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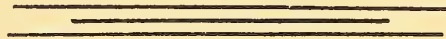

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap, Qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tilton-Northfield High School in said town on Tuesday March 9 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk and Town Treasurer for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, two Auditors for the ensuing year, one member of the Park Commission for a term of two years, one Selectman for a term of three years.

1. Under Article VII, Section 12.
 - a. To allow Trailer and Trailer Parks.
2. Article XVIII — Mobile Home and Trailer Regulations Amendment.
 - a. A mobile home or trailer shall be allowed to be located in the Town of Tilton.
 - b. 2. It shall not be considered a Mobile Park or Trailer Park if one trailer is parked on private property.
 - c. 1. Minimum park or subdivision area.

d. Mobile Home Park or Trailer Subdivision may be allowed in a single or general residence District whose such lots have been approved for homes. (By petition).

27. To see if the Town will vote by ballot, the election of one Trustee for the Northfield Library Association for a term of three years. (This election made necessary by decree, Merrimack Superior Court Equity No. 18,227). (By petition.)

28. To see if the Town will vote to extend the present boundaries of the Tilton-Northfield Fire District (Tilton portion) to the boundaries of the Town of Tilton. (A similar article appears in the Northfield Warrant). (By petition).

29. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to appoint a town tax assessor and raise and appropriate a sum of money for same.

30. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for all purposes for ensuing year.

31. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.

32. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

33. To choose any other officers and agents for the year ensuing.

34. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Polls shall be closed not earlier than 6:00 o'clock in the evening.

**SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND
RECOMMENDATIONS**

June 11, 1970

Board of Selectmen
Tilton, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Tilton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library, District Nurse and Recreation Council.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets — December 31, 1968-
December 31, 1969: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1968 and December 31, 1969 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus decreased by \$12,-820.05 in 1969.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with

the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$20,-483.99, less a revenue surplus of \$14,359.27, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$6,124.72.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1969, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Library: (Exhibit E)

A statement of the activity in the Library Account is presented in Exhibit E.

Other Special Activities Accounts: (Exhibits F-1, F-2, G-1, & G-2)

Statements of the activity in the Tilton-Northfield District Nurse Association and Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council Accounts are presented in the above Exhibits.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all Town officials charged with the custody, receipts and disbursement of public

funds were examined and audited, Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

General Comments

Selectmen:

We again recommend that the Selectmen comply with the provisions as set forth in Chapter 84 of the Revised Statutes Annotated in regard to the commitment of National Bank Stock Taxes.

The selectmen had in their custody on December 31, 1969, the Leon F. Lawrence Fund established in 1967 for the purpose of aiding the worthy poor. The original amount of the bequest was \$11,215.05. Accumulated interest to December 31, 1969 was \$1,336.81, bringing the total fund balance as of that date to \$12,551.86.

Inasmuch as the law provides that the Trustees of Trust Funds shall have custody of all trust funds held by their Town, the selectmen should forward this account to the Trustees at once.

Tax Collector:

All real estate taxes remaining unpaid at December 1st next, after its assessment, should be sold at a tax sale to be held no later than one year from October 1st following date of assessment.

The balance sheet of the Town lists unredeemed property taxes for 1966 and prior years amounting to \$4,314.37. We again recommend that the Tax Collector deed all of the properties represented by these unredeemed tax liens to the town.

Town Clerk:

We noted in our 1968 report that for the period January 1, 1968 thru October 13, 1969, there was an amount due from the Town Clerk of \$316.40, representing motor vehicle permit fees collected — not remitted.

Again this year, we extended our examination of the Town Clerk's accounts to cover the period from January 1, 1970 thru March 10, 1970. We found an additional amount due the Town of \$31.90. In summary, for the period January 1, 1968 thru March 10, 1970, there is an amount of \$348.30 due the Town on account of motor vehicle permit fees collected — not remitted.

Trust Funds:

There were 296 separate trust fund accounts in the custody of the Trustees at December 31, 1969. Considerable time was involved in reconciling the principal and unexpended income balance of each fund as of that date. A statement of trust fund income and expenditures is shown in Exhibit H-1. A summary of trust fund principal, unexpended income and investments is shown in Exhibit H-2.

There have been numerous errors made over a period of years in recording the sale of stock, stock purchases and capital gains dividends. Purchase of common trust fund stock has not been properly reflected on each fund as required. Likewise, income earned has not been distributed. In some instances, income earned has been allowed to accumulate rather than be spent, as requested by the will. We recommend that the instruction manual for the operation of common trust funds be reviewed and the proper procedures implemented. A cash journal in which all receipt and expenditures are recorded is also needed.

In cases where common trust funds have been established, the law requires that an additional report (Form

M2-A) be made to the Tax Commission besides the regular trust fund report which has previously been made.

It is also required by law, wherever common trust funds have been established, that the Trustees file a copy of each of these reports with the Attorney General.

Treasurer:

It is recommended that the Treasurer's surety bond be increased from \$10,000.00 to \$25,000.00.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the town. This letter of transmittal should be published in its entirety but the publication of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Tilton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

The past year saw many changes taking place affecting, to an important extent, the financial and social well being of our town.

This was the first year in which the municipalities were required to extend to those people over seventy (70) years of age, who qualified, an exemption on property taxes of \$5,000.00. We, being evaluated at 97% of total, were required to allow \$4,850.00 to each person who qualified. This resulted in a decrease in our taxable evaluation of \$358,000.00, thus causing an increase in the tax rate on eligible property owned by the remaining taxpayers. Also, it became necessary to re-appraise all mobile homes in the town to conform to the rules and regulations of the State Tax Commission. This resulted in a further decrease of \$141,000.00 and added more burden to be borne by the taxpayers.

Cost of services have constantly risen, equal to the rate of inflation, so that 1970 saw us pay 11% more for the basic services needed to operate this town.

On the plus side, however, there is much to be said. In spite of the decrease in property evaluation and a loss in the change over from the old stock-in-trade tax to the business and profits tax which taken all together should have increased the tax rate some 11%, the tax rate for 1970 showed an increase of 9%. Other items such as interest on a \$99,000.00 appropriation for sewer study, and \$8,000.00 appropriation for a town comprehensive plan, must also be considered. The foregoing items served to increase our appropriation and also our tax liability.

As a fitting climax to our centennial celebration, found "Time Table Mabel" was relocated at what we hope will be her permanent home at the east end of Main Street, where she gets all comers to our town.

For the first time in our history, the town owns its own gasoline pump, servicing municipal vehicles. Bulk purchase of this fuel has resulted in a savings of 150% in the cost of gasoline to the town.

Last, but not least, the three selectmen wish to thank you for your cooperation and patience so that each small step taken will act to make our town a better place to live.

REPORT OF FULL TIME SELECTMAN

On April first 1970 I started as Tilton's first Full Time Selectman. This is also a first for the State of New Hampshire. The work load which has increased these past several years warrants a continuation of a Full Time Selectman. In the period from April first to December thirty-one many accomplishments were made.

I had meetings with State Tax Commission on several occasions, the Department of Public Works and Road and three times concerning the bridge across from the Town Hall.

With interested property owners in the eastern part of town, we met with Federal & State Road Officials concerning the southern route of 3 & 11. I worked five weeks with the State Auditors and the same length of time with the State Appraiser on new additions to our Valuations. This work increased our Tax Structure by \$338,000.00.

A more accurate census count increased our rooms and meals tax income from \$6,692.00 to \$10,611.00 an increase of \$3,918.00 dollars

I accepted the offer to serve as inspector for Water Supply & Pollution Control. This extra service is free. It allows people in Tilton whether putting in new or replacing old septic tanks and leach fields a faster service, as I am available within an hour's notice. This inspection service can be performed without delay.

By setting up a better and more up to date filing system, the increased work is expedited for our taxpayer.

The state is demanding more record keeping and also the Federal Government has demanded monthly deposits on Withholding starting in January. This is something which has not been required in the past.

This year a new census will be taken to bring our population count and also Head & Poll tax up to date.

The Blotter Book which is the account of all property owners in Tilton is made up only after the State Appraiser is here and gone in July. The Blotter and Warrant Books have to be made up after the tax rate has been set. This takes about two or three months to finish.

We now have to keep a record (since 1970) of seventy-two "taxpayers" that are "seventy" years of age who fulfill the requirements for property exemptions.

There have been many fine comments from the nine hundred and thirty-four people who came into the office in the last nine months of 1970. As most of them said "Just to come in and have someone to talk to and have our problems acted on is worth a great deal to us."

In 1970 a dog officer has been busy for the second year. We are glad to report our dog problems have been reduced because of instant action on part of the Selectman's office and the dog officer.

It is hoped property owners will come to the office with problems or questions so we can act promptly on all matters.

During the nine months as a Full Time Selectman, eleven hundred and four phone calls were made to our office. Twelve hundred and sixty pieces of mail were received. Six hundred and eighty-eight pieces of mail were sent out. I traveled five hundred and fifty-four miles.

I intend to update and complete our records and make corrections through the Tax Commission on some properties which are in error. We have a few assessing problems which will be corrected in 1971.

The Full Time Selectman's office can be made to your approval through comments or criticism on behalf of the people in Tilton.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD 1970 ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

In concluding our 1969 report, this Board expressed our hope to obtain proficiency in our work by gaining the assistance, the comprehension and support of the Citizens of Tilton. This Board now takes pleasure in expressing our gratitude in the realization that our hope, as expressed then, is now reality. We have made abounding progress toward our goal this past year, solely because of the assistance and support of the majority. Most assuring is the comprehension of the importance of planning by more and more citizens.

Highlights of the accomplishments follow:

A Mobile Home Regulations Amendment to the Zoning Regulations was voted in at the Town Meeting.

A substantial appropriation was voted for Planning Purposes, participation in the Federal HUD "701" Comprehensive Planning Program, through the Office of State Planning, toward the ultimate formulation of a Comprehensive Plan for Tilton.

An Official Zoning Map of Tilton was authenticated and recorded with the Belknap County Registry of Deeds.

Subdivision Regulations were adopted by the Planning Board per authority voted it at Town Meeting of March 9, 1965 and duly recorded August 6, 1970 by the Town Clerk and at the Belknap County Registry of Deeds.

Printings of the complete Zoning Regulations and Subdivision Regulations in booklets.

Application for participation in the "701" Comprehensive Planning Program was approved by the Office of State Planning and four elements of the work

are nearing completion. Briefly: an interim report in Subdivision by the Technical Planning Associates, and an Initial Housing Element Study by the Environmental Consulting Group, Base Maps for Tilton and updating by the Department of Resources and Economics Development Graphics Section, and the preparation of a Reconnaissance Survey by the Principal Planner of the Office of State Planning.

Planning Board representation attended many various meetings with other groups involved in Regional Planning, Pollution Studies, Sewage and Solid Waste disposal, etc.

Many other in-between situations arose necessitating the direct attention of the Planning Board in assistance to subdivision proposals, Mobile Home Parks and interpretations and application of the Zoning Ordinances.

In summation: a busy year of solid progress.

Current objectives, in addition to the new work phases of the "701" Program, are to co-operate toward Regional Planning and Accomplishments; to study the zones of the Town in preparation for potentials evolving from current highway planning, the growth of the Town and best possible use of the land areas to insure the preservation of the finest ecological and environmental conditions that must forever be our Town — TILTON.

The fire season of 1970 was not a quiet one in this area, on the contrary, it was a very busy time with some towns reporting a greater number of fires than in past years. This record is not good.

Both state and towns are striving to meet this challenge. Results show that we are not doing enough, we must do more in the matter of fire prevention education, a more active inspection program and a more prompt, complete investigation of fires where definite cause is not known with court action where the need is indicated.

We must insist that minor children are given needed supervision, this is a parent's responsibility.

Your Warden and District Chief stand ready to help in this work.

Our gratitude to all who have helped in forest fire prevention and suppression this past year and we look forward to this continued help in our effort to improve our good prompt detection system and fast suppression action. This, coupled with a good prevention program, will improve our fire record.

Follow these simple suggestions to help:

Set a good example for others by observing fire permit laws and regulations; take your debris and waste to the town dump; keep matches away from children and be sure your smoking material is dead out when discarded.

1970 Annual Report

The conclusion of 1970 terminated the 15th year of the Recreation Council's programmed activities. During the non-summer months, the center (over the Tilton Town Hall), was open Monday through Friday (except Thursday) evening from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. Boys and Girls from junior grades could attend from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m., senior grades from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. During the spring, various tournaments were held among the center attendants involving indoor games and contests.

The Babe Ruth ball team, which was completely outfitted with uniforms on behalf of the A. S. Brown Company, did much better this year in the Laconia League.

A swimming program involving two (4) week sessions was successful for another year. The courses ranged from beginners to junior lifesavers. Certificates were awarded for completion of various tests at each level, as outlined by the American Red Cross.

The playground program was scheduled for a seven week period. Various arts and crafts were taught in addition to short trips to the pond, J. Donellon's golf range, and the Animal Farm in Laconia. Nature walks, various outdoor games, a parade, and various athletic events were also part of the program.

Another successful trip to Boston, for a Red Sox game was a further highlight toward summer's end. On this trip, the group also visited the Boston Aquarium.

The "Neighborhood Youth Corps," a federally funded youth program was undertaken again this year. Nine teenagers from town, meeting specific requirements, were supervised by the Recreation Council, working on community projects. They helped us with

During this period the nurse made 2,051 calls and 242 patients were cared for. Health and Welfare calls 89 for 16 cases.

A total of four immunization clinics were held in March, April, May and October. Immunizations were divided as follows: Polio 150, Triple toxoid 39, Diphtheria and tetanus 74, smallpox 21.

Assisting at these clinics were Mrs. Francis Crawford R.N., Mrs. Lois Glines R.N., Mrs. Ellen Maxwell R.N., Mrs. Mary O'Neil R.N., Mrs. Clarida Cannon, Mrs. Betty Pelletier, Mrs. Marjorie Robert. Dr. Frank J. Robinson was in attendance at three clinics and Dr. G. Vincent Ryan was in attendance at one.

The nurse also assisted at the two Rubella clinics which were held at the school on February 11 and 12.

Grateful appreciation is again extended to the American Legion for the use of their hall for these clinics.

Mrs. Ellen Maxwell R.N. substituted as district nurse for the last week in July, first three weeks in August and the first week in December.

The nurse attended two work-shops at the office of the State Public Health Nurse in Laconia in April and May concerning Child Welfare.

During Thanksgiving, Easter, and Christmas, many deserving families received gifts of food, clothing, and toys. Generously provided by the Rotary, Elks, American Legion, Rainbow Girls, Tilton-Northfield High School Honor Society, Congregational Church Friendly Club and Sunday School, Salvation Army and individuals. Approximately 21 families including 25 adults and 78 children were recipients.

At this time I wish to extend my appreciation to all organizations, churches, and individuals that have assisted me in any way, so that the work of this association may be carried on to the best interest of all residents of the Tilton and Northfield area.
