## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

### TO THE MEMBERS OF THE SCHOOL BOARD:

Herewith is submitted for your consideration my sixth annual report on the condition of your schools.

### TEACHERS

Two teachers were new to the force at the beginning of school in September. Miss Fogg, teacher in the number seven school, declined re-election at the close of the school in June, and Miss Eva Williams, who was teaching in Washington, was elected to the position. Miss Marie Shea, teacher in the intermediate school in the village, also declined re-election, and Miss Mabel Marshall, a Keene Normal school graduate, was elected. At the end of about six weeks service she asked to be released from her contract for personal reasons, which request was granted, and Miss Madeline Creamer, a Keene graduate, was secured to fill the position. Miss Ruth Perry, from the Keene Normal, has had charge of the music during the year. In the High School Mrs. George W. Weston was engaged by the trustees to teach the Latin and French for the year, as there was sufficient demand for the Latin to warrant its continuance in the course. The other teachers remained as for last year.

### THE WORK IN GENERAL

It is quite evident that the work being done in your schools is producing good results as seen in the progress of the pupils and as disclosed in tests that have been given in particular subjects.

Tests in reading and in the fundamental operations in arithmetic were given in the fall. The test in reading was intended to show the ability of the pupils to comprehend the thought from what it read. It has been shown quite frequently that many pupils who are able to read fluently orally are not able to comprehend clearly what they read. This ability, of course, is the primary object of reading and the major part of school work is dependent upon it.

I am glad to report that the results of this test were very satisfactory indeed. Sixty-three per cent of the pupils tested equaled or far surpassed the standard set for their grade. Eighteen pupils were classed as high average or very superior. Forty-three pupils were tested from grades four to eight inclusive. However the test revealed the fact that quite a number

of individual pupils are not able to grasp the thought accurately from what they read, and emphasis is being placed upon silent reading.

In the test in the fundamentals in arithmetic 27 pupils were tested in grades three to six inclusive. Twenty pupils, or about 74% equalled or surpassed the standard set for the grades. Notwithstanding this good record we are not letting up at all on the drill on these fundamentals.

All of these tests are standardized and by using them we are able to discover how our pupils stand in comparison with pupils in other schools over the country.

### THE HIGH SCHOOL

It is a source of gratification to know of the excellent work being done in the High School. The pupils who have gone out to Normal School and college are making excellent records for themselves and are reflecting credit upon the High School. The record of the school at fairs and in judging contests in which the pupils have participated has been excellent. The spirit of the school both in the regular work and in its sports is good, all of which are indications of the character of work the school is doing.

### REPAIRS

Aside from the general repairs incident to any school year there is nothing of major importance to be done, so far as I can see. In the matter of equipment it would be well to consider the advisability of equipping another school with modern school furniture. Two years ago modern furniture was put into the primary room. The intermediate room and the school at number seven are still using the old style, non-adjustable seats and desks, number seven having the greater need in this respect. The seats and desks there are of several different types and continually needing repair. Eighteen or twenty units of adjustable furniture would probably provide for the number of pupils likely to be there at any one time, and this would not involve a very great expenditure.

### ATTENDANCE

Last year there were 100 different pupils enrolled in the schools, with an average membership of 84.3 and an average attendance of 79. The per cent of attendance was 93.7 which was 2.6% better than the previous year. There were 145 cases of tardiness reported. An average of six days was lost during

the year on account of holidays, and other no school days. The following names appear as not having been absent or tardy during the year.

#### HEALTH

The following is the report of the medical inspection of school children last June.

One case of defective vision was reported as having been treated and ten cases of defective teeth. In 1922, 51 cases of defective teeth were reported and only three as having had treatment, although more pupils were examined that year. The comparison between the two years is of interest in view of the dental clinic which has been held for the last few years. If the number reported as having defective vision, enlarged tonsils and adenoids is correct it indicates that sufficient attention is not being given by parents to the defects found in their children. The notices sent out by the examining physician should be taken seriously, and if defects are reported they should be attended to.

To all who by their interest and cooperation have helped in the improvement of the schools may I express my appreciation.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD TO THE CITIZENS OF HANCOCK

Our schools have averaged well with other years in excellence of instruction and interest in each child on the part of teachers and attention to study and loyalty to school on the part of the pupils. The parents have co-operated splendidly by sending the children. Another step much to be desired is for them to visit the schools and understand better what is being accomplished. A few needed repairs have been made at No. 7. Also on slated roof at the Village school house.

After having experts come and examine the furnace, we decided it was better to remodel the old one rather than to purchase a new one. This was done for about fifty dollars, whereas the expense of a new furnace would have been from three to four hundred dollars at the least. The result is satisfactory and the rooms are being well heated.

Loretta Stickles at \$1200; Nellie M. Welsh, \$1100; Madeleine Creamer, \$900; Eva Williams, \$756. For music, Ruth Perry, at \$5.00 each day and expenses.
