REPORT OF SELECTMEN

During the 1962 year, other than the routine duties of the Selectmen, a few items are mentioned below:

Again bids were sent out for heating fuel for the Town Buildings and the lowest bid was Daniels Bros. of New Boston.

Most of the real estate of the Town has now been equalized with the exception of those under construction or being extensively repaired and some forest lands.

The Milford Cabinet was awarded the contract for the 1962 Town Reports at a substantial saving over previous years.

A meeting was held with the resident and non-resident taxpayers, after notice had been posted, to discuss future necessary projects for the welfare of the community.

We hope to hold such a meeting this year in August, believing that all taxpayers should be acquainted with the reasons behind certain expenditures. For instance, some years ago the Town contracted with the Francestown Electric & Water Co. to furnish water to the various Town buildings, but due to the allegedly indifferent management of the company in the past, we are faced with a substantial expenditure to insure water for the Town Hall so that we can keep it open to the public during the summer months.

We thank the advisory board individually and collectively for the fine work they have done for us this past year and believe that a board of this kind, used properly, can be of valuable assistance to any Board of Selectmen.

Due to the cooperation of the Tax Collector, Treasurer and School Board we were able to borrow considerably less money (short term notes) thereby saving on interest.

A new plan of paying employees has been introduced saving postage and the insurance structure was overhauled with the help of our agent, not only eliminating one \$1000 bond but getting more coverage for our money.

We feel that if everyone would cooperate and think of the Town as a whole, rather than individual department interests, a very healthy situation, tax-wise, would prevail especially as new houses and camps are being built and some of our wild land is in the process of development.

We will gladly meet with any resident or non-resident taxpayer by appointment to discuss any problems concerning the individual and the Town.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Francestown in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Francestown on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to draw five hundred ninety-one dollars forty-five cents (\$591.45) from the Capital Reserve Funds allotted to Town Hall or take any action relating thereto. (This will pay for the addition of a Selectmen's Office to the Town Hall.)

4. To see to what purpose the Town will apply six hundred eighteen dollars (\$618.00) balance from foundation repairs to the Town Hall.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to draw a sum not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00) to wirebrush and seal with rust resisting paint the fire escape.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed eighty dollars (\$80.00) to paint a sealer over the floor of the lower Town Hall or take any other action.

7. To see to what purpose the Town will apply the balance from the purchase of the police car radio or take any action thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750.00) to improve the water system in the Town Hall.

9. To see if the Town will vote to let the Cemetery Trustees draw all monies from the Cemetery Trust Funds to apply to the new cemetery or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to survey the bounds of the Town Common and have a plan drawn thereof showing footage and compass directions.

11. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance by adding the following paragraphs under Article #8:

1—It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

2—Upon any well-founded information that this ordinance is being violated the Selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court if necessary, or by any other Legal Action.

12. To see whether the Town of Francestown will in town meeting adopt the following ordinance:

Exercising the power granted by Chapter 36:2 New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, a town planning board of seven members is hereby created. The said planning board shall perform all of the duties and is hereby granted all the powers permitted under Chapter 36:1-36 New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955 and/or those that shall be permitted by the New Hampshire State Legislature from time to time, including but not confined to the following: preparation of a master plan, establishment of an official community map, and regulation of new subdivision and platting of land. The town clerk is hereby instructed to file with the register of deeds of Hillsboro County a notice of this authorization. The selectman member of said board is hereby designated as the member of the planning board to carry on the duties of Chapter 36:23 mentioned above and other duties where a planning board member must by law be specifically designated to act on behalf of the board. The first meeting of the planning board is to be convened by the Selectman designated as an ex officio member of the board on a day not later than thirty days after the passage of this ordinance.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future fire truck replacement or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500.00) to be placed in

the Capital Reserve Fund for future Town Fire Station or take any action relating thereto.

15. (A) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fire Wards, together with a committee of three from the Fire Company, to prepare plans, specifications and prices for the erection of a new fire house and report the same to an adjourned town meeting at 8:00 p. m., Friday, May 17, 1963.

(B) And to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00), less Capital Reserve Funds and interest, for town buildings and Fire Station, or to take any action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relating thereto.

17. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and take action on same.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Francestown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer, Cemetery Commission, Fire Department and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1961 – Dec. 31, 1962:

(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1961 and December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the financial condition of the Town changed from a Surplus of \$10,885.07 to a Net Debt of \$11,676.48 during the year 1962.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$847.12, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$514.27, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,361.39.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:

(Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1962, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$10,885.07 to \$11,323.52, during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, as shown herewith:

Highway Equipment Fund:

Income received from the use of highway equipment (grader) is paid over directly to the Trustees of Trust Funds and added to the principal of the Highway Equipment Fund which is held in their custody.

It is recommended that such income be first remitted to the Town Treasurer and then paid over to the Trustees of Trust Funds by regular Town order and Treasurer's check.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) of this report shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES GEORGE HOLMES BIXBY MEMORIAL LIBRARY, 1962

The Story-hours for the Pre-school children have now developed into a combined Nursery School and Story Hour of at least two hours weekly under the capable direction of Mrs. Donald Severance. Mrs. Severance and Mrs. Marsden and several of the mothers have given much time to help introduce these children to the Library, an extremely important service. The children enjoy hearing stories, playing musical games, painting, and crafts. They have also enjoyed two special parties: a Fourth of July celebration including a picnic in Mrs. Anderson's garden, and a Christmas party in the Library.

This year, the Library received an Honorable Mention for its participation in the National Library Week contest, April 8 - 14. With all the groups helping to celebrate, and with Mrs. Muzzey as Chairman, there was a full week of events. It began with an Open House, and Mrs. Champagne was in charge of the Tea. The Girl Scouts helped as hostesses and the 4-H Chefs made many of the cakes and cookies served. There were two special Children's Story Hours; there was a tea for the Women's Guild at which Mrs. Starrett and Miss Emily Lord gave book reviews; and the Brownies, with the help of Mrs. Basset and Mrs. Edward Jones, put on a charming play, "The Library Circus." The Library was open part of every day, and there were many exhibitions including paintings by Mrs. Woodworth's Art Class, potted plants by the Grange, painted trays from Mrs. Douglass' class, sewing, a special display of old family Bibles, and paintings by the children.

In May, the Librarian and Trustees attended the N. H. Library Association meeting and received the award for the Library, a very handsome book, "The Epic of Man."

In June, the Library sponsored an Arts Festival which was held in the Town Hall and the Library. Many, many people showed articles they had made. There were exhibits of painted tin, painted furniture, rugs, woodwork, jewelry, pottery, knitting, sewing and embroidery, furniture, and paintings. Outside, the children danced and sang under the direction of Miss Britte Imhoff. They also danced around a lovely Maypole lent by Mrs. Lord. Mrs. Bailey and Mrs. Liddell served refreshments. At the Library the children's paintings and paper sculptures, done at School, were exhibited—some being displayed outside.

In October, the Trustees attended the N. H. Library Trustees meeting in Concord. In the Fall, the Tray-painting class met with Mrs. Ruth Douglass of Derry on Tuesday mornings. For several weeks before Christmas, a group met to make cone wreaths and pine cone trees with Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. Eggert. The Library was open on Halloween and the Librarian

had "treats" for the visitors—and no soap appeared on the back door! Among some of the exhibitions at the Library, was a display by the Francestown 4-H.

Upstairs, in the Gun room and the middle room, two new ceilings have been installed. New railings have been installed by the front door. A colonial light has been purchased to be used outside, the present one will be used inside as it is not weatherproof. To make the record collection of more use, a small portable record player was purchased. This may be taken out with borrowed records. An electric broom has also been bought.

The evening hours were changed, and the Library is now open from 6 to 8 on Wednesday and Friday. These hours have proved to be more convenient.

Several people have suggested that they would like to come and work creatively, and the Library plans to have one morning or afternoon a week when such a group might meet.

Miss Hall and Miss McKinlay gave their series of the Metropolitan Museum Art Seminars and also a beautiful doll dressed to represent Lady Frances Wentworth.

Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Prest gave "Great Books of Western Culture." These books are contained in their own bookcase.

Mr. and Mrs. Wight gave many books.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kendall gave a collection of their books on Art and Architecture.

The Library is very grateful for these gifts.

The Library again thanks the Village Improvement Society for its donation of the "Doll Money."

Many people, too numerous to name, have contributed so much, and the Library is grateful to them all.

Special thanks go to Mrs. William Lord for her help at all times and particularly with the children when they come over from the School.

And many thanks to our Librarian for the wonderful job she continues to do.

REPORT OF THE FRANCETOWN FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1962

Board of Selectmen
Francetown, N. H.

We hereby submit our report and financial statement for the year 1962 together with our budget for 1963.

During the year we removed the "FM" radio from the "Brush Breaker" truck and installed it in the Fire Station as a Base Station, thereby giving us better contact with the Dispatch Center at Keene.

We continue our membership in the Southwestern Fire Mutual Aid.

It is possible that we will be able to discontinue the "Red Phone" system which is costly, and in its place utilize radio control. No decision has been reached as yet on this matter.

We were obliged to have extensive repairs made to the "Brush Breaker." It is unfortunate that due to the lack of storage space in the Fire Station we are obliged to de-commission this unit during winter months. This reduces our water-carrying capacity by about 40 per cent, a serious lack during the cool weather.

As we have pointed out in many past reports, the Fire Station is in very poor condition. During the extreme weather of the last week of the year men were obliged to report to the Station every few hours and start the trucks to prevent freezing.

As has been the custom in the past the Volunteer Fire Co. donated generously to the cost of the equipment, thereby relieving the taxpayers of greater expense.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Preventing Forest Fires Is Our Responsibility.

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man-caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control—pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to instill in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 2 fires. We burned 1/4 acre. Permits issued, 58.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of
Francestown qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March 1963, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will vote to include the transportation of Francestown students to High School as a part of its required obligations, to become effective July, 1963. This article to remain in effect until rescinded by vote of the School District.
10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400 to enable the School Board to carry out the above article for the fiscal year 1963-4. This money to be used for a contract with an approved Carrier, for transportation of High School students to Peterborough Consolidated School; and also to reimburse students choosing to commute to other high schools, to which the district is responsible for tuition, at an equitable rate per student.
11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The First Aid cabinet was checked and supplies were replaced.

Pre-school enrollment and examinations were held in May.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of Francestown, I respectfully submit my fifth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

STAFF AND INSTRUCTION

The school opened in the fall with one change in the school staff, Mr. Lawson Hatfield of Greenville, New Hampshire was hired as Principal and teacher of grades six, seven and eight to replace Mr. Carl Shaw. All other members of the staff continued, thereby helping to insure the proper continuity of the overall school program.

Two important programs in the instruction area have been initiated this year which, it is believed, will considerably strengthen the educational program of the school. The quality of instruction in reading, it is felt, is being considerably improved by the initiation of a very highly phonetic system of teaching reading. The Spalding System is being taught in grades one through five and requires children to learn all the ways in which common sounds of the English language can be written. The children learn these sounds and then spell words, using the sound spellings and the rules for using the spellings. Finally, the system requires that the words be written as they are sounded and spelled, adding a third phase to the overall program of this particular reading system. The system is being used with considerable success in practically all of the schools of the Union. Even though teachers were hesitant to embark upon this program which departs to some extent from traditional reading systems, the success in building word solving power has been so satisfactory that teachers are enthused and encouraged. The development of the program in the first grade must necessarily proceed very slowly. Parents must understand that youngsters will probably not be reading to the same extent in the first half of the year as they would under a traditional type program. Parents may very well expect, however, that by the end of the year youngsters will be reading at a level beyond that which is usually achieved in the first grade. It is expected that over a period of two or three years the results of this reading system will result in a marked improvement in the level of reading, writing and spelling. Moreover, the special attention which is being given to the sounds of letters and combination of letters will make it possible for youngsters to unlock the meaning and pronunciation of almost every word that they might be expected to come in contact with.

The second academic area being given considerable emphasis this year is in mathematics. The books which are being used and which serve as a guide for Mrs. Abbott in teaching

grades one and two, provide a modern approach to the entire subject of mathematics. This program will eventually be expanded to all grade levels. During the coming year it is expected that material at the third and fourth grade levels will be available. The purpose of the Modern Math Program is to tie together mathematics from grades one through twelve. This means that at the lower grade level basic concepts which are within the level of ability of youngsters in these grades, will be presented in a simple fashion. Ultimately, at the high school level many of the basic concepts first presented there now will have already been presented in a simple manner in the elementary school, thus making possible at the high school level, an even higher level of mathematical understanding. This will also mean that non-college students who usually do not spend much of their High School time studying mathematics extensively, will have a better general mathematical background than is prevalent today. This will undoubtedly better prepare them for the kind of world they are going to face in the future.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

Provisions for maintaining and improving the building is reflected by an increase of approximately Sixteen Hundred Dollars (\$1600.) in these two areas in the budget for 1963-64. Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.) is included within the budget to provide for the touching up and painting of the building. This work has been much needed for the past two years and any extension of time for doing this required work would result in a marked deterioration of the structure. The lighting facilities in the classrooms upstairs have been unsatisfactory for a considerable number of years. Facts brought to light since the construction of the present school plant have pointed up an increased need for better illumination for children working in a classroom. Each year evidence is uncovered which indicates that the amount of light available for each child can definitely affect the quality of work being done. An insufficient amount of light might have a harmful effect on a youngster's eyes. With these facts in mind the School Board has included in Item No. 1266 a sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.) to provide for the installation of modern fluorescent fixtures that will meet needed lighting requirements.

FINANCE

Two areas of the Budget other than those heretofore mentioned account for some of the overall increase in the proposed budget over the present budget. Item No. 210, Salaries, has increased \$500. This increase is vitally necessary to continue the kind of educational program that Francetown has been

fortunate in having for the past several years. Two of the teachers are working in classroom situations where three grades are in one room. Not only is instruction extremely difficult under such circumstances, but a certain limit is also thereby placed upon the educational progress of the individual child. Most beginning teachers would not seriously consider the teaching of two grades a room, let alone three, and therefore, it is extremely important that the present staff be encouraged to work in Francestown—first, because replacements would be very difficult to find, and secondly, teachers of proven ability are valuable. It must be remembered that the quality of a school is no better than the individual teacher. If a good teacher is lost, there is a good chance that good education is lost. As in other things, quality costs money. This increase will help to insure good education for Francestown children.

In the area of Tuitions, an increase of approximately \$1900 is shown. This is brought about by an increase in the number of youngsters who are attending high school from Francestown. The state average for high school instruction for the coming school year will be approximately the same as this year.

The sum of these additions to the present school budget results in a total amount required to meet the School Board's Budget of \$40,166.16, an increase of \$3,349.46. The actual assessment for school purposes is \$36,011.16, an increase of \$4,260.35 over that approved as the school assessment rate by the Tax Commission for the present school year. This further increase in the assessment is the result of a reduction of anticipated income of approximately \$911.

CONCLUSION

I am pleased to report that cooperation of the School Board, citizens and the school staff of Francestown are together resulting in a high level educational program. The continuing cooperation on the part of these three groups will make possible an educational program of which each and every citizen of Francestown may well be thankful and proud.
