

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy, N.H. in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the TEASI building, in the said Town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next at 10:00 AM in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Articles 1 and 2, listed below, and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 15th day of March at 7:30 PM to act upon the remainder of the listed warrant.

ARTICLE 1: To bring in your vote for one Selectman for three years, and other Town Officers, elected by ballot as passed by Town Meeting or State Statute for the specified number of years.

ARTICLE 2: Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Are you in favor of the adoption of <u>Amendment #1</u> as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To revise Article III - General Provisions, Paragraph A. to make the setbacks for sewage disposal systems consistent with the Troy Water Resources Protection Ordinance adopted at the 1994 Town Meeting.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article III - General Provisions, Paragraph F. to permit by right the placing of a manufactured home on an already occupied lot for up to 12 months, to allow for the repair or reconstruction of a dwelling that has been rendered unusable by some catastrophe.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as proposed by the

Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article III - General Provisions, Paragraph H. to allow more than one principle use per lot by Special Exception of the Board of Adjustment, subject to criteria spelled out in Article XIV.

Are you in favor of the adoption of <u>Amendment #4</u> as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article VIII - Highway Business District, to permit home occupations by Special Exception in the Highway Business District, subject to the criteria spelled out in Article XIV.

Are you in favor of the adoption of <u>Amendment #5</u> as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article XIV - Board of Adjustment, Paragraph F. by expanding the Special Exception criteria followed by the Board of Adjustment when reviewing an application.

**ARTICLE 3:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town expenditures:

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to modify the Optional Elderly Exemption (RSA 72:43h) adopted at the March 14th, 1990 Town Meeting, based on the following:

For a Person 65-74	\$12,000.00
For a Person 75-79	25,000.00
80 or more Years of Age	50,000.00

and Assets not in excess of \$40,000.00, excluding the Value of the person's residence and 2 acres.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the care of the cemeteries. Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend \$14,171.00. \$13,171.00 to come from the Cemetery Trust Funds.

- ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Block Grant of \$35,379.00 that the Town will receive from the State of New Hampshire for the calendar year 1995 for maintenance, construction, and reconstruction of Class IV and V highways. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.
- **ARTICLE 7:** To see if the Town will vote a sum of money \$79,807.08 for the payment of Sewer Bonds. Income from the State of New Hampshire will be \$27,247.08. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.
- **ARTICLE 8:** To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$207,627.00 for the Water/Sewer Department operations. Income comes from collections of water and sewer rents. Recommended by Water/Sewer Commissioners and Budget Committee.
- **ARTICLE 9:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the sealing of Town roads. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.
- **ARTICLE 10:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,164.28 for the lease of the 4x4 Police Cruiser. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to establish an Industrial Development Trust Fund under RSA 31:19-a and to raise and appropriate from surplus the sum of \$10,950.00 to be placed in the said Trust Fund and to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.
- **ARTICLE 12:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money listed below to be placed into the Capital Reserve Funds for each department for the purpose of purchasing vehicles or equipment when voted by the Town. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money listed below to be placed into the Capital Reserve Funds for each department for the purpose of constructing new buildings or additions. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to be placed into the Gay-Kimball Library Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of building an addition. Recommended by Trustees of Gay-Kimball Library. Not Recommended by Selectmen or Budget Committee. (BY PETITION)

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Reassessment Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Board of Engineers to withdraw up to \$40,000.00 from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a chassis suitable to build a fire tanker or the purchase of a fire tanker if something comes available during the year. Requested by Board of Engineers. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen

to sell 34M4 the 1971 Ford pumper truck, take the proceeds from the sale of, place in the Fire Department's Vehicle and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the use/transfer of the proceed from the December 31, 1995 fund balance for this purpose. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Troy Youth Committee Revolving Fund as per RSA 35-B:2 II, into which all Troy Youth Committee fees and charges may be deposited. If this fund is created, the money in the fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year and shall not be considered part of the Town's general surplus. This fund is to be used only for the study, development of plans, construction or renovations and/or equipment for a future Youth Center. The Town Treasurer shall have custody of all moneys in the fund and shall pay out the same only upon orders of the Troy Youth Committee. Recommended by Selectmen.

**ARTICLE 19:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$39,000.00 from the Highway Building Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of building a new Highway Barn on the Dort Street lot. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 20:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,055.00 for Southwestern Community Services, Inc. community action programs. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 21:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Troy-Fitzwilliam Youth Sports Association. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 22:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Helping Hand Center. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 23:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to relay the front granite steps of the Town Hall. Recommended by Selectmen. Not Recommended by Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 24:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,500.00 for underdrain work on the tennis courts and patch the asphalt. Recommended by Selectmen. Not Recommended by Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to modify the existing agreement relative to FICA exclusion for election workers to raise the exclusion from \$100.00 annually to \$1,000.00 annually for services performed after December 31, 1994 or to take any other action relating thereto. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 26:** To see if the Town will vote to organize the Troy Fire Department pursuant to RSA 154:1 I (c) with a Fire Chief elected by the local legislative body pursuant to RSA 669:17, with firefighters appointed by the Fire Chief. Recommended by Selectmen.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to prepare a recommended program of local Capital Improvements projected over a period not to exceed six years. The sole purpose of the Capital Improvements Program is to aid the Budget Committee in its consideration of the annual budget. Recommended by Selectmen.

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of the library to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year pursuant to RSA 202-A:4-c, I, II, and III.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of the library to collect and expend without further action by Town Meeting, any fees for the use of the copier, and fines collected for lost and overdue materials.

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreement with Southwest Region Planning Commission and other State agencies, when money becomes available for feasibility studies, grants, and agreements in the best interest of the Town. This is to be done by the Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee,

after consultation with the Conservation Commission, Planning Board and Industrial Development Committee.

**ARTICLE 31:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend money from the State, Federal, or other government units or a private source, which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31-95b.

**ARTICLE 32:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax lien and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction, or advertised sealed bid, or in such a manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, and to pay charges and interest thereon.

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hear reports of committees, agents, or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

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

We have audited the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1994, and have issued our report thereon dated February 7, 1995.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement.

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1994, we considered its internal control structure in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

The management of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but no absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal

control structure, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

For the purpose of this report, we have classified the significant internal control structure policies and procedures in the following categories:

Budget
Cash and Investments
Revenue and Receivables

Expenditures for Goods and Services and Accounts Payable Payroll and Related Liabilities Debt and Debt Service Expenditures

For all of the internal control structure categories listed above, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk.

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the general purpose financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

This report is intended for the information of the Board of Selectmen. However, this report is a matter of public record and its distribution is not limited.

## **GAY-KIMBALL LIBRARY**

In 1994 the library had another year of increased activity. More people than ever used the facility for study, recreational reading, meetings and events. The Summer Reading Program attracted over 140 youngsters. Other activities for children included the Mystery Reader's Club, Story/Craft Hour, the Skit Group, parties and school field trips. For adults there was a Book Discussion Group, Friends of the Library, book sales, committee meetings, tax preparation and two open house events. The Friends of the Library held a work day and hosted the open house events, sold raffle tickets for the Building Fund and provided volunteers to staff the desk. Laura Kelsey is the chairperson of the group and the Friends' liaison to the Building Committee. We invite all Troy residents to become members of this informal group which exists to support and promote the library.

Volunteers and donors continue to enable the library to keep expenses low and to raise money for the library. Our thanks to the many people who continue to give the library unneeded books for the collection and the book sales. All are appreciated and accepted at any time of the year. Gifts were received in memory of Durale Watkins, Robert Bonner, and Doris Edwards. The Troy Baptist Church gave 19 Christian books for children and adults. Volunteers cleaned, washed windows, painted, pruned, raked and seeded. Bev Devine and Mary Sweet donated handcrafted items for our raffles. As always, Ray Dicey was a tremendous help with storage and transporting of books for the sales.

The library continues to increase the scope of services offered as the electronic age becomes more and more a necessary part of the way we operate. The New Hampshire State Library installed a new and faster computer system that affects all members of the NH Automated Information System (NHAIS). We can access CD-ROM databases, E-Mail, the Internet, Keene Link, UNH & Plymouth State Libraries as well as the holdings of almost every library in the state. Books can be reserved and sent by State Library van, thus saving much time on each inter-library loan transaction. Even very small libraries such as Troy's, now have access to information previously only available in big city or academic libraries.

The library's need for more space and to be accessible to the handicapped led to the formation of a Building Committee with Ralph Wentworth as its chairman. Members of the committee are Jean Shankle, Iver Olsen, Janet Damiano, Laura Kelsey, Sue Brumaghim and Trustees, Kathleen Marrotte, Pat Condon and Bernard Lepine. A needs assessment and preliminary designs have been made by the architect. The committee chose a design which should meet the library's needs for the next 15 to 20 years. Further design development is in the works for 1995 and there will be a display available at Town Meeting. Fund raising will start with an appeal to all of Troy's businesses to help defray the costs of the project. The committee is selling notecards and postcards printed with Christopher Sheldon's sketch of the library.

In March, John Firmin retired as Superintendent after nine years of service. John was a very devoted employee who oversaw many minor and major changes and upgrading of both departments. Fortunately, a position of Commissioner occurred and in April, John was appointed to fill this position until the election this March.

Bradley Beaudoin who has been serving as Assistant Superintendent since 1988 was appointed to the position of Superintendent and we hired Christopher Rocheleau to fill the position of Assistant Superintendent.

In March the Board accepted the resignation of Frank Obuchowski. Frank was only with us for a year but was very devoted to his position and a we thank him for his service.

In September the Board accepted the resignation of Peter Marrotte. Pete's job has taken him out of the area for a length of time. His expertise will be missed. The Water/Sewer Commissioners appointed Douglas Rouleau to fill this position until election this March.

December saw a change in the water/sewer rates. Because of mandates thrust upon us by the government, additional funding is needed in the Water Department to upgrade to their standards. Therefore, not wanting to add additional burden to our customers, we proposed raising the water rates and lowering the sewer rates. A Public Hearing was held and the new rates were adopted as of our December billing.

The Sewer Treatment Plant has been running good this past year. We did have a problem after being struck by lightening this past summer which resulted in a major electrical wiring replacement.

The Water Department has been busy with continuous work on the Avoidance Waiver from Filtration. This should be completed this year. The reservoir was cleaned and the hydrants flushed twice this year.

Brad extends the invitation to any resident who would like to tour the water system or Wastewater Water Treatment Plant. He would also like at this time to thank Chris for his excellent work as Assistant Superintendent.

Revisions were also done to the ramp in the garage to allow wheelchair access into the Town Hall and supporting beams were put up into the clock and bell tower roof.

Improvements to be addressed in the future are relaying the granite steps and painting the exterior of the Town Hall. Daily cleaning and maintenance is done to keep up with the dirt and dust in keeping the Town Hall looking her best.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1994 saw the Town of Troy controlling the town's share of the tax rate for the 4th year in a row. The town's share of the tax rate for the last 5 years was as follows:

1990	\$4.97
1991	4.75
1992	4.67
1993	4.42
1994	4.42

The Selectmen's and Budget Committee's proposed budgets for 1995 are both less than last year, so you can be assured that the town's share of the tax rate for 1995 will be less or the same as 1994. The Town is also carrying a surplus of approximately \$150,000.

The Town of Troy's operating budget, according to the State of New Hampshire's most recent survey of all 66 towns in Troy's population range, is the smallest in the State. The Town of Troy can be assured that the Selectmen and Budget Committee have worked very hard over the last five years to make sure each and every dollar is being spent with a lot of thought.

The bad news for 1994 was the school's share of the tax rate took a jump of 20% which caused our taxes to increase 13.75%. The fact that the county share of the tax rate went down saved us from going up the full 20%. The reasons for the increase in our school tax are listed below:

- 1. The number of students increased by 30.
- 2. State Foundation Aid decreased.
- 3. The school operating budget increased.
- 4. The building program added new classrooms.

This year there will be an Article on the School Warrant for Saturday, March 4th, to change the schools funding formula for the eight towns in the school district. We presently pay for the operating budget based on the number of students we send to the School District. The new proposal

will have 75% according to the number of students and 25% according to the valuation within each town. This formula change would help the property poorer towns in the School District which are Troy, Gilsum, and Sullivan. We presently have towns paying twice as much on an individual school tax as other towns. With some valuation in the school formula, we could reduce some of the disparity on school taxes from one town to another. Please go to the School Meeting on March 4th and vote.

The biggest change within the Town in 1994 was new street lighting thanks to a study started by Steve Holmes two years ago with Public Service Company of New Hampshire. The pay back on the new lights is less than three years. Other new additions include the new roof on the Town Hall, a handicap accessible restroom in the Town Hall, a fire truck, 2 highway trucks, newly repinned loader arms, and resurfacing of West Hill Road.

The Landfill remains a big question in everyones minds as we await information from our engineering firm, Dufresne-Henry, Inc. and the State of New Hampshire as to what has to be done next in the long process of closing our Landfill, and what does the Town do with it's solid waste problem.

The State of New Hampshire has hired a consulting firm to study the Route 12 issue going through the Town of Troy. We are presently waiting to meet with state officials and the consulting firm to start the study. This year will give everyone an opportunity to offer their input.

Some new projects for 1995 include the installation of light poles with new copper lanterns on the Town Common which have already been funded and money has already been donated to build a band stand on the common. The five year plan for resurfacing of roads will include a section of Richmond Road and Mackey Road. We would like to remind everyone that Troy Elementary School will be celebrating 100 years in April, and we hope that as many people as possible will get involved in this great event.

This year there is an Article on the Town Warrant to decrease the amount of the Elderly Exemptions. The main reason for this decrease is

to offset the amount the Selectmen are going to devalue the property in town. The Selectmen will be devaluing the town by at least 20% to try to make property values more in line with market values. On a property with an assessed value of \$100,000., lowering the assessment by 20% would drop the value to \$80,000. will mean the Elderly Exemption will be worth \$20,000. more unless we reduce the exemption. We ask you for your support on this change.

The Selectmen would like to stress the importance of using and posting a street number on your residence to comply with the new 911 law which takes effect July 5, 1995. This is necessary so all emergency vehicles can locate every residence in the Town of Troy.

The Selectmen would like to thank Raelene Cummings who spent 12 years as our Town Clerk/Tax Collector for her dedicated service. Raelene was defeated in the March 1994 election. The Selectmen would like to extend a special thank you to Kim Matson and Thompson Nurseries and the newly formed Garden Club who kept our Town Common looking beautiful with flowers last summer. We would also like to thank all Department Supervisors, town employees, committee chairmen and members, and volunteers who kept the town running smoothly, and allowed the town to control budgets. The Selectmen would like to extend an invitation to all residents who would like to serve on a committee. The town is always in need of new faces and new ideas.

Lastly I would like to end with something from our auditor's report. Our auditors, Vachon, Clukay & Co., reported after auditing 57 towns and cities in the State of New Hampshire, that it does not get any better than the Town of Troy. We can certainly give Cindy Satas, Janet McCullough, and Ralph Heald a lot of this credit, but it takes a town of dedicated employees, committee members, and volunteers working together to be successful.

## **BUDGET COMMITTEE**

The Budget Committee appreciates the carefulness of the various departments in keeping within their budgets in this last year. We are all feeling the economic tightening and we must all do what we can to keep the operating costs of our community from strangling us, without compromising the quality of needed services. All departments have been encouraged to keep their 1995 budget requests at or below last years budget. Most departments have made that effort; however, the Budget Committee would like to propose the following changes in the requested budgets:

## 1. JUDICIAL AND LEGAL. Requested \$10,270.00

Based on what has actually been spent each year over the past three years, this committee recommends a budget this year of \$5,000.00.

## 2. POLICE DEPARTMENT Requested \$114,789.00

We appreciate the fine job being done by our Police Department but we believe that with the resourcefulness and creativity that the Chief has demonstrated, reductions and adjustments can be made in this department so that it can operate effectively on a budget of \$102,000.00.

## 3. HEALTH ADMINISTRATION Requested \$ 7,850.00

1994	\$10,064.00	\$5,724.00

Again, based on previous years monies actually spent, we recommend a budget of \$7,000.00.

Spending tax money demands good accounting, record keeping, and careful planning. The Budget Committee had several reservations concerning this budget including proposed building repair without bids; no specifics on new programs; salary inconsistent with scheduled hours; unknown records and statistics from previous years and a winter ski program when the war memorial focus has been a summer program. We are also concerned about the serious deterioration of the tennis courts and the need of investing funds in their repair. There are new people involved on the War Memorial Committee and we recommend they begin with a basic program; therefore, we recommend a budget of \$10,000.00.

#### 5. LIBRARY CAPITAL RESERVE

The library requested \$25,000.00 to be placed in the capital reserve account for the building. We recommend \$10,000.00 simply to be consistent with the goal of keeping taxes down this year.

#### 6. SPECIAL ARTICLE FOR REPAIR OF TOWN HALL STEPS

Requested \$25,000.00

We acknowledge the need of repair, but this committee strongly contends that all contracted repairs and/or services be preceded by at least three bids before town monies are appropriated; therefore, we cannot recommend this expenditure, without further justification.

## 7. SPECIAL ARTICLE FOR REPAIR OF TENNIS COURTS

Requested \$9,500.00

Again, we acknowledge the need of repair, but we cannot recommend this expenditure without further justification.

## 8. CAPITAL RESERVE:

Highway Department \$10,000.00 \$10,000.00

This is the first year that the Budget Committee has published this detail in the annual Town Report; however, we feel that it is necessary to give the voters a better understanding of the difficulty in presenting a budget for the town. ## FIRE DEPARTMENT

1994 saw the Fire Department respond to seventy-three calls for help.

During the year we completed outfitting the American LaFrance pumper purchased from the Greenlawn, New York Fire Department. We would like to thank J&J Auto of Troy and Yankee Signs of Walpole for the paint job, lettering, and striping work done on the apparatus. Many hours were also volunteered by department members in preparing the apparatus for painting and replacing the equipment afterwards.

In the spring, the department held an Open House which many of you attended. My personal thanks to 1st Deputy Charles Rocheleau, 2nd Deputy Raymond Dicey and members of the department who greeted you and ran demonstrations for the people of Troy.

By now you have heard about the used apparatus purchased from Rockville Volunteer Fire Department of Rockville, Maryland. It is a 1978 Mack with a seven man enclosed cab. carries 750 gallons of water and has a 1.000 gallon per minute two stage pump. The apparatus is in service and has already responded to calls.

The Ford pumper which the Mack is replacing is for sale. If you know or hear of anyone who may be interested in it, let us know.

Like the Marines, the Fire Department is looking for a few good men or women who would be willing to serve their community. A sign seen outside the Spout Spring. North Carolina Fire Station reads:



# TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were No Permit, Children, and Rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000.00 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

## WELFARE DEPARTMENT

During 1994, fifty-two families received assistance and the cost to the Town of Troy totaled \$9,866.00, as follows:

\$40.00 was returned to the Town by those who had received assistance who were able to find employment and pay back some of the assistance received.

The Troy Welfare Department is a network involving Town Government, the State Welfare Agency for AFDC and Food Stamps, the New Hampshire Employment Security Office, Helping Hand Center, and Southwestern Community Services, Inc.

Article 28 of the March 9, 1994 Town Warrant appropriated \$2,000.00 for the Helping Hand Center which eliminated the need to issue food vouchers last year. Helping Hand was able to meet that need.

Representative Gingrich and the Republican Congress are sincere about reforming the Federal Welfare System; however, the impact on the states and the cities and towns is yet unclear. The Troy Welfare Department is for emergency situations to help families over some rough times and to assist families to return to an income status.

Again, I would like to thank everyone for their contributions to the Christmas Tree CFX Bank puts up annually for children of needy families and thank you for your support and the opportunity to serve our community.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

1994 brought with it a number of events that affected the Police Department. First, Officer Baird was involved in a great tragedy which eventually led to his untimely death. After this the officers were put to a test by the first Troy Mills strike in over a decade. This strike saw escalating violence until both sides were forced to the table and resolved their differences.

The year also brought a number of successes; our Traffic Safety Program underwritten by grants from the NH Highway Safety Agency enabled us to stress pedestrian safety with school kids, a Bicycle Safety Program, Truck Enforcement and DWI programs. An additional program, our Seat Belt Safety Program, was recognized and received an award from the NH Buckle Up Coalition. The 1994 Traffic Safety Program is currently being considered for a national award. These programs were able to be used, by receiving grant money from the State and Federal Government, rather than make use of our existing budget.

Our juvenile program has been a success also in that the number of juvenile cases has dropped. I attribute this to our involvement with the Troy School as well as the Middle School and High School administration. The DARE Program, again fully funded by grants and not from the town budget, has been a great success in reaching the kids in both the Troy and Fitzwilliam elementary schools.

We are currently setting up a SALT council (Seniors and Law Enforcement) in order to address the needs of our senior citizens. This program will be working with two other towns as a model for Cheshire County and hopefully an expanded program of help for seniors. In 1994, the Troy Police Department was instrumental in working with the courts and other agencies in setting up a Domestic Violence Council to assist with this serious problem and help the victims.

The Police Department was honored by Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD) by being loaned a video camera system for our use in our DWI cases. The department was singled out because of its efforts in this field.

In 1995 we are planning to continue our Highway Safety Program and continue to push our DARE Program. Our main emphasis will be slowing down commercial truckers and drug abuse.

While our statistics below show what was done in 1994, they do not give the full story. Besides the programs and grants that the department receives, we are constantly looking for ways to deliver to the citizens the most for their money. While other agencies ask for more to function, we are searching for ways to receive money back through grants, court fines that previously went to the state and administrative charges for services rendered. While it does not allow us to operate for free, it provides the additional services and programs that we are currently operating, such as Traffic Safety, DARE and the new Senior Program. That would, if not received through grants, add over \$20,000. to the budget.

## PLANNING BOARD

While there was little development activity in Troy this year, the Planning Board was involved in a number of land use issues. At Town Meeting in March, the Wetlands Ordinance was adopted by voters. The Conservation Commission worked closely with the Board in researching related ordinances and terminology, and provided invaluable input as the Ordinance was written. Troy had been one of the last area towns to adopt this. The Planning Board adopted and passed a Flood Plain Ordinance, which will allow the town to be part of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Without this arrangement, property owners in flood prone areas could not qualify for mortgages and flood insurance. The Board also adopted revised Subdivision and Site Plan Regulations. These regulations and their accompanying applications, checklists and process flow charts are an attempt to simplify and streamline the application process. This information will be printed in the spring.

The Planning Board has worked closely with the Selectmen, the ZBA and the Conservation Commission on a number of issues this year. As a result, several proposed changes to the Zoning Ordinance will be presented to voters at this year's Town Meeting.

There has been little information coming from the DOT concerning the Route 12 issue. An engineering firm has been selected to do the preliminary studies, but they were required to resubmit their cost estimates due to a shortfall in the state highway budget. Keene and neighboring towns are pushing their own transportation problems and needs at DOT hearings. Troy's voice has been heard, but the timetable for any proposed project - be it widening, bypass or something else - seems to be extending farther into the future. In February, the Planning Board held a public hearing where representatives of businesses, and community members were given the opportunity to express their feelings about the bypass issue. It is a complex and potentially divisive issue for the town. The Planning Board is committed to providing information to the community when it becomes available. Several members hold important monitoring positions: Ray Miller and Dennis Poirier are our Commissioners to the Southwest Regional Planning Commission and

Warian Hawkins faithfully attends and reports on all Transportation Advisory Commission hearings. Members have also been attending the Spring and Fall Law Lecture Series and a Planning Board Conference held in Concord last spring.

A new base map, commissioned by the Planning Board, has been mounted and installed opposite the Selectmen's Office. Board member, Judy Lepine, completed an inventory of all hiking and biking trails in the town.

The Planning Board has offered to develop a Capitol Improvement Program in response to the Selectmen's concerns over budgeting issues. The sole purpose of such a program is to assist the Budget Committee in its consideration of an annual budget with a several year timetable of needs and improvements.

Many of these projects and issues could not have been undertaken without the professional assistance of Carol Ogilvie of the Southwest Regional Planning Commission. She and her office are an indispensable resource to the town.

The Planning Board meets the first and third Wednesday evenings of every month at 7:30 in the Town Hall. Typically, the first meeting is spent on public issues and the second meeting is a workshop during which the Board learns about and works on updating zoning and land use ordinances. With the expansion of the Police Department Office, and with the Americans With Disabilities Act restricting use of the second floor for public meetings, the Board finds itself without a location to hold meetings and hearings in a professional manner. The Board hopes that the Selectmen will address this issue soon.

## INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

All too soon the months slip by with no committed client willing to locate a new and acceptable light industry in Troy. The Industrial Development Committee continues to meet with state and local Economic Development Coordinators with the hopes that the town can experience economic growth. Two members of the committee spent several hours in Concord in the late fall to meet with three state level coordinators representing two state agencies. Cary Gladstone, a community coordinator for the Business Visitation Program, outlined no less than 14 state agencies in and around Concord designed to assist communities in attracting and landing desirable clients. The Business Visitation Program appears to be a fine start in identifying established businesses' problems, improving the community's business climate, and coordinating future economic development through a statewide data base. Local Industrial Development Committee (IDC) members plan to visit other New Hampshire communities where the BVP has been implemented. Outcomes of such an effort involving local business representatives and professional state coordinators should stimulate local economic growth and attract additional business as a spin off. Within the next few months, local businesses should be contacted with the BVP outlined to ascertain interest and level of participation.

Dennis McCann and Kenneth Ormann, coordinators with the Office of State Planning, made it very clear that community block grant funds are out there to assist community endeavors wanting to attract new business. Money is available to lay sewer and water lines, for example, to provide the basic amenities that a start up business would require. There are, or course, certain criteria to be met. A very basic one is that there must be a firm commitment from a serious minded client for the grants to be awarded. The Dort Street stumbling blocks have been addressed before and could be eradicated with federal grant funds allocated via the state agencies.

Communication was established with a well known country store mini chain regarding the vacant Troy Market and Troy Hardware sites. If the controversial Route 12 bypass becomes a reality, what magnet type of business would draw the buying traveler through the village? We do have

a fine new diner, the well known Mountain View Restaurant, Bower's Sports Shop, convenience stores, auto shops, and the bakery. How can we improve our lot - the Business Visitation Program? Your suggestions are welcomed.

I am sure you share the IDC's frustrations when you read of the industrial growth and well financed planning taking place with our neighbors to the northwest. Please also be reminded that these same neighbors can boast a full-time, paid IDC director or chairman.

### LANDFILL

Landfill Permits for 1995/1996 are available in the Town Clerk's Office for \$2.00 during regular business hours.

This year a cement slab was poured for a roll-off dumpster which holds crushed glass. We have been fortunate to find markets for our recyclables. During 1994 we deposited \$6,491.81 in the Landfill/Recycling Special Trust Fund. These funds were generated from recyclable and fees for materials left at the site. The purpose of this account is to help defray the cost of closing the Landfill.

Thank you for your continued cooperation with our recycling efforts and a special thank you to my assistants for another year of dependable, dedicated service.

### ANIMAL CONTROL

The year of 1994 did not produce the expected number of complaints about rabies and Troy did not have any confirmed cases, although a number of raccoons had to be destroyed due to symptoms that are synonymous with the rabies strain. While we did not have any confirmed cases, all our neighbors have experienced them. It is expected that the epidemic will continue on for a number of years before it runs its course. It is also expected that in the next couple of years the fox rabies epidemic coming in from Canada and Vermont will be in our area.

This means that we will have to continue to exercise caution in dealing with wildlife and to make sure that our dogs and cats are vaccinated against rabies. As you are aware, several incidents of cats with rabies have caused a considerable scare in New Hampshire. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact us for assistance or information on rabies.

The number of cases was down considerably from the previous year and our budget was reduced to reflect this trend. Part of this reduction was from the Police Department taking over a number of problems that were previously handled by the Animal Control Officer and the new Ordinance Violations Summonses that are issued for town animal violations. These summonses and fines cut down on the repeat problems that previously ate away at the budget.

### MONADNOCK ADVISORY COMMISSION

The Monadnock Advisory Commission is charged by the State of New Hampshire under RA 258:1 to advise and guide the Department of Resources and Economic Development on management of their lands and leased lands of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. The lands are located on Mt. Monadnock, Gap Mountain, and Little Monadnock Mountain.

During 1994 the Commission held public meetings in Jaffrey and Troy. In 1995 the Commission will hold meetings in other member towns. The staffing of the Old Toll Road area in Jaffrey by the Division of Parks and Recreation has been very successful after a full year of operation. ### SOUTHWEST REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

I am writing to request that Troy continue its membership in the Southwest Region Planning Commission. The annual dues are based on a rate of \$1.10 per capita, according to the latest population figures from the Office of State Planning. The dues for 1995 will be \$2,327.00.

The Commission depends upon its membership dues to fund core staff and office facilities. This financial foundation allows the Commission to provide basic planning and support services to member communities. As a member community, you are entitled to unlimited telephone support and office consultation regarding land use issues. We will also attend up to six meetings during the year with the Planning Board or other boards to help resolve local concerns. Staff is also available to help prepare or review minor proposed amendments to local land use regulations.

The Commission offers other services. The Planning Board Assistance Program (PBA), a unique program whereby a community receives the benefit of a contracted amount of a professional planner's time at a discounted rate of \$30.00/hour to help with very specific needs. Towns will use PBA to cover the cost of site development or subdivision reviews, revisions to outdated subdivisions or site plan regulations, or even minor updates to master plans.

The Commission is also available to prepare master plans, well head protection management plans, capital improvement programs, special traffic studies, detailed impact studies, extensive zoning ordinance revisions, ADA compliance plans, or other special studies.

We are also prepared to develop maps of tax parcels, zoning districts, land use maps, wetlands, or various combinations using the latest geographic information system (GIS) computer technology.

If you would like help developing a budget for any of the above, please contact us.

The Commission is also willing to help your community acquire its share of state or federal grant monies. Last year, we successfully submitted proposals for Community Development Block Grant funds on behalf of Troy, Sullivan, Walpole, and Swanzey.

Troy's membership allows the Commission to meet its responsibility to the southwest region. In addition to maintaining a library of information and resource materials, the Commission works with many local and regional groups around issues that affect us all - transportation, housing, open space preservation, river protection, recreation, etc. We look forward to working with you next year and thank you for your continuing support.

# HOME HEALTH CARE AND COMMUNITY SERVICES, INC.

The Annual Report includes statistical and financial information bout the services provided to residents this year. In 1995, we are requesting an appropriation of \$7,544.00 to continue to provide home care services in Troy, and \$859.00 for the Meals-On-Wheels program. The appropriation will continue to cover services that assist residents to recover at home, or to remain independent at home. These services include visiting nurses, rehabilitation therapies, home health aides, homemakers, and hospice care for the terminally ill.

HCS continues to make every effort to seek funding for patient care from a variety of sources, and utilize the town dollar only when other funding is exhausted. In 1994, HCS was successful in keeping the cost of services under the appropriation; however, we respectfully request that the home care appropriation remain at the same level due to the uncertainty of other payor sources, such as state and federal funding, in the coming year.

First, of most importance, our volunteer staff became very low in active members. This was a result of many different reasons. Of course, this caused us great concern, knowing that to provide you with the best care possible in the most expeditious time, is what TEASI is all about. This problem was addressed in many ways. One result was TEASI sponsoring an Emergency Response Class. A huge THANK YOU to you folks who answered our cry for help by stepping forward and making a commitment to your community! When the class was completed, we were blessed with seven new members. We also have three more members enrolled in an EMT class at this time. Even though we have taken steps to correct this situation, we realize this will be an on-going challenge as it is in many communities.

Another challenge that came back to haunt us, was the very urgent need for a new ambulance. Yes, by the time you read this, our ambulance has been ordered! This has been a tremendous undertaking to which literally hundreds of hours were devoted to this project by our volunteers and many friends. Although we are very excited about the conquest of this challenge, we will need to continue our appeal for funds for this purpose. The purchase of the ambulance was made with actual and projected funds. We hope that your support will continue as it has in the past.

Troy Emergency Ambulance Service, Inc. (TEASI) is not 'JUST" a non-profit volunteer organization. TEASI is a FREE to the user ambulance service! We provide absolutely FREE emergency ambulance service to all folks in Troy and Fitzwilliam. There is never a charge for our service. We also provide all residents of both Troy and Fitzwilliam with FREE transfer service. We do not operate on tax dollars, we operate on your contributions and funds from special fundraising activities.

Our volunteers respond to all calls for ABSOLUTELY NOTHING. They do what they do because they care about us and want to serve the community. ### TROY-FITZWILLIAM YOUTH SPORTS ASSOCIATION

The 1994 baseball and softball season is long over and now is the time to reflect on the past and make plans for the future. We have already had one meeting of our local association and two meetings at the league level.

For the 1994 season, 75 children from Troy and 84 children from Fitzwilliam played on 11 teams. From early May to July there were 67 baseball games and 30 softball games. In addition, there were weekly practices, league playoff games, post season tournaments, and approximately 15 additional 13-15 year old players participating in Babe Ruth Baseball. The 11 teams operated on a total budget of approximately \$3,700.00, which was raised from contributions, sign-up fees, and contributions from both Troy and Fitzwilliam.

Team size was a problem due to late sign-ups. While large teams keep the costs for equipment and insurance down, having an average team size of 14.5 players reduces playing time for the children. It is anticipated that the 1995 season will have two additional teams. Since the cost of outfitting a complete team is approximately \$1,000.00, we are exploring the options of raising sign-up fees (our cost is currently compatible with other towns in the area, but significantly below Keene), fundraising through the sale of discount cards with Gap Mountain League (this was quite successful last year), contributions from local businesses (which was not successful last season), and increased financial commitment from both Troy and Fitzwilliam Recreation.

We are requesting \$1,000.00 each from Troy and Fitzwilliam Recreation Commissions in support for the upcoming season. Last year we received \$800.00 from Fitzwilliam Recreation and \$750.00 by a Special Warrant Article from the Town of Troy. Hopefully, you will include this request of \$1,000.00 within your Recreation Commission budget for 1995, a small cost for the reward the children receive. Thank you for your support.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To add a new Article XXIII, Water Resources Protection Ordinance, the purpose of which is to protect natural wetlands and all surface water bodies from destruction and pollution. The ordinance provides for a 75-foot setback for all new buildings and parking lots, and a 100-foot setback for septic systems and leach fields. Wildlife habitat management, some recreational uses, conservation areas and nature trails, drainage ways and

agricultural uses are permitted in the Water Resources Protection District. Uses that would require a conditional permit from the Planning Board are construction of roads, pipelines, powerlines and pipelines, and forestry and tree farming. All residential structures existing as of this date are exempt from the provisions of the ordinance.

Moderator Britton recognized Richard Martin who read RSA Chapter 32 which states that the Budget Committee has the sole responsibility for the budget and that their budget should be the one voted on.

Judy Lepine questioned the difference in the amount for the library between the Selectmen's Budget and the Budget Committee's recommendation. Richard Martin said departments have to get their budgets in on time. Kathy Marrotte said that the library budget was in on time but they did not have December figures.

Frank Obuchowski commented that the Budget Committee had put a lot of hours and hard work into the preparation of their budget. With no further discussion, Article 3 was passed as amended by Bruce McCulley almost unanimously.

Pat Condon moved to amend the library budget from \$32,000.00 to \$33,040.00. Amendment passed.

John Callahan questioned why the Selectmen's Budget for the Landfill was less than that presented by the Budget Committee. Richard Martin explained that it had to do with a pay raise for the Superintendent.

**ARTICLE 4:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money s may be necessary for the care of cemeteries. Selectmen

and Budget Committee recommend \$14,171.00. \$13,171.00 to come from the Cemetery Trust Funds. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend he Highway Block Grant of \$33,790.21 that the Town will receive from the State of New Hampshire for the calendar year 1994 for maintenance, construction, and reconstruction of Class IV and V highways. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

**ARTICLE 6:** To see if the Town will vote a sum of money \$81,151.39 for the payment of Sewer Bonds. Income from the State of New Hampshire will be \$28,591.39. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$206,249.00 for the Water/Sewer Department operations. Income comes from collection of water and sewer rents. Recommended by Water/Sewer Commissioners and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the Water Department to up grade its system and purchase equipment as required by the Department of Environmental Services to be in compliance with The Federal Surface Water Treatment Rule, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$50,000.00 of bonds and notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Town Officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Recommended by the Board of Water/Sewer Commissioners and Budget Committee. (2/3 Majority Ballot Vote Required).

Gideon Nadeau questioned if Article 8 was a wash. Fred Lawrence stated that it was paid out of operating costs. Article 8 passed by ballot vote of YES 80 NO 7

**ARTICLE 9:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$20,000.00 for the sealing of Town roads. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

**ARTICLE 10:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,164.00 for the lease of the 4x4 Police Cruiser. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

**ARTICLE 11:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,665.00 to have the Town Hall roof completely redone. This will include removing the shingles on one side, slate on the other side, installing 1/2" plywood over the existing boarding and new 30 year shingles. Also the chimney will be rebuilt from the roof line up. Bidding process was used and the above sum was low bid. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money listed below to be placed into the Capital Reserve Funds of each department for the purpose of purchasing vehicles or additional equipment when voted by the Town. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

Without any discussion, Article 12 passed with the Budget Committee's recommendations.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of purchasing vehicles or additional equipment for the Landfill and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed into this fund. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money listed below to be placed into the Capital Reserve Funds of each department for the purpose of building new buildings or

additions. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 to re-pin and bush the Highway Department's loader arms. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a long-term lease agreement with Grappone Ford Company for the purpose of leasing a new truck (sander) for the Highway Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the current lease payment. The \$12,000.00 to come from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund. The cost of the truck will be \$42,864.00 on a seven year lease with six remaining payments of \$6,487.70 each. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. (2/3 Majority Ballot Vote Required). If this article passes, then Article 17 can be passed over.

Jim Dicey, Road Agent, requested we pass over Article 16 and vote on Article 17. He prefers a used vehicle but he did secure the information on a new vehicle as he was requested to do by the Budget Committee. He added that a new vehicle fully equipped would cost \$61,500.00, not \$42,864.00 as written in Article 16. Article 16 was passed over as recommended by Jim Dicey.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 to purchase a used six wheel dump truck, to replace the 1980 Ford dump truck and the 1970 Ford truck, less the sander. The \$12,000.00 to come from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as

presented.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the 1970 Ford truck, less the sander, and the 1980 Ford dump truck, take the proceeds from the sale of and place in the Highway Vehicle and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the use/transfer of the proceeds from the December 31, 1994 fund balance for this purpose. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

Fred Lawrence asked Jim if he wanted to sell the 1980 Ford dump truck. He wanted to know the way the Article is written if they have to sell it. Dennis Poirier said he assumed they have to sell it. Article 18 passed as presented.

ARTICLE 19: To se if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$7,450.00 from the Landfill Capital Fund, established under RSA 31:95-c for the final payment of the engineering fees, border-line adjustment survey, test pits, incurred in the Phase I closing of the Town of Troy Landfill. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,855.00 for engineering expenses for the Landfill Closure Design. The firm of Dufresne and Henry, Inc. has been hired by the Selectmen and Phase I was implemented in 1993. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

**ARTICLE 21:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for a proposal from the firm of Ransom Environmental Consultants, Inc., to locate, sample, and the development of a plan for the removal and disposal of the unmarked drums of hazardous waste found at the Town of Troy Municipal Landfill. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

Ralph Wentworth asked if the \$6,000.00 was a fixed price. Dennis Poirier explained that it was just the fee to determine how many barrels there were and what was in them and a plan for how to get rid of them. He added the Selectmen's Office had been approached by a local firm

and that if the barrels were theirs, they would be involved in the cleanup. Passed as presented.

**ARTICLE 22:** To see if the Town will vote o raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,246.51 to convert all of its outdoor lighting to High Pressure Sodium. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Board of Engineers to withdraw up to \$40,000.00 from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a used fire truck or fire tanker if something becomes available during the year. Requested by the Board of Engineers. Recommended by Selectmen.

John Callahan, Fire Chief, explained the needs of the Fire Department and that he has developed a network of communication to be made aware of vehicles as they become available which might be feasible for the Town of Troy. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell 34M5 and the 1973 Ford pumper truck, take the proceeds from the sale of, place in the Fire Department's Vehicle and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the use/transfer of the proceeds from the December 31, 1994 fund balance for this purpose. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

John Callahan explained that this was a cleanup Article from last year. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,400.00 to paint the outside concrete block portion of the Fire Department. Requested by the Fire Department.

John Callahan explained that Article 25 was requested by the Fire Department. The \$3,400.00 is not only to paint the outside concrete block portion of the building. It is necessary to pressure wash the block section of the building, repair some of the blocks, paint the blocks and stain the wood. Gideon Nadeau asked why we didn't use volunteers to

do the work. John said a professional job would be much better and last longer. Passed as presented.

**ARTICLE 26:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Jaffrey Area Mediation Program. The Mediation Program will provide services to any Troy family requesting services free of charge. Recommended by Selectmen. Not recommended by Budget Committee.

Karen Herbert asked what Jaffrey Area Mediation Program is. Chief Smith explained they were used by the Police Department and the Jaffrey/Peterborough Court to help mediate problems in the family, often times with juveniles. During 1993, seven families received services. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the Troy Youth Baseball. This was previously included in the War Memorial Budget. Because this item is not associated with the War Memorial, the committee felt that this amount should be considered under a separate article. Recommended by Selectmen. Not recommended by Budget Committee.

Sam Johnson, representing Troy-Fitzwilliam Youth Baseball Association, stated that the \$750.00 did not cover all the expenses involved in running Troy's share of the program. They also try to get donations from businesses and private sources. Passed as presented.

Ed Lang requested at this time that we recognize Iver Olsen who has been a Trustee of the Trust Funds for six years. At the time Iver accepted that position, he had quite a job to get everything in order and he has done an outstanding job as Trustee. Everyone stood for Iver with applause.

Dennis Poirier added that he would like to recognize our State Representative, Dan Burnham, for all his work in Troy's interests.

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Helping Hand Center in Troy. Recommended

by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purpose of having plans drawn for ADA modifications and an addition to the library. Recommended by Trustees of the Library. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of the library to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year pursuant to RSA 202-A:4-c, I, II, and III. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of the library to collect and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, any fees for the use of the copier and fines collected for lost and overdue materials. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable general trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Town Building Maintenance Fund, for the purpose of repairing and maintaining town buildings. No funds to be raised this year, but in the upcoming years an amount to be established each year to go into this fund. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint 3-7 citizens s members of the Heritage Commission pursuant to the provisions of RSA 673:4-a and RSA 673:5 and to appoint not more than 5 additional citizens as alternate members pursuant to the provisions of RSA 673:6, or take any other action relating thereto. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreement with the Southwest Region Planning Commission and other state agencies, when money becomes available for feasibility studies, grants and agreements, in the best interest of the town. This is to be done by the Selectmen, with the approval of the Town Budget Committee, after consultation with the Conservation Commission,

Planning Board and Industrial Development Committee. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, or other government units, or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with he procedures set forth in RSA 31-95b. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 36: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax lien and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction or advertised sealed bid, or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 37: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, to pay the charges and the interest thereon. Passed as presented.

ARTICLE 38: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hear reports of committees, agents, or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative. Passed as presented.
