4 and 5 was accepted by Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr.

Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. called for a combined vote on Articles 4 & 5. All in favor were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. No opposed votes.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Board of Cemetery Trustees consisting of five (5) Trustees to be elected for a term of three years. For the initial Board of Trustees, one (1) Trustee would be elected for one (1) year, one (1) Trustee for two (2) years, and one (1) Trustee for three (3) years and as required by law, the Selectmen shall initially appoint one Trustee for one (1) year and one Trustee for two (2) years. Thereafter, trustees shall be elected by ballot at the annual Town Meeting to replace those whose terms expire.

Moved by John McIlwaine and seconded by Richard Bielefield.

 $A short \ discussion \ followed \ on \ compensation. \ The \ Selectmen \ said \ there \ would \ be \ no \ compensation \ for \ the \ Trustees.$

All in favor of Article 6 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

Lee Williams nominated Roger Aldrich, Edna Glaessel and Lorraine Hunt to serve as members of the Board of Cemetery Trustees. Seconded by William Norton.

The Moderator asked if there were further nominations from the floor. A voice vote was called for by Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. All in favor were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will adopt the bylaw detailed in this year's Town Report, for the care, protection, preservation and use of the Town cemeteries, as provided in RSA 31:39.

The proposed Sugar Hill Cemetery regulations are printed on pages 44, 45 & 46 of this years Town Report.

Moved by William Norton, seconded by Lee Williams to adopt Article 7. All in favor of Article 7 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) for cemetery maintenance and to withdraw the accumulated income accrued during 1992 from the Cemetery Trust Funds to reduce the appropriation.

Moved by William Tucker, seconded by Bertram Dube'.

A short discussion was held concerning the use of cemetery trust funds.

All in favor of Article 8 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$1,250) for the purpose of employing a qualified Certified Public Accountant to assist the Town Auditor by reviewing the report of the Town Auditor and to make a report to the Town Meeting in 1994.

Moved by William Tucker, seconded by Deborah McIlwaine.

A short discussion followed.

All in favor of Article 9 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200) to be placed in the Gale River Gravel Bar Expendable Trust Funds.

Moved by Stanley Rowins, seconded by Richard Bielefield.

Discussion followed.

All in favor of Article 10 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will appoint a committee to research the consolidation of the Expendable Trust Funds and existing Capital Reserve Funds for greater utilization of the monies and recommend for Town approval at the next Town Meeting.

Moved by Deborah McIlwaine, seconded by Richard Bielefield.

No discussion.

All in favor of Article 11 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand one hundred ninety-five dollars (\$1,195) for the purchase of a new copier for the Town offices.

Moved by John Manix, seconded by Jeanne Ring.

All in favor of Article 12 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$2,250) to purchase bookkeeping software for the Town offices.

Moved by Sarah Pinney, seconded by Deborah McIlwaine.

Discussion followed.

All in favor of Article 13 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand eight hundred dollars (\$6,800) to be placed in the Police Capital Reserve Fund.

Moved by Meri Hern, seconded by Lee Williams.

All in favor of Article 14 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be placed in the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

Moved by Sarah Pinney, seconded by Richard Bielefield.

All in favor of Article 15 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. One or two No votes.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be placed in the Meetinghouse Capital Reserve Fund.

Moved by Richard Bielefield, seconded by Bertram Dube'.

All in favor were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to establish the Fire Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:3 for the purpose of providing funds for major equipment.

Moved by William Tucker, seconded by Richard Bielefield.

All in favor of Article 17 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the Fire Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

Moved by John Manix, seconded by Roger Aldrich.

All in favor of Article 18 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the Fire Department Expendable Trust Fund.

Moved by John McIlwaine, seconded by Richard Bielefield.

Short discussion followed.

All in favor of Article 19 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to establish the Historical Museum Expendable Trust Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:3 for the purpose of providing funds for major improvements.

Moved by William Norton, seconded by Lee Williams.

Discussion followed. Selectman Laurence Ring explained that the Town is responsible for the exterior of the building.

All in favor of Article 20 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) for the Historical Museum Expendable Trust Fund.

Moved by Richard Bielefield and seconded by Star Ford.

Lissa Boissonneault questioned the amount and Selectman Laurence Ring replied that the figure is wrong. The amount should be \$1,800 for this year. The six thousand dollars is for over a period of years.

Moved by Laurence Ring to amend the six thousand dollars down to one thousand eight hundred for this year. Seconded by Richard Bielefield.

Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. said we would vote on the Article as amended. All in favor of Article 21 as amended were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to name the Selectmen as agents of the Town to carry out the objectives designated by the Town in the Meetinghouse Capital Reserve Fund.

Moved by Sarah Pinney and seconded by Meri Hern.

An explanation of Article 22 was given by Selectman William E. Williams, Jr. The reason this particular article is in here is because this is the only Capital Reserve Fund from which we intend to take money this year. We must take sufficient monies to meet requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act, which is going to require a handicapped lavatory on the first floor and will be unisex. We will need to readjust the front ramp and redo the front doors. We also need to meet fire safety codes. The Selectmen feel they can do this with the amount of money available or less. It will go out to bids. Plans will be available for the Town to look at as they go along. For the Selectmen to take money from the Capital Reserve Fund we need the approval of the voters. The approximate amount is \$18,000.

Selectman Paul Pinkham reported on the inspection done by the Fire Marshall. The building is in pretty good shape. A second means of leaving the second floor is needed. A fire alarm system may be allowed in place of a second means of egress. The building is old and valuable. If anything happened in the middle of the night, it would be an advantage to know right off.

All in favor of Article 22 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 80:52, to direct a discount of one percent (1%) to be made to those persons or corporations who shall pay taxes within a period of three (3) weeks from the date of the tax bill.

Moved by Stanley Rowins and seconded by William Tucker. David Southworth. To give a one percent discount we raise the amount to give it back to ourselves.

A voice vote was called for. Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. said the chair was in doubt and called for a standing vote. Yes 33, No 40. The motion did not carry so declared by Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr.

ARTICLE 24. "The undersigned hereby request that the following article be placed on the Town Meeting Warrant for the 1993 Town Meeting.

To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to adopt the following regulations authorized under RSA 31:39-a regarding conflict of interest:

No member of the Board of Selectmen shall participate in deciding or shall vote on any question which the board is to decide if that member has a direct personal or pecuniary interest in the outcome which differs from the interest of other citizens, or if that member would be disqualified for any cause to act as a juror upon the trial of the same matter in any action at law. Reasons for the disqualification do not include exemption from service as a juror or knowledge of the facts involved gained in the performance of the member's official duties.

This article to be voted by secret ballot." (BY PETITION)

Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. said before entertaining a motion on Article 24 he would let Selectman William E. Williams, Jr. address the Town on some legal opinions they have received from our Attorney on this article.

Selectman William E. Williams, Jr. said as most are aware any article presented by petition is reviewed by our Town Attorney to find out its legality and if there is anything the Selectmen should know about.

Our Attorney has advised on this particular petition article that in fact the Selectmen are covered in an RSA that doesn't allow them to enter into this kind of association or agreement. As a body the Selectmen have no argument with it at all. They feel it is redundant.

Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. called for a motion on Article 24.

Moved by Roger Aldrich to pass over Article 24. Seconded by William Norton. Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. called for discussion. There were no questions. All in favor of passing over Article 24 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it.

ARTICLE 25. "The undersigned hereby request that the following article be placed on the Town Meeting Warrant for the 1993 Town Meeting.

To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to not pursue any lawsuits as plaintiff without the express permission of the Town given at a Town Meeting. This article to be voted on by secret ballot." (BY PETITION)

Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. said he would again ask Selectman William E. Williams, Jr. to address the Town before he entertains a motion under Article 25.

Selectman William E. Williams, Jr. Our Town Attorney has advised us this petition has no merit because you may not restrict Selectmen entering into any lawsuits during the term between Town Meetings. The reason is somewhat obvious. The Selectmen must act as plaintiffs under certain circumstances where the Town will suffer. If someone violates one of our Zoning Ordinances and refuses to acknowledge or abide by it the Selectmen must obviously be able to take action to have this individual cease and desist.

The second point is yes in fact at the subsequent Town Meeting the Town may by petition advise and vote to withdraw from any lawsuit pending. Something similar to what happened last year which was only an advisory situation. If it had been a petition and the vote came out the way it did we would have been forced to withdraw from that particular lawsuit. Again this is the Attorney's opinion.

The chair called for a motion under Article 25.

Moved by Roger Aldrich to pass over Article 25, seconded by William Norton. Moderator Robert Whitney called for discussion or questions.

Meri Hern asked what happens to articles that are passed over. She wanted to know if they go away forever.

Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. responded with in essence they are permanently shelved. Actually under the laws of the State of New Hampshire this article and the one preceding may be brought up again this evening under Article 30. Carol Walker. Interested to see that the Moderator allowed discussion of articles before he got a first or second. She asked if this was not unusual. Moderator Whitney replied that it is. Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. said he had violated procedure to allow a little bit more information to be given to the Town Meeting before a motion was made.

Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. said discussion has not been cut off. The voters are free to discuss this article as much as they wish.

Further discussion followed.

All in favor of the motion to pass over Article 25 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. One or two "No" votes.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year, as provided in RSA 31:95-b, which limits the expenditures to legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money and requires a public hearing prior to the Selectmen taking any action.

Moved by John McIlwaine, seconded by Meri Hern.

All in favor of Article 26 were asked to indicate by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Moved by John Manix, seconded by Deborah McIlwaine.

A short discussion followed.

All in favor of Article 27 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of taxes and authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments in prepayment of taxes as provided in RSA 80:52-a.

Moved by William Tucker, seconded by Richard Bielefield.

A short discussion followed.

All in favor of Article 28 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed either by public auction or by advertised sealed bids as provided in RSA 80:80.

Moved by Michael Hern, seconded by Helen Rowins.

Short discussion followed.

All in favor of Article 29 were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed.

ARTICLE 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Moderator Robert Whitney, Jr. thanked Michael and Meri Hern for the outstanding meal they provided for the election officials this evening.

Motion to adjourn was made by Michael Hern, seconded by Richard Bielefield. All in favor were asked to signify by saying "Aye", opposed "No". The "Ayes" have it. None opposed. 9:00 PM.



To the inhabitants of the Town of Sugar Hill, in the County of Grafton, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified that the Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Sugar Hill, New Hampshire, will be held at the Meetinghouse on Tuesday, March 8, 1994, at 7:30 p.m., to act upon the following subjects:

Polls will open at 11 a.m. for voting by ballot on Article 1 (the election of Town Officers) and Articles 2, 3, and 4 (Amendments to Town ordinances). Polls will close at 7:30 p.m. unless the Town votes to keep the polls open to a later hour. All other Articles will be presented, discussed and acted upon starting at 7:30 p.m.

ARTICLE 1. To vote by nonpartisan ballot for the following Town Officers:

One Selectman to serve for a term of three (3) years

A Town Treasurer to serve for a term of one (1) year

A Town Clerk to serve for a term of one (1) year

A Tax Collector to serve for a term of one (1) year

An Overseer of Public Welfare to serve for a term of one (1) year

A Library Trustee to serve for a term of three (3) years

A Town Auditor to serve for a term of one (1) year

A Supervisor of the Checklist to serve for a term of six (6) years

A Trustee of Trust Funds to serve for a term of three (3) years

A Town Moderator to serve for a term of two (2) years

Two Zoning Board of Adjustment members to serve for terms of two (2) years

Two Zoning Board of Adjustment members to serve for terms of three (3) years

Two Board of Cemetery Trustees to serve for a term of three (3) years

And such other Town Officers as may be required by law.

ARTICLE 2. (To vote by Official Ballot)

To see if the Town will vote to amend the existing Sugar Hill Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board which would amend Section 403. The official copy of the amendment is on file and available to the public at the Office of the Town Clerk and will be on display on the day of the meeting. The following question is on the Official Ballot:

"Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing Sugar Hill Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?"

(The purpose of this amendment would be to allow the subdivision of a parcel of land into not more than two lots, and one of the two lots would contain less than the minimum lot size and be limited to use for home recreational facilities, swimming pool, gardens or woodlots, and a parking area.)

ARTICLE 3. (To vote by Official Ballot)

To see if the Town will vote to amend the existing Sugar Hill Flood Plain Management Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board. Unemployment Compensation Expendable Trust Fund 1986 Town Plan Expendable Trust Fund 1986 Welfare Assistance Expendable Trust Fund 1987 Street Lighting Expendable Trust Fund 1991

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase of a new dump truck for the Highway Department for an amount not to exceed sixty-three thousand dollars (\$63,000) and obtain part of the funds for such purchase from the sale of the 1984 truck chassis, and designate the Selectmen as agents of the Town to withdraw and expend money from the Highway

Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for the purposes of this vote. (The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase of a tanker chassis for the Fire Department and install the present tank on this chassis for an amount not to exceed fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) and designate the Selectmen as agents of the Town to withdraw and expend money from the Fire Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of this vote. (The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)

ARTICLE 19. ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize indefinitely, until rescinded, the Selectmen to convey property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, either by a public auction or by advertised sealed bids or as justice may require, as provided in RSA 80:42 and 80:80.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to delegate to the Board of Selectmen the authority to accept the offer to dedicate new public highways or streets as provided in and subject to the terms and conditions of RSA 674:40-a.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town: gifts, legacies and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize indefinitely, until rescinded, the prepayment of taxes and authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments and prepayment of taxes as provided in RSA 80:52-a.

ARTICLE 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SELECTMENS' REPORT

This year has shown the fulfillment of many of our obligations and requirements. We have worked hard to finish a lot of the gnawing items that somehow we hadn't been able to get to.

The revised Current Use criteria for evaluating the assessed value of the land has been implemented with each landowner providing the needed input. We have completed the task of inputting this data and all are now in compliance. This card information is being put into the computer for easy access and for alterations that we must make each tax year. Many thanks to Carolyn for her detailed scrutiny of each lot. Did you know that about sixty-five percent of our land area is in Current Use?

The more obvious accomplishments are visible at the Meetinghouse. The building is now in conformance with the mandated Americans With Disabilities Act. The front ramp was removed and replaced with one that meets the requirements. We think that the balustrade railing adds to the charm of the building. A fully handicapped accessible restroom is now located on the first floor and is available to all. The Town received a one thousand dollar grant from the New Hampshire State Council on the Arts to assist in the ramp effort and the Town thanks the North Country Chamber Players for providing input for the application.

Another major improvement to the building is the installation of a building wide (basement to belfry) heat and smoke alarm system. The system is fully automatic and when a signal is received, the system will set off sound and visible alarms within the building, as well as dialing for emergency personnel. In addition, a sprinkler system was installed in the furnace room and the new restroom that will automatically operate and also notify emergency personnel.

Pure drinking water is now available in the kitchen after the installation of a state of the art water purification system. This system was given to us by the Willing Workers Organization and the Town extends many thanks for this much needed improvement.

As you have seen in the frontispiece of this report, Harold Aldrich, our Road Agent of twenty nine years, has retired. We feel that his replacement, Doug Glover, will continue Harold's tradition of seeing that we all can readily travel throughout the Town.

We are sorry to have to report that we are the defendants in a legal case over the value of and compensation for the gravel that the Town removed from the pit off Presby Road many years ago. We have proposed to have compromise discussions, but were told that the plaintiff chose not to participate in such discussions.

Finally, we would be derelict if we did not thank the Committee to review our Trust Funds for their time and recommendations. They reviewed all of the trusts and the current and future need for each. We have implemented many of their suggestions. Again, thank you!

AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Town's books for 1993 were audited by a Certified Public Accountant who submitted the required reports to the State Municipal Service Division. The Town Auditor and the C.P.A. have made several recommendations for improving accounting practices in managing the Town's accounts and reports. The Town is now on a modified accrual basis which meets State standards.

The Selectmen and Town Auditor do not feel an audit by a Certified Public Accountant is needed for 1993. The Town Auditor has made a complete audit of all Town records and reports. The Auditor's Instructions from the Municipal Services Department of New Hampshire and the Code of Administrative Rules have been followed. In proper time, the Town Audit will be submitted to the Selectmen and the Municipal Services Division of the State Department of Revenue.

The various Town reports accurately reflect the income and expenditures of Sugar Hill for 1993. Good control has been maintained over the Town's financial affairs.

However, the Town Auditor strongly urges that all records, or copies thereof, of the various Town Boards, especially the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Board of Adjustment and the Trustees of Trust Funds, be maintained at the Town Hall. And further, that adequate space be made available for these records. The Town is getting too large and life too complex to continue to have such records remain in private homes.

Our portfolio is well balanced - 45.9% invested in 294 U.S. Treasury Zero Coupon Bonds at growth rate of 13.8% - the remaining 54.1% invested in equity mutual funds.

Investing for growth and income in our era of low interest rates requires careful diversification in not only U.S. equity funds, but also in challenging international equity funds. We continue to remain cautious as we head for 1999, when assets from the Carolina Crapo Trust will become eligible for qualified community programs.

SUGAR HILL FIRE DEPARTMENT

The fire department responded to 22 calls during 1993 as follows:

Our one structure fire was at the Carolina Crapo School while school was in session, and because of a quick response, the fire was quickly extinguished, resulting in only minor damage, and no injuries to students or staff.

The fire department belongs to the 24-member Twin State Fire Mutual Aid System, and in 1993, we assisted adjacent towns in fighting 3 major structure fires, and on 6 other occasions, either covered vacant stations, or assisted with less severe emergencies.

Under our mutual aid preplan, a structure fire in Franconia, Sugar Hill, or Easton, receives a response of all 3 towns on the initial call, thus helping to assure that small fires will remain small. To enhance our effectiveness, the 3 towns have 2 or 3 joint training sessions each year, which has helped improve cooperation and coordination between the 3 fire departments.

We continue to have monthly training sessions, and in addition, several of our members in 1993 completed a State sponsored Hazardous Materials Awareness class.

Our muster team was awarded the 2nd place trophy at the annual State Championship Firemen's Muster at the Hopkinton State Fair, this past September.

Like most volunteer fire departments, we have a need for additional members to effectively handle the many emergencies that we respond to, especially daytime calls. Any man or woman who wishes to become a member, is urged to contact the Fire Chief, or any firefighter, to obtain information on membership.

We would like to express our sincere appreciation to the citizens of Sugar Hill for their continued support. We would also like to thank the members of the Twin State Fire Mutual Aid Association, and in particular, the fire departments of Franconia and Easton, and the Franconia Life Squad, for all the help that they have given us this past year.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1993, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris fires that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message - "Remember...Only <u>YOU</u> can prevent forest fires. Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fires and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

NH EXECUTIVE COUNCIL - DISTRICT ONE REPORT

The five-member Executive Council acts much like a Board of Directors within the Executive Branch of your State Government. We have the authority granted to the Governor and Council by constitutional and statutory law for the overall administration of the affairs of State as defined by the NH Constitution, NH statutes, advisory opinions of the Attorney General and opinions of the NH Supreme Court.

We each represent one-fifth of the population divided into five districts. Our District consists of 98 towns and four cities spread over all or parts of five of New Hampshire's ten counties. The current population of our District is 221,000 people - basically the land area north of Concord.

Of prime importance to this region is the development of the highway transportation program throughout the State. The NH Legislature by law set in motion a two-year cycle which will start July 1, 1994, which requires each Councilor to hold public hearings to ascertain highway and transportation needs. We then meet, make our recommendations to the Governor who then will make a recommended plan for highways to the NH Legislature by February 1997. Governor Merrill will be making his 1994 recommendations to the NH Legislature by February 15, 1994. Towns, cities, counties and citizens having an interest in this should contact their local State Representatives and State Senator.

Another project that is of continuing interest to this District is the nomination and confirmation of individuals to the dozens of State boards and commissions on which the Governor and Council are required to fill with qualified and interested citizens. NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL Annual Report

1993 has been a busy year for North Country Council. Our membership stands at forty-four communities, representing 99 percent of the region's population.

The year has seen major successes under the Council's senior staff leadership: David Beauchesne, Regional Planning Coordinator; Cathy Conway, Civil Engineering Coordinator; Claire Douglass, Community Planning Coordinator; and Liz Ward, Small Business Development Coordinator. This team has supervised projects that run the gamut from master planning and sewer system designs to traffic corridor planning, GIS mapping, and micro-enterprise lending. Marghie Seymour, our Solid Waste Planner, continues to provide valuable assistance to the region's solid waste management districts and communities on issues of recycling and solid waste management. Sharon Penney, Transportation Planner, has been providing the support and guidance for the Council's ISTEA Transportation Planning Program. This new program will give NCC members a much greater say in how the New Hampshire Department of Transportation prioritizes transportation construction activities in the North Country in the future.

Other activities completed this year include the third annual business survey, the North Country Ingenuity Fair, household hazardous waste collections, wood products market development planning, business counseling, regionwide computerized wetlands mapping, Northern Forest Lands representation, floodzone management, completion of an industrial environmental site assessment, completion of feasibility studies for industrial development, design of solid waste transfer stations, implementation of the rural plastics recycling program, and regional telecommunications system planning.

In October, the Council celebrated its 20th anniversary year of service to the region with a gathering of former board members, friends, community representatives and staffers in Franconia, our old home town.

Chamber projects include: Frostbite Follies, our most successful series of events and great press coverage in some time. Find N Phone at Cannon Mountain has proved quite successful and doubles as a visual statement that YES there is more to Franconia than just the Notch. The Tri-Town mailing received some great responses. Local residents were thrilled to get all that helpful information mailed directly to them. We will make this an annual event. We will make extra packets for local realtors to distribute as part of a Welcome Package to new residents.

The booth attendants continuously do a terrific job of selling the area and helping the vacationing tourist find their way around the Tri-Town community. We are manning the booth at the tram in the summer (3 days a week) as well as the booth in town.

The chamber is looking for more ways to be of service to the community, and the businesses in the community. If you have suggestions or ideas we'd like to have your suggestions.

This year we had a Silver Tea and Silent Auction in May. The Summer Sale was held in July, and the Christmas sale in November. All sales and work meetings are held in the Meeting House. Proceeds from the sales are used for the scholarship fund. Money is also given to: North Country Home Health Agency, Bancroft House, David's House, and Upper Valley Hostel. Various memorials were given. We also purchased a water filter system for the Meeting House kitchen this year. Toys for the Sugar Hill Christmas party at the Meeting House were also purchased.

From time to time we donate to families who have had fires or some other tragedy.

NORTH COUNTRY HOME HEALTH AGENCY 1993 Town Report

The North Country Home Health Agency is a not-for-profit home care agency, founded in 1971, providing acute care and a long term care option at home to support patients and families in meeting health care needs. Care is provided pre- and post-hospitalization and as an alternative to residential long-term care.

The Agency's philosophy is that health care should be community based, patient and family centered, support and empower the individual and prioritize the least restrictive care alternatives.

In the Agency's service area (Northern Grafton and Southern Coos Counties) 590 clients received 35,000 home visits representing 56,000 hours of care. 13 residents of the Town of Sugar Hill received 584 visits as follows:

Nursing 179
Home Health Aide 299
Homemaker 62
Physical Therapy 12
Medical Social Service 27
Companion 5

Over 1700 individuals were served at Agency sponsored influenza immunization, blood pressure, blood sugar and foot care clinics.

75-80 individuals are employed, representing 47-50 full time equivalent employees.

A major expansion of services is forthcoming in 1994; the Agency will seek Medicare Hospice Certification, which will assist persons with a terminal illness and their families by providing specialized benefits. A New Hampshire Charitable Foundation grant was received by the Agency to support the development of hospice services.

The Agency raised \$40,689 through voluntary contributions during 1993, and offered \$98,281 in free and subsidized care to individuals and families. Voluntary funds were generated by individual donations, memorials, the annual appeal, the golf tournament, and the casino night.

Combining the efforts and energy of a dedicated staff, the Agency recruited numerous volunteers (consisting of board members and community residents) who contributed over 2200 volunteer hours.

WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES 1993 Director's Report

During 1993, White Mountain Mental Health and Developmental Services has provided quality services to 960 individuals and their families. Consumers of our services range from newborn infants with developmental problems to nursing home residents referred for psychiatric consultation.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

We continue to offer a full range of outpatient mental health services in spite of ever decreasing reimbursement from third party payers. The nationwide trend in health care toward brief, carefully monitored services has impacted the mental health field, and we strive to offer effective and cost efficient treatment. Our mental health services staff of licensed professionals are constantly updating their skills and refining techniques to provide "state of the art" treatments in a rapidly changing field. Some of our newer programs and services include:

*Seasonal Affective Disorder assessment and treatment. The use of high intensity full spectrum light in the treatment of "winter" depression.

*"The Recovery Connection", a program specifically directed toward assisting individuals who suffer from alcohol or drug problems. This program combines education, counseling, family support, and referral to self-help recovery programs to assist in the difficult process of getting and staying "clean and sober".

*The ACUDO program, a partnership with the Division of Children and Youth Services and local schools to provide an active, outdoor activity based alternative to traditional "talk" therapy for youth identified as being in imminent danger of residential placement. This highly successful program is being used as a model for other such programs across the state.

*The Children's Outreach Program, which provides intensive home based services to children and their families.

These newer programs join our traditional array of services offered to consumers in twenty-two towns. We continue to operate outpatient offices in Littleton, Lancaster, Woodsville, and Lincoln to help make our services available as close to our clients' homes as possible. Maintaining these decentralized offices is an increasing challenge, given the increases in cost to maintain and staff several offices. Local financial support helps offset some of this expense, and is greatly valued.

DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES

Our Developmental Services programs have been experiencing a period of evolution as we work to provide individualized programs dedicated to the philosophy that all persons have the right to meaningfully participate to their fullest potential in the life of their communities. Our services build on our consumers' individual capacities and natural supports within the family and community while assisting in the enhancement of personal, social, vocational, and physical functioning. This year we are proud of some special accomplishments:

* We have assisted one of our developmentally disabled clients in purchasing her own home, with funding provided through a special "Home of Your Own" project. This represents a giant step toward independence and security for an individual who would have previously spent her life either dependent upon family or living in a series of costly supervised "placements" in the community.

- * Our Early Intervention Program is currently expanding to better serve young children and families by providing early identification of conditions which commonly lead to developmental delays. New recruitment efforts include the addition of a Physical Therapist, Speech Pathologist, Certified Clinical Social Worker, and an additional Child Development Specialist to our existing staff.
- * Our consumers are working in many community settings, both as paid employees and as volunteers. This community integration is possible only when local businesses recognize the economic benefits of giving "a chance" to an individual who might otherwise be passed over for employment. We, and our consumers, are grateful to the area businesses who have realized the potential of these disabled individuals as loyal, stable, and hard working employees.

As our agency begins a new year, we are indebted to Dennis MacKay, who has guided WMMH&DS as Area Director for the past twelve years. Dennis left in September to assume the position of Associate Director of Mental Health Services for Northern New Hampshire Mental Health and Developmental Services. Happily, our agency continues to benefit from his leadership through our affiliation with NNHMH&DS. It is our hope that with the support of our local communities, we will move forward to provide the best possible services, including new and innovative programs, in 1994.
