MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY.

All persons furnishing materials or service for the city, or aid to the city poor, should be particular to take the name of the person ordering such service, material, or aid, and should *know* that the person is duly authorized to contract said liability.

The city will not be holden for merchandise sold or delivered on city pauper account, except on the written order of the Overseer of the Poor.

Duplicate copies will be required of all bills payable by the city, furnished on county pauper account.

All bills against the city must be approved by the person authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the Committee on Accounts, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the city clerk before 12 o'clock of the day of meeting of the Committee on Accounts, they will be audited by them, and, if approved, be ready for payment on the Wednesday following.

Meetings of the Committee are held on the Thursday next preceding the last Saturday in each month, at 2 o'clock P. M.

EXTENSIONS, IMPROVEMENTS, AND STATISTICS.

A new 4-inch pipe has been laid from Clinton street through Fruit to Pleasant street, a distance of 2900 feet. A new hydrant has been located at the corner of Clinton and Fruit streets, and another near the residence of William W. Critchett on Fruit street.

From Warren street, northerly in Giles street, a distance of 860 feet, a new 4-inch pipe has been laid so that families on Giles and the westerly part of School street can be supplied from the works instead of from the spring near Little Pond road. A new hydrant has been located on Giles, near School street.

The engineers of the Fire Department have suggested that there was not suitable protection to the large number of wood-

en buildings situated east of Main street, between the Eagle and the Phenix hotels. CITY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the City Council:

As you are aware, most of the duties devolving upon the city physician during the past year were performed by my lamented predecessor, the late Dr. Marden. Since assuming the duties of the office, December 3, 1885, seven different patients have been treated. I have made nine house visits, and have given five prescriptions at my office.

Knowing so little of what was done by the city physician during eleven months of the year, I have nothing of interest to offer. But perhaps it may not be improper for me to say a word of the late city physician, Dr. Sumner D. Marden. He was born in this city September 17th, 1852, and died November 27th, 1885. He graduated from Dartmouth Medical College in the class of 1883 as one of the class officers, and soon after opened an office in this city. In January, 1885, he was chosen city physician. Owing to a variety of causes, among others the threatened attack of small pox and the vaccinations which necessarily followed, the duties were more arduous than for several years previous; but they were thoroughly and satisfactorily performed. Although a young man in the practice of his profession, he had won the respect and confidence of the community to an enviable degree, and his death is mourned by all. He was a member of the Centre District and New Hampshire State Medical societies.

STREET DEPARTMENT.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF HIGH-WAYS.

To the City Council:

The disbursements for the year 1885 in the care of the streets and highways of the city have amounted to \$24,281.51, being an increase of \$94.67 in the gross expenditures.

The net expense, however, is more favorable, because the collections from abuttors, on account of sidewalks, are considerably in excess of last year, and show an actual gain in net results of \$534.55, which, considering the extra amount of work accomplished, is even better than anticipated.

The detailed statement of payments will be found in the account of "Running Expenses," under the heading of "Highway Department."

The subdivision of the labor pay-rolls has been carefully made, and the expenses, as given under the various headings, indicate very nearly the cost of the different branches of work required for the proper maintenance of the streets in the central district.

In the outside districts no subdivision is attempted, the work in most cases falling under the head of "General Repairs."

In the central district the heading of "General Repairs" includes all payments which cannot be properly classified under one of the terms employed for subdivision of expenses.

For "Bridges and Culverts" the outlay amounts to \$839.99, and includes the expense of lighting the Free bridge and Lower bridge, and the snowing of the same in winter, bridge plank and lumber required for repairs of bridges and culverts, and for concreting when needed.

The Federal bridge at East Concord has been thoroughly ex-

amined, and the decayed parts of the planking in the roadway replaced by sound timber, and carefully concreted for future protection.

The wooden abutments of the bridge near Moses Brown's on the old Hopkinton turnpike have been replaced by substantial stone abutments, and the bridge thoroughly rebuilt under the direction of Mr. George W. Chesley.

Most of the bridges in the city are now provided with stone abutments, and I believe there are but three remaining in all the city which are built wholly of wood. One of these (at the Soucook river on the Pittsfield road) was erected after the severe freshet in 1869, and has thus far answered well its purpose, but will undoubtedly require rebuilding in the near future. A new stone culvert has been built across the Pittsfield road near Richardson's mills, to relieve the cross road from the water which has overflowed it every spring, and rendered travel difficult and sometimes dangerous.

Many culverts have been cleaned out and repaired, and when practicable have been enlarged and strongly rebuilt to ensure their permanent usefulness.

But little has been expended for "Fences and Signs," as guide-boards have heretofere been erected whenever a suggestion has been made as to their desirability, and the fences maintained by the city along bank walls are mostly permanent and in good condition.

The "macadamizing" expenses for the year amount to \$2,391.94, including rent, insurance, and repairs of boiler and machinery. Almost all the stone used for crushing has been obtained at the city gravel banks, and the work of obtaining gravel for highway purposes has been materially aided by thus keeping the banks cleared. State street has been macadamized from Washington to Franklin street, and the west side of South Main street from Freight to Thorndike street, and the east side from Freight to Fayette street. This makes the most durable roadway which can be built in this section, and requires the least outlay for repairs. To make it perfect, a steam road roller should be used, but, with the limited amount which it is possible with our present appropriations to build each year, it is perhaps questionable whether an outlay of \$6,000 for the purchase of such an engine would be expedient.

The expenses for sidewalks and crossings aggregate \$4,204.22, the larger part of the sum being for concreting, edgestones, and flagging stones. Granite flagging stones have been laid for cross walks wherever required across a macadamized street, and although expensive are the most durable of anything which can be procured for the purpose. The whole expense of concreting sidewalks is paid by the city, and one half afterwards collected back from the abuttors. The collections upon this account will be found in detail at the end of the report of the commissioner of highways.

More than the average number of sidewalk petitions have been granted by the Board of Aldermen, and, in addition to the small pieces granted throughout the city, long stretches of concrete have been laid on North State street above the old cemetery; on the east side of North Spring street, from Maple to Washington; on the east side of Union, south from Washington; on the north side of Cross street, from State to South street; on the north side of West street, from South Main to Mills street; and on the east side of South street, from Fayette to Perley street.

In the expense for "Cleaning and Sprinkling Streets" is included only the account of *one* of the city teamsters, and then only when engaged directly in that work. If the work in this department, now accomplished by the other teams used in connection with the fire department, were to be hired from other parties, the expense would be increased about \$800.

More attention than formerly is given to cleaning the gutters, not only on account of the improved appearance of the streets, but for their better protection during the spring rains.

The item of "Breaking Roads" in the central district amounts to \$1,336.62 for the year. The expense for this purpose is of course variable, and depends largely upon the character and severity of the storms of winter.

Various expedients have been resorted to for the purpose of avoiding the drifting of snow in exposed localities, but in our climate there must always be a considerable expenditure for breaking out the roads and making them passable after each snow-storm.

In most of the outlying districts the expenditures have been

confined to the ordinary work of repairs, and few extensive improvements have been undertaken. The expenses in each district will be found under the appropriate heading in the "Running Expense" account.

In the Borough district the easterly abutment of the Borough bridge has been entirely rebuilt, of split granite, in a substantial manner, at an expense of \$200. The old abutment was built of small boulders, and by the lapse of time had so fallen to pieces as to become insecure, thus rendering its rebuilding imperative.

In the village of Penacook a new bank wall has been built near Amsden's factory, and surmounted by a substantial fence, thus providing for a level walk along a part of the street which, from its sloping character, was frequently rendered dangerous when the ground was covered by ice. In this district, also, the old wooden drain leading from a point near the Washington house to the canal was so badly decayed as to require extensive repairs, and it has been replaced by twelve-inch Akron pipe, thus ensuring its durability for many years.

In several districts a large amount of work has been done with the road machines, and judging from the comments of travellers much has been accomplished, and to the general satisfaction of the travelling public.

The work of building the new street laid out by the Board of Aldermen, under the name of Forest street, has been done by this department without any special appropriation for that purpose, and the new street fifty feet in width, well made and fully completed from Valley street to Auburn street, is a very apparent improvement to that locality. The expense of building Harrod street has also been included in this department without special appropriation, the work having been done by our regular force, and without detriment to other duties. The expense for both was about \$250, and is included under the heading of "General Repairs," the items being almost entirely in the labor pay-rolls.

In the prosecution of the work of the department I have had, as heretofore, the invaluable assistance of Mr. James H. Rowell, the superintendent of streets, upon whom I have relied for the execution of all projected improvements; and to his experience and knowledge of the wants of the department, is due much of

the economical administration of the affairs of this branch of the public service.

I am also indebted to the several foremen who have been employed, and to the laborers who have so satisfactorily discharged their duties, for the manner in which all suggestions have been received, and the willingness and celerity with which all orders have been executed.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SEWERS AND DRAINS.

To the City Council:

The total expenditures for the construction of "sewers" in the year 1885 amount to \$2,694.36, a detailed account of which will be found under the heading of "Precinct," in the general running expenses.

Two important works have been undertaken, the first being the building of a new sewer through Tremont street, from State to Jackson street. This was accomplished with great difficulty owing to the stony character of the ground. The cutting was through a succession of boulders and ledge, requiring the constant use of drills and wedges, and progress was necessarily very slow. For a long distance blasting with powder was resorted to as the only means of reducing the rock to a suitable size for removal. The broken pieces were lifted from the ditch with derricks, but were so large as to be unsuitable to return for filling, and were consequently taken to the stone-crusher to be used for street purposes. The pipe laid was 12-inch Akron, and the work was completed satisfactorily, although at considerable expense, and seems to be appreciated by the residents of that vicinity, for whose particular benefit the outlay was demanded.

The other work of importance was the building of a 4-feet brick sewer under the tracks of the Concord Railroad, from the intervale to the foot of Depot street.

The matter of supplying an extra outlet from Main street sewers to Merrimack river has been under consideration for a long time, but no feasible plan for carrying out such purpose has been presented, until the destruction of the old passenger depot offered the opportunity for making almost a straight sewer from Main street to the river. The railroad officials, recognizing the necessity for additional sewer accommodations in the

vicinity of Railroad square, gave their hearty cooperation in advancing and completing the work. Owing to the large number of trains passing over the route of the proposed sewer, its construction was attended with difficulty and danger; but with the great care exercised by all parties, the sewer was safely completed before the erection of the new train shed of the Concord Railroad, a portion of which now extends directly over the sewer as laid. It was at first proposed to let the whole work by contract, but after mature deliberation it was decided to conduct operations under the supervision of the committee. This has been done, and the sewer as constructed is egg-shaped, of double courses of brick, and four feet across its largest diameter. It has been most thoroughly and carefully built, yet the expense was not as large as was anticipated and provided for. Of the special appropriation of \$2,000, made for the purpose, nearly \$500 remains in the treasury, which will be available for the extension of this sewer the coming spring. As now left unfinished, overflow connections have been made with the Depot street sewer, and the sewer passing in the rear of the Phenix hotel, so as to provide for any possible contingencies pending its construction to the river bank. This necessary extension should be commenced as soon as operations can be conveniently resumed in the spring, and the estimated expense for the same, with proper granite walls to protect the outlet at the river's brink, is not far from \$2,000.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

To the City Council:

The Trustees of the public library present their report for the year ending January 31, 1886. Accompanying this are the reports of the Librarian and the Treasurer, which are respectfully submitted.

During the year very good progress has been made toward making our library as complete in the walks of general literature as the money at our disposal would warrant, but the end is still far off, even under these circumstances. The annual appropriation, it must be borne in mind, is not wholly available for the purchase of books, about half being used for that purpose. The remainder is expended for salaries, rents, fuel, gas, binding, and other expenses incident to the proper maintenance of our trust.

When so much is needed, a thousand dollars a year goes but a little way toward filling up the gaps that exist, for, besides the incompleteness of many subjects, the current books of the day must be purchased, or we should fall sadly behind in public expectation. A public library should contain books in all branches of knowledge. It should cater to all healthful tastes, and become the repository of all material necessary to a thorough education. It should be, in the broadest sense of the word, the people's college. Books alone can bring this about, and books cost money.

The city of Concord has been liberal in everything connected with its welfare and adornment. It has literally made the wilderness glad; but when we come to the matter of its library the record is not pleasant. But little attention has ever been devoted to the enlargement or nourishment of this important social factor. It has almost been let alone, and the result of this thirty years of mistaken policy is painfully manifest. For

years the library was hidden away in the upper story of an almost inaccessible court-house, a place so difficult to reach as to deter public patronage, and to cause a widespread indifference toward the institution and its needs. This has been changed, and the present rooms give satisfaction to the constantly increasing number of readers.

Concord has the reputation of being a literary centre, and its public schools are the pride of its people; but strangely enough, in all the years that the library has been in existence, but two legacies have been left to it. There is something wrong, or the liberally disposed citizens would have bequeathed more than \$2,000 to its support. But this small sum is in generous proportion to the appropriations of the city. In thirty years the library has received from the public treasury \$23,531.67, a large part of which must be reckoned in as running expenses, thus leaving not more than half the amount for the purchase of books. Five hundred dollars a year cannot be considered an extravagant sum for the support of a public library among a community so intelligent and so increasing as our own. Not many years ago the Home for the Aged was established without a single dollar of funds: to-day its friends rejoice that its permanent endowment puts the home beyond the pale of experiment. The same may be said of the City Hospital. Let the Public Library be known as a cherished and fostered institution, and funds will soon be forthcoming.

At present a library building may be impracticable, but, with the school-district out of debt, it seems but reasonable and fair to vote an appropriation which shall be large enough to meet our present urgent wants, and which may be wholly applied for the purchase of books.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

To the Trustees of the Concord Public Library:

Nine hundred and twenty-three books have been added to the library during the year now closing, of which one hundred and ninety were purchased from the income of the Lyon and Pierce legacies. Five hundred and fifty-three were purchased from the city appropriation; and one hundred and eighty were presented by national and state officials and individuals.

Among the donations to the library are twenty-five bound volumes of the Concord Daily Monitor, and three bound volumes of the Independent Statesman, presented by the Republican Press Association; eight bound volumes and unbound files of the New Hampshire Statesman, by George E. Jenks, Esq., making, with others previously received, a complete file of the Statesman from 4 July, 1851, to 24 September, 1885, and with the exception of one half yearly volume, a complete file of the Monitor from 1 January, 1871, to 30 June, 1884.

Partial files of the New Hampshire Patriot have been secured from 25 April, 1809, to 1 January, 1819, and complete files of same from 1 January, 1819, to 1 January, 1829, and nearly complete files of the New Hampshire Statesman from 18 February, 1826, to 31 December, 1831.

A collection of pamphlets, written or published by citizens of Concord, has been commenced, and partial files of the annual reports of state institutions located in Concord have been collected. To these collections donations are solicited, and will be thankfully received.

Since the first of October last the daily average of books given out has exceeded one hundred volumes; and a large increase of the patrons of the library has been secured in Wards 1, 2, and 3.

Many of the older books are badly worn and defaced, and some are quite imperfect. These should be replaced by new ones. For books printed on paper made largely of wood, and miserably bound, three or four years' service in a public library is all that can be reasonably expected.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

I herewith submit the annual report of the Fire Department of the city of Concord for the year ending December 31, 1885, embracing a list of fires and alarms, with losses and insurance, compiled from authentic sources, and also embodying the rolls of membership of the several organizations, and other data of public interest.

CONGRATULATORY.

In my report for 1884 I took occasion to congratulate our people upon the remarkable immunity we had enjoyed during that year from serious or even ordinary fires, and their attendant calamities. The year 1885 has been almost exceptionally similar in our business centres, and, excluding the outlying districts beyond the aid of any portion of this Department, the losses have been comparatively insignificant. In the Precinct they sum up \$2,385.39; insurance, \$1,955.39. At Penacook, \$1,045; insurance, \$855. In outlying districts, \$17,000; insurance, \$13,100. Total losses, \$20,430.39; insurance. \$15,910.39. Three fires in outlying portions of the city, aggregating the sum of \$16,000, and constituting nearly four fifths of the entire loss, each occurred almost upon the very outside of the municipal limits, and all far beyond our call or assistance. The favorable result in the Precinct is largely due to the prompt responses invariably made to alarms by the Department, no less than to its general efficiency. The infrequency of fires which has with remarkable good fortune characterized the compact portion of our city during the past two years, would very naturally induce laxity in the fire service, but discipline has been well sustained, and the esprit de corps of the Department has at all times been excellent.

There have been eleven box alarms during the year, viz., one each from boxes 18, 27, 32, 41, 42, 43, and 45, three from box 25, and one from boxes 5 and 25 at the same alarm.

Upon reference to the list of fires and alarms it will be observed that defective chimneys have been the most fruitful source of fires. In numerous instances, not detailed, assistance has been summoned from the Central Station, or rendered by the engineers and firemen in the vicinity of localities where property was endangered by burning chimneys, and consequently no loss has been sustained, and an alarm has invariably been avoided. The Department stands ready at all times to afford aid of this character, and the practice of sending to the Central Station or the hose-houses in such emergency has very generally obtained among the people of the Precinct, and is a most commendable one, often obviating the necessity of a general call.

FORCE, &C.

The force of the Department is as follows: In the Precinct, at the Central Station, two second-class Amoskeag steamers,—"Kearsarge," with "Kearsarge Hose" (16 men), and "Gov. Hill," relief steamer, with "Eagle Hose" (12 men). The hose-carriages are both of Amoskeag manufacture, first-class. Hook and Ladder carriage, "City of Concord" (20 men). All the apparatus is drawn by horses. All the men in these companies are call men. The permanent employés are steward, assistant steward, and three drivers. There are six horses, besides the steward's horse, always held within reasonable distance to respond to an alarm.

The "Alert Hose" (12 men), at the North End, and the "Good-Will Hose" (12 men), at the South End, are each provided with a horse, kept constantly at a hack-stable adjoining the hose-houses. The "Alert" uses a modern Department wagon, and the "Good-Will" a second-class Amoskeag, four-wheel carriage. Each has the swinging harness. The men are all call men.

The "Pioneer" steamer at Penacook (28 men) is a fourthclass Silsby, with a second-class Amoskeag hose-carriage. The steamer can be drawn by horses or by hand, as necessity may require. Horses are held available. The "Old Fort" at East Concord, and the "Cataract" at West Concord, are hand-engines, with jumpers for hose. Their complement of men is 30 each.

The board of engineers consists of chief and three assistants in the Precinct, and one assistant each at Penacook, East Concord, and West Concord. The entire force numbers 172 men,—81 in Precinct, and 91 outside.

The apparatus has been properly tested at regular intervals.

The protection of personal property and the control of its removal are in the charge of the city marshal and police force, and whenever required have been promptly and properly rendered.

HOUSES AND APPARATUS.

All the properties of the city connected with this Department have been properly cared for during the year. In the three outer wards, the assistant engineers, having control of the houses and providing supplies, and the stewards of companies in charge of apparatus, are entitled to much credit for the performance of their duties. In the Precinct the hose-houses and apparatus have been well attended to by the stewards. A new and modern furnace has been placed in the "Alert" house. At the Central Station, the steward, assistant steward, and teamsters have been constant in attendance, and faithful and unremitting in their services. The Central Station has long held a widespread reputation for its order, neatness, convenience, and elegance. It is visited daily by considerable numbers, and the employés have been uniformly courteous and attentive in showing its apartments and apparatus. Our citizens have felt a just pride in introducing their friends from abroad to its inspection. Its register for the year contains entries of nearly fifteen hundred names of visitors from all parts of our state and of the Union.

HOSE.

In the spring of the current year, the city purchased of Messrs. James Boyd & Sons, of Boston, two thousand feet "Paragon" hose, similar to that supplied by the same firm at various times during the past five years. Six hundred feet of this hose was assigned to Penacook, making the complement of fabric hose

of the "Pioneer" steamer eight hundred feet, with a reserve of eleven hundred feet of leather hose. The latter is occasionally called into requisition by reason of the limited water-supply, often requiring unusual length of lines to reach buildings in the outer sections of that village. The Precinct Department received the balance of this hose, and each of its four carriages now carries seven hundred feet fabric hose. We have at the Central Station six hundred feet additional of fabric, and about two thousand feet of leather hose. The last named is all old and unreliable, and can hardly be considered serviceable. It is used only, for very short periods of time, during the drying out of the fabric hose after fires, when it is placed upon the reels temporarily. An additional amount of two thousand feet fabric hose will soon be a necessity. This quantity would constitute an ample supply for general use and change, also. It is due the "Paragon" hose to state that we have had a thousand feet in use for nearly five years. It has never been ruptured, is now in excellent condition, and will safely bear a water-pressure of more than two hundred pounds, double the ordinary steamer pressure and quadruple the hydrant pressure at fires.

EXPENSES.

The expenditure for the past year has been \$11,192.14, being about the amount of the ordinary running expenses of the Department for the years 1883 and 1884. In addition, the sum of \$1,547.26 was paid by special appropriation for the purchase of new hose. These expenses compare favorably with other New England cities. The incalculable advantages of the fire-alarm telegraph, the abounding water and hydrant facilities, the perfection of apparatus, and the capacity and convenience of our station, hose, and engine-houses, and the intelligent and welltrained corps of men in service, have accomplished in late years very marked results, which are apparent to every citizen. The conflagrations of fifteen or twenty years ago, when our losses on property, of much less value than at present, rarely fell below \$50,000 annually, and frequently approximated double that sum, can now hardly be repeated; and, notwithstanding the very considerable expense in keeping up to its present standard a department like ours, there is no complaint among the tax-payers, and no one would desire to curtail its privileges and resources, and exchange the conditions.

FIRE-ALARM TELEGRAPH.

It would be an act of supererogation, after what has been said in my previous reports, to comment here upon the great value of the fire-alarm telegraph, in a community where it is so fully appreciated. It demonstrates itself, and shows conclusively that by it

> "A little fire is quickly trodden out, Which, being suffered, rivers cannot quench;"

and its efficiency, since its introduction, has been made more apparent in the very small amount we find constituting the fire losses in the compact portion of the city, where it has been available. I am of the opinion that it would be good policy to increase its capacities, putting in two additional circuits, and exchanging the present two-circuit repeater in the Central Station for a four-circuit, and by the erection of three or four more boxes at outer limits. It would render the alarm more certain and reliable, and entail no increased care or expense in its maintenance. The cost of such an enlargement would probably be \$1,200 to \$1,500.

NEW HYDRANTS.

Five new hydrants have been erected during the year, viz.:— Two in the alley in rear of North Main street, one in Eagle court, the other at the intersection of the passway, south of Woodward's block; one at the corner of School and Giles streets, near the jail; two on Fruit street, one opposite Critchett's, the other at the corner of Clinton street. The whole number of public hydrants is now 109; private hydrants, 22.

The placing of hydrants in the rear of the large business blocks on North Main street is a progressive and very commendable measure, and I hope may be followed up until all the valuable property on this street, between Pleasant and Centre streets, may be commanded by water-supply in its rear as well as its front. The cost will very likely be more than compensated by a single fire.

INSURANCE-PROFITS AND LOSSES.

In my two previous reports, I discussed the subject of insurance, but only as affecting the interests of our own city. I had gathered, from the annual returns of this Department, the losses and insurance of each year, commencing with 1873, the date of the introduction of Long Pond water; and I now, for the purpose of record and reference, reproduce the table, with the addition of the year 1885:—

The average loss for these thirteen consecutive years has been \$25,877.08, and the average insurance recovered, \$18,959,49.

In my report for the year 1883, the statement was made, founded partly upon very full and unquestionable statistics, procured with much pains and labor by the Board of Engineers in 1869, and then published in detail in newspapers in Concord, and partly on information communicated to me personally at the time of preparing the report by two well known insurance agents of this city, that the sum annually paid for premiums on insurance of property in Concord was about \$70,000. This statement was reiterated and commented upon in my report for the year 1884, and has never been publicly denied or con-

troverted. Accepting it for present purposes, the subjoined results of our insurance business are obtained:—

If the insurance interests of the country have not been reasonably prosperous and remunerative of late years, as has been claimed they have not, most assuredly we have added but little to their losses, and no fault lies with us; and the foreign companies which, in a solid body (fifty-eight in number), recently withdrew their business in its entirety from our state, cannot complain of their adverse fortune in Concord, as they shake off upon us the dust from their feet in leaving the Capital.

DWELLING-HOUSE INSURANCE IN PRECINCT.

I desire to call the attention of the property-holders residing in the Precinct, who are accessible to the resources of the watersupply and fire-alarm and the protection of the Department, to the large insurance carried upon the dwelling-houses within its limits. Such insurance may not be excessive as covering a large or total loss, but the policy or necessity of placing very large amounts, in view of the possibility or probability of such a result, is exceedingly questionable. No dwelling-house has been burned in the compact portion of this city, involving a total loss, since the introduction of water thirteen years ago; and few have been damaged to any very serious extent. In but three or four instances within my recollection has a single loss occurred during this time in excess of one thousand dollars. The losses on dwellings, including in nearly every instance, by reason of collective awards, the damage to contents, in the Precinct, for the past three years, have been as follows:

1883, \$1,471.30—one single loss, \$1,164.30; 1884, \$320.05; 1885, \$841.39; total, \$2,632.74. The sum of two thousand dollars per annum will unquestionably cover the losses on dwelling-houses since the erection of the alarm, and most probably for the entire term of hydrant supply. The more valuable dwelling-houses carry insurance varying from \$3,000 to \$10,000, and it is worthy the consideration of their owners whether they cannot themselves afford to assume some portion of the slight risks of very considerable losses.

THE "VALUED POLICY" LAW.

At the session of the legislature, held last summer, a bill was enacted, known to the public as the "valued policy" law. This act provides simply that an insurance company shall be liable, in cases of total loss, to the full amount written in the policy; that in partial loss the company shall pay a sum equal in amount to the damage done; that compacts and combinations, for the purpose of fixing rates, shall not be formed; and that suits arising from disagreement shall be brought and maintained only in the courts of New Hampshire. It passed the House of Representatives by a vote of nearly three to one, and the Senate by more than two to one, receiving the ready approval of the governor; and it has been unquestionably sustained by an overwhelming preponderance of sentiment, both of the people and the newspaper press, through whose columns it has been freely and fully discussed. The passage of this law was followed almost immediately, and evidently with concert of action, by the withdrawal of every foreign insurance company transacting business in the state, leaving the public, which had been almost entirely dependent upon these underwriters, without apparent resource. With characteristic self-reliance and pluck, the emergency was met at once. A few months sufficed to develop the formation of both stock and mutual companies abundantly able to protect all our interests, and the incoming year will find the people of New Hampshire in a position requiring no aid from abroad.

Without commenting upon the policy or merits of this law, or the seemingly ungracious action of the insurance companies, we shall unquestionably find most beneficial results arising from its enactment. First come increased attention and care of

property at risk; next, the reduction of large and unnecessary insurance, and the entire avoidance of the greatest of all evils, over-insurance; and lastly, the provision of more ample means for the extinguishment of fires. All these will largely decrease the losses, and, as a consequence, the amount expended for insurance, and inure greatly to the public advantage. It is proper here to say, that the attention of the people residing in the villages of this state has, in this connection, been called to the necessity of providing greater water facilities, both for the extinguishment of fires and the promotion of convenience and health. Water-works have been erected in several localities during the past year, involving an expense varying from \$5,000 to \$50,000 or more; and the time is not far distant when every considerable community will demand its ample supply of pure water, and a failure in compliance will cut short its growth and prosperity and bring upon it public discredit.

INCENDIARISM.

In but one instance has a fire occurred within the Precinct in which there has been any suspicion of incendiarism. This result is measurably attributable to the fear of detection, as the quick response assured by the fire-alarm, and the consequent extinguishment of fire in its incipient stages, seldom fail to expose the evidence of the crime. A single fire, in an outlying district, is charged to the incendiary.

FIREMEN'S RELIEF ASSOCIATION.

In the winter of 1883-'84 the members of the Precinct Department formed a relief association, which had, at the date of its organization, an endowment of \$600. This sum has been increased by annual assessments, and amounts, January 1, 1886, to \$804.13, well invested. No casualty has occurred since its organization, and consequently there has been no occasion for payment of its benefits.

ENGINEERS AND CITY OFFICIALS.

During the past three years, in which I have, for the second time, held the office of Chief Engineer, my labors have been lessened largely by my assistants and by the steward and other employés at the Central Station. The engineers have brought both experience and ability to their positions, and this is equally true of the others. Each has rendered me all possible aid, and with the uniform support and hearty coöperation of the mayor and members of the city government, in all things tending to promote the interests of this Department and its general advancement, and with the unvarying expression of public confidence, we find ourselves well rewarded in the results of successful administration.

CONCLUSION.

In taking leave of this Department, I must express my acknowledgments to its officers and men for their constant and earnest efforts to sustain me, and for the unvarying courtesy and kindness of each and every one. My connection with it will always be, in its retrospect, a source of great pleasure and satisfaction.

SUMMARY.

The losses for the entire city sum up \$20,430.39, and the insurance, \$15,910.39—each about three fourths the average for the twelve preceding years. The single loss of the Birchdale house, four miles distant from the city proper, constitutes nearly three fifths of the aggregate loss, and nearly two thirds of the insurance. In the Precinct the loss (\$2,385.39) and the insurance (\$1,955.39) are less than one eighth of the whole, and is smaller than for many preceding years, except that of 1884, when it amounted to \$335.05 only.

REGULATIONS OF THE CONCORD PRECINCT FIRE DEPARTMENT.

ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF ENGINEERS, JANUARY, 1874.

ARTICLE 1. Any engine or hose company running out a line of hose from a hydrant or steamer shall be entitled to the pipe, although the hose of other companies may be attached in order to reach the fire; and any company coming to a fire, and finding an incomplete line of hose laid out from a hydrant or steamer, shall attach to and lengthen out such line, in lieu of laying a line of its own.

- ART. 2. When two or more engine or hose companies are playing in a continuous line, the pipe shall belong to the company attaching to the hydrant or steamer, as provided in the foregoing article; but any company furnishing the *entire* line, and receiving water from a steamer, the pipe shall belong to such company so receiving.
- ART. 3. Each engine and hose company shall have equal claim to the hydrants; but it is enjoined upon the engine companies to draught their own water from a reservoir, wherever a suitable one can be found within a reasonable distance.
- ART. 4. No company shall take possession of a hydrant or reservoir, unless their hose and apparatus for attaching to the same are at hand and ready for use. The company which shall be thus ready shall be entitled to such hydrant or reservoir; but, upon the order of an engineer, another company may attach a second line of hose from such hydrant or steamer, in case the same may be necessary, such company having first laid its hose, and being ready to attach the same.
- ART. 5. In proceeding to, working at, or returning from fires, noisy demonstrations are strictly prohibited, and it is required of officers of companies to maintain perfect order and decorum in their respective commands during all such service.

ART. 6. No company, while returning from a fire, will be allowed to proceed faster than a walk, and at all times to keep on the right of the street. Drivers are strictly enjoined, in proceeding to a fire, to use the utmost care and caution consistent with promptness. Racing between companies is forbidden under any circumstances. Any collision or casualty occurring to horses or apparatus will be considered a sufficient cause for the suspension of the driver in charge at the time.

ART. 7. No member of any company shall leave the city withont first informing his foreman; no foreman or assistant engineer, without first notifying the chief engineer, in each case the party so leaving providing a substitute.

ART. 8. In case of fire, the foreman first arriving shall be in command until the arrival of an engineer.

ART. 9. Any order issued by the chief or an assistant engineer shall be promptly obeyed.

RULES FOR DRIVERS.

The drivers shall be required to occupy sleeping apartments in the Central Station, each being allowed two nights off each week, from 9 o'clock P. M. to 6 o'clock A M.. upon particular nights to be designated by the steward.

They shall be at or near the station at all times, except when employed by the superintendent of streets or absent by permission of the steward or an engineer, and shall perform such duties as the steward or chief engineer may direct.

They shall groom and take proper and trusty care of their horses; shall keep the stables clean, and the harnesses and all things pertaining to their department in order; shall have the horses harnessed as directed, and not leave the station without everything in readiness for immediate service; shall exercise their horses when required by the steward or chief engineer, and practice care and economy in feeding and general management.

In case of fire, the drivers shall be subject to the orders of any engineer.

FIRE-ALARM TELEGRAPH.

For the purpose of uniformity in numbering the fire-alarm boxes, the city is divided into four districts, viz.,—

DISTRICT 1. Embraces that section of the city north and west of Washington street, box 17 of this division being located on the *south* side of the street.

DISTRICT 2. Embraces all between School and Washington streets.

DISTRICT 3. Embraces all between Pleasant and School streets.

DISTRICT 4. Embraces all south of Pleasant street.

The first figure of the box-number will indicate the district.

FIRE-ALARM SIGNALS.

- 1. Alarms rung in from boxes 41, 42, 43, 45, and 46, will not be responded to by the Alert Hose until signalled. The signal to proceed to the fire will be a second alarm; the signal of dismissal, three strokes of the bells.
- 2. Alarms rung in from boxes 15, 16, 17, 18, and 23, will *not* be responded to by Good-Will Hose until signalled. They will be governed by the same signals as the Alert Hose.
- 3. Eleven consecutive strokes of the bells, following any regular boxalarm, or during any fire, is a call for the relief steamer (Gov. Hill), and will be responded to by Eagle Hose, which has that steamer in charge. The relief steamer will, however, respond to the *first alarm* from box 7 (N. H. Asylum for Insane) without special call.
- 4. Two rounds of each eleven strokes of the bells, with an intermission of one minute between the rounds, without any regular box-alarm, will signalize the requirement of a steamer from outside the Precinct, and will be responded to by Kearsarge and Eagle Hose companies alone. In case further aid is necessary, the box alarm from 34 (Central Station) will follow.

(These rounds of eleven strokes, which are signals for the relief steamer, or a call from out of town, must not be confounded with an alarm from private boxes 5, 6, or 7.)

From the above, it will be seen that the companies are subject to calls as follows:

Steamer Kearsarge and Hose—To all calls except the relief steamer. Eagle Hose—To all calls, including the relief.

Hook and Ladder—To box alarms only.

Alert Hose—To box alarms only above Pleasant street, and upon second alarm to boxes below.

Good-Will Hose—To box alarms only below Washington street, and upon second alarm to boxes above.

TESTING SIGNALS.

For the purpose of testing the condition and accuracy of the fire-alarm telegraph, a box alarm will be rung in every Monday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, precisely. It will be one single round only, indicating by the strokes on the bells the number of the box; and the box will then be cut out, and no additional round sounded. The boxes used for this purpose will vary each week, alternating in the circuits.

Upon each other week-day a single blow upon the bells will be struck from the button of a box, alternating as before mentioned.

THE FIRE-ALARM TELEGRAPH

Is the "Gamewell" patent. It embraces nine miles of wires on the main lines, and four miles of extension wires for call-bells.

On the main line are eighteen fire-alarm boxes belonging to the city, and three private boxes,—in all, twenty-one. There are three alarm bells,—two of 2000 pounds each (American steel), and one of 1000 pounds (bell metal), with a tower striker to each. There are also one engine-house gong, four mechanical tappers, one repeater, and three indicators.

On the extension line are seventeen call-bells.

The battery consists of eighty cups for the main line, and five cups for the extension.

The alarm was put up in 1880 by Edwin Rogers, 27 Federal street, Boston, Mass.
