#### **TOWN WARRANT**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilsum in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Gilsum Town Hall in said Gilsum on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at 7:30 of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To receive the report of the Budget Committee and act in any manner relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the town will appoint a committee to take charge of the observance of Memorial Day.

6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any or all pieces of real estate, either by auction or private sale, now acquired by Tax Deed.

7. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$419.00 as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital.

8. To see if the town will vote to have a committee appointed to consider the need of additional equipment for plowing the streets of Gilsum, and report their recommendation to the next regular or special town meeting. 9. To see if the town will vote to have a committee appointed to investigate the advisability of enlarging or improving the kitchen in the town hall and report their recommendation to the next regular town meeting.

10. To transact any other business which may regularly come before it.



#### SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the Town of Gilsum qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district on the 7th day of March, 1960 at 7:30 in the evening, to vote upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.

2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents in the district.

6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$384.00 for the purpose of paying the district's share of the salary and expense of a Helping Teacher to be employed by Supervisory Union No. 60.

11. To see if the School District will vote to authorize the School Board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Keene School District.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# **REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE**

The following is my report for the year ending June 30, 1959.

- 113 pupils had vision tests given by the school nurse
  - 13 pupils received vision notices
  - 70 pupils had hearing tests given by the school nurse
- 115 pupils were weighed and measured
- 115 pupils were given inspections by the school nurse
  - 65 pupils were found in need of dental care
  - 29 pupils attended polio clinics
  - 13 pupils attended pre-registration clinic
  - 15 pupils were checked and necessary follow-up done for small pox vaccination
- 115 pupils were instructed in Dental Education
- 97 pupils participated in tests for Albumin and Sugar

In studying the aims of the school health program one finds that health education is becoming another added aim to the list.

The aims of health education:

1. To instruct children and young people so that they may conserve and improve their own health.

2. To promote satisfactory understandings, attitudes and ways of behavior among parents and other adults so that they may maintain and improve the health of home and community.

3. To improve the individual and community life of the future: To work toward a better second generation and still better third generation.

Perhaps in this area we can integrate more health education into our daily living.

My sincere thanks to all who gave their time and effort to make this year a success.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Gilsum:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Gilsum's elementary per pupil instructional cost for 1958-59 was \$187.67. This is \$75.33 less than the average cost in the state.

It was decided at the December Supervisory Union meeting to request each school board to include an article in the school district warrant that would give the district's citizens an opportunity to consider the advisability of adding a Helping Teacher to the administrative staff of the Supervisory Union. This article is included in the warrant.

A Helping Teacher is an assistant to the Superintendent who usally spends the most of his or her time working to improve education at the elementary level. The guiding purpose of a Helping Teacher is the improvement of childrens' learning in school and the realization of this purpose is by helping the classroom teacher help the children. The classroom teacher is helped to develop her best potentialities. The Helping Teacher passes on to the classroom teacher the best of what is being done in other schools in the Supervisory Union and helps teachers keep abreast of the advances being made in curriculum and methods of teaching.

A Helping Teacher is an especially qualified teacher who has had a number of years of successful experience and usually has a masters degree in education covering administration, supervision, child growth and development, curriculum study, guidance, special education, tests and measurements.

The work of the superintendent and helping teacher is closely integrated. They work cooperatively to promote the best possible educational program without duplication of effort.

Approval of the state plan under Title III of the National Defense Education Act was made in November. Directions of procedure for school districts followed shortly and we are nearly ready to submit our local plan for the use of the federal funds available under this act. As soon as our plan is approved orders will be placed for the equipment to strengthen and improve the areas of mathematics and science.

Gilsum teachers met at Walpole with other elementary teachers from the supervisory union on January 7th to study ways and means of improving the use of California Test results. The meeting was conducted by two educational consultants from the California Test Bureau.

The Written Language Arts Syllabus has been completed and given to teachers to use as a guide. Each school in the supervisory union also has language arts syllabi that have been developed by other school systems. The additional syllabi are used for reference.

To help the school board keep well informed in regard to the educational program teachers are being requested to attend board meetings to report on a phase of teaching, such as reading, arithmetic or Social Studies. It will take some time to cover all subjects as it is not possible to include this item on the agenda of every meeting.

Mr. Davis has compiled a guide book of school regulations which is being studied by the school board with the view to adoption in the near future.

All of the faculty returned at the opening of school in September. However, a change occurred on January 4, 1960 when Mrs. Arena Damon replaced Mrs. Ellen Pearce as school nurse. This change is on a leave-of-absence basis. Mrs. Damon is a former school nurse in the Rockingham, Vermont School System. Another change is to take place February 1, 1960 when Miss Marjorie Shay replaces Mrs. Shirley Houle. Miss Shay did her practice teaching in Hanover and Lebanon and has completed the requirements for a degree at Keene Teachers College which will be conferred in June of this year. Mr. William Meeh is expected to be a cadet teacher in grades seven and eight during the last nine weeks of school.

A reduction of \$2,147.84 in the school assessment as compared to the amount of assessment listed at the district meeting resulted in a reduction of the anticipated tax rate.

Two factors were the cause of this change—a considerable increase in the amount of the estimated balance which was enough to more than take care of the reduction in receipts from state foundation aid. The reduction in state aid is due to an increase in the equalized valuation as determined by the State Tax Commission.

# PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple—

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles—use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home—Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.
