THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare School Gymnasium in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town of Weare "Shall favor designation of Lake Horace Marsh, 200[±] acres, beginning from Abijah Bridge, south (between high water marks) to the Deering Town Line and north northwest along Dudley Brook (between high water marks) to the Deering Town Line in the Town of Weare as Prime Wetlands as provided in RSA 483-A:7 and described in documents and maps filed by the Planning Board and Conservation Commission with the Town Clerk as required by RSA 31:63-a."

NOTE: In accordance with the vote of Town Meeting of March 6, 1973, Articles 3 through 60 will be taken up at an adjourned session of this meeting on March 10, 1983 at 7:30 P.M. in the Weare School Gymnasium.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same:

4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year 1983 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110,000.00 for summer and winter maintenance of the highways or to take any other action in relation thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$53,920.00 for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for repair of bridges or to take any other action in relation thereto.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,088.05 to be used with the sum of \$13,920.31 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.
9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$17,665.19 which represents the anticipated Additional Highway Subsidy funds under RSA 241:15.

10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$27,398.23 as a set-off against the State reimbursement known as Highway Subsidy Funds.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for road sealing of town roads or to take any other action in relation thereto.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the resurfacing of town roads or to take any other action in relation thereto.
13. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Highway Department to sell some of its used equipment with the funds received to be applied toward purchasing updated equipment for the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to go with State Matching Funds of \$20,000.00, 2 to 1, for reconstruction of River Road (Clough Rd. section), or to take any other action in relation thereto.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,150.00 for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,400.00 for the general budget of the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,480.00 for repair and maintenance for the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for fire fighting equipment for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for repairs and maintenance of Town Water Holes or to take any other action in relation thereto.
20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the "Jaws of Life" for the Weare Fire Department Rescue Squad, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a new ambulance for the Weare Fire Department Rescue Squad, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to make the Center Fire Station more energy efficient, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,200.00 for the Weare Landfill, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,550.00 for the Weare Community Nursing Service for expenses and to have the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association provide Home Health Services for the residents of the Town of Weare, N.H., or to take any other action in relation thereto.
25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to the Town Hall, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
26. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Weare Historical Society the use of the upstairs of the Town Hall for Weare artifacts, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,099.74 for the operation of the Weare Public Library, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to purchase two bookcases for the adult section of the Weare Public Library, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
29. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for repairs to the Old High School, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
30. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,328.00 for the purchase of 6 new pagers and 1 new radio for a fire truck and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of \$7,000.00 which represents a principal payment on a note

to the BankEast for the Fire Department Tanker.

32. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for the purchase of Pagers for the Police Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
33. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,400.00 for the purchase of radio equipment for the Police Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for the purchase of firearms for the Police Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
35. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purchase of a plow truck for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the preservation of Town Records, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
37. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for road signs for the Highway Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
38. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. (Petition Article)
39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for repairs to the Sawyer Estate at Tavern Village or to take any other action in relation thereto.
40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare, and to appropriate the same to the payment of purposes for which it constitutes reimbursement, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. (As provided under RSA 80:42, Sale of Tax Liens/Tax Deeded Properties).
42. To see if the Town will vote to add a penalty to the Mobile Home Ordinance whereby the Selectmen will issue a \$100.00 fine for non-compliance of the ordinance. Upon receipt of notification of being in violation of our mobile home ordinance, the party will be fined \$100.00 per day for each day of continued non-compliance.
43. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Annual July 4th Celebration or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Petition Article)
44. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to resurface South Sugar Hill Rd. for one mile beginning at intersection of Route 77 and South Sugar Hill Rd., or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Petition Article)
45. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following as an ordinance, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

Occupancy of Campers

1. No person shall occupy a camper in the Town of Weare for more than a total of 180 days, whether or not consecutive, in any 12-month period, regardless of whether the camper is on his property, the property of another or in a campground.
2. Each campground in the Town of Weare shall keep a daily register in which shall be recorded the name and address of each person occupying a camper in that campground during each day or any part thereof. The owner of the campground shall be responsible for maintaining such register and shall make the same available to the Selectmen or their representative during regular business hours.
3. A camper is a prefabricated dwelling unit, other than a mobile home (sometimes referred to as house trailers), which is not designed for long term and continuous residential occupancy, but is designed to be moved on wheels.

4. Any person who shall be found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$100, and each day on which the offense shall continue shall be deemed a separate violation.
46. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following as an ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:
 1. A campground which contains one or more trailers or mobile homes, occupied as living quarters for a total of more than 90 days in any 12-month period, shall be considered a trailer park and shall be deemed in violation of this ordinance unless it has been duly licensed as a trailer park.
 2. The owner of each campground shall provide the Selectmen by the 15th day of each January and July, as of the first day of the month, with a written list of the names and addresses of those persons who used trailers or mobile homes as living quarters for more than 90 days during the preceding 12 months or, if none, shall so state in writing.
 3. A person found guilty of violation of this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$100, and each day any person shall continue to violate the ordinance shall be deemed a separate violation. (Petition Article)
 47. To see if the Town will adopt the following ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:
 1. Foster homes, foster group homes, orphanages and other regular residential accommodations for 5 or more individuals under 18 years of age who are not related to each other by blood, marriage or legal adoption shall not be permitted unless a permit shall first be obtained from the Selectmen.
 2. The Selectmen shall grant such a permit only if(a) they find, after a public hearing at which the views of townspeople shall be given substantial weight, that the proposed activity would not pose an unreasonable social, educational or financial burden on the Town, and(b) the Town at Town Meeting concurs with such findings.
 3. Any person or entity found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$100, and each day such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense.

48. To see if the Town will vote to approve winter maintenance for Blake Rd., or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Petition Article)
49. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Chase Recreational Park, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
50. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Weare and to the health and welfare of the people of Weare.

These actions shall include:

1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.
2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. (Petition Article)

51. "Shall the citizens of Weare ask members of the New Hampshire delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress to:

Request the President of the United States to propose the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries." (Petition Article)

52. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following as an ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:

Interpretation of Ordinances

When implementing ordinances that deal with land use, Town Officials and agencies will consider the Master Plan in interpreting them to insure that land use changes do not detract significantly from the established rural character of the town. They will also interpret them to insure that topography and natural resources are considered and that

changed land uses will not impose on the town an unreasonably large, expensive demand for public services over a short period of time.

53. To see if the Town will vote to amend its subdivision regulations to provide for a "T" at the end of every dead-end road in a subdivision instead of a cul-de-sac, or take any other action in relation thereto.
54. To see if the Town will vote to amend its subdivision regulations to provide that all roads in a subdivision must have a minimum of 3 inches of tar (farmer's mix or hot top) or take any other action in relation thereto.
55. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to help subsidize costs of services provided by the Contoocook Valley Counseling Center for Weare residents in need of financial assistance, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Petition Article)
56. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:

Airport Ordinance

1. No airport, other than those existing at the adoption of this ordinance, shall be permitted in the Town.
 2. No commercial airport shall be permitted.
 3. Aircraft may take off or land at airports no earlier than 9 a.m. and no later than one-half hour before dusk, or 6 p.m., whichever comes first.
 4. Only single engine propeller-driven aircraft and gliders may use airports in the Town.
 5. Noise levels at any boundary of the property on which an airport is located may not exceed 95 db.
 6. Any person found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be fined \$100, and each day such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense. (Petition Article)
57. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following as an ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:

Sign Ordinance

- A. No person shall display advertising signs or cause signs to be displayed in the Town except those relating to

activities occurring on the property on which they have been placed. Direction, political and other non-advertising signs are not so restricted.

B. The following regulations apply to all signs:

1. No sign shall exceed twelve square feet in area; a directional sign shall not exceed 2 sq. ft.
2. All signs shall be constructed and maintained in such a way that they do not endanger traffic by obstructing views of street or intersection.
3. Neon, tubular gas, moving or flashing signs shall not be permitted.
4. Signs shall be lighted by indirect light only, and the beam of such lighting shall not extend beyond the boundaries of the lot on which the sign is placed.
5. Signs shall not be placed within a Town way or right-of-way.

C. Any person found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$10, and each day any person shall continue to violate the ordinance shall be deemed a separate violation.

D. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to:

1. The Town, its agencies or departments;
2. to non-profit organizations; or
3. to signs legally in place at the adoption of this ordinance.

(Petition Article)

58. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the audit by independent public accountants of town records for the year ending December 31, 1982 and a compliance audit required of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds.

59. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the position of Administrative Assistant or to take any other action in relation thereto.

60. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town of Weare "Shall adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax. These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: For a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence."

At 7:30 p.m., Thursday, March 11, 1982, the recessed Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William G. Herman. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Malcolm C. Purington. The Meeting was asked to stand to hear the reading of town residents who had died since last Town Meeting. This was followed by a moment of silence.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare, and to appropriate the same to the payment of purposes for which it constitutes reimbursement pursuant to RSA 31:95-b.

The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Kenneth Glaude moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$500.00.

The vote was affirmative.

The Meeting recessed at this time and resumed at 9:25 p.m.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 for the purchase of communications equipment for the Police Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Donald E. Thomson moved the sum of \$3,800.00 be appropriated for purchase of communications equipment. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$3,800.00.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$3,260.00 for the purchase of 6 new pagers and 1 new radio for truck number one and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Chief Thomson expressed his appreciation for the many hours of volunteer labor given by Tom Reynolds in the construction of the police department quarters in the town office building.

The vote on the article was affirmative.

ARTICLE 31. Chester A. Colburn moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for the completion of reconstruction of Reservoir Drive.

Finance Committee did not recommend this article, and Adrienne Scarfo moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded.

The vote on the dismissal of Article 32 was negative. The vote on the original motion was affirmative.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. (As provided under RSA 80:42, Sale of Tax Liens/Tax Deeded Properties.)

Forrest Esenwine moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to amend its gravel ordinance as follows, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

1. Replace "may in its discretion" with "shall" in the section entitled "Bond", so that a bond must be posted to insure compliance with the ordinance.
2. Replace "will not be contrary to" with "will affirmatively promote" in the section entitled "Issuance of Permit", so that a permit shall be issued if the proposed alteration affirmatively promotes the purpose of the ordinance.

Neal Kurk moved that the Town adopt Section 1 of this article as written. The motion was seconded.

Burt Brown moved to dismiss Part 1 and Part 2 of Article 34. The motion was seconded.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative.

The vote on the dismissal of Article 34 was affirmative.

Volker Wyrenbeck moved that the gravel operators who live in town form a committee among themselves and meet with the Selectmen and/or Planning Board and draft an ordinance they can live with. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 35. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for installation of culverting in Weare Center on the easterly side of Route 114 from the termination of the existing storm sewer, to a distance of approximately 250 feet.

Malcolm Purington moved to indefinitely postpone this article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Meeting recessed at 11:00 p.m. and was called back to order at 11:20 p.m.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,143.45 for payment of membership dues in the Southern New Hampshire Regional Commission, the dues for 1982 being based on 35 cents per resident x 3267, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Murray Wigsten moved Article 36 be approved as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,143.45.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 to purchase two bookcases for the children's section of the Weare Public Library, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Bessie Myhr moved the article be approved as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$450.00.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to approve amending its subdivision regulations as follows, or take any other action in relation thereto:

1. Replace paragraph 2.A with the following:

A subdivision is defined as any division of a lot, tract or parcel of land into two or more lots, plats, sites or other divisions of land for the purpose, whether immediate or future, of offer, sale, rent, lease, condominium conveyance or building development. Subdivision includes the division or development of residential and non-residential land, whether by deed, metes and bounds description, devise, intestacy, lease, map, plat or other recorded document. The division of a parcel of land held in common and subsequently divided into parts among the several owners shall be deemed a subdivision under these regulations.

2. Replace paragraph 2.B with the following:

A subdivision consisting of two lots only shall not be subject to paragraph 3.E of these regulations if:

- a. approval is sought for one lot only;
- b. the subdivision is not part of an approved subdivision;
- c. such a subdivision is created not more than once in any calendar year; and
- d. no other subdivision is created in the same calendar year.

3. Replace paragraphs 4.A and 4.B with the following:

- A. Any person who intends to subdivide any land shall prepare a plat for the subdivision. This plat shall show the boundaries of the individual lots, any roads to be constructed annotated by classification, any ponds and permanent waterways within and also within 1000 feet of the planned subdivision, abutters and all of the other information required by the Register of Deeds of Hillsboro County. It shall also include or be accompanied by such other information and documents, including State of New Hampshire permits and approvals as these regulations require or as the Planning Board may reasonably request.
- B. The plat, including required documents and information, shall be filed with the Board at least 15 days prior to the meeting at which it is to be formally submitted and accepted. It shall be accompanied by the names and addresses of the applicant and all abutters as indicated in Town records not more than 5 days before the day of filing. At least one reproducible and two blueprint copies of the plat shall be filed.
- C. The Planning Board shall notify the abutters and the applicant by certified mail, return receipt requested, of the date on which the application will be formally submitted to the Board. Notice shall be mailed at least 10 days prior to such date. Notice to the general public shall also be given at the same time by posting in 2 public places within the Town. The notice shall include a general description of the proposal which is the subject of the plat and shall identify the applicant and the location of the proposal. All costs of notice shall be paid in advance by the applicant.
- D. No plat may be denied or approved without a public hearing at which the applicant, any abutter, any person permitted by the Planning Board may testify in person or in writing; provided, however, that a public hearing is not required with respect to:
 1. minor lot line adjustments or boundary agreements

which do not create buildable lots, but notice to abutters shall be given prior to approval in accordance with paragraph 4.C and any abutter may be heard on request; or

2. disapprovals based on failure to supply required information, to meet reasonable deadlines or to pay costs or fees; or
 3. small subdivisions established under paragraph 2.B unless requested by the applicant, any abutter or the Board prior to approval or disapproval.
- E. The Planning Board shall begin formal consideration of the plat within 30 days after its submission and shall act to approve or disapprove within 90 days; provided, however, that the Board may apply to the Board of Selectmen for an extension not to exceed an additional 90 days and/or the applicant may waive the time limits.
1. If the plat meets the requirements of these regulations and all of the pertinent State statutes, and is in the best interests of the Town, the Planning Board shall approve the plat by endorsement and, at the expense of the applicant, send the reproducible copy to the Register for recording.
 2. In case of disapproval of any plat submitted to the Board, the grounds for such disapproval shall appear in the Board's records.
4. Replace "1982" with "1984" in paragraph 3.F.
 5. Add the following after "acres" in the second sentence in paragraph 3.E:

provided, however, that a parcel used for residential purposes shall contain at least two acres for each dwelling unit thereon, a dwelling unit being a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities.
 6. Replace paragraph 5.B with the following:

In an event such as above, the applicant may submit his plat, as described in paragraph 4.A., to the Weare Board of Appeals which shall have all of the authority vested in such boards by the statutes of the State of New Hampshire to deal with such an event.
 7. Change "Weare Board of Adjustment" to "Weare Board of Appeals" in paragraph 5.C.

Forrest Esenwine moved that the reading of this entire article be dispensed with. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Murray Wigsten moved acceptance of this article as printed with the following change in Paragraph 2: "A subdivision consisting of two lots only shall not be subject to these subdivision regulations if:" The motion was seconded.

Robert Hyman moved Article 38 be dismissed in its entirety. The motion was seconded.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative.

The vote on the dismissal of Article 38 was affirmative. A standing vote was requested. The result of the standing vote:

Yes - 80; No - 31

Volker Wyrenbeck moved that the Town adopt a resolution to give the feeling to the Planning Board that we would not divide less than the 2 acre minimum with 200 foot frontage on the road if it is for dwelling purposes. The motion was seconded.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the resolution was negative.

Frank Farmer made a motion to accept paragraphs 4 and 5 of Article 38. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the acceptance of paragraphs 4 and 5 of Article 38 was affirmative.

Neal Kurk moved the adoption of paragraph 1 of Article 38. The motion was seconded. After comments from Douglas Hatfield, Town Counsel, Mr. Kurk withdrew the word "intestacy" from his motion with the approval of his second.

Kenneth Glaude made a motion to amend paragraph 1 of Article 38 to treat a condominium as an apartment building and require 2 acres for each dwelling unit. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was negative.

The vote on the acceptance of paragraph 1 of Article 38 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire independent public accountants to perform the financial audit of the town records for the year ending December 31, 1982 and also a compliance audit required of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of Article 39 as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 for the purchase of a used tank truck for the Weare Fire Department. Said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes or bonds under such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem in the best interests of the Town.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the acceptance of Article 40 as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$35,000.00.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative.

A standing vote was taken on Article 40. The vote was unanimous to adopt Article 40 and the Moderator so stated for the record.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the citizens of the Town of Weare will ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress to:

Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries.

Elizabeth Straw moved the adoption of this resolution as printed in the Warrant. The motion was seconded.

Neal Kurk moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative.

The vote on dismissal of Article 41 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to accept Center Brook Lane as a town road when it is completed on May 28, 1982. The work that is complete to date is up to town specifications. On May 28, 1982, under the vote of the town, the Road Agent would either approve or disapprove it.

Stetson Hunt moved that Article 42 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

The vote was negative. A standing vote was requested. The result of the standing vote: Yes - 17; No - 40. The motion was defeated.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to close the so-called "Cut-off" from Oak Hill Road to State Route #77 and return to abutter the ownership of the said "Cut-off" and traffic island.

Albert Farmer moved adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Frank Szerlog moved to dismiss Article 43. The motion was seconded.

The vote on dismissal of Article 43 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 44. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to test the water at Lake Horace or to take any other action in relation thereto.

James Spring moved to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to test the water at Lake Horace. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$100.00.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative.

The vote on Article 44 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to deed back to Walter Williams certain property on Oak Hill Road in So. Weare, formerly owned by him and acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, but only after payment to the Town of all unpaid taxes, plus interest and/or penalty on same, legal fees, etc., and upon payment of any other costs as deemed by the Selectmen to be in the best interests of the Town.

Walter Williams moved that Article 45 be adopted as printed. The motion was seconded. Mr. Williams' attorney was given permission by the Meeting to speak in behalf of Mr. Williams.

Albert Farmer moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded. After discussion, Mr. Farmer withdrew his motion with the permission of his second.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative.

The vote on the article as printed was affirmative.

ARTICLE 46. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Adrienne Scarfo, Chairman of the Finance Committee, moved that a committee of seven (7) persons, including one Selectman and two

members of the Finance Committee, be appointed by the Moderator to study the feasibility of the Town of Weare hiring a town manager or administrative assistant. The committee is charged to report its findings at the 1983 Town Meeting for the voters consideration.

The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Meeting adjourned at 1:50 a.m.

The following Town officers were given the oath of office by the Moderator after the Meeting adjourned:

We entered into a contract with the Valley Transportation, Inc. of Bradford, N.H. to do some repairs and necessary changes and to build a tank which was installed on the chassis. Now, we have our own new tanker in service with a 2700 gallon water tank.

A review of oil bills at the Center Fire Station led to the recent decision of having an energy audit by Public Service, and proposed action to cut energy waste in this building. This audit has been completed. The center Fire Station was built in 1949 of cement block construction. Twenty years later, in 1969, an addition was put on the south end of the building. This addition was also cement blocks with no insulation in any of the walls. These walls and the overhead doors are where we get most of our heat loss. Now, we are trying to find the most effective, and least expensive, ways to proceed with making this building more energy efficient. We are, also, trying to determine what the pay back will be to the taxpayer. The possibility of some type of Solar heat has been discussed, but, at this time, we feel that would not be practical due to the lack of insulation in the building. We must be able to keep any heat generated within the building before we can spend money looking at new sources of heat. We feel that some money should be raised this year to get a project started for conserving heat in this building, and add to it each year until the project has been completed.

The Board of Fire Wards meet once a month, the first Thursday after the Fire Department meeting. Any input from the taxpayers is most welcome.

On behalf of the Board of Fire Wards, I would like to thank all the members of the Fire Department who have given so much of their time in putting the new tanker into service. Thanks, also, to the Fire Department members and the Rescue Squad for their response to the many emergency calls this past year.

The new tanker was in service as of October this year. We would like to thank all the volunteers, Fire Department members and others, who helped locate the tanker for us to purchase and put it together.

The Weare Fire Department and the State Fire Marshalls made periodic inspections of the schools. We found only a few violations this year. We would be very pleased if everyone would adhere to the no-parking signs posted along the roadway between the elementary and high schools and the roadway in front of the Town Hall. This would enable our fire trucks and rescue van clear access to the buildings if an emergency should arise. The Selectmen have adopted an ordinance that states a vehicle will be towed at the owner's expense if in violation of the Town of Weare no-parking signs.

Again, this year, we are in need of volunteers for both the Rescue Squad and the Fire Department. If anyone is interested in becoming a volunteer, please contact the Fire Chief for further information.

We would like to thank everyone for their support in 1982 and we're hoping for a fire-safe and prosperous 1983.

WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT

RESCUE SQUAD

In 1982, the Weare Fire Department Rescue Squad responded to a total of 175 rescue calls over a period of 11 months - December 1, 1981 to October 31, 1982. Of these, 114 were medical emergencies, 27 were automobile accidents and 34 were miscellaneous or mutual aid runs.

Donations received in 1982 totalled \$2,486. Necessary expenditures during the year included: medical supplies, \$977.23; office supplies, \$58.23; new equipment, \$996.72; refresher courses, \$86.10 purchase of calculator, \$152.25; and miscellaneous (inclusive of maintenance), \$520.11.

Other proceeds included \$1,492.08 from a dance and raffle held in October. Of this amount, we expended the following: set-ups, \$94.36; decorations and paper goods, \$48.75; prizes, \$130.79; band, \$250.00; police, \$45.00; tables and chairs, \$155.00; and tickets, \$62.00. Profits from the dance and raffle combined came to a total of \$706.18.

Cash on hand at the closing of fiscal year '82 was \$4,000.00 (inclusive of \$170.00 interest). This balance includes monies carried forward from previous years.

Two rescue personnel attended an Emergency Medical Technician refresher course this year as well as several persons being re-certified in CPR.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the townspeople for their support of the Rescue Squad and also thank those who allow their employees to respond to medical emergencies during working hours.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE
WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT

ANNUAL REPORT

During the past year, calls received by the dispatcher and by officers on their own personal phones totaled over 2,850 or on the average of more than 55 per week. Some of these calls did not require an officer to respond to the scene, but could require considerable time checking on whatever the complaint might have been. I have attempted to show by the breakdown below the number and types of calls received. This does not include any calls that we made to the State Police unless they called us with the complain. Also, shown below is a breakdown of court cases handled by the Department during 1982 which is in addition to the telephone calls.

The work in the office space in the basement of the Town Office is still in progress. One cell for temporary lock-up has been assembled and installed. This cell was obtained at no cost to the Town. More finish work is still to be done and should be completed this year.

The radio system requested in last year's budget has been installed. This included a base station which is located at the office and three remote operating points. Use, so far, indicates very good coverage of the town. We still have three old GE four channel radios that are between 15 and 20 years old and not reliable. These should be replaced over the next three years. Also, we have one portable that is of the same vintage and should be replaced.

A reminder that all dogs over six months of age in the town must be licensed. This can be done in the Town Clerk's office. The department will be sending out letters again to those known to have unlicensed dogs.

During the year, citizens concerned about crime in Weare came to the Police Department with information which resulted in the arrest and conviction of those responsible for the crime. The department would like to remind you that if you have information about a crime or suspicious incident, you are encouraged to call. Your name will be held in strict confidence and not released without your permission. One of the largest deterrents to criminal activity is knowing that people are reporting what they know relating to that type of activity.

HIGHWAY DEPT. REPORT

The year 1982 began with a boom of storms. The ski areas did great but the Town Highway budget suffered!

Throughout the spring mud season, we had more impassable roads than the previous year, and it seemed that the highway crew was hauling gravel continuously so people could travel their roads. We had to haul gravel for the road to the Landfill area so people could get in and out on the days that the dump was open. Even then, we had to close at noon some days.

Good weather was in our favor the rest of the year, so there were no additional costs to the town.

We completed the Reservoir Road Project (excavation, drainage, and tar).

We had to tear up and re-do Locke Hill. It was like a collapsing roller coaster! We used some of our Road Resurfacing Fund to do this job and the balance of the fund was used to tar the approaches and over the bridge on East Street.

We replaced the bridge on Barnard Hill Road, at the Cold Springs end, with a large culvert. We also widened the road. Bridge work consisted of putting up rails and posts and painting in other areas of town.

TRA monies were used to continue the tarring on Mountain Road.

The rest of the summer we hauled gravel to the roads that needed it; cut brush; removed dead trees; cleaned and replaced culverts and did general highway maintenance.

By fall, the grader was getting roads graded and the crews were raking and picking rocks. The last part of the winter of 1982 was mild, therefore, we were able to keep within our budget.

WEARE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

1982 ANNUAL REPORT

During the past year, the commission has dealt with a number of subjects. These are discussed below; their order not indicative of their importance:

Water Power Use: A small hydroelectric generating station has been proposed by East Coast Engineering Company of Barrington, N.H. The penstock and generating station will be located below Lake Horace Dam. The Commission has reviewed all available data and has discussed all proposals personally with ECE officials. At this point the commission is satisfied that no adverse ecological impact will result from this activity. Our reviews will continue until final decisions are made.

Water Purity Concerns: In an effort to detect problems before serious water contamination becomes a fact, the commission contracted Normandeau Assoc., Inc. of Bedford, N.H. to perform a series of conductivity water tests. These were concentrated in two areas: (1) around the old dumping site, just north of Route 77 between North Weare and Sugar Hill, and, (2) on the Peaslee Meadow side of the town forest landfill area. Nineteen (19) surface water locations were tested. Measurements indicated that highly mineralized leachates are being generated at and migrating from both landfills. It is known that town landfills typically contain high concentrates of sulfates, chlorides and iron, none of which are very toxic. They may also contain lower, but more toxic concentrations of trace metals and organic compounds (pesticides, solvents, PCB's, etc.). The presence, or absence, of such material can only be confirmed by water sampling and extensive laboratory analyses. The commission has reported these preliminary results, together with the Normandeau recommendations, to the N.H. Bureau of Solid Waste and to the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission for the purpose of guidance and/or assistance. The commission specifically requested that the air above the new ball-field (old dumpsite) be tested for possible harmful vapors.

Town Forest Management: In June, the commission agreed to proceed with a selective tree harvest. Pittsfield Box Company's bid was selected. The harvest, continuing at the time of this writing, is being done by a horse-logging method. Forester, Robert Todd, has been contracted to supervise this harvest together with the commission members. Harvesting is being done with care and little damage is being inflicted across the harvested site. It is expected that this selective cut will greatly improve the quality of the remaining timber.

The commission is cooperating with representatives of the University of New Hampshire's Institute of Natural and Environmental Resources in a timber growth study of the Hatch Lot. This study has been underway since 1966.

Conservation of Wetlands: A major effort was made in 1982 to identify and map the wetlands (streams, ponds, marshes, swamps, lakes, etc.) throughout the town. Aerial photographs were taken of each primary wetland. A wetlands map has been completed. New legislation, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated 483-A:7 makes it possible for towns to designate any "unique and unspoiled wetland" as a Prime Wetland. Commission members made many trips into our major wet areas for the purpose of nominating a candidate for this designation. The choices came to three: (1) Tavern Marsh on Meadow Brook off Route 77 in South Weare; (2) Railroad Marsh System on Bog Brook between North Weare and Henniker, and, (3) Lake Horace Marsh from Abijah Bridge south to Deering Town Line and Dudley Brook to Deering Town Line.

Because of the greater possibility for immediate development, Lake Horace Marsh is the candidate being offered by the commission for Prime Wetland Designation. Public hearings were held in December and January (83) and the action was placed on the official ballot for vote at the March (83) Town Meeting. Such a designation is important because a public hearing must be held before any application requesting to dredge, fill or construct in the designated area can be approved.

Problems: Far and away, the greatest amount of the commission's time and energy was expended in its involvement with resident and non-resident digging, filling and constructing in and around wetlands. Simply put, it is illegal to disturb any wet area where water stands or flows without an approved permit from the N.H. Wetlands Board. There are substantial fines (up to \$5000.00) for failure to comply with the wetlands legislation. The commission urges everyone to know and abide by the laws for the protection and conservation of our water supplies and wetland areas.

Expanding the Use of Town Forest Lands: Weare is fortunate to have upwards to 1000 acres of land set aside for its citizens. We are number one in Hillsborough County; only seven towns in the state have more acreage! The commission intends to create a management plan for the use and preservation of Weare's public town forest lands.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN
N.H. PLANNING COMMISSION 1982

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission is an association of municipalities voluntarily organized and operating under the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 36:45-53. The Commission's statutory responsibility is to prepare a coordinated development plan for the region and to encourage its cooperative realization through the advisory process.

Directed by representatives of the City of Manchester and the Towns of Auburn, Bedford, Candia, Chester, Deerfield, Goffstown, Hooksett, Londonderry, New Boston, Raymond and Weare, the Commission's professional staff carries out the development of the technical elements of the plan.

The Commission's program is organized under regional, metropolitan transportation, and local technical assistance functions. Within these broad categories, individual tasks often vary on an annual basis according to the needs of the region and those of the Commission's participating communities.

In addition to reviewing detailed technical studies with appropriate area officials and agencies, staff reports on summaries of these and other timely planning items are covered in the Commission's quarterly newsletter "Project" which is widely distributed to approximately five hundred municipal officials and interested residents of the region.

Although several regional planning tasks were accomplished during the year, one stands out as a major achievement which can be directly attributed to the Commission's vigilance and its ability to act quickly and effectively on behalf of its member communities.

Due largely to the efforts of Chairman Ray F. Langer (Hooksett), Vice Chairman Donald M. Babin (Londonderry) and Commissioners Robert L. Wheeler (Goffstown) and John L. Sherburne (Deerfield), and the participation of the region's boards of selectmen, the State's Solid Waste Management Act was successfully amended by the Special Session of the General Court in May, 1982. On July 22, the Tricounty Solid Waste Management District was formally organized and the District by-laws were adopted by the ten participating towns in November. During 1983, the District will undertake the planning process which will ensure local compliance with the requirements of the new Act.

Local assistance services provided during the year included:

Provided the Planning Board with municipal and county population figures for use in the development of the Weare Master Plan;

Provided the Planning Board with information on the local capital improvements programming process;

Assisted the Planning Board by reviewing and preparing comments on selected portions of the draft master plan;

Advised the Board of Selectmen of the availability of Outdoor Recreation and Conservation Project funds -- of possible interest to the Conservation Commission;

Informed the Board of Selectmen of the availability of funding under the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's fiscal year 1982 Community Development Block Grant program;

Provided the members of the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen with schedules of the Fall, 1982 Municipal Law Lecture Series;

Notified the Board of Selectmen of the provisions of the State's new Solid Waste Management Act, and offered them an opportunity whereby the Town could achieve compliance;

Provided the Planning Board with the graphic services required to produce the Resources Inventory map for the Weare Master Plan;

Provided the Planning Board with suggestions for continued work on the Master Plan to support future recommendations for the implementation of land use control measures.

CHASE RECREATIONAL PARK

ANNUAL REPORT 1982

The 1982 season at Chase Recreational Park showed an increase in ticket sales in all areas; resident, non-resident and boats. As June was a cool month, the bulk of the activities and record crowds arrived during July and the first two weeks of August. Income and expenses were as follows: 1982 total income was \$9,622.75 vs. 1981 \$8,540.52 and expenses for 1982 were \$9,696.38 vs. 1981 \$7,691.30.

Many major improvements were made to the park in 1982. The diving board frame was repaired and reinforced with steel plating to give the frame additional strength. Two regulation horseshoe pits were constructed, a new flag was purchased and a new life ring box with alarm was installed. Ten loads of beach sand were brought in to the main beach. New fireplace grates were purchased and improvements were made to the outdoor lighting. Also, a new service entrance was installed on the snack bar and the snack bar was completely rewired for electrical service. All buildings in the park were restained.

Many group outings were held again this year. There is no charge for local groups, but out of town groups to day the regular admission rates. Among them were Electro Pac Corp., Kendall-Hadley, Cub Scout Pack 24, Sugar and Spice, North Weare Federated Church, and many classes at Weare Schools as well as many other civic and social groups.

The lake water was tested and found safe for swimming and the well water was tested and found safe for drinking. Swimming lessons were held at the park again this year.

In 1983, there will be an increase in admission rates in all areas. Season tickets will be increased from \$5.00 for each two vehicles to \$6.00 per vehicle per year for residents and local taxpayers only. Adult non-resident tickets will be increased from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per day. Child non-resident tickets will be increased from .50 to \$1.00 per day. Boat tickets will remain at \$2.00 per day, and senior citizens (over 62) will be free.

As funds permit, plans for improvements in 1983 include replanking the diving board pier, staining the picnic tables and boat docks, shingling the roofs on the dressing rooms and rest rooms and paving of the parking lot.

Members of the Park Commission are: Dr. Frederick Vintinner, Chairman, Sylvia Brown, Secretary, Jane Munro, Richard Perkins and Leon Taylor. Bernard Phelps served as maintenance and Security Officer on weekends and special occasions. Judith Rehm and Leo Vogelien served as gate attendants.

DOG OFFICER'S REPORT

On March 23, 1981, the Selectmen appointed a Dog Officer for the purpose of picking up stray dogs. During the year 1982, approximately 170 calls were received by the Officer pertaining to animal problems: lost & found, complaints, pickups, and general information. All complaint calls were directed to the Police Department. A total of 42 dogs were picked up during 1982 - 28 were transported to the Animal Rescue League after attempts to find their owners proved negative, 2 were injured and transported to Russell Animal Hospital, 1 was deceased, and 11 were retrieved by their owners.

As a service to the community, the Dog Officer also conducts a Lost & Found Service. Several animals have been returned to the owners at no charge.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

TOWN REPORT FOR WEARE, 1982

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. continued to service Weare for this past year. In the Home Care program, service is provided under a physician's plan of treatment to patients who are essentially homebound with diagnosed illness. This service is rendered by health professionals (Registered Nurses, Physical Therapist, Occupational Therapist, Speech Therapist, Nutritionist) and paraprofessionals, (Homemaker/Home Health Aides, Health Assistants) according to the patient's and family's needs. Hospice care is provided to patients in the last six months of terminal illness. The Health Promotion program has services (child health, family planning, screening) that are provided to low income/high risk patients and families in group settings, such as clinic and screening sites.

Health Education and Instruction is part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Weare may request agency service-patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. Patients are also referred by other agencies. All requests are answered, but continuing home care can be provided only with a physician's orders.

A call to the CRVNA (224-4093) between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m., seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. Hospice staff are on call (224-4093) 9 p.m. to 8 a.m.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for those unable to pay the charge if that person has no other funding source available. However, for fee scaling, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed and a fee may be appropriate for which the patient will be responsible. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This Agency is accredited by National League for Nursing and American Public Health Association; Certified for Medicare and is a member agency of Community Health Care Association and United Way of Greater Concord.

To the School Board and Citizens
of Weare

I herewith submit my 1982 Report concerning the public schools of Weare.

A very important part of any long-range administrative plan and a key to instructional effectiveness in any school is the provision for the in-service professional growth of teachers and principals. During the past year, S.A.U. #19 identified two key areas in which additional staff training would be beneficial: Classroom management and improving the achievement level of all students. Teacher and Administrator training programs in both areas were made possible by Chapter 2 Block Grant federal funds.

ASSERTIVE DISCIPLINE. In an effort to improve the classroom management skills of Weare teachers, a day-long training session in Assertive Discipline was presented by the S.A.U. #19 Staff Development Committee this Fall. Assertive Discipline first establishes three "rights" which teachers must claim if they are to receive respect from students:

1. The right to establish a classroom structure and routine which provides an optimum learning environment in light of the teacher's strengths and weaknesses.
2. The right to determine and request appropriate behavior from the students in order to encourage the positive social and educational development of the child.
3. The right to ask for help from parents and the principal when a teacher needs assistance with a child.

The child, on the other hand, has the right to:

1. Have a teacher who can help him/her limit inappropriate behavior.
2. Have a teacher who will provide him/her with positive support for appropriate behavior.
3. Choose how to behave and know the consequences to follow.

In essence, Assertive Discipline provides teachers with a competency-based, systematic approach and set of procedures by which he/she can clearly set down and enforce rules for classroom behavior so that precious learning time is not interrupted and lost. The system provides students with a fair and consistent approach to discipline which defines teacher expectations and consequences before problems arise and, most important, provides positive reinforcement for appropriate behavior.

Obviously many teachers already handle discipline with an Assertive Discipline approach. For them the training served to reinforce what they are doing and provide them with an organized system. For others who experience difficulty with classroom behavior, the system provides practical, clear answers to daily behavior management problems. In addition the entire school becomes a more orderly place in which to teach and learn because rules are applied and enforced in a much more consistent manner.

The Weare faculty has prepared a school-wide discipline plan which is presently in effect. Each teacher also has a classroom behavior plan so that students know expectations and consequences in each of their classes.

MASTERY LEARNING. As a next step in the S.A.U. #19 accountability process and in an effort to develop a learning environment in which all children can achieve at a high level, S.A.U. #19 has begun a training program for principals and teachers in Mastery Learning.

We define Mastery Learning as an instructional process which asserts that under appropriate conditions virtually all students can and will learn most of what they are taught. The process requires that the classroom teacher:

- (1) determine skill levels of individual students
- (2) clearly define appropriate learning objectives
- (3) share these objectives with the students
- (4) teach to these objectives
- (5) provide students with sufficient time to learn
- (6) construct tests which measure mastery of objectives
- (7) provide students who do not achieve mastery the first time with alternative instructional materials and methods
- (8) provide students who do achieve mastery the first time with challenging enrichment.

Because S.A.U. #19 believes that Mastery Learning will increase our accountability to help more students learn and improve the quality of education, we have implemented the following training program this year as a Block Grant project:

- Step 1: Principals from S.A.U. #19 schools participated in a four month intensive inservice program aimed at instructing them both in the theory of mastery learning and the role of the principal as an instructional leader.

Step 2: Selected teachers from each school will participate in a 40 hour training program enabling them to understand mastery learning; develop units for use in their own classrooms; become role models for other teachers; and work closely with the principal in designing, implementing and assessing mastery learning in their building.

Step 3: These initial steps will be evaluated both in terms of student achievement/attitude, and reactions of principals and teachers.

The Mastery Learning model is based upon educational research which has clearly shown that the critical element in student achievement is learner time-on-task. Assertive Discipline will assist teachers in providing an orderly learning environment and in maximizing learning time. Mastery Learning is an instructional delivery system which will help teachers to make much more efficient use of learning time to increase learner achievement. Higher learner achievement is our main purpose as educators.

ACCOUNTABILITY

Last Spring Weare completed its second annual Accountability Assessment. The purpose of this annual assessment is to determine the academic progress of Weare students and to report their progress to the community. As a result of this assessment, the following planning goals have been developed by the faculty and administration for the current school year:

General Goals -

1. The three subcommittees of the summer curriculum study which developed a continuum of skills in the areas of language arts, math, and social studies will:
 - a) Prepare a detailed item analysis of testing results, examining each item answered incorrectly by more than 20% of those tested. Each item will be assigned to the appropriate objective.
 - b) Review all accountability goals and objectives for the three grade levels and ensure that they are incorporated into the 1-12 continuum, AND/OR develop a list of any goal or objective which should be changed or deleted during the accountability revision project scheduled for the summer of 1983.
 - c) Inform each subject area teacher at the 4th, 8th and 11th grade levels of the goals and objectives which are to be covered and mastered by 80% of their students.
2. A proposal for a restructured school day will be developed and submitted to the State Department of Education. This will provide release time for teachers to continue their curriculum revision and development.

3. In-service training and staff development activities will be scheduled to assist teachers in their curriculum work and to provide them with additional teaching strategies to help improve student performance in those deficient areas identified through accountability test result analysis.
4. The Weare Accountability Committee in conjunction with the Assistant Superintendent will develop an accountability testing instructions package and will present an orientation program to all those responsible for administering the assessment.

Specific Goals/Recommendations -

1. A math curriculum committee will develop a comprehensive math continuum for grades Readiness - 12. As this is completed the committee will review math textbook programs and supplementary teaching supplies and will recommend to the administration those materials which should be ordered for implementation in the 1983-84 school year.
2. Dictionary, literature, and vocabulary development materials will be budgeted for, selected, and ordered to help meet the identified needs in this area of the language arts curriculum.
3. The social studies department will develop extensive course outlines for each grade level. They will assist the librarian in her efforts to inventory, catalog, and coordinate all audio-visual teaching resources which can be shared among the various grade level teachers.
4. Secondary staff will meet with the administration to create a grouping system or some viable alternative for meeting the diverse needs within a typical required math, English, or social studies class in a small high school.
5. Regularly scheduled departmental meetings will be held for science, social studies, English, and math teachers grades 7-12 - with occasional representation from the intermediate grades.

I wish to express my appreciation for the assistance and cooperation provided me by the administrators, teachers, School Board, and citizens of Weare. Without this assistance and cooperation, many of the things accomplished would have been left undone and I look forward to another prosperous year -- a year of continued cooperation.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I have selected curriculum development as the central theme for my 1982 annual report. I choose this topic because it represents where we presently are in our efforts to continually improve the quality of education in the Weare school system. We have attracted a quality staff, we have agreed on our philosophy of education, and we have identified education goals and objectives. The only logical direction from here is to redefine our curriculum - what is it that we should teach? What should today's students learn in order for them to develop into responsible citizens tomorrow.

In April 1978 the New Hampshire Department of Education published guidelines for the implementation of the New Hampshire accountability plan. Stated very simply this mandate required that local districts 1) describe what it is that we want students to learn, 2) test to measure how well they have learned it, 3) analyze the test results and report to the local community, and 4) develop an accountability management plan to improve student performance. Although our first year's accountability test results were published in the 1981 Town Report our management plan was not.

A major goal of that management plan was to establish a summer curriculum study committee whose charge was to develop a continuum of skills grades 1-12 in the subject areas of math, social studies, and language arts. Money was included in the 1982-83 budget for ten teachers to participate in this two week summer project. I would like to share with you what was accomplished during the period July 6-16, 1982.

Three subcommittees, each comprised of teachers representing the elementary, junior high, and high school levels, developed a sequence of skills to be taught at each grade level in their respective subject areas. The teachers met with state educational consultants who reviewed their progress suggesting additions and/or deletions to their curriculum guides. The end result of each committee's labor was two-fold. First they developed a general 1-12 continuum of skills and secondly they expanded a topical outline for each grade level of skills and concepts to be introduced, reinforced, or mastered.

A five year curriculum revision cycle was an additional outcome of the Weare Schools' summer curriculum study. The consensus of the committee was that the purpose of this cycle is to establish a plan for a scheduled, in-depth review of a subject area and is not merely a timetable for adopting a new textbook series. Each year an amount will be budgeted so that teaching materials can be ordered to help fill any gaps in the curriculum area under review. The actual five-year budget schedule is as follows--

- 1983-84 - Math, fine arts
- 1984-85 - Science, health, physical education
- 1985-86 - Language arts
- 1986-87 - Social studies, foreign language
- 1987-88 - Home economics, business education, industrial arts

On September 13, 1982 each subcommittee presented a report to the Weare School Board in which they discussed the curriculum guide for their subject area. The entire committee presented a series of recommendations for the Board to consider, most importantly, that they schedule time in the school calendar for teachers to work on curriculum development and inservice training and that they provide for at least one week in the summer for curriculum revision work. The committee stressed to the Board that what had been accomplished was just a beginning. They emphasized that a curriculum is not a static product shelved in a closet but rather a useful resource which needs continual review and updating. A by-product of the study was the enthusiasm that this project inspired in the teachers who participated. Elementary teachers working side by side with high school teachers created a closeness, a commonness of purpose, an awareness and an eagerness to persevere.

What remains to be done in the area of curriculum development? As a start we must complete a similar study grades 1-12 in science. Money is allocated in the 1983-84 budget for continued curriculum study this summer. In addition to creating a science continuum, the committee will also review, revise, and refine the curriculum they established during their previous study. A need exists for the three teachers of the vocational courses to review their curriculum areas and coordinate their programs with those available at the Concord Vocational Center. Those staff members responsible for foreign language, physical education, health, and the fine arts need to re-evaluate their course offerings and define their curriculum objectives. Finally, to seriously study the space needs issue the first question to be answered is what programs do we want to offer students in Weare Schools three years, five years, or even ten years from now.

In closing I return your attention to my introductory remarks and questions. Curriculum should be the central theme around which our entire educational system revolves. Now is the time to begin in earnest the curriculum work that must be done.

REPORT OF THE WEARE SCHOOL BOARD

I. Progress Toward Long Range Goals

The Weare School Board has continued to utilize the results of the 1980 community survey to provide focus for its planning and goal setting. During the past year, progress has been made in five key areas of concern: Curriculum, Discipline, Comprehensive High School, Enrichment, Teacher Turnover, and Capital Improvements.

The curriculum provides the overall structure for the educational program and, for this reason, it is important for the Weare School District to review and refine its curriculum on a continual basis.

This past summer, 11 teachers studied and revised the math, language arts and social studies curricula, grades 1 through 12. During the two week period of this summer project, the teachers wrote learning goals and objectives at each grade level in each subject area. This school year the faculty is engaged in developing more detailed curriculum outlines, reviewing resources and activities, and preparing units in the three subject areas. Money has been included in the '83-'84 budget to fund a similar curriculum review in science as well as to continue the process in the other subject areas.

This fall, the Weare faculty attended a day-long workshop on Assertive Discipline. The 6 hour training session provided teachers with proven techniques and procedures for improving classroom behavior. An important part of the training was the emphasis upon positive reinforcement as a means of increasing correct behavior. As a follow-up to the workshop, and in cooperation with the parents who are reviewing discipline procedures, teachers and administration have developed specific classroom and school rules with consequences for inappropriate behavior.

This year an art teacher was hired and an art program successfully initiated. This represented a major step forward in an effort to expand the curriculum in order to meet the educational needs of all students. As a result, this year the Art courses are well-subscribed and students are benefitting from this learning opportunity. The High School Standards, as set in 1963 by the New Hampshire State Board of Education, is currently undergoing revision. In order to meet the new standards, Weare High School will need to upgrade laboratory facilities in science, industrial arts, music and art. Safety measures have been taken to assure compliance with applicable safety standards. The revised standards are expected to be completed within a year.

In addition the school meeting authorized the purchase of a micro-computer to enhance the business education and mathematics courses in the junior/senior high school. A board-appointed computer committee conducted a study of available computer hardware and software in relation to the school's instructional needs, prior to the purchase of an appropriate unit. Classes using the computer

presently are over-subscribed, and faculty and students are very enthusiastic about this exciting addition to the program.

For the second year, an enrichment program for academically and creatively talented students is being offered to selected students by a group of community volunteers working within the school. The emphasis this year is on creative thinking and academics. The creative thinking program stresses group problem solving. Academic enrichment is provided through a great books reading program, in which students read and discuss literary classics.

Finally, the School Board is pleased to report significant progress toward its goal to attract and keep quality staff. This year we experienced a significant reduction in the number of teacher resignations. During the summer it was only necessary to fill 3 teaching positions and 1 administrator's position in addition to the new art position. It is apparent that the three year bargaining agreement, which significantly improved the salaries of Weare teachers, was a major factor in reducing turnover. It is imperative that this trend continue if we are to provide a quality education, if curriculum development is to be carried out, and if other long-term goals are to be met.

II. Facilities Study

A. INTRODUCTION

The Weare School Board has carefully considered the space needs of the District during the past several years. Concern for school space needs has also been expressed by the community through the Survey Committee Report (1981) and the Weare Planning Board Report (1982). As a result of its study and community concern, the Board is proposing a special article in the warrant to assist it in preparing a recommendation to solve the facilities problems faced by the District. This recommendation will then be presented to the voters at the 1984 School District meeting.

The Weare School Board wishes to report its facilities findings to the School District with respect to three areas: Enrollment, Curriculum, and Recommendations.

B. ENROLLMENT

The State Department assisted the School Board in updating the 1979 enrollment projection for the Weare Schools. From this study it was determined that growth has occurred but at a rate somewhat below the initial projections. The Elementary School has an enrollment of 332 students this year, with a rated capacity of 326 students. We now project an elementary school enrollment of 364 for the 1987/88 school year or an increase of 32 students.

The rated capacity for the high school, which houses grades 7-12, is 274 students and our current enrollment is 276. The space problem at the high school has been temporarily alleviated to some degree by the students who participate in Vocational programs in Concord and physical education

programs in the gymnasium on a daily basis. A 1987/88 enrollment of 312 students is projected for grades 7-12 or an increase of 36 students.

C. CURRICULUM

The Weare faculty has undertaken a total curriculum review, grades 1-12. This process was begun last Spring and included a 2 week summer workshop involving three subject areas - Language Arts, Mathematics and Social Studies. The curriculum study in these areas is continuing during this school year. During the summer of 1983, a committee will review the science curriculum following a similar process.

At this time it is not possible to add necessary courses to the high school program of studies because of the lack of classroom space. In addition to its severe space constraints, the high school has been cited by the State Department of Education for inadequate facilities in laboratory courses such as Science, Industrial Arts, Music and Art. Thus curriculum development and expansion depend to a great extent upon finding a solution to our need for additional space.

D. RECOMMENDATIONS

The Weare School Board recommends that:

- (1) It be empowered by the voters to formulate a facilities study committee to review the needs of the Weare school facility and to prepare a plan to meet those needs. The Facilities Study Committee will be charged with studying space needs, exploring all possible options such as tuitioning students, cooperative school ventures, and building renovation and addition.
- (2) The School District appropriate a sum of \$7,000 to be used by the School Board to fund the preparation of a plan to be presented to the voters at the 1984 School District meeting. The plan will include educational specifications, building code requirements to be met, mechanical and structural improvements necessary, schematic drawings and cost estimates.

Time Line -

1. April, 1983 - Facilities Study Committee appointed and charged by Weare School Board.
2. April, 1983 - Facilities Study Committee identifies major options for study.

3. September, 1983 - Facilities Study Committee submits preliminary report on its findings to the Weare School Board. Board decides to fund the preparation of a plan by the Facilities Study Committee for presentation to the town and engages professional services as necessary.
4. September, 1983 - Faculty reports to the School Board on curriculum study and recommends necessary additions to the program of study to be incorporated into final plan.
5. December, 1983 - Facilities Study Committee submits final report to the Weare School Board containing its recommended plan to meet the Weare School facilities needs. The plan will include educational specifications, building code requirements, mechanical and structural improvements necessary, schematic drawings and cost estimates.
6. January, 1984 - Weare School Board prepares special article for the School District Warrant based upon Facilities Study Committee Report.
7. March, 1984 - School District votes on facilities plan.

III. Facilities Committee

At its March 23, 1982 meeting, the Weare School Board voted to establish a Facilities Committee and charge it to work with the Administration and the Head Custodian to develop specifications for improvements to the buildings and grounds as voted on at the 1982 School District Meeting and search out bids. The Facilities Committee was to report back to the Board and further, a five year maintenance plan was to be developed.

Though all present Board members are fully aware of the improvements made this past year to buildings and grounds as voted on at the 1982 School District Meeting, a copy of these improvements with projected and final costs is attached with this report.

Through discussions at various meetings the Facilities Committee shares the following beliefs:

1. Every classroom should have adequate storage and furniture
2. All support facilities should have adequate storage and furniture.
3. All renovations, additions, painting and general maintenance should be planned for and executed in an orderly way with the least amount of interruption of school programs.

4. Standardization of all materials used (paint, ceiling tiles, etc.) is of utmost importance.
5. All facilities should be as energy efficient as is feasible.
6. All areas must comply with Life Safety Code.
7. All facilities will be available to the citizens of Weare within certain guidelines. Abuse will not be tolerated.

Because of the scope and magnitude of these beliefs we feel that the Facilities Committee should be ongoing and we wish to propose to the Board the following format for implementation of these beliefs:

- PURPOSE:
1. To recommend improvements, maintenance, and/or renovation to schools and/or grounds in Weare School District.
 2. To represent the Weare School Board at any meetings concerning building/grounds maintenance.

MEMBERSHIP: Two Board Members appointed by the Chairman each year in March, Principal, Head Maintenance and Business Administrator, SAU #19.

MEETINGS: Meet as necessary and recommend to the School Board for implementation the following:

1. Development of specifications including materials for work to be done by outside contractors.
2. Review bids and recommend a bidder.
3. Final review of completed work and review of work in progress.
4. Develop short and long term maintenance program including any budgetary ramifications.
5. Propose energy conservation measures.

- PROCEDURES:
1. The principal and the Central Office Administrator will arrange committee meetings as needed.
 2. The principal and Central Office Administrator will prepare the meeting agenda prior to the committee meeting.
 3. The results of committee meetings will be reported to the School Board at its monthly meetings for action.
 4. A yearly report will be presented to the School Board highlighting all changes and/or improvements carried out during the year.

With School Board approval of this proposal the Facilities Committee will be able to continue to interpret, study and recommend to the School Board the needs of the district within our duties.

Our plans over the next five years include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Repair of all roofs as necessary.
2. Set up a planned schedule for all interior and exterior painting.
3. Bring all areas in compliance with Life Safety Codes.
4. Establish a complete inventory of all school furniture and equipment and set up a planned replacement cycle.
5. Establish measures to make all facilities as energy efficient as possible.
6. Establish a list of grounds use and set up a plan for ground improvements.

In September, routine physical exams with required blood work were given to all school cafeteria personnel. T.B. Tine tests were once again made available to all personnel and incoming students as were routine blood pressure checks.

Athletic physical exams were also completed during the month of September with a total of 104 physicals given. Physical exams were repeated in June for the following year and totalled 45 students.

This year, our dental program was offered to all elementary and high school students as well as to kindergarten and preschool. A total of 108 students participated. Mrs. Joyce Prowse, our dental hygienist was available from November - January for cleanings, dental checks, fluoride rinses and individual as well as classroom instructions for our students.

In the health teaching area, topics on nutrition, drugs, alcohol, venereal disease, adolescence and preventive health measures were covered at the respective grade levels during the course of the year.

In October, students in grades R-4 were presented with a film entitled the "Huffless, Ruffless Dragon". This animated cartoon film uses humor and satire to emphasize health hazards of cigarette smoking. Individual programs of classroom instructions and discussion were also conducted in the respective grade levels.

During February, students in grades 1-4 were offered a program entitled "Early Start to Good Health". Each grade level enjoyed a filmstrip specifically geared to that particular age and development. The objective of this program is to increase children's awareness and respect for their bodies, and its interaction with their environment promoting positive health habits while giving them some general knowledge of how their bodies function.

The 5th and 6th grades were also presented with a program on adolescence which included short films followed by classroom discussion.

An immunization clinic was held at the elementary school April 1st with a total of 93 participants including faculty, students, preschoolers and parents. One hundred and ninety-seven (197) immunizations were given.

A vision-hearing clinic sponsored by the Sugar & Spice Pre-school was held on May 4th at the Town Hall. A total of 53 children attended, 39 of which were registered for first grade in September.

On May 18th all incoming first graders were invited to spend part of the day at the elementary school as guests of the present first grade students; 44 children participated.

The cooperation of our Principal, Mr. Fred Roberts, the School Board and the Superintendent's office during the past year has been greatly appreciated. Once again, I would like to thank the parents, teachers and community volunteers who have given their support to the children and myself over this past school year.

MINUTES OF THE WEARE SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 3, 1982

The Moderator, Bill Herman, called the March 3, 1982 meeting of the Weare School District to order at 7:35 pm in the School Gym.

Frank Farmer led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Herman then requested a moment of silence be observed for Lillian Day, a teacher in the Weare Elementary School for many years, who had recently passed away.

It was announced that Roberts' Rules of Order Revised would govern the conduct of the meeting.

Mr. Herman introduced those seated at the head tables: members of the School Board, the School District Clerk and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Finance Committee.

Adrienne Scarfo moved to waive the reading of the warrant in its entirety at this time, and to have each article read in proper sequence as the business of the article is brought to the attention of the meeting. The motion was seconded and passed.

Frank Farmer paid tribute to Tom Clow for his many years of service on the School Board, and then pointed out several school reports in the Weare Town Report which should be of interest to those present.

Article I

Dale Conant moved that the salaries of the school board and truant officer and the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District be accepted as printed in the Town Report. The Finance Committee concurred with this motion and it was duly seconded and PASSED.

Article II

Dale Conant moved that the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen be accepted as presented or printed in the Town Report. The Finance Committee concurred with the motion and it was duly seconded and PASSED.

Article III

Dale Conant moved that the District authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States, and/or any other source, and to appropriate any funds received to the payment of obligations of the District for which said funds constitute full reimbursement, in accordance with RSA 198:20-B, or take any other action in relation thereto. The Finance Committee concurred with this motion and it was duly seconded and PASSED.

ARTICLE IV

Frank Farmer moved that the District raise and appropriate \$1,319,658 for the support of schools, for the payment of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen

the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Adrienne Scarfo, Chairman of the Finance Committee, then moved to amend this article, changing the amount appropriated from \$1,319,658 to \$1,292,628, a reduction of \$27,030.

At this point, Frank Farmer spoke in support of the original figure proposed by the School Board -- listing and explaining the School Board's goals for the schools. He then explained the procedure for the presentation of the school budget.

The budget was then presented by the members of the School Board, following which Frank Farmer explained the Revenue Sheet printed in the Town Report.

Following the presentation of the budget, Mr. Herman once again presented the amendment proposed by the Finance Committee to Article IV, and a vote was taken on the amendment by a secret written ballot. The results of that vote were as follows:

104 voted in favor of the amendment
125 voted against the amendment

The motion was defeated, and a vote was then taken on the original Article 4. The Article PASSED.

Article V

Robert Wheldon moved that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,914.00 for the implementation of life safety code items as directed by the State of New Hampshire Fire Marshall. The Finance Committee concurred with this motion and it was duly seconded and PASSED.

Article VI

Frank Farmer moved that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,258.00 for the purpose of purchasing folding chairs and storage carts for use at functions held in the gymnasium. The Finance Committee did not concur with this motion and Adrienne Scarfo, Chairman of the Finance Committee, moved to dismiss this article. The motion was seconded. After a voice vote proved inconclusive, a standing vote was taken on the motion to dismiss this article. The results were as follows:

70 voted in favor of dismissing Article VI
96 voted against dismissal Article VI

The motion to dismiss Article VI having been defeated, the original motion to pass Article VI was seconded and PASSED.

Article VII

Tom Branscom moved that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purchase of a microcomputer to be used primarily in business education and mathematics courses in the junior/senior high school. Adrienne Scarfo, Chairman of the Finance Committee then moved to dismiss this article. Her motion was seconded but NOT PASSED. The original motion was then seconded and PASSED.

Article VIII

Tom Clow moved that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,675.00 to paint the exterior of the elementary school. Mr. Clow then spoke to the motion -- explaining the need for the repainting of the building. The motion was seconded and PASSED.

Article IX

Tom Clow moved that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,187.00 to regrade and resurface the elementary playground and install drainage in the lower athletic field. Adrienne Scarfo, Chairman of the Finance Committee, then moved to amend this article to appropriate \$2,187.00 for drainage in the lower athletic field, but to delete the \$4,000.00 appropriated for resurfacing the playground. The motion was seconded, but NOT PASSED. The original motion was then duly seconded and PASSED.

Article X

Robert Wheldon moved that the School District raise and appropriate the total sum of \$14,586.00 to be allocated in the following manner: lower ceilings and change lighting in the hall of the original elementary school (\$3,000); retile the floors in the hall of the original elementary school (\$2,500); install new heating units and bathroom stalls in the locker room (\$2,500); repair, reline, and resurface the gymnasium floor (\$3,000); install acoustical ceiling tile in the new two room addition (\$2,662); purchase entrance mats (12) for all buildings (\$624), and purchase paint for classrooms (\$300).

Adrienne Scarfo, Chairman of the Finance Committee, moved to amend article X to appropriate \$9,086.00, in so doing delete \$2,500 for heating units and bathroom stalls, and \$3,000 for the repair, relining and resurfacing of the gymnasium floor. The amendment was seconded, but NOT PASSED.

The original motion was then seconded and PASSED.

As there was no other business to come before the meeting, following the Winter Carnival Drawing the meeting was adjourned by Mr. Herman at 11:00 pm.

To see if the School District will raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Three Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$11,375) to be allocated in the following manner: Install new insulated entrance doors at the north end of the elementary school, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty Five Dollars (\$1,965); install metal bathroom partitions in the elementary school, Four Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4,950); install ceramic floor tile in the elementary bathrooms and gymnasium shower rooms, Three Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$3,900); install fluorescent lights in the elementary corridor, Five Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$560) or take any other action in relation thereto.

9. To see if the School District will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) for the purchase of the following maintenance equipment: High Speed Buffer, Heavy Duty Wet Vac and Lawn Mower or take any other action in relation thereto

10. To see if the School District will raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$7,800) for the purchase of three microcomputers and accessories for instructional use or take any other action in relation thereto.

11. To see if the School District will vote to authorize the Weare School Board to appoint a Facilities Study Committee to review the needs of Weare school facilities and prepare a plan to meet those needs; and to raise and appropriate a sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000) to be used by the School Board to fund the preparation of a plan to be presented to voters at the 1984 School District Meeting, or take any other action in relation thereto.

12. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.
