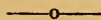

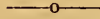

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

DEERING N. H., MARCH 12, 1946



A legal meeting of the Inhabitants of Deering, N. H., was called to order at 10:25 in the forenoon by the Moderator Albert A. Holden. The warrant was read by the Moderator.

Upon motion made by Arnold Ellsworth it was voted to close the polls at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted that articles 2 through 17 be taken up at 11:30

Article 1. Votes were cast for all officers on the Australian ballot as follows:

Selectman for 3 years: Leroy H. Locke had 3 votes, Carroll E. Green had 34 votes, Winniatt K. Griffiths had 46 votes and took oath of office.

Town clerk: Marguerite L. Dutton had 73 votes and took oath of office.

Town Treasurer: Marguerite L. Dutton had 72 votes and took oath of office.

Overseer of Poor: Arthur O. Ellsworth had 77 votes and took oath of office.

Tax Collector: Arnold K. Ellsworth had 1 vote, Chester P. McNally had 53 votes and took oath of office.

Road Agent: Orvis Fisher had 1 vote, Howard E. Whitney had 77 votes and took oath of office.

Auditors: Marjorie A. Holden had 75 votes and took oath of office. Eunice E. Willgeroth had 73 votes and took oath of office.

Library Trustee: Helena I. Taylor had 26 votes, Mary B. Holden had 48 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds: Mabel R. Wood had 70 votes and took oath of office.

Chief of Police: William J. Dumais had 51 votes and took oath of office.

Constables: William Dumais had 26 votes, Percy Putnam had 34 votes and took oath of office. Ernest R. Johnson had 47 votes and took oath of office.

Surveyor of Wood and Lumber: Carroll E. Greene had 33 votes, Everett H. Abbott had 42 votes and took oath of office.

Article 2. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$2,000.00.

Article 3. Upon motion made by Howard Whitney it was voted to raise \$2,000 for winter and \$1,000 for summer roads.

Article 4. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$400.

Article 5. Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to raise \$250.

Article 6. Motion made by Chester P. McNally to keep street lights at Deering Center only. 11 voted in favor of this motion and 28 against.

Motion made by Louise Locke to raise \$320 for street lights leaving the location of 14 lights to the selectmen. It was voted.

Article 7. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted not to raise \$300.

Article 8. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$750 for road grader.

Article 9. Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to raise \$40.

Article 10. Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to raise \$600.

Article 11. Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to authorize selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to authorize selectmen to deliver inventory blanks.

Article 13. Upon motion made by Carroll Greene it was voted to raise \$649.50 for T. R. A.

Article 14. A motion was made to empower selectmen to investigate water possibilities and make a report at the primaries or fall election. It was so voted.

Article 15. Upon motion made by Mary B. Holden it was voted not to hold a citizens caucus.

Article 16. Upon motion made by Carroll Greene it was voted to raise \$1,600 for new Ford truck.

Article 17. Upon motion made by Carroll Greene it was voted to leave the disposal of the International tractor to the discretion of the selectmen.

It was voted to adjourn with date.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deering, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Deering, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300 for street lights.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300 for Blister Rust Control or pass any vote relating thereto.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$40 for the Monadnock Region Association.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$900 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2200 for a Ford truck or pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short-term notes in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$649.50 for T. R. A. money.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$50 towards expenses of Old Home Day.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for Water Supply for Town Hall or pass any vote relating thereto.

16. To see what activities the Town will vote, in regard to price paid for labor.

17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to re-assessing Real Estate, or pass any vote relating thereto.

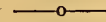

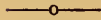

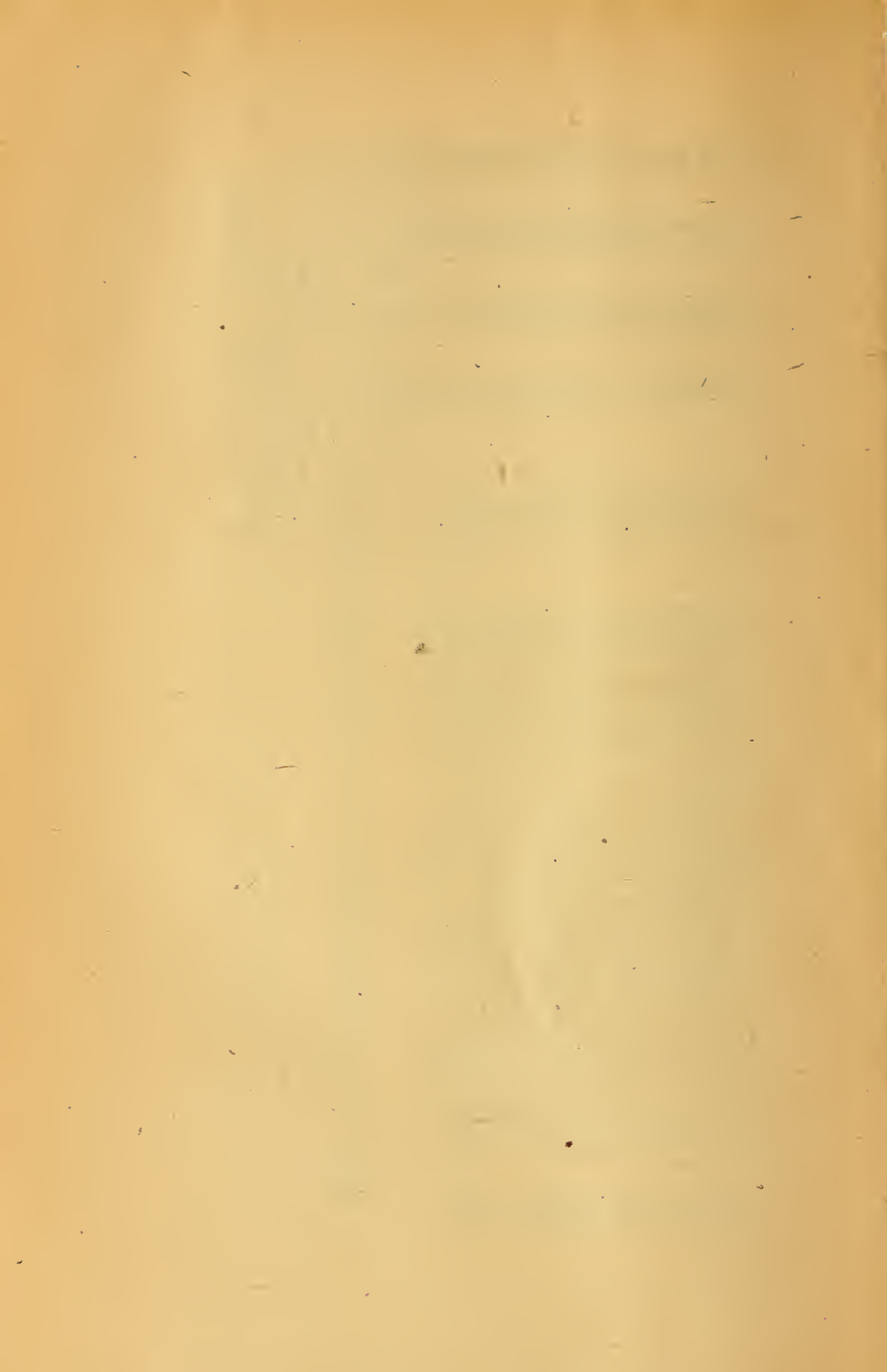

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Deering:

I hereby submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

ORGANIZATION

School Board: Eunice Willgeroth, Chairman; Kenneth F. Fales, Clara Rich.

Superintendent of Schools: Stewart V. McCormack.

School Nurse: Margaret Harris, R. N., Keene, N. H.

Attendance Officer: William Dumais.

Teacher: Miss Margaret Milliken, Salary \$1,600. She has a Certificate.

THE GENERAL REPORT

At this time of year when we are considering appropriations and plans for the next school year, it is well to consider carefully what we have accomplished with the current budget, in terms of the educational goals of the community. It has been said that there is a purpose, conscious or unconscious, behind every act of the schools which our pupils attend. In every lesson which is taught, every new problem or course introduced, every field trip, every game taught, every group meeting of pupils, every public meeting, every board meeting, some purpose is served. Commonly, the great difficulties of the school is the fact that its purposes are often not clearly thought through. There is probably no way in which schools can be improved more at less cost than through intelligent discussion which develops and clarifies sound purposes. My plea to all is that as these reports are studied, each person determine for himself, to acquire a clearer understanding of the purposes of American education and make sound application of such knowledge to thoughts and practices at the local level.

This year in Deering we are operating only the East Deering School with a registration of twenty-four pupils taught by Miss Margaret Milliken, and the other resident pupils are transported to Hillsboro in various cars. The enrollment by grades is as follows:

It would seem that payment by the district of costs of transporting High School pupils has helped to keep up the attendance of pupils of that group. Withdrawal of such support would probably cause hardship to many young people of Deering who could not then see their way clear to a much desired education.

If state aid for the next year is paid, even at the current rate, to help out the budget as presented and including the special appropriation for high school transportation, Deering's total expenditures per pupil would be well under the state average expenditures per pupil which was \$139.24 in 1945-1946.

Last summer the district authorized the board to dispose of the North Deering and the Pond school properties. Much legal work has had to be done on the titles to these properties but the way is nearly clear to culminate these sales.

During the past year, the school board has had a new ceiling installed at the East schoolhouse and Mr. Fales devoted considerable time to improving the stove arrangement. During the summer, the interior of the building was painted and pupils had a more pleasant environment awaiting them when school opened. This Fall, Miss Milliken, and her pupils promoted an auction which was extremely

well supported by friends of the school, and which netted the pupils almost enough money to purchase a combination record player and radio. The remainder of the needed money was donated by the Ladies' Guild.

Pupils at the East Deering school have the advantages of a large amount of the newest learning materials including textbooks and workbooks. Parents of these pupils have been very cooperative in promoting harmony within the group concerned and it is becoming clear that learning takes place much more completely when such conditions prevail.

Pupils who go to the Hillsboro schools have recently been benefited by the noon-lunch program providing a hot lunch for a very modest fee each day. Constant study of the problems of commuting pupils to these schools may eventually give these pupils greater improved educational advantages.

In conclusion I must thank the voters of the district for having elected to their board such harmonious and business-like persons as Mrs. Willgeroth, Mrs. Rich and Mr. Fales. Education can achieve much when directed by a well chosen board of education. Grateful thanks are due also to the parents of your children who constantly demand good educational facilities for their children. These serve as a challenge to guide our work.

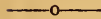

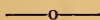

HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

PREVENT FIRES — IT PAYS!



Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxjayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy forest fire wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer to the forest fire problem. This is not as difficult of accomplishment as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this —

1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.

3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.

4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.

5. **HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES** — his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!
