Tax collector for the ensuing year,
Town treasurer for the ensuing year,
Highway agent for the ensuing year,

One cemetery trustee for three years,
One trust fund trustee for three years,
Three auditors for the ensuing year,
Overseer of the poor for the ensuing year,
Police chief for the ensuing year.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M., the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second: To see if the town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

Third: To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as may have come in during the year and such trust funds as have not previously been accepted.

Fourth: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any or all property acquired by tax deed since the last vote so authorizing them to do so.

Fifth: To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Sixth: To see if the town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham fund for schools or library.

Seventh: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the land and building known as the Police Station, and to further authorize the selectmen to apply the proceeds of said sale toward the expense of repairs and improvements to the Town Hall, or in such manner as the town may by vote direct.

Eighth: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equaling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

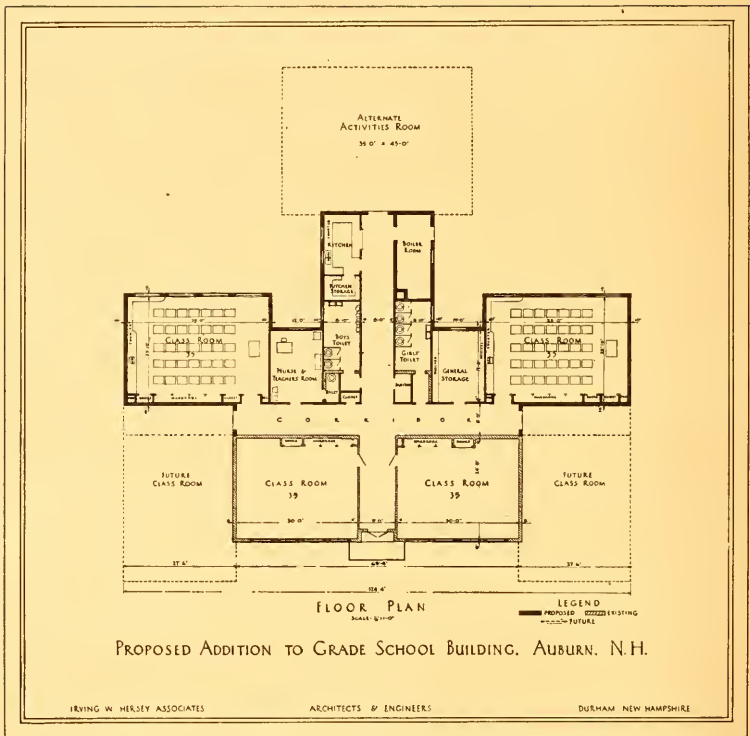

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of
Auburn, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March, 1948 at 7:30 in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in the warrant.
7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officers, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred dollars to paint exteriors of both schools.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two hundred dollars to erect a chain fence along the highway at the Severance School.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen hundred dollars to alter, decorate and relight the primary room at Severance School.

11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application to any Federal or State agency now existing or created by special legislation for funds to additional educational facilities and to accept any such funds in behalf of the district.

12. To see if the district will vote to build and equip an addition to the Auburn Village School in order to provide two additional classrooms with auxiliary service rooms to take care of the increased school population and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. If the vote on preceding article is in the affirmative, to see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to issue serial notes or bonds of the district in an amount not exceeding \$34,000 for the purpose of defraying the cost of the addition to the Auburn Village School in the name of and on the credit of the district; said notes or bonds to be issued pursuant to chapter 72 of the Revised Laws; and to authorize the school board to determine the time and place of payment of the principal and interest, the rate of interest and all other matters in connection with the financing of this project.

14. If the vote on the above article is in the affirmative, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five thousand dollars for the operational expense of the additional rooms.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOL

Several critical problems face the schools of the district, state and nation. The most pressing problem is that of housing. In the report of last year attention was called to the fact that a solution of housing problem was a fact that the district would have to face. The census figures indicate that something needs to be done to alleviate the housing shortage for the district has gained a considerable number of actual and potential pupils. The following indicates the actual and potential enrollment from 1942-55.

In light of these facts the school board is presenting a plan to the district for its consideration. Organizational plans could be effected to provide greater educational opportunities for all if the plans were adopted by the district.

The financial problem imposed by increasing enrollments is increased by the problem of teacher supply.

The supply of teachers is decidedly short. This shortage is caused by three factors. The necessity of having an increased number of teachers because of increased enrollments is self evident. Another contributing cause is a changing philosophy in regards to class size. The profession and the public are recognizing the necessity particularly at primary level of smaller classes. It is important that younger children be given the opportunity to build a foundation that will more adequately insure success as they ascend the educational ladder. This means more individual attention to the various phases of growth at the early stages of children's education. The third factor is the size of graduating classes at the teacher training institutions. For the past several years the number of graduates in the elementary field has been sufficient to fill only 1 of 6 vacancies.

The economics of this kind of situation means higher salaries. In addition the price structure has affected school costs in the same degree that it has affected the general living costs. In a real sense the schools of the district face a financial problem. Increased enrollments plus the fact the educational dollar purchases less than before impose a heavier financial burden on the local community.

That educators are cognizant of this fact is revealed quite clearly in the legislative programs of both national and state legislatures. Despite the fact that funds from a national and state level are collected from the tax payer, the base is broadened so that more people contribute to the cost of education. Such a program will tend to alleviate the tax load now on real estate. Pending legislation in the state legislature proposes an allocation of state funds which will benefit the school district by about \$2000 more if passed as proposed. Other legislative matters can also effect the educational financial structure so that the financial responsibility of the community will be less without sacrificing educational opportunities of children.

INSTRUCTION

The instructional needs of your children are being met more adequately than previously. Recognizing the need for an improvement in the handwriting of school children the school board contracted for the services of the Rinehart Functional Handwriting system. General approval of the program has been expressed by several people.

The vacancy occasioned by the loss of Mrs. Crosby was filled by reassignment of teachers and engaging Mrs. Gladys Hart of Derry Village, a teacher of experience, for the primary grades at Severance. The teaching positions were all filled by competent professional trained teachers and the results of their efforts were gratifying.

Text book purchases continued to provide greater source materials. The graded spellers were introduced. In general

the text book situation is improving in your schools and planned purchases will continue to maintain and improve the present status of book supply.

Budget

The operational budget exceeds last year's by \$1437.80. Decreases in several items amounting to \$2325 are offset by advances in other items. In light of enrollment increases with some advances in supplies such an increase is not unanticipated. This fact was pointed out in last year's report. The levy cannot be definitely established until the adjournment of the legislature. The amount of state aid money available to the district is dependent on legislative appropriation. A suggested method of procedure may be available to the district as a result of conferences of the attorney general's office and the state board of education.

In addition to the current operating budget special articles are included in the warrant to allow the district to determine how much of the long range program, suggested last year, may be completed at the present time.

The efforts of all concerned directly with the functioning and administration of the schools are concerned with one primary objective, to provide the best educational opportunity for Auburn children. The cooperative attitude of all has made educational planning a pleasant duty. Words can not convey the gratitude and appreciation one has when working in such a situation.
